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Poverty in the United States: 1992

NOTE TO USERS: The estimates in this report are controlled to national population estimates by age, race, sex, and Hispanic origin. The population controls used in the preparation of the estimates are based on results of the 1980 census carried forward to 1992. The estimates in this report, therefore, may differ from estimates that would have been obtained using 1990 census results brought forward to the survey date. Population controls incorporating 1990 census results will be used for survey estimation beginning in 1994.

INTRODUCTION

This report presents social and economic characteristics of the population below the poverty level in 1992 based on the March 1993 Current Population Survey (CPS). Transitions into and out of poverty are presented using data from the 1990 panel of the Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP). The poverty definition used in this report is that adopted for official government use by the Office of Management and Budget and consists of a set of money income thresholds that vary by family size and composition (see table A). Poverty status is based on responses to income questions which in the March CPS refer to income received in the previous calendar year. In this report, families or individuals with income below their appropriate poverty threshold are classified as below the poverty level. These

poverty statistics exclude inmates of institutions, Armed Forces members in barracks, and unrelated individuals under 15 years of age.

Poverty thresholds are updated every year to reflect changes in the Consumer Price Index. For example, the average poverty threshold for a family of four was \$13,924 in 1991 but \$14,335 in 1992. Weighted average poverty thresholds in 1992 varied from \$7,143 for a person living alone to \$28,745 for a family of nine or more members. The poverty definition is based on pre-tax money income only, excluding capital gains, and does not include the value of noncash benefits such as employer-provided health insurance, food stamps, or Medicaid. For further discussion of this point, see the section entitled "Collection and Limitations of Poverty Data." The effect of taxes, realized capital gains, and the value of noncash benefits on poverty estimates are examined in P60-186RD, *Measuring the Effect of Benefits and Taxes on Income and Poverty: 1992*.

All demographic surveys, including CPS and SIPP, suffer from undercoverage of the population. This undercoverage results from missed housing units and missed persons within sample households. Compared to the level of the 1980 Decennial Census, overall CPS and SIPP undercoverage is about 7 percent. Undercoverage varies with age, sex, and race. For some groups, such as 20 to 24 year old Black males, the undercoverage is as high as about 35 percent. The weighting procedures

used by the Census Bureau partially correct for the bias due to undercoverage. However, its final impact on estimates is unknown. For details, see appendix B.

The data in this report consist of cross-classifications of poverty status by such characteristics as age, race, Hispanic origin, family relationship, educational attainment, work experience, and type of income received. Although the primary focus of the report is on the United States as a whole, some tables also present data by region and type of residence. In addition, appendix D presents poverty estimates and rates for States for the years 1982 through 1992, based on CPS figures.

In the text, the terms "poverty population", "poor", and "below the poverty level" are used interchangeably, as are the terms "nonpoor" and "above the poverty level". Characteristics such as age and marital status are as of the survey date (March 1993), while income, poverty status, and work experience data refer to the whole previous calendar year (1992). In the report text, the year cited refers to the "income" year.

HIGHLIGHTS

(The figures in parentheses denote the 90-percent confidence intervals.)

- The number of persons below the official government poverty level was 36.9 (± 0.9) million in 1992, a figure 1.2 million higher than the 35.7 (± 0.9) million poor in 1991 and 5.4 million higher than the 31.5 (± 0.9) million poor in 1989. The number of poor in 1992 was the highest since 1962, when 38.6 (± 1.0) million were poor.
- The poverty rate was 14.5 (± 0.3) percent in 1992, not significantly different from the 14.2 (± 0.3) percent poverty rate in 1991, but higher than the last low point of 12.8 (± 0.3) percent in 1989. The poverty rate was lower than in 1983, when it reached 15.2 (± 0.3) percent.
- Both the number and poverty rate for persons 25 to 44 years increased between 1991 and 1992. While the poverty rate for children (21.9 ± 0.7 percent) remained higher than that of other age groups, there was no significant change in the rate between 1991 and 1992.
- There was no significant change between 1991 and 1992 in the poverty rates for Whites, Blacks, persons of Hispanic origin or Asians and Pacific Islanders. However, the number of poor Hispanics was 6.7 (± 0.3) million in 1992, up from 1991.
- The poverty rate for the South remained the highest of the four regions, at 16.9 (± 0.7) percent, and was the only regional poverty rate that increased between 1991 and 1992.

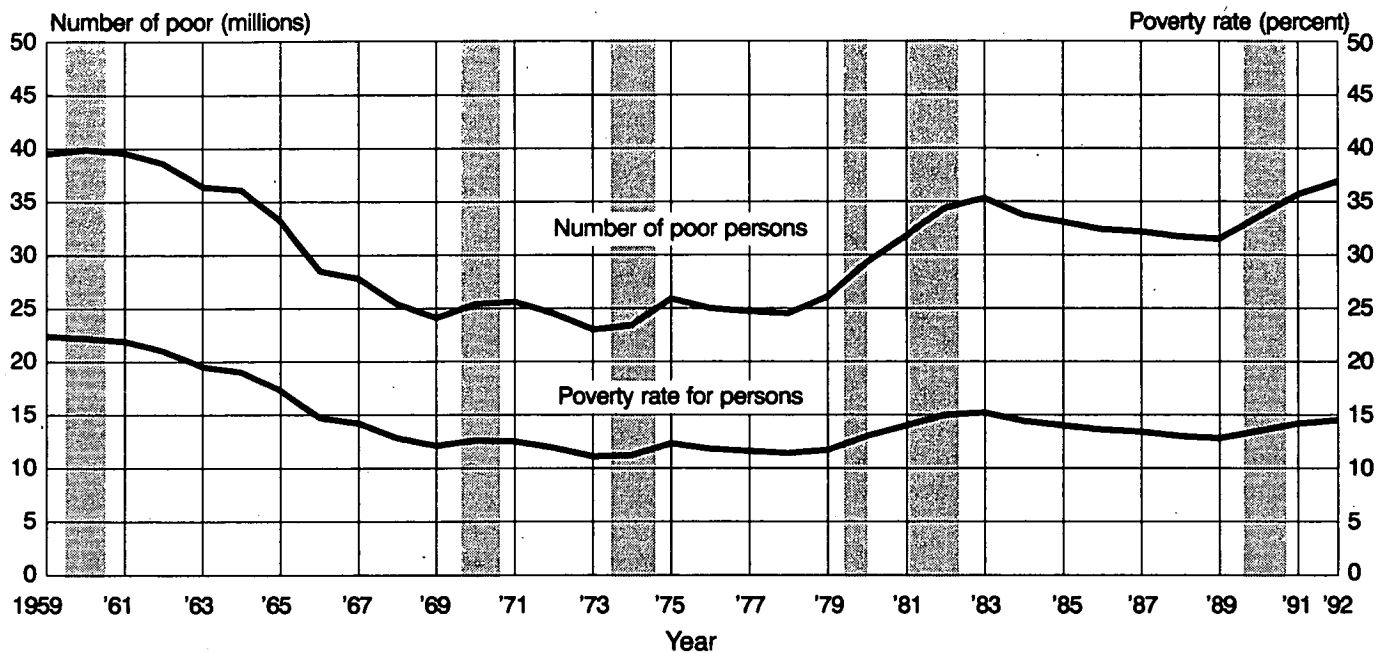
- The number of poor in the Nation's Metropolitan Statistical Areas was 27.4 million (± 0.8) in 1992. The poverty rate was 13.9 (± 0.3) percent. Neither was statistically different from 1991.
- There was no change in the number of poor families between 1991 and 1992. In 1992, there were 8.0 (± 0.3) million poor families, resulting in a poverty rate of 11.7 (± 0.3) percent.
- In 1992, 40.3 (± 1.6) percent of poor persons 16 years and over worked, and 9.2 (± 0.5) percent worked year-round, full-time. The number of poor persons in these categories remained unchanged between 1991 and 1992.
- The average amount of money needed to raise the incomes of each poor family above the poverty level was \$5,751 ($\pm \112) in 1992, not statistically different from the 1991 figure of \$5,681 ($\pm \114).
- About 42.7 (± 1.3) percent of the poor received cash assistance through such programs as Aid to Families with Dependent Children in 1992. On the other hand, 26.8 (± 1.1) percent of the poor received no assistance of any type, whether in the form of cash or noncash benefits.
- About 28.5 (± 1.2) percent of the poor reported they had no medical insurance in 1992. Poor adult males 18 to 44 years were the least likely age-sex group to be insured. Among the poor, persons of Hispanic origin were less likely to be insured than Blacks or Whites.

POVERTY IN THE UNITED STATES: 1992

The number of persons below the official government poverty level was 36.9 million in 1992, representing 14.5 percent of the Nation's population. While the number of poor showed a statistically significant rise from the corresponding 1991 figure of 35.7 million poor, the percentage of the population below the poverty level was unchanged. This represents the third consecutive annual increase in the number of poor (figure 1). Between 1989 and 1992, the poverty rate rose from 12.8 percent to 14.5 percent and the number of poor rose from 31.5 to 36.9 million. Prior to 1990, the poverty rate had not increased since 1982. Between 1983 and 1989 the poverty rate declined, although the year-to-year changes were not always statistically significant.

