# Scope

Lead in Consumer Products

- United States Textile Industry (excluding carpet)
- Wet processing industry sector (dyeing, finishing, printing)
- Hugh growth in imported textiles/apparel
- Hugh reduction in U.S. textile production

Sources

Lead in Consumer Products

- Primary Textile Industry

   (including quality, environmental, production, technical services)
- Fiber Industry
- Academia
- Trade Associations



## Possible Sources of Lead in Textiles

Lead in Consumer Products

- Dyes, dyestuffs and pigments
- Fibers (natural and synthetic)
- Ground water
- Lead pipes and joints in existing systems



## Major Dyestuff Suppliers to U.S. Textile Industry

Lead in Consumer Products

- No lead complex dyes offered
- Must comply with trace metal impurities (100 ppm for lead)
- Know of no operation in U.S. using lead based pigments



**Current Situation** 

- Lead in Consumer Products
- No lead added to yarns or fabrics by U.S. Textile Industry
- Testing of incoming fibers and fabrics reveal none or only trace levels
  - Even if trace amounts of lead existed, very little or none would remain on finished fabrics because:
    - Low application levels
    - Washed out during processing
