From the days of Wilbur's early flights in France in 1908 until the present time, the Wrights have been the subject of numerous works of art, including busts, etchings, mural paintings, portraits, and, in particular, depictions of their famous first flight at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, on December 17, 1903.



Mosaic mural in lobby of Dayton Convention and Exhibition Center, Dayton, Ohio, reproducing the historic photograph, the original glass-plate negative of which is in the Library of Congress collection. Unveiled December 15, 1972, the 60- by 20-foot mural consists of 163,000 one-inch square tiles manufactured in Italy, each tile bearing one of eighteen symbols related to the story of the Wright brothers. Detailed reproductions are shown of the eighteen symbols, which were designed to convey graduated shades of light and, used with black and white tiles, present, when viewed from a distance, a total picture of the flight.