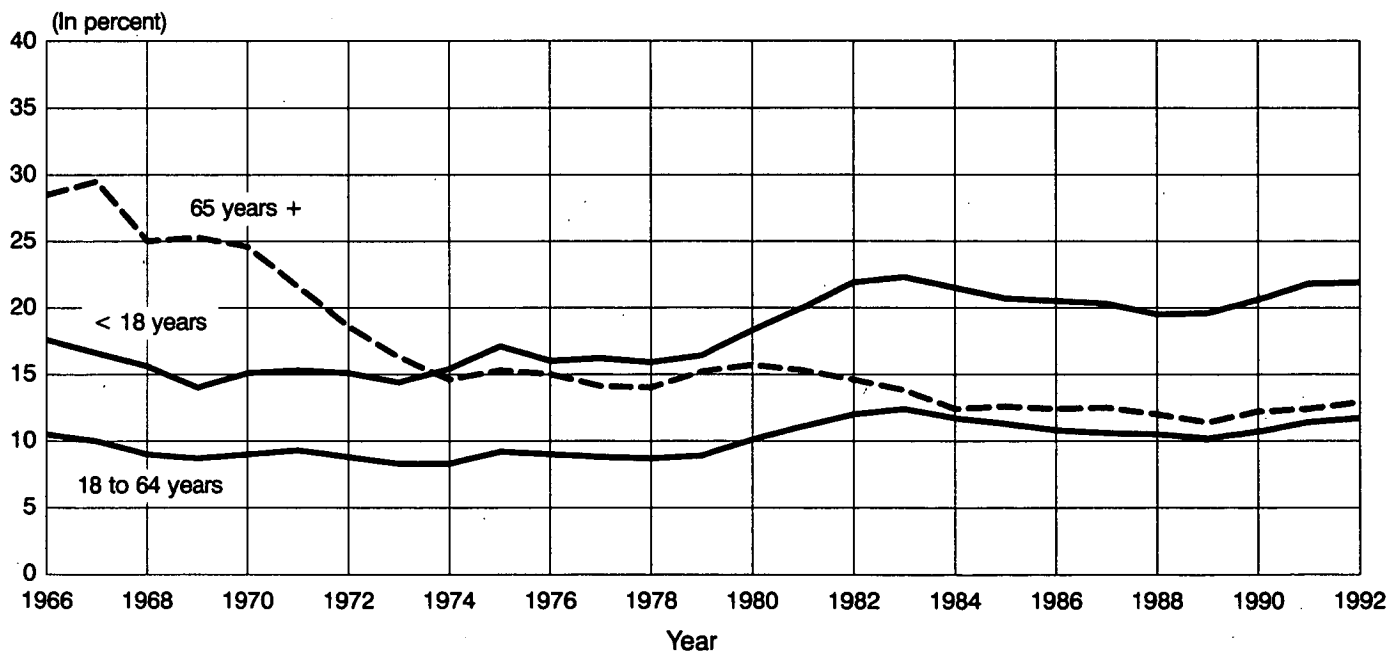
While the poverty rate in 1992 was lower than the peak of 15.2 percent reached in 1983 after the recessionary period of late 1981-82, the number of poor in 1992 (36.9 million) was greater than the 35.3 million poor reached in 1983. The 1992 poverty rate of 14.5

percent remains well above the 1978 level of 11.4 percent, the low point achieved during the economic expansion from March 1975 to January 1980.

Age. In 1992, the poverty rate for all children under 18 was 21.9 percent, 11.7 percent for persons 18 to 64 years of age, and 12.9 percent for the elderly. Half of the Nation's poor in 1992 were either children under 18 years or elderly.

The elderly are underrepresented in the poverty population. (Persons 65 and over are approximately 12.2 percent of the total population but make up only 10.8 percent of the poor.) However, a higher proportion of elderly (7.5 percent) than nonelderly (4.5 percent) were concentrated just over their respective poverty thresholds (between 100 percent and 125 percent of their thresholds). While 18.9 percent of the Nation's 12.3 million "near poor" persons were elderly, only 10.8 percent of persons below the official poverty level were elderly.

Children represent a large segment of the poor (39.6 percent) even though they are only a little more than one-fourth of the total population. Between 1991 and 1992 poverty for children did not change significantly. Prior to 1974, the poverty rate for children was below that of the elderly. Since 1974, it has been higher than poverty rates of other age groups. (See figure 2).

During the 1960's, the poverty rate among children declined from a high of 26.9 percent in 1960 to a low of 14.0 percent in 1969. Throughout the 1970's, 14 to 17 percent of children were counted among the poor in any given year. Poverty rose among children in the early 1980's, reached 22.3 percent in 1983, and remained at or above 20 percent throughout the 1980's. Poverty was again elevated by the recession of the early 1990's. The poverty rate for children in 1992, 21.9 percent, was nearly as high as it was in 1964, when 23.0 percent of children were poor.

Children under 6 years of age have been particularly vulnerable to poverty. In 1992, the overall poverty rate for related children under 6 years of age was 25.0 percent. Of children under 6 years of age living in families with a female householder, no spouse present, 65.9 percent were poor, compared to 12.8 percent of such children in married-couple families.

Black children represented 34.6 percent of all poor related children under 6 years of age, but only 16.3 percent of all children in this age category. The majority of poor children under 6 years were White (61.0 percent) and 21.2 percent were of Hispanic origin. Regardless of race or Hispanic origin, a very large proportion of children under 6 years of age living in female-householder families were poor: 60.5 percent, 73.1 percent, and 71.8

percent, for White, Black and Hispanic-origin children, respectively.¹ (See table 5).

Families with children under 18 years of age were much more likely to be poor than those without children. In 1992, 17.7 percent of families with children were poor, compared with only 5.2 percent of families without children. About 78.8 percent of all families whose incomes were below the poverty line in 1992 were families with children (see table 4).

In addition, families with children were more likely to be poor regardless of work experience of the adults in the household. In 1992, 8.1 percent of all families with at least one worker were poor, while for comparable families with children the poverty rate was much higher (12.0 percent). In families with at least one year-round, full-time worker, 3.2 percent were poor. The comparable proportion for families with children was 4.7 percent.

Poor children aged 16 and 17 were less likely to be enrolled in school or to have graduated from high school than all children in that age group. In 1992, 6.0 percent of all children 16 to 17 years of age were not enrolled in school, compared to 13.8 percent of their poor component. Of all young people aged 18 to 21 years, 13.4 percent had no high school diploma. The comparable percentage for poor persons in this age group was 29.2 percent, twice the rate of all young people.

The majority of poor young adults not enrolled or without a high school diploma were females. About 51.3 percent of the poor children 16 to 17 years of age not in school were females, of the poor aged 18 to 21 years without high school diplomas in 1992, 59.0 percent were women (table 12).

Race and Hispanic origin. In 1992, the poverty rate was 11.6 percent for Whites and 9.6 percent for non-Hispanic Whites. For persons of Hispanic origin (who may be of any race) the poverty rate was 29.3 percent, and for Blacks, 33.3 percent were poor (table B). For Asians and Pacific Islanders, the largest component of persons of other races, the poverty rate was 12.5 percent in 1992, not significantly different from the poverty rate for Whites.

Even though the poverty rate for Whites was lower than that for the other racial and ethnic groups (except Asians and Pacific Islanders), the majority of poor persons in 1992 were White (66.5 percent) and 49.6 percent were non-Hispanic White. Approximately 83.4 percent of the entire population was White, and 75.0 percent was non-Hispanic White demonstrating that these groups are underrepresented in the poverty population. Blacks constituted only 12.6 percent of all persons but 28.8 percent of the poor, a proportion that

has fluctuated little since the mid-1960's, as can be seen in figure 3. Asians and Pacific Islanders combined represented 2.5 percent of the Nation's poor. About 18.0 percent of the poor in 1992 were persons of Hispanic origin. This fraction is greater than their representation in the population as a whole (8.9 percent).²

Blacks and Whites showed no significant increase in poverty between 1991 and 1992. Persons of Hispanic origin showed an increase only in the number living in poverty, not in the rate (table 1). Compared to 1989, a non-recession year, 1992 showed a significant increase in poverty for White, Black, and Hispanic persons and families (table B). The poverty rate for Asians and Pacific Islanders, 12.5 in 1992, was not significantly different from their poverty rate in 1991.

Regions. Among the Nation's four regions in 1992, the Northeast and the Midwest had the lowest poverty rate (12.3 percent and 13.1 percent respectively, and not statistically different) (see table 8). The poverty rate in the West (14.4 percent) was higher than that in the Midwest and the Northeast, and as has historically been the case, the poverty rate was highest in the South (16.9 percent).

The South continues to have a disproportionately large share of the Nation's poverty population; 40.0 percent of the poor lived in the South in 1992, compared

with 34.4 percent of all persons (see figure 4). The South was the only region in which there was a statistically significant increase in the poverty rate between 1991 and 1992.

States. This report contains State level poverty rates from the Current Population Survey (table C).³ State poverty rates ranged from 7.3 percent in Delaware to 24.6 percent in Mississippi using a (1990 to 1992) 3-year average.⁴

Based on comparisons of 2-year moving averages (1990-91 versus 1991-92), four States had statistically significant changes in their poverty rates between 1990 and 1992. The poverty rate increased in California, Nevada, North Carolina, and Rhode Island. Poverty rates did not fall in any State between 1990 and 1992 (figure 5).

