Resolution Regarding Clean Water Act Regulations of EPA's Definition of "Waters of the U.S."

WHEREAS, the Clean Water Act (CWA) and implementing regulations of the past four decades recognize the partnership between federal, state, and local governments to achieve the objectives of the Act; and

WHEREAS, Section 101(g) of the CWA expressly states that it is "the authority of each state to allocate quantities of water within its jurisdiction [that] shall not be superseded, abrogated, or otherwise impaired by this Act"; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers have proposed a rule to redefine "waters of the U.S." that could significantly increase the cost and regulatory requirements for state and local governments and ultimately the costs for state and local residents and businesses; and

WHEREAS, the proposed rule provides almost unlimited CWA federal jurisdiction, impairs state authority and therefore contravenes congressional intent and is not consistent with three distinct rulings by the Supreme Court regarding the limits of federal jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, the proposed rule will apply to all programs of the CWA and therefore subject more activities to CWA permitting requirements, National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) analyses, mitigation requirements, and citizen suits challenging local actions based on the applicability and interpretation of new-found authorities; and

WHEREAS, the costs of obtaining Corps wetlands permits are significant: averaging 788 days and \$271,596 for an individual permit; 313 days and \$28,915 for a nationwide permit—not counting costs of mitigation or design changes and the greatest burden will fall on small landowners and small businesses least able to absorb the costs; and

WHEREAS, the proposing agencies' economic analysis for this rule did not consider impacts of the full range of CWA programs affected or of economic impacts to small businesses and the analysis relies on nearly 20-year old cost data that has not been adjusted for inflation and, in concluding that the proposed rule would increase the waters subject to permitting requirements by only 2.7 percent, the proposing agencies rely on a data base that is incomplete and not representative of those waters that are subject to jurisdiction under current regulation; and

WHEREAS, the justification for the scope of the proposed rule rests on a scientific analysis that is still under review and the proposing agencies decided to proceed with development of a proposed rule addressing issues associated with the connectivity of waters prior to being informed by the Science Advisory Board Review and the implications of its findings; and

WHEREAS, the proposed rule does not provide an explanation or clear understanding about how the proposed expansion of CWA jurisdiction and transfer of ultimate authority might affect other CWA programs, state laws and responsibilities, water rights, land use, governances, and regulated parties; and

WHEREAS, EPA and the Corps have failed to fully consult with the states thus undermining the cooperative federalism intent at the heart of the CWA;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as co-regulators of water resources, states should be fully consulted and engaged in any process that may affect the management of their waters; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the American Legislative Exchange Council urges the EPA and the Corps of Engineers to defer adopting any redefinition of the waters of the U.S. rule until:

- a) The Science Advisory Board concludes its review and the EPA and the Corps of Engineers incorporates the conclusions of the Science Advisory Board review; and
- b) An economic analysis is completed that addresses the full economic impact of the rule and uses properly updated data.

When this resolution is approved, copies of it shall be transmitted to the President, all members of Congress, the Administrator of the US EPA, and the leadership of the US Army Corps of Engineers and the ALEC staff is directed to advocate for policies that reflect these principles.



Weights and Measures and Standards for Dispensing CNG and LNG Motor Fuels

Section 1: Legislative Findings

The legislature does make the following findings concerning the use of compressed natural gas and liquefied natural gas as motor fuels:

- (a) Gasoline and diesel fuel are the two dominant motor fuels currently in use in the U.S. and worldwide:
- (b) The transportation sector in the U.S. is almost totally reliant on gasoline and diesel fuel and as such there is very little competition from other motor fuels;
- (c) It is in the interest of this country and this state to encourage the use of alternative fuels in order to reduce reliance on imported petroleum from unstable regions of the world;
- (d) It is in the interest of this country and this state to promote the use of domestic motor fuel such as natural gas in order to increase competition in the motor fuels market and reduce reliance on petroleum motor fuels;
- (e) It is in the interest of this country and this state to ensure that consumers and businesses understand the economic value of using natural gas compared to gasoline and diesel fuel;
- (f) The best way to help consumers and businesses understand the potential economic advantages of using natural gas is to ensure that it is dispensed in units that allow ready comparison with gasoline and diesel fuel;
- (g) Selling natural gas in units that approximate the energy contained in gasoline and diesel fuel will accomplish this objective and help better inform businesses and consumers. Since compressed natural gas (CNG) can be used in both light duty and heavy duty vehicles and is capable of displacing gasoline and diesel fuel, retailers should have the option of selling it in gasoline gallon equivalent units or in diesel gallon equivalent units. Liquefied natural gas (LNG) however is primarily intended for heavy-duty motor vehicles and will mostly displace diesel fuel therefore it should be dispensed in diesel gallon equivalent units.

Section 2: Weights and Measures and Standard Used for Dispensing CNG and LNG for Motor Vehicle Fuel Use

- (a) In General- the weight and measure officials of this state shall adopt rules and procedures requiring that the retail sale of compressed natural gas and liquefied natural gas used as a motor vehicle fuel are dispensed in the manner set out in this section.
- (b) Compressed natural gas. Compressed natural gas shall be dispensed either in gasoline gallon equivalent (GGE) units or diesel gallon equivalent (DGE) units. A GGE of CNG shall initially be

set at 5.66 pounds and shall remain at that level unless changed pursuant to a rulemaking. A DGE of CNG shall initially be set at 6.38 pounds and shall remain at that level unless changed pursuant to rulemaking.

