Building a national movement

In 2012, Earthworks joined more than 136 groups around the country to launch Stop the Frack Attack, a national network to build the grassroots power of the oil and gas justice movement. On July 28, the largest rally and march on fracking to date took place at the US Capitol, with 5,000 fracktivists from more than 20 states speaking out for people whose lives have been impacted by fracking. Stop the Frack Attack is bringing together diverse groups to collaborate on campaigns and elevate grassroots voices to the forefront of the fight against dirty and dangerous drilling.

New uranium mining halted near the Grand Canyon

After a five-year campaign to protect the forests around the Grand Canyon from new uranium mining claims, Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar signed a 20-year administrative withdrawal in January. More than 100 million acres of land around Grand Canyon National Park are free from new mining claims. This is a huge victory for clean water and indigenous communities!


Supermarkets take a stand for Alaska's wild salmon


The Food Marketing Institute (FMI), which represents 1,500 of the nation's biggest supermarket chains and 75% of US retail food sales, publicly supported Environmental Protection Agency action to preserve Alaska's Bristol Bay. The world's largest sockeye salmon fishery is threatened by the proposed Pebble copper and gold mine. If developed, Pebble would be the biggest open pit mine in the world. Soon after FMI's announcement, the EPA released their draft watershed assessment detailing the grave threat that mining waste from Pebble would pose to Bristol Bay's unique ecosystem.





Goldman Prize awarded to Filipino mining activist

Father Edwin "Edu" Gariguez, a Catholic priest and mining activist from the Philippines, won the 2012 Goldman Environmental Prize for his work to stop irresponsible mining on Mindoro Island. Earthworks is proud to have nominated Father Edu for the prize. He joined five other recipients from around the world who were recognized for their sustained efforts to protect the environment, often at great personal risk.

Exposing how oil and gas companies get away with breaking all the rules

Earthworks released a series of trailblazing reports, *Breaking All the Rules:* The Crisis in Oil & Gas Regulatory Enforcement, changing how people think about the state regulation of oil and gas operations. Our reports debunked industry claims that states are the best place for government oversight. Data from six states revealed that more than half of all active oil and gas wells go completely uninspected each year and companies are seldom held accountable for violations. As a result, states have taken notice and some, like New York, Colorado and New Mexico, are beginning to take action to improve their record. Cities and towns, even in oil and gas industry-friendly states, are taking matters into their own hands to put a stop to the out-of-control drilling and fracking that threatens public health and the environment.