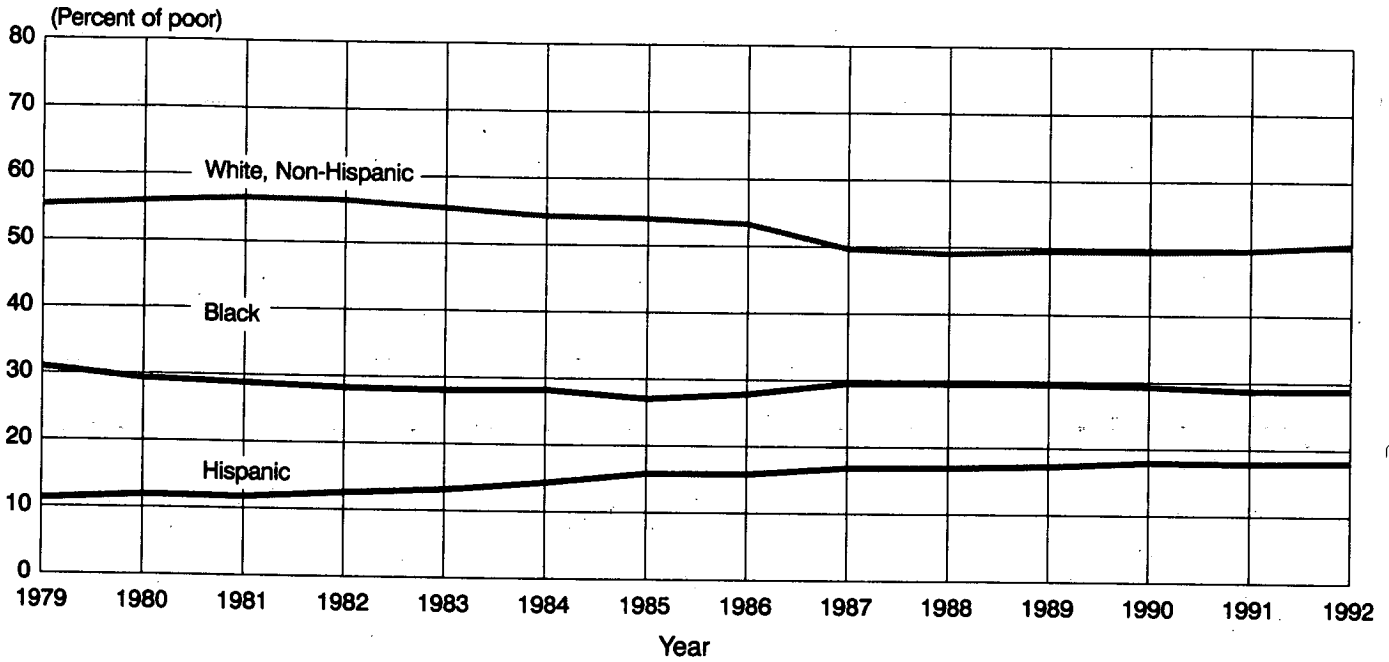
Also included in table C are poverty estimates for the Los Angeles and New York Consolidated Metropolitan Statistical Areas (CMSA's). These are the Nation's two largest CMSA's. Using the 3-year 1990-92 average, the poverty rate was 16.3 percent in the Los Angeles CMSA

³These estimates should be used with caution since relatively large standard errors are associated with these data. Somewhat lower standard errors are associated with the averages shown.

⁴Users should be aware that although the 1992 data presented in table B indicate that Mississippi had the highest poverty rate in that year and Delaware the lowest, none of these rates is necessarily statistically different from the next several higher (or lower) State poverty rates. Accordingly, we advise strongly against using these estimates to rank the States. Different samples easily could have led to different poverty rate estimates and rank.

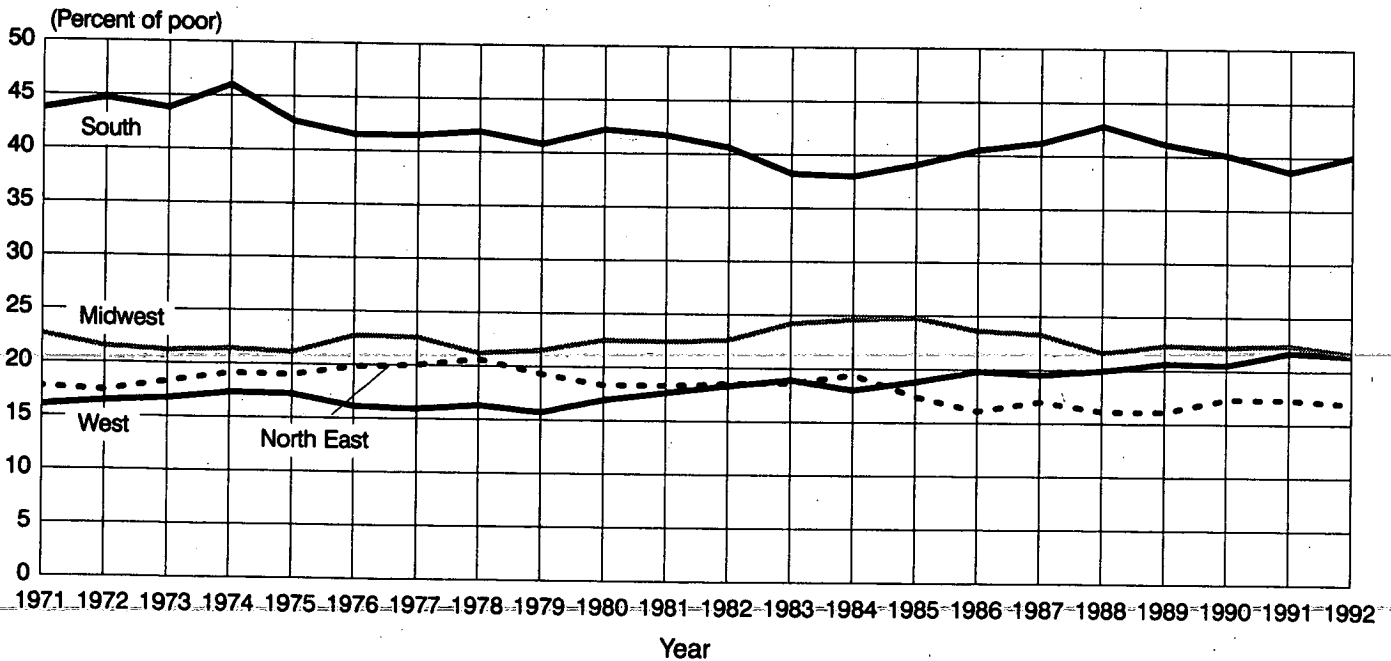

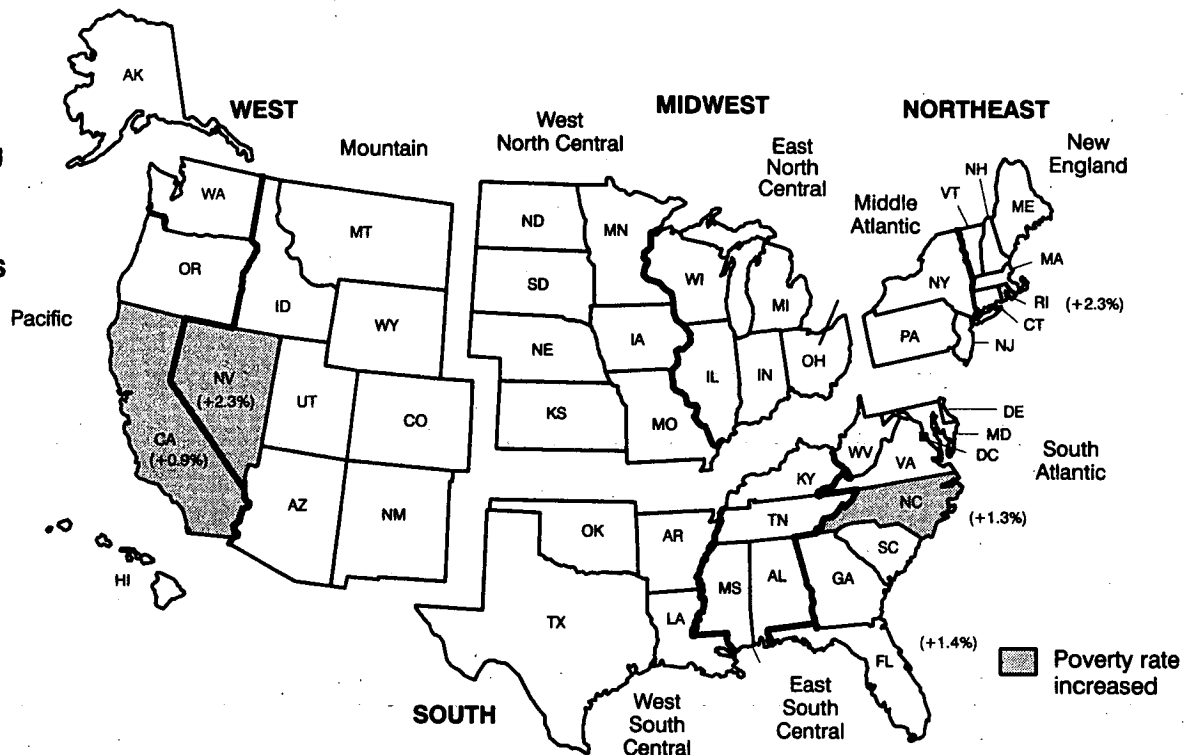

and 14.6 percent in the New York CMSA. The poverty rate in the Los Angeles CMSA increased significantly between 1990 and 1992 using 2-year moving averages. The rate for the New York CMSA did not change significantly.