- (c) Liquefied natural gas. Liquefied natural gas shall be dispensed in diesel gallon equivalent (DGE) units. A DGE of LNG shall initially be set at 6.06 pounds and shall remain at this level unless changed pursuant to a rulemaking.
- (d) Rulemaking Authority. The weights and measure authority shall conduct a rulemaking to establish procedures to carry out the provisions in this section and to adopt the values set out in this section. If it subsequently becomes necessary to revise such standards due to changes in the energy contents of motor fuels, the weights and measures authority shall take into consideration whether the National Conference on Weights and Measures has adopted similar standards for dispensing CNG and LNG and whether those standards use different values for GGE and DGE units. If the National Conference on Weights and Measures has adopted different GGE and DGE unit, it shall be presumed that such standards should also be adopted for this state unless good cause is shown otherwise.
- (e) Effective Date This section shall apply to any sale or use of compressed natural gas or liquefied natural gas no later than 180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act.



Resolution Concerning EPA's Proposed Guidelines for Existing Fossil Fuel-Fired Power Plants

WHEREAS, the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) and its member states supports an all-the-above energy strategy because it is in the best interest of the Nation and the states; and

WHEREAS, A reliable and affordable electricity supply is vital to the Nation's and each state's economic growth, jobs, and the overall interests of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, it is the prerogative of each State to ensure a reliable and affordable supply of electricity for its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the regulation of electricity is a sovereign State function that federal agencies have a legal obligation to respect and preserve; and

WHEREAS, on June 25, 2013, the President issued a memorandum to the Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) directing the EPA to develop guidelines to control greenhouse gas emissions from existing fossil fuel-fired power plants under Section 111(d) of the federal Clean Air Act and to seek input from states;

WHEREAS, on June 2, 2014, the EPA issued proposed guidelines limiting carbon dioxide (CO₂) emissions from existing fossil fuel-fired power plants under Section 111(d) of the federal Clean Air Act and published them for comment in the Federal Register on June 16, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the proposed guidelines are based on EPA's assessment of each State's ability to improve the efficiency of coal-fired electric generating units, retire or operate differently coal-fired electric generating units, substantially increase the generation of electricity from natural gas, significantly increase reliance on renewable energy sources, and substantially reduce the use of electricity by consumers, all in a plan and on a schedule that is not achievable and workable; and

WHEREAS, the proposed guidelines and plan, by EPA's own estimates have a major impact on the economy of each State and significant consequences for how electricity is generated, transmitted, distributed, and used within State.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that ALEC recommends to its state legislators to work with their other policymakers to provide comments to EPA on the legal, reliability, affordability, achievability, timing, implementation scheduling and other issues that need to be more appropriately considered for individual state to eliminate or minimize the aforementioned risks; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution are to be transmitted to the same persons as the previous resolution including the President of the United States, relevant department heads in his Administration, members of Congress, leadership in state policymaker associations, and state's legislative leadership and staff are directed to advocate for the provisions in this resolution, and collaborate with the aforementioned parties to educate and achieve the goals in this resolution.





Resolution In Support of Expanded Liquefied Natural Gas Exports

WHEREAS, plentiful natural gas supplies and unprecedented advances in technology have provided a historic opportunity for the U.S. to achieve energy self-sufficiency while creating jobs and wealth for our economy; and

WHEREAS, pioneering exploration and extraction methods have opened such vast natural gas resources to development that demand on U.S. natural gas markets can grow with little impact to domestic prices; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Energy estimates natural gas production levels by 2035 will be 55 percent more than the Department estimated only four years ago, a growth trend that can support all domestic demand while allowing the U.S. to capitalize on the economic benefit of exporting abundant natural gas to other nations; and

WHEREAS, expanding exports of liquefied natural gas (LNG) is a key component to helping the United States realize its potential as a global energy leader while creating hundreds of thousands of jobs and strengthening the U.S. economy; and

WHEREAS, global demand for LNG is expected to grow significantly over the next two decades; and

WHEREAS, LNG exports will create tens of thousands of construction and operations jobs and will support fifty thousand jobs in the exploration and production sectors for every two billion cubic feet per day of exports; and

WHEREAS, according to recent studies, expanding markets for LNG is expected to generate as much as \$86 billion in net benefits to the U.S. economy, could create more than 450,000 American jobs and help reduce the U.S. trade deficit by as much as \$60 billion by 2038.

WHEREAS, expanded LNG exports would promote stability in natural gas pricing and spur increased investments by the natural gas industry, providing more jobs and revenue for roads and schools in natural gas producing regions; and

WHEREAS, creating additional markets for U.S. natural gas is also consistent with national trade and security policy because failure to do so would force our allies to continue to rely on regimes hostile to U.S. interests for their energy needs; and

WHEREAS, construction and operation of LNG export facilities would incentivize new direct infrastructure investments worth billions of dollars and generate royalties and local tax revenues directly into communities across the country; and

WHEREAS, nearly 30 LNG production facilities have applied to the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) for licenses to export, yet only one project has received final permitting approval;

WHEREAS, a diverse coalition of LNG producers, energy and petroleum companies, business groups, service companies, elected officials and others have expressed their support for LNG exports.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC) endorses expanded markets for LNG exports from the United States and encourages regulatory and legislative policies designed to streamline and simplify the permitting process; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a suitable copy of this Resolution be transmitted to Members of the United States Congress as an expression of ALEC's support for expanded LNG exports and the streamlining of permit approval for pending export facilities so that the economic benefits of LNG exports can be magnified throughout the United States.
