Purpose

Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge was established to conserve, manage and restore migratory bird populations.

Issues

Refuge staff work with community leaders to address beach parking and access issues resulting from the barrier island's westward migration.

Management for threatened piping plover and other shorebirds may conflict with public uses.

Chincoteague ponies graze on the refuge under a special use permit.

The refuge faces the potential for conflict between recreational beach use and the Service's mission.

Movement of barrier island complicates refuge management.