Appendix D presents estimates of the number of poor and poverty rates (and their respective standard error) for States for the years 1982 through 1992 from the Current Population Survey. It is useful to note that the poverty thresholds are not adjusted for differences in the cost of living across States. Thus, a poverty level income might go farther in rural Mississippi than in urban Connecticut.

Metropolitan/Nonmetropolitan Residence. As has historically been the case, the nonmetropolitan poverty rate in 1992 (16.8 percent) was higher than the rate for metropolitan areas (13.9 percent). Central cities of metropolitan areas had the highest poverty rate, 20.5 percent. In 1992, 42.4 percent of the poor lived in central cities, compared to 30.1 percent of all persons.

The number of poor and poverty rate in the Nation's metropolitan areas did not change between 1991 and 1992, while the number of poor persons living outside metropolitan areas did increase significantly (table 1).

Within metropolitan areas, poverty rates were unchanged between 1991 and 1992 in both central cities and suburban areas.⁵

Poverty Areas. Among areas of high poverty concentration (termed poverty areas), the poverty rate was somewhat higher in large cities than elsewhere: 39.5 percent in central cities, 31.7 percent in suburban poverty areas, and 27.3 percent in nonmetropolitan poverty areas (see table 9).⁶

While the majority of the 12.7 million poor poverty area residents lived in central cities (59.3 percent), 13.0 percent lived in suburban areas and 27.7 percent lived outside metropolitan areas.

About 34.5 percent of the Nation's poor in 1992 lived in poverty areas, not statistically different from 1991.

Families, Family Composition, and Unrelated Individuals. The poverty rate for families was 11.7 percent in 1992. For families with a female householder, no spouse present, the poverty rate was 34.9 percent, while the rate for families with a male householder was 15.6 percent. Married-couple families had the lowest poverty rate at 6.2 percent.

Female-householder families were over-represented among the poor. While 52.4 percent of all poor families had a female householder, with no spouse present, only 17.5 percent of all families in the U.S. had a female householder. While neither of these figures was statistically different from their respective 1991 estimates, the percent of female-householder families among all families has increased significantly from 1989 (from 16.5 percent). Over the same period, the proportion of poor families with female householders has not risen significantly (see table D).

White families had a lower poverty rate (8.9 percent in 1992), than Black families (30.9 percent), or families of Hispanic origin (26.2 percent) and are therefore under-represented among the poor. Of all poor families, 64.8 percent were White, 30.6 were Black, and 17.5 percent were of Hispanic origin. In contrast, 84.9 percent of all families in the U.S. are White, 11.6 percent are Black, and about 7.8 percent are of Hispanic origin.

The lower overall poverty rate for Hispanic-origin families compared with Black families was the result of different distributions by family type between the two groups. The poverty rates within type of family for Hispanic-origin families exceeded or were not statistically different from those for Blacks for married couples and families with a female householder, no husband present. For example, the poverty rate for Hispanic-origin married couples was 18.5 percent in 1992 compared with 13.0 percent for Blacks, and about 50 percent of both Black and Hispanic-origin families with a female householder, no husband present were below the poverty level in 1992. However, female-householder families constituted 46.7 percent of Black families compared with 23.3 percent of Hispanic-origin families. It is this difference in demographic composition that leads to higher poverty rates for Black persons and families.

Poverty rates for families in 1992 decreased with increasing age of the householder (38.2 percent for those under age 25, 14.0 percent for those 25 to 44 years of age, 7.3 percent for those with a householder 45 years and over). Poverty rates decreased with the number of workers in the family (table 19), and increased with family size (table 23). Poverty rates for families with a householder aged 25 years and over also decreased as years of school completed by the householder increased.

Those persons not in families (the 8.0 million unrelated individuals; persons living alone or with nonrelatives only) had a poverty rate of 21.8 in 1992, not

significantly different from the 1991 rate. Unrelated individuals accounted for 21.7 percent of the poverty population, compared with only 14.5 percent of the entire U. S. population.⁷

Work Experience of Persons and Family Household-ers. In 1992, 40.3 percent of poor persons 16 years old and over worked during 1992 and 9.2 percent worked year-round, full-time. For all persons the comparable figures were about 69.1 and 42.1 percent, respectively. The proportions of poor persons 16 years and over who worked at any time and those who worked year-round, full-time in 1992 were not statistically different from those in any year since 1980. (See table E).

Among poor family householders, 49.1 percent worked in 1992 and 15.3 percent worked year-round, full-time (see table 19). Neither of these figures is significantly different from the comparable 1991 estimate. For comparison, 76.8 percent of all family householders worked in 1992 and 56.7 percent worked year-round, full-time.

In 1992, 69.0 percent of poor married-couple families had at least one worker, and both spouses worked in 24.1 percent of such families (see table 19). About 12.3 percent of husbands in poor married-couple families who did not work in 1992 indicated retirement as the reason while 48.1 percent gave illness or disability as the reason and the remaining 39.6 percent gave a reason such as unable to find work or going to school.⁸ For all married-couples, 37.4 percent of husbands who did not work were retired.

In 1992, 41.9 percent of poor female householders worked, and 9.0 percent worked year-round, full-time. These participation rates were lower than those for female householders generally. The majority of poor female family householders aged 16 to 64 who did not work gave family responsibilities as the reason for not being in the labor force (63.7 percent). (See table 15).

In 1992, 58.9 percent of all poor families had at least one worker and 16.6 percent of all poor families had two or more workers (see table 19). When considering all families in the U.S., the majority had two or more workers in 1992 (56.7 percent). Poverty rates tended to decrease as number of workers in the family increased, from 31.6 percent for families with no workers to 3.4 percent for families with two or more workers.

Educational Attainment of Family Householders. In 1992, 56.1 percent of poor family householders 25 years old and older were high school graduates, compared with 80.7 percent of all householders (see table

11). Poverty rates decreased dramatically as years of schooling increased: the poverty rate was 24.1 percent for householders who had not completed high school, 11.0 percent for those who had a high school diploma, but no college, and 7.2 percent for householders who had completed some college but had no degree. Of householders with at least a bachelors degree, only 2.2 percent were poor in 1992.

This general relationship between education and poverty exists regardless of race or Hispanic origin, although large differences exist among these groups within education category. For example, 28.4 percent of Black family householders who were high school graduates (but had no college) were below the poverty level in 1992, while 19.4 percent of Hispanic householders and only 8.4 percent of White householders with comparable education were poor. At the same time, 32.6 percent of poor Hispanic householders had a high

school diploma, compared with 57.0 percent of White and 53.8 percent of Black householders below the poverty level (these last 2 percentages are not statistically different).

Mean Income Deficit. The income deficit measures the difference in dollars between a family's income and their respective poverty threshold. In 1992, the mean income deficit for families was \$5,751, not significantly different from the 1991 figure of \$5,681 (in 1992 dollars). This amounts to a deficit per family member of \$1,638 in 1992. The mean income deficit for poor families with a female householder, no husband present (\$6,223) was higher than that for married-couple families (\$5,219). This difference is compounded by the fact that poor families with a female householder were smaller than poor married-couple families. Thus, the deficit per family member was \$1,892 in 1992 for

families with a female householder, no husband present, compared with \$1,350 for married-couple families (see table 22).

For unrelated individuals, the average income deficit was \$3,218 in 1992, significantly higher than their average deficit of \$3,107 in 1991 (in 1992 dollars). The average deficit in 1992 for female unrelated individuals was \$2,978, significantly lower than the \$3,597 figure for men. A larger proportion of female unrelated individuals were aged 65 and over, a group for whom poverty thresholds are about \$500 lower than for younger persons.

Another gauge of the relative distance of the poor from the poverty level is the proportion below specified fractions of their respective poverty thresholds. For all poor persons, 40.7 percent, or 15.0 million persons, were in families (or were unrelated individuals) whose total income in 1992 was below one-half of their respective poverty threshold (table 6). This fraction was not different from the figure for 1991, but it is higher than the estimate for 1990 (38.5 percent). For additional data on income-to-poverty ratios, see Current Population Reports, Series P60-184, *Money Income of Households, Families, and Persons in the United States: 1992*.

In 1992, there were 11.4 million poor persons whose family income (or personal income in the case of unrelated individuals) was between 75 percent and 99 percent of their poverty threshold. These persons represented 30.9 percent of all poor persons. A slightly larger number of persons (12.3 million) had "near poor" income in 1992 — that is, income more than their respective poverty threshold but below 125 percent of their threshold. The number of "near poor" persons increased significantly from the previous year.

There were 400,000 poor families and 831,000 poor unrelated individuals whose 1992 incomes were within \$500 of their respective poverty thresholds, while a similar number of families and unrelated individuals had incomes in 1992 within \$500 above their respective poverty thresholds.

Receipt of Assistance from Government Programs.

About 42.7 percent of persons below the poverty level in 1992 received means-tested cash assistance⁹ in that year through such programs as Aid to Families with Dependent Children or Supplementary Security Income (see table F). The majority (56.0 percent) of persons in households where cash assistance was received had incomes still below the official poverty level after the assistance was counted as income in 1992. The eligibility criteria for many programs are multiples of the poverty level (for example, 185 percent of the appropriate poverty guideline) so that a family could have earnings part of the year or some other non-welfare income and cash government assistance another part of the year which could combine to produce an annual income above the poverty level.

