POSSIBLE AMENDMENT OF PART (C) OF THE EXPLANATORY NOTE TO HEADING 28.04

I. BACKGROUND

- 1. At its 29th Session, the Harmonized System Committee provisionally adopted the texts approved by the Review Sub-Committee concerning certain amendments to the Nomenclature and Explanatory Notes regarding silicones (Proposal by the US Administration).
- 2. The Committee also took note of the fact that the Sub-Committee had agreed to consider a possible amendment of Part (C) to the Explanatory Note to heading 28.04 at its next session. This was in response to an intervention made by the EC Delegate who indicated that he might come back with a new proposal to improve the relevant part of the Explanatory Note.
- 3. On 17 June 2002, the Secretariat received the new proposal from the EC. This is reflected in the Annex to this document.

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II. <u>SECRETARIAT COMMENTS</u>

4. The Secretariat wishes to first recall that, acting on the Scientific Sub-Committee's observations at its 17th Session in respect to the proposed amendment of Part (C) of the Explanatory Note to heading 28.04 (see paragraph 15, Annex A/10 to Doc. NS0060E2), the Secretariat had prepared the following text for the consideration by the Review Sub-Committee at its 25th Session:

Page 271. Heading 28.04. Part (C). Item(5). First and second paragraphs.

Delete and substitute:

"Silicon is obtained almost exclusively by carbothermal reduction of silicon dioxide using electric arc-furnaces. It is a poor conductor of heat and electricity, harder than glass, and it is put up as a chestnut-coloured powder or, more often, in shapeless lumps. It crystallises as grey needles with a metallic lustre.

Silicon is used in metallurgical industries (e.g., ferrous or aluminium alloys), and for the preparation of silicon tetrachloride. Very pure silicon, obtained by, for example, crystal pulling, may be in forms unworked as drawn, or in the form of cylinders or rods; when doped with boron, phosphorus, etc., it is used for the manufacture of diodes, transistors and other semi-conductor devices.

Modern electronics is almost exclusively (>95 %) based on silicon devices. Because of the eminent and ever increasing importance of electronics in technology and everyday life, silicon is one of the most important technical materials, although the quantity required for this application is relatively small. Of secondary importance are the uses of silicon for metallurgy and chemistry (silicon compounds), although they consume the major portion of the silicon produced."

- 5. The Sub-Committee, at its 25th Session, decided not to consider the above amendment. However, the Sub-Committee approved an amendment to the Explanatory Note to heading 28.04, Part (C), Item 5, first paragraph, to replace the expression "silicon carbide" by the word "carbon", which was found to be an error in the existing text. Consequently, this amendment was provisionally adopted by the Harmonized System Committee at its 29th Session (Annex O/3 to Doc. NC0590E2).
- 6. It appears that the EC proposal is an attempt to improve the above texts (paragraph 4), which were already examined and rejected by the Sub-Committee at its last session. The EC proposal is, in effect, largely a re-arrangement of the existing text and can, therefore, be supported by the Secretariat.

IV. CONCLUSION

7. Taking account of the Secretariat comments above, the Review Sub-Committee is invited to examine the proposed amendment of the Explanatory Note to heading 28.04 as set out in the Annex hereto.

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
