NOVEMBER 2014 BOND ELECTION

Presented to Denton City Council on June 3, 2014

Citizens Bond Advisory Committee

- In November 2013, the Council formally established a Citizens Bond Advisory Committee and appointed 51 members, including two chairpersons.
- The Committee met 12 times from December 2013 through May 2014 to discuss the projects proposed by staff and the community.
- Three subcommittees were formed to discuss specific service areas: Transportation (including drainage),
 Public Facilities, and Leisure Services.

Committee Charge

- The City Council requested that the Committee focus on the following priorities:
 - Existing facilities;
 - Infrastructure;
 - Drainage improvements; and
 - Downtown area
- The Council requested that the Committee specifically consider including:
 - Reconstruction of Fire Stations No. 3 & No. 4
 - \$12 million for reconstruction of City streets

Committee Charge (Cont.)

The Council asked that the Committee evaluate whether to recommend the inclusion of new facilities and infrastructure.

The City Council also requested that the Committee consider including funding for Public Art Projects.

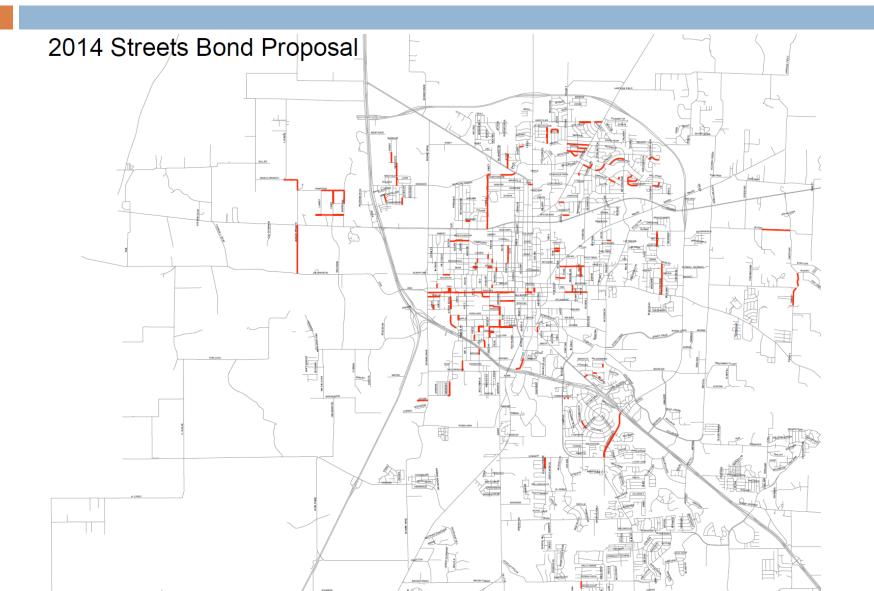
Recommendations

- The Citizens Bond Advisory Committee recommends a \$98.175 million bond program for the November 2014 election.
- Funding allocated among the following programs:
 - Transportation \$61,710,000 (62.8%)
 - Drainage \$8,545,000 (8.7%)
 - Public Safety- \$16,565,000 (16.9%)
 - Parks- \$11,355,000 (11.6%)
- □ \$535,000 is planned for public art

Tax Rate Impact

- Program assumes up to a 3 cent tax rate increase.
- □ Tax rate estimate is based on 8% growth in assessed values in FY2014-15 and 4% growth thereafter.
 - Tax rate impact will vary based on actual appraised values realized in each year.

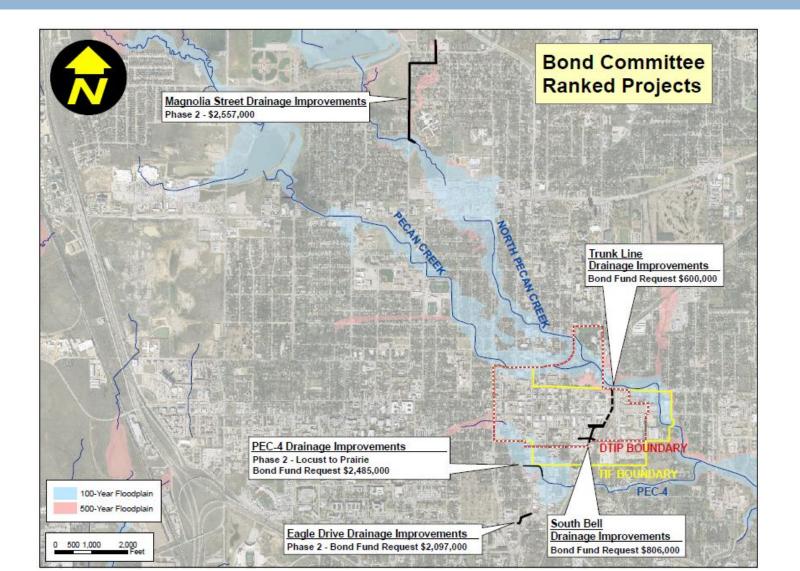