In 1992, 66.6 percent of the poor (24.6 million) were in households that received means-tested assistance other than free or reduced price-school lunches and 8.8 million of these received noncash benefits only. Another 2.4 million poor persons were in households which received free or reduced-price school lunches but no

other assistance; only 1.3 million of whom were children under 18 years. About 73.2 percent of the poor received some sort of means-tested assistance (including school lunches).

In 1992, 26.8 percent of the poor received no benefits of any sort. There are several explanations why this would occur. Some were ineligible because of assets such as a car or savings; some did not know they were eligible; others knew they were eligible but chose not to accept assistance or felt the effort was not worth the small amount of benefits for which they qualified.¹⁰

About 88.4 percent of poor related children under 18 years were in households where some form of means-tested benefit was received. This included 93.2 percent of children in families with a female householder, no spouse present and 81.7 percent of those in married-couple families. About 47.0 percent of the elderly poor received some form of means-tested benefits.

In 1992, 45.2 percent of poor unrelated individuals received such benefits, with 25.5 percent of these unrelated individuals receiving cash assistance.¹¹

Health Insurance Coverage. Despite the existence of such programs as Medicaid and Medicare, 28.5 percent of the poor in 1992 reported that they had no medical insurance of any kind at any time during that year (see table G).¹² About 12.4 percent of persons with income above the poverty level lacked medical insurance in 1992. The percent of nonpoor persons without coverage rose significantly from the 1991 measure of 11.7

percent. The percent of the poor without health insurance was not different from the previous year. Persons with income below the poverty level represented 28.1 percent of the 37.4 million uninsured persons.

In 1992, 47.2 percent of the poor were covered by Medicaid (or Medicaid as well as some form of private insurance), 13.4 percent were covered by Medicare (or Medicare as well as some other form of insurance), 1.9 percent reported coverage under a Veterans or military plan, and 22.0 percent were covered by a private health plan, generally through their employer or a relative's employer.

Poor adult males 18 to 44 years were the least likely age-sex group to have insurance, with 54.6 percent uninsured in 1992. About 20.1 percent of poor children under 18 years had no insurance, compared with 3.1 percent of the elderly poor. Poor persons of Hispanic origin were more likely to be uninsured (41.2 percent) than Whites (31.0 percent) or Blacks (22.6 percent).¹³

TRANSITIONS INTO AND OUT OF POVERTY

While year-to-year changes in the number of persons in poverty are, in general, relatively small, the poverty population is actually much more dynamic than is commonly thought. In fact, many more people change poverty status from 1 year to the next than are indicated by simply looking at the net change in the poverty rate. This can be seen from an analysis of the Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP), a longitudinal income survey conducted by the Census Bureau. Unlike the income information collected in the CPS, which does not allow the analysis of change in income or poverty status over time, SIPP data make it possible to gauge movement along the income distribution and into and out of poverty for the same person in 2 consecutive years. These data enable comparisons to be made between the characteristics of persons who remained poor from 1 year to the next, those who exited poverty, and those who became poor.

The analysis in this section refers to poverty transitions between 1990 and 1991, the most recent annual longitudinal estimates available from SIPP. Based on persons interviewed over this 2-year period, 18.8 million persons who were poor in 1990 remained poor in 1991. However, there was a 1.1 million increase in the number of persons in poverty between 1990 and 1991.¹⁴ This increase, however, may more accurately be viewed as the net result of the poverty transitions experienced by

11.3 million persons, as 5.1 million persons moved out of poverty and 6.2 million persons moved into poverty. About one-fifth of the persons who were poor in 1990 were not poor in 1991 (see table H). The following sections describe the characteristics associated with differing poverty entrance and exit rates.

It should be noted that longitudinal estimates presented here are based only on responses of persons who were interviewed in all eight waves of the 1990 panel. Insofar as persons who left the sample experienced poverty differentially from those who were interviewed, these estimates may be biased.

Differences in Transitions by Selected Characteristics

The years 1987 and 1988 were a period of economic upswing, while 1990 and 1991 were recession years. Thus, one would expect a higher probability of becoming poor and a lower probability of leaving poverty behind in the 1990-1991 period than in 1987-1988. Table H shows that 2.9 percent of the nonpoor became poor in 1991 while 21.2 percent of the poor left poverty. These estimates show a greater probability of becoming poor in the recessionary period of 1990-91 and a lower probability of leaving poverty compared with the 1987-88 period during which only 2.2 percent became poor while one-fourth of the poverty population became nonpoor.

Race and Hispanic origin. Whites were more likely than their Black and Hispanic origin counterparts to exit poverty between 1990 and 1991. Table H shows that 23.3 percent of Whites who were poor in 1990 were able to exit poverty by 1991 compared with 17.4 percent of Blacks and 14.3 percent of persons of Hispanic origin.

As in the 1987-88 period, White nonpoor persons were significantly less likely to enter poverty in 1991 than Blacks or persons of Hispanic origin. While 2.5 percent of nonpoor Whites became poor, 8.3 percent of persons of Hispanic origin and 6.5 percent of Blacks did so.

While 1991 exit rates for Black and Hispanic persons were not significantly different from 1988, the exit rate for Whites decreased from 30.0 percent in the 1987-88 period to 23.3 percent in the 1990-91 period. On the other hand, all three groups had higher entrance rates in the later period.

Age. Nonelderly adults (persons aged 18 to 64) were the only age group that experienced significant changes in exit and entrance rates between 1988 and 1991. As can be seen in table H, their exit rate decreased from 30.0 percent in 1988 to 24.5 percent in 1991. At the same time, their entrance rates increased from 2.0 to 2.6 percent.

As in the earlier period, elderly poor persons (those aged 65 and over) were less likely to exit poverty than children (under 18 years) and nonelderly adults. The exit rate for the poor, aged 65 and above, was 14.2 percent, compared to 24.5 percent for poor persons between 18 and 64 years of age and 19.0 percent for poor children (the exit rates for the elderly and for children were not significantly different).

Children were more likely to become poor than other age groups. Of those who were nonpoor in 1990, 4.3 percent became poor in 1991, compared to 2.6 percent

of nonelderly adults and 1.7 percent of the elderly. Apparent changes in entrance rates over time were only significant for nonelderly adults.

Family composition. In the 1990-91 period, poor persons who went from being members of other family types to being members of married-couple families had an exit rate of 58.0 percent, significantly higher than the 12.7 percent of persons who remained members of other family types for the entire 2-year period. Persons who changed from being members in married-couple

families to some other family type had a exit rate of 17.6 percent, not significantly different from persons who remained members of married-couple families, about 28.7 percent.¹⁵

Work experience and number of workers. Similar to the estimates from the 1987-88 period, almost 42 percent of poor persons who worked year-round, full-time in both years exited poverty in 1991. As shown in table H, poor adults who did not work during the 2-year period had the lowest exit rate (14.0 percent).

Table H also shows that the number of workers in the family was strongly associated with the exit rate. Only 8.5 percent of the poor whose family had no workers in either year exited poverty compared to 30.5 percent of those with one worker in both years and 44.3 percent of those with two or more workers in both years.

The exit rate of persons in families that increased the number of workers over the 2-year period was significantly higher than the exit rate for all persons, 47.2 versus 21.2 percent. On the other hand, 9.2 percent of persons in families with a decreased number of workers fell into poverty, a rate three times as high as the entrance rate for all persons (2.9 percent).

Computation of Poverty Status in SIPP and Comparison With CPS Estimates

Official poverty data in the CPS are based on questions on income received in the preceding calendar year which are asked in the March supplement. Family composition is fixed as of the survey date and assumed to be constant over the previous year (in the case of 1990 poverty status, the data were collected in March 1991). In the 1990 SIPP panel, income information was collected for each month. Family composition data was updated on a monthly basis also. A person's annual poverty status was determined by comparing the sum of the person's monthly income (family income or unrelated individual income as appropriate) against the sum of the appropriate monthly poverty thresholds. If the sum of the monthly incomes was below the sum of the monthly poverty thresholds, the person was classified as below the poverty level for the year.

Poverty estimates vary considerably between the CPS and SIPP. An earlier study showed that an approach that adjusts poverty for changes in household composition results in a poverty estimate that is about 5 percent lower than an estimate based on an approach that does not adjust for changes in household composition.¹⁶

Other than treatment of changes in household composition, there are several other differences between CPS and SIPP that should be noted in comparing results from the two surveys. First, the shorter recall period in SIPP results in more accurate data on the receipt of transfer income. This difference would tend to result in SIPP poverty estimates that are lower than CPS poverty estimates. A second difference concerns the way in which self-employment income is recorded. It is possible to record negative amounts in CPS, but not in SIPP. This difference would also tend to result in SIPP estimates of poverty that are lower than CPS estimates. It is also possible because of its more frequent interviews that SIPP has better reporting of intermittent income than does the CPS. If such income tends to cluster at the lower end of the earnings distribution, this would tend to lower the number of poor.

Paradoxically, wage and salary income estimates tend to be lower in SIPP than in the CPS. It is possible that persons tend to report net rather than gross wage and salary income in the SIPP. This would tend to result in SIPP estimates of poverty that are higher than the CPS estimates for those persons/families with wage and salary income.

