

## AMERICORPS\*NATIONAL GRANT PROGRAMS

AmeriCorps grants fund programs that use service and volunteerism to address compelling community needs<sup>i</sup>. Applicants for AmeriCorps funds must identify the communities to be served and the community need to be addressed, and design a program that uses **AmeriCorps members**<sup>ii</sup> and volunteers to meet that need. AmeriCorps programs can address communities' educational, public safety, human, or environmental needs. Examples of AmeriCorps program activities include tutoring and mentoring youth, building affordable housing, teaching computer skills, cleaning parks and streams, running after-school programs, helping communities respond to disasters, developing a volunteer program, providing legal assistance, teaching adult literacy, and engaging in public health outreach. Successful applicants are responsible for recruiting, training and placing the individuals who will serve as AmeriCorps members.

National Direct Program An AmeriCorps program addressing community needs in at least two states. The <b>grantee</b> <sup>v</sup> organization is responsible for the implementation and oversight of local programs in different states. National Education Award Program (EAP) An AmeriCorps program that receives minimal financial support from the Corporation for National and Community Service and has fewer fiscal reporting requirements. Because of the minimal financial support, EAP grants are best suited for pre-existing service programs or for organizations with other sources of funding, for whom becoming part of AmeriCorps will add value to their program. <sup>iv</sup> Match is the amount of funds to be contributed by the grantee organization.

<sup>v</sup> A grantee is the direct recipient of grant funding.

<sup>vii</sup> An Indian Tribe is defined in the Corporation's Regulations as an Indian Tribe, band, nation or other organized group or community that is recognized as eligible for the special programs and services provided by the United States under Federal law to Indians because of their status as Indians, including any Native village, Regional Corporation, or Village Corporation, as defined under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act (43 U.S.C. Section 1602); and any tribal organization controlled, sanctioned, or chartered by one of the aforementioned entities.

viii An intermediary is an organization that takes on the fiduciary or management responsibility for organizations which do not have adequate capacity to do so.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>i</sup> For example, an organization might identify a need for children of immigrants to get additional support in developing their English language skills. The organization might develop an after-school program in which AmeriCorps members provide English as a Second Language tutoring to these children. The program would also work with local schools to ensure that their curriculum and materials complement what the school is using. The program might develop partnerships with local faith and community-based organizations that serve predominantly immigrant populations, and these organization could serve as sites, sources of children, or partners.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>ii</sup> An AmeriCorps member is an individual enrolled in an AmeriCorps program who commits to engage in community service for an intensive period of time. Some AmeriCorps members receive a living allowance to support them during their term of service, and upon successful completion of their service they receive an AmeriCorps Education Award. Also referred to as "member."
