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Public Comment Period Begins Five Refineries get Preliminary OK for Title V Permits

The Bay Area Air Quality Management District has made a preliminary decision to grant Title V permits to each of the five Bay Area refineries including:

Amorco Terminal, Waterfront Road, Martinez

These draft permits were subject to a public comment period in July 2002 and public hearings were held in the community for each of the permits. The Air District has modified the draft permits in response to the public comments received. A new public comment period on the modifications begins on August 12 and continues until September 15, 2003. During this time, any member of the public may comment on any portion of the permit that has been updated or corrected. A copy of the proposed permits can be found:

What is Title V?

Title V is part of the 1990 amendments to the Clean Air Act, and requires all state and local governments to develop and implement operating permits for all major pollution emitting facilities. The EPA oversees these permit programs and the Air District is charged with implementing them in the Bay Area, in accordance with Federal guidelines.

Title V is intended to clarify the complex air quality permitting process by consolidating federal, state, and local air pollution control regulations into one summary operating permit that covers all aspects of a facility's year-to-year air pollution activities. The Title V operating permit program is implemented under Air District Regulation 2, Rule 6.

Public comment is important to the Title V process. A final decision will incorporate consideration of public comments on the proposal.