In addition, for SIPP, the total weighted number of persons in 1990 will fall short of the independent estimates of the total population because some persons with positive weights are excluded from the analysis, namely, those who died, were institutionalized, or moved to Armed Forces barracks or out of the country. The total estimate for 1991 will fall short of independent estimates for the same reasons and because of natural increase and net immigration between 1990 and 1991.

THE MEASURE OF POVERTY AND COLLECTION AND LIMITATIONS OF POVERTY DATA

The definition of poverty as presented in this report is based on research developed by staff of the Social Security Administration in 1963 and 1964 and revised in 1969 and 1981 by interagency committees. In 1992, a panel of the Committee on National Statistics of the National Academy of Sciences began evaluating alternative definitions of poverty. Their report containing recommendations will be issued in the fall of 1994. Several important issues concerning the adequacy of the official poverty measure are under discussion by this panel. These issues fall into two categories: issues concerning the measurement of income or available resources, and issues regarding the poverty thresholds themselves.

Measuring Resources

The income measure used to determine poverty status is derived from the Current Population Survey (CPS) and represents the amount of money income

received regularly in the preceding calendar year from various sources. Currently the income used to determine poverty status is family cash income from many sources including money wages or salary, Social Security income, Supplemental Security income, public assistance or welfare payments, interest income, dividends, royalties, pension income and other sources such as alimony and child support payments. The income measure does not include capital gains, nor does it exclude taxes paid.

The original Social Security Administration calculations were based on post-tax income, the notion being that poverty should be determined using only income actually available to the family for spending, that is, disposable income. The official statistics have always used pre-tax income because of the limited information available from the CPS. The Census Bureau currently publishes alternate poverty rate calculations which exclude estimated taxes paid from income.¹⁷

Another resource measurement issue is that non-cash benefits received, such as food stamps or employment related benefits, are not counted as income in the official poverty definition. The difficulty here is generally one of valuing these sources of income. Alternative estimates of poverty calculated by the Census Bureau are based on an income measure that includes values for food stamps, school lunches, housing, medical government transfer benefits, and employer-provided health insurance.

In addition to noncash benefits, another important issue when considering the availability of resources to families is the inclusion of net worth. The ownership of assets clearly promotes well-being. Indeed, many government transfer programs exclude those with low incomes if their asset holdings are high. Currently, poverty status is determined without regard to the availability of asset holdings. Asset holdings (other than homeownership) are not collected on the CPS, though they are collected on the Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP). The Census Bureau attempts to evaluate imputed income from homeownership and presents alternate estimates of poverty status based on this expanded income definition.¹⁸

Measuring Needs

The key research issues to be addressed with regard to thresholds relate to the determination of minimal commodity consumption levels adequate for a family of a given size and composition; different families face various levels of living standards. The original underlying assumptions about minimal consumption standards, based on data from 1955, remain intact in the poverty thresholds.

Current data from the Consumer Expenditure Survey suggest that spending for food no longer represents one-third of a family budget, as originally derived from a 1955 survey, and that most families require much more than three times their food budget to meet other needs such as housing and transportation costs.

Adjustments built into the thresholds to allow comparisons among families of different sizes, known as equivalence scales, represent another area of possible investigation. The relationship embodied in the current thresholds among families of different sizes is also based, for the most part, on relative food costs as they existed in 1961.

A final issue with regard to the measurement of need is the one of adjustment for variations in the cost of living. There are significant differences in the cost of living by region and residence, yet there is no accounting for this in the determination of poverty status. Finally, adjustment for changes in the cost of living over time is an issue. Alternative estimates of poverty using the CPI-U-X1 are published separately by the Census Bureau.

Accounting Period

A final important issue in the measurement of poverty is the aspect of time. The current measure looks back over the last calendar year and compares resources available over that year. No information is available from the CPS about family composition changes during the last year or since.

Additionally, there are reasons to be concerned about persons who are poor for very long periods of time in contrast to persons who remain poor for very short periods. Government officials administering programs designed to aid families through temporary difficulties are interested in persons who are poor for a few months, while much public policy debate is concerned with persons and families who remain poor for long periods of time. The current measure of poverty does not allow us to distinguish between short and long spells of poverty.

The issues discussed here regarding the measurement of poverty are complex. There are also other, more fundamental issues, such as the choice of a relative rather than an absolute measure of poverty, which are not discussed here.¹⁹ In general, all of the conceptual improvements require additional measurement and estimation which, in turn, would be subject to errors and biases of various kinds. While there is currently much criticism of the poverty measure, many suggested improvements are themselves arbitrary in nature.

Data Collection

Findings presented in this report from the Income Supplement of the Census Bureau's Current Population Survey of March 1992 are based on information collected from a sample of persons representing the civilian noninstitutional population and members of the Armed Forces living off post or with their families on post in the United States. Because the collection of income data in the survey is restricted to persons 15 years old and over, unrelated individuals under 15 are excluded from this report. In addition, poverty numbers and rates exclude inmates of institutions, and Armed Forces members living in barracks.

The data on income collected in the CPS are limited to money income received before payments for personal income taxes and deductions for Social Security, union dues, Medicare premiums, etc. Money income is the sum of the amounts received from earnings; Social Security and public assistance payments; dividends, interest and rent; unemployment and worker's compensation; government and private employment pensions; and other periodic income. (Certain money receipts such as capital gains are not included.) Readers should be aware that for many different reasons there is a tendency in household surveys for respondents to underreport their income. For additional information on this topic, see Appendix C, "Underreporting of Income."

RELATED REPORTS

Current Population Survey

A detailed explanation of the poverty concept appears in *The Measure of Poverty, A Report to Congress as Mandated by the Education Amendments of 1974*, prepared by Poverty Studies Task Force under the auspices of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. This report also discusses limitations of the poverty definition and presents alternative methods for measuring poverty.

A detailed description of the original poverty index developed by the Social Security Administration appears in the following articles by Mollie Orshansky published in the *Social Security Bulletin*, "Counting the Poor: Another Look at the Poverty Profile," January 1965 (reprinted in the October 1988 issue) and "Who's Who Among the Poor: A Demographic View of Poverty," July 1965.

Data on persons in poverty based on the original poverty definition appear in Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 54, *The Extent of Poverty in the United States: 1959 to 1966*. Data based on the revised definition of poverty appear in later reports in the P60 series. Poverty data are also included in some reports in

the P20 and P23 series of the Current Population Reports. All relevant titles are listed on the inside of the back cover of this report. Data based on the Current Population Survey showing the distribution of families and persons by income levels also appear in the P60 series; the latest report is P-60, No. 184, *Money Income of Households, Families and Persons in the United States: 1992*.

Detailed data on the receipt of noncash benefits in 1985, including the poverty status of recipients appear in Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 155, *Receipt of Selected Noncash Benefits: 1985*. Several approaches to the valuation of these benefits are explored in *Technical Paper 58, Estimates of Poverty Including the Value of Noncash Benefits: 1987*. The Bureau has also released a series of reports which estimate the incremental effect on the number of poor of valuing certain noncash benefits and using an after-tax income concept (but using the same poverty thresholds as the official definition). See Current Population Reports, Series P60-186RD, *Measuring the Effect of Benefits and Taxes on Income and Poverty: 1992*.

In 1992, the Census Bureau initiated a research study on poverty measurement at the Committee on National Statistics, National Academy of Sciences, sponsored by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and The Administration for Children and Families, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. A report is expected in 1994.

Survey of Income and Program Participation

Data on movement into and out of poverty in a 2-year period are contained in Current Population Reports, Series P-70, No. 15-RD-1, *Transitions in Income and Poverty Status: 1984 and 1985*, P-70, No. 18, *Transitions in Income and Poverty Status: 1985-86*, and P-70, No. 24, *Transitions in Income and Poverty Status: 1987-1988*.

Decennial Census

Poverty data derived in the 1990 Census are available for all States on computer files (referred to as summary tape files, or STF's) as well as in published reports. Summary Tape File 3 contains poverty data cross classified by race, age, type of family, and presence of children, for States, standard metropolitan statistical areas (SMSA's), counties, county subdivisions, incorporated places, census tracts, block numbering areas, and block groups. Various subfiles of STF3 present information for neighborhoods, Congressional districts, and zip code areas. There will be two report series based on STF3: Series CPH-4, Congressional Districts of the 98th Congress, and Series CPH-5, Summary Social, Economic, and Housing Characteristics.

Summary Tape File 4 provides somewhat more detailed information on the age and family structure of the poverty population and additional characteristics including receipt of Social Security and public assistance income, work experience, and ratio of income to the poverty level. All items in STF4 will be tabulated for detailed race and Hispanic-origin groups. Data will be shown for States, SMSAs, counties, county subdivision, places and tracts. The three report series based on

STF4 are Series CP-2, General Social and Economic Characteristics, Series CPH-3, Census Tracts, and Series CH-2, Detailed Housing Characteristics.

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Appendix A. Definitions, Explanations, and Comparability of Data

DEFINITIONS AND EXPLANATIONS

Population coverage. This report includes the civilian noninstitutional population of the United States and members of the Armed Forces in the United States living off post or with their families on post, but excludes all other members of the Armed Forces. Unrelated individuals under 15 years old are also excluded.

Metropolitan areas. The population residing in metropolitan statistical areas (MSA's) as defined in June 1984 constitutes the metropolitan population. MSA's are defined by the Office of Management and Budget for use in the presentation of statistics by agencies of the Federal Government. An MSA is a geographic area consisting of a large population nucleus, together with adjacent communities which have a high degree of economic and social integration with that nucleus. The definitions specify a boundary around each large city so as to include most or all its suburbs. Entire counties form the MSA building blocks, except in New England where cities and towns are used. The former term SMSA was changed to MSA in 1983.

