CAPT Trueman Sharp, MD, USN

CAPT Trueman W. Sharp is currently the Chair of the Department of Military and Emergency Medicine in the F. Edward Hebert School of Medicine in the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences. CAPT Sharp was born in New Orleans, Louisiana. He attended Haverford College, where he received a Bachelors of Arts degree (with Honors) in History in 1978. After completing pre-medical courses at the University of New Orleans in 1980, he attended the University of Virginia School of Medicine, from which he received his MD degree in 1984. He completed a residency program in Preventive Medicine at the University of Washington School of Community Medicine and Public Health in 1987. This included a Masters in Public Health degree, which was awarded in 1987. He served as Chief Resident in 1987. His first assignment in the Navy was at Naval Medical Center, San Diego, from 1984-1985 as an intern in Internal Medicine. He then served as the medical officer for Destroyer Squadrons Seven and Seventeen from 1985-1987, during which he participated in a number of deployments overseas. After residency training, he served as Head, Epidemiology Department, U.S. Navy Environmental and Preventive Medicine Unit Seven, Naples, Italy from 1989-92. He was assigned to the Infectious Disease Threat Assessment Program at the Naval Medical Research Institute, Bethesda, Maryland, from 1992-1994. Dr. Sharp served as the Preventive Medicine Officer, Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps, from 1994 to 1997. He became the Officer-in-Charge of Naval Medical Research Center Detachment, Lima, Peru, from 1997-2000. During the course of these assignments, Dr. Sharp served in Operation Sharp Edge in West Africa, Operation Provide Comfort in Northern Iraq, Operation Restore Hope in Somalia, and with the Marine Corps Chemical Biological Incident Response Force during the 1998 Olympic Games. Dr. Sharp was assigned to the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences from 2000-2002 as the Residency Director for General Preventive Medicine. He then served as the Commanding Officer, Naval Medical Research Unit No. 3, Cairo, Egypt, from 2002-2005. CAPT Sharp has had a number of published articles on infectious diseases in military forces and on humanitarian assistance in the Journal of the American Medical Association, the American Journal of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene, the Proceedings of the Naval Institute and other publications. He is an author of five textbook chapters.