An area qualifies for recognition as an MSA if (1) it includes a city of at least 50,000 population, or (2) it includes a Census Bureau-defined urbanized area of at least 50,000 with a total metropolitan population of at least 100,000 (75,000 in New England). In addition to the county containing the main city or urbanized area, an MSA may include other counties having strong commuting ties to the central county. If specified conditions are met, certain large MSA's are designated as consolidated MSA's (CMSA's) and divided into component primary MSA's (PMSA's).

Nonmetropolitan areas. The territory outside metropolitan statistical areas is referred to here as nonmetropolitan.

Central cities. The largest city in each MSA is always designated a central city. There may be additional central cities if specified requirements, designed to identify places of central character within the MSA, are met. Although the largest central cities are generally included in the title of the MSA, there may be central cities that are not part of the title. The balance of the MSA outside the central city or cities often is regarded as equivalent to "suburbs."

Outside central cities. The territory outside central cities of metropolitan statistical areas but within MSA's is referred to here as outside central cities.

Geographic regions. The four major regions of the United States for which data are presented in this report represent groups of States as follows:

Northeast: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

Midwest: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin.

South: Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, District of Columbia, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and West Virginia.

West: Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, Oregon, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming.

North and West: Northeast, Midwest, and West Regions combined.

Poverty areas. For this report poverty areas are defined in terms of census tracts (in metropolitan areas) or minor civil divisions (townships, districts, etc. in nonmetropolitan areas) in which 20 percent or more of the population was below the poverty level in 1979 based on the 1980 census. See 1980 Census of Population report PC80-2-8D, Poverty Areas in Large Cities.

Tenure. A housing unit is "owner occupied" if the owner or co-owner lives in the unit, even if it is mortgaged or not fully paid for. A cooperative or condominium unit is "owner occupied" only if the owner or co-owner lives in it. All other occupied units are classified as "renter occupied," including units rented for cash rent and those occupied without payment of cash rent. For renter-occupied units, information was also obtained as to whether the unit was publicly owned or subsidized by the Federal, State, or local government.

Income (CPS). For each person in the sample 15 years old and over, questions were asked on the amount of money income received in the preceding calendar year from each of the following sources: (1) money wages or salary; (2) net income from nonfarm self-employment; (3) net income from farm self-employment; (4) Social Security or railroad retirement; (5) Supplemental Security income; (6) public assistance or welfare payments; (7) interest; (8) dividends, income from estates or trusts, net rental income or royalties; (9) veterans' payments or unemployment and worker's compensation; (10) private pensions or government employee pensions; (11) annuities, alimony or child support, regular contributions from persons not living in the household, and other periodic income.

It should be noted that although the income statistics refer to receipts during the preceding year the characteristics of the person, such as age, and labor force status, and the composition of families refer to the time of the survey. The income of the family does not include amounts received by persons who were members of the family during all or part of the income year if these persons no longer resided with the family at the time of enumeration. However, family income includes amounts reported by related persons who did not reside with the family during the income year but who were members of the family at the time of enumeration.

Data on consumer income collected in the CPS by the Bureau of the Census cover money income received (exclusive of certain money receipts such as capital gains) before payments for personal income taxes, Social Security, union dues, Medicare deductions, etc. Therefore, money income does not reflect the fact that some families receive part of their income in the form of noncash benefits such as food stamps, health benefits, and subsidized housing; that some farm families receive noncash benefits in the form of rent-free housing and goods produced and consumed on the farm; or that noncash benefits are also received by some nonfarm residents which often take the form of the use of business transportation and facilities, full or partial payments by business for retirement programs, medical and educational expenses, etc. These elements should be considered when comparing income levels. Moreover, readers should be aware that for many different reasons there is a tendency in household surveys for respondents to underreport their income. From an analysis of independently derived income estimates, it has been determined that income earned from wages or salaries is much better reported than other sources of income, and is nearly equal to independent estimates of aggregate income.

The various sources for which income is reported are defined as follows:

1. *Money wages or salary* is total money earnings received for work performed as an employee during

the income year. It includes wages, salary, Armed Forces pay, commissions, tips, piece-rate payments, and cash bonuses earned, before deductions were made for taxes, bonds, pensions, union dues, etc.

2. *Net income from nonfarm self-employment* is net money income (gross receipts minus expenses) from one's own business, professional enterprise, or partnership. Gross receipts include the value of all goods sold and services rendered. Expenses include costs of goods purchased, rent, heat, light, power, depreciation charges, wages and salaries paid, business taxes (not personal income taxes), etc. In general, inventory changes were considered in determining net income; replies based on income tax returns or other official records do reflect inventory changes. However, when values of inventory changes were not reported, net income figures exclusive of inventory changes were accepted. The value of saleable merchandise consumed by the proprietors of retail stores is not included as part of net income.

3. *Net income from farm self-employment* is net money income (gross receipts minus operating expenses) from the operation of a farm by a person on his own account, as an owner, renter, or sharecropper. Gross receipts include the value of all products sold, government farm programs, money received from the rental of farm equipment to others, and incidental receipts from the sale of wood, sand, gravel, etc. Operating expenses include cost of feed, fertilizer, seed, and other farming supplies, cash wages paid to farmhands, depreciation charges, cash rent, interest on farm mortgages, farm building repairs, farm taxes (not State and Federal personal income taxes), etc. The value of fuel, food, or other farm products used for family living is not included as part of net income. In general, inventory changes were considered in determining net income only when they were accounted for in replies based on income tax returns or other official records which reflect inventory changes; otherwise inventory changes were not taken into account.

4. *Social Security or railroad retirement* includes Social Security pensions and survivors' benefits, and permanent disability insurance payments made by the Social Security Administration prior to deductions for medical insurance and railroad retirement insurance checks from the U.S. Government. Medicare reimbursements are not included.

5. *Supplemental Security income* includes payments made by Federal, State, and local welfare agencies to low income persons who are (1) aged (65 years old or over), (2) blind, or (3) disabled.

6. *Public assistance or welfare payments* include public assistance payments, such as aid to families with dependent children and general assistance.
7. *Interest* consists of returns on savings or other interest bearing investments.
8. *Dividends, income from estates or trusts, net rental income, or royalties* include dividends from stock holdings or membership in associations, periodic receipts from estates or trust funds, net income from rental of a house, store, or other property to others receipts from boarders or lodgers, and net royalties.
9. *Veterans' payments or unemployment and worker's compensation* include 1) money paid periodically by the Veterans Administration to disabled members of the Armed Forces or to survivors of deceased veterans, subsistence allowances paid to veterans for education and on-the-job training, as well as so-called "refunds" paid to ex-servicemen as GI insurance premiums; 2) unemployment compensation received from government unemployment insurance agencies or private companies during periods of unemployment and any strike benefits received from union funds; and 3) worker's compensation received periodically from public or private insurance companies for injuries incurred at work. The cost of this insurance must have been paid by the employer and not by the person.
10. *Private Pensions or government employee pensions* include (1) private pensions or retirement benefits paid to a retired person or his survivors by a former employer or by a union, either directly or through an insurance company and (2) government employee pensions received from retirement pensions paid by Federal, State, county, or other governmental agencies to former employees (including members of the Armed Forces) or their survivors.
11. *Annuities, alimony, or child support; regular contributions from persons not living in the household, and other periodic income* include (1) periodic receipts from annuities or insurance; (2) alimony and child support; (3) contributions received periodically from persons not living in the household; (4) other periodic income such as military family allotments, net gambling winnings, and other kinds of periodic income other than earnings.

Receipts not counted as income are receipts from the following sources (1) money received from the sale of property, such as stocks, bonds, a house, or a car (unless the person was engaged in the business of selling such property, in which case the net proceeds would be counted as income from self-employment); (2) withdrawals of bank deposits; (3) money borrowed; (4) tax refunds; (5) gifts; and (6) lump-sum inheritances or insurance payments.

All sources of income may be combined into two major types:

Total money earnings. The algebraic sum of money wages or salary and net income from farm and nonfarm self-employment.

Income other than earnings. The algebraic sum of all sources of money income except wages and salaries and income from self-employment.

Income (SIPP). The cash income concept used in the SIPP section of this report includes the sum of all income received from any of the sources listed in table A-1. Rebates, refunds, loans and capital gain or loss amounts from the sale of assets, and interhousehold transfers of cash such as allowances are not included.

Accrued interest on Individual Retirement Accounts, KEOGH retirement plans, and U.S. Savings bonds are also excluded. This definition differs somewhat from that used in the annual reports based on the March CPS income supplement questionnaire. The data from the CPS are based only on income received in a regular or periodic manner and, therefore, exclude lump-sum or one-time payments, such as inheritances, or insurance settlements which are included as income in SIPP. Educational assistance, which is included in the March CPS income concept, is not included in the SIPP income concept.

The income amounts represent amounts actually received during the month, before deductions for income and payroll taxes, union dues, Part B Medicare premiums, etc.

The SIPP income definition includes three types of earnings: wages and salary, nonfarm self-employment, and farm self-employment. The definition of nonfarm self-employment and farm self-employment earnings is not based on the net difference between gross receipts or sales and operating expenses, depreciation, etc. The monthly amounts for these income types are based on the salary or other income received from the business by the owner of the business or farm during the 4-month period.

While the income amounts from most sources are recorded monthly for the 4-month reference period, property income amounts such as interest, dividends, and rental income, were recorded as totals for the 4-month period. These totals were distributed equally between months of the reference period for purposes of calculating poverty status in the SIPP portion of this report.

Means-tested Assistance. There are two categories of means-tested assistance:

Means-tested cash assistance. Includes cash benefits received from Aid to Families with Dependent Children

(AFDC), General Assistance, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), and means-tested veterans compensation or pensions.

Means-tested noncash assistance. Includes medicaid benefits, food stamps, subsidies from free or reduced-price school lunches, and rent subsidies.

AFDC. Title VII of the Social Security Act permits States to give cash assistance to needy children who lack financial support of one parent because a parent is continuously absent from home, incapacitated, dead, or unemployed.¹ The Federal and State government share in the cost of benefit payments and administrative outlays. Some States require local governments to

share these costs. Able-bodied AFDC recipients are required by federal law to register for training and employment services. Mothers receiving AFDC payments are required to assign their child support rights to the State and to cooperate in establishing paternity of a child born out of wedlock.

General Assistance.—General Assistance consists of a host of State and local programs to provide cash assistance to needy persons not qualifying for AFDC or SSI. Eligibility rules vary from State to State, and often from county to county within a State, ranging from aid to mostly unemployable single adults (District of Columbia), to workfare programs, where recipients work in exchange for the assistance (New York).

Public and subsidized housing. There are several programs designed to "remedy the unsafe and unsanitary housing conditions and the acute shortage of decent, safe, and sanitary dwellings for families of low

income."² Among these, the most important are Low Rent Public Housing and Sections 8, 236, and 101 of the U.S. Housing Act, all of which are funded in full by the Federal Government. Under sections 8 and 101, Federal funds are used to subsidize private sector housing. The difference between the "fair market" rent and the rent charged to the tenant is paid to the owner by the government. Under an interest reduction program (e.g. section 236), the amount of interest paid on the mortgage by the owner is reduced and the subsequent savings are passed on to low-income tenants in the form of lower rent charges.

Participation in public housing is determined by two factors: program eligibility and the availability of housing. Income standards for initial and continuing occupancy vary by local housing authority, although the limits are constrained by Federal guidelines. Rental charges, which, in turn, define net benefits, are set by a Federal statute not to exceed 25 percent of net monthly money income. A recipient unit can either be a family of two or more related persons or an individual who is handicapped, elderly, or displaced by urban renewal or natural disaster.

Federal law mandates that, as a total among all assisted housing programs, at most, 25 percent of units being re-rented and 5 percent of units that become available can be rented to households with incomes between 50 and 80 percent of the area median.³ All other units are to be reserved for families at or below 50 percent of the area median.

Food stamps. The Food Stamp Act of 1977 defines this Federally funded program as one intended to "permit low-income households to obtain a more nutritious diet."⁴ Food purchasing power is increased by providing eligible households with coupons which can be used to purchase food.

The Food and Nutrition Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) administers the Food Stamp Program through State and local welfare offices. The Food Stamp Program is the major national income support program which provides benefits to all low-income and low-resource households regardless of household characteristics (e.g., sex, age, and disability). The questions on participation in the Food Stamp Program in SIPP were designed to identify households in which one or more of the current members received food stamps. Once a food stamp household was identified, a question was asked to determine the number of current household members covered by food stamps. Questions also were asked about the number of months

food stamps were received and the total face value of all food stamps received during the period.

Medicare. The Medicare Program is designed to provide medical care for the aged and disabled. The Basic Hospital Insurance Plan (Part A) is designed to provide basic protection against hospital costs and related post-hospital services. This plan also covers many persons under 65 years old who receive Social Security or railroad retirement benefits based on long-term disability. Part A is financed jointly by employers and employees through Social Security payroll deductions. Qualified persons 65 years old and over who are not otherwise eligible for Part A benefits may pay premiums directly to obtain this coverage. The Medical Insurance Plan (Part B) is a voluntary plan which builds upon the hospital insurance protection provided by the basic plan. It provides insurance protection covering physicians' and surgeons' services and a variety of medical and other health services received either in hospitals or on an ambulatory basis. It is financed through monthly premium payments by each enrollee and subsidized by Federal general revenue funds. The term "covered" means enrolled in the Medicare Program. In order to be counted, the person did not necessarily have to receive medical care paid for by Medicare.

Medicaid. The Medicaid Program is designed "to furnish medical assistance on behalf of needy families with dependent children, and of aged, blind, or permanently and totally disabled individuals whose incomes and resources are insufficient to meet the costs of necessary medical services."⁵ The program is administered by State agencies through grants from the Health Care Financing Administration of the Department of Health and Human Services. Funding for medical assistance payments consists of a combination of Federal, State, and in some cases, local resources.

Medicaid is for the most part a categorical program with complex eligibility rules which vary from State to State. There are two basic groups of eligible individuals: the categorically eligible and the medically needy. The major categorically eligible groups are all Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) recipients and most Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients. Other categorically eligible groups are those who meet basic State cash assistance eligibility rules (the aged, blind, or disabled; needy single parents with children; and, in some States, needy unemployed parents with children who are not currently receiving money payments), and needy persons who meet categorical eligibility standards but are institutionalized for medical reasons (e.g.,

low-income elderly persons in nursing homes). However, such institutionalized persons are not included in the CPS universe and, therefore, are not reflected in these statistics.

In roughly one-half of the States, coverage is extended to the medically needy: persons meeting categorical age, sex, or disability criteria whose money incomes and assets exceed eligibility levels for cash assistance but are not sufficient to meet the cost of medical care. In such States, qualifying income and asset levels are usually above those set for cash assistance. Families with large medical expenses relative to their incomes and assets may also meet medically needy eligibility standards in these States.

Social Security. In the context of this report, Social Security refers to the Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability Insurance (OASDI) program.⁶ The Old Age program

provides benefits for the workers who retire in old age, the Survivors program provides benefits to families of workers who died, and the Disability program grants assistance to persons whose disabilities do not permit a continuation of the work effort. Persons are participants in Social Security if they worked in covered employment and are now disabled or retired. In addition, participants include spouses or dependent children of retired or disabled workers and widowed spouses and surviving children.

Supplemental Security Income. Authorized as Title XVI of the Social Security Act by the Social Security Amendments of 1972 and implemented in 1974, the SSI program provides monthly cash benefits to aged, blind, and disabled persons who are financially needy according to criteria governing both income and assets. The program is allied with optional State Supplementation Programs (SSPs), which raise the levels of payments to amounts desired by individual States. SSI/SSP, which covers people of all ages, replaced Federal grants to the States for old-age assistance and aid to blind and permanently and totally disabled adults.

Total money income. This is defined as the algebraic sum of money wages and salaries, net income from self-employment, and income other than earnings. The total income of a family is the algebraic sum of the amounts received by all income recipients in the family.

The income tables for families and unrelated individuals include in the lowest income group those who were classified as having no income in the income year and those reporting a loss in net income from farm and nonfarm self-employment or in rental income. Some of these were living on income "in-kind," savings, or gifts, or were newly constituted families, unrelated individuals who had recently left families, or families in which the sole earner had recently died or had left the household. However, other families or unrelated individuals who reported no income probably had some money income which was not recorded in the survey.

Median income. The median income is the amount which divides the distribution into two equal groups, one having incomes above the median, and the other having incomes below the median. The medians for households, families, and unrelated individuals are based on all households, families and unrelated individuals. The medians for persons are based on persons with income.

Mean income. The mean income is the amount obtained by dividing the total income of a group by the number of units in that group. The means for households, families, and unrelated individuals are based on all households, families, and unrelated individuals. The means for persons are based on persons with income.

Income per family member. The income per family member is the average amount of income available to

every man, woman, and child in a family. Income per family member is derived by dividing the total family income of a group by the number of family members in the same group.

Poverty definition. Poverty statistics presented in this report are based on a definition developed by the Social Security Administration in 1964 and revised in 1969 and 1981 by interagency committees. This definition was established as the official definition of poverty for statistical use in all Executive departments by the Bureau of the Budget (in Circular No. A-46) and later by the Office of Management and Budget (in Statistical Directive No. 14).

The original poverty index provided a range of income cutoffs adjusted by such factors as family size, sex of the family head, number of children under 18 years old, and farm-nonfarm residence. At the core of this definition of poverty was the economy food plan, the least costly of four nutritionally adequate food plans designed by the Department of Agriculture. It was determined from the Department of Agriculture's 1955 survey of food consumption that families of three or more persons spent approximately one-third of their income on food; the poverty level for these families was, therefore, set at three times the cost of the economy food plan. For smaller families and persons living alone, the cost of the economy food plan was multiplied by factors that were slightly higher in order to compensate for the relatively larger fixed expenses of these smaller households. Annual revisions of these SSA poverty cutoffs were based on price changes of the items in the economy food budget.

As a result of deliberations of a Federal Interagency Committee in 1969, the following two modifications to the original SSA definition of poverty were recommended: (1) that the SSA thresholds for nonfarm families be retained for the base year 1963, but that annual adjustments in the levels be based on changes in the Consumer Price Index (CPI) rather than on changes in the cost of food included in the economy food plan; and (2) that the farm thresholds be raised from 70 to 85 percent of the corresponding nonfarm levels. The combined impact of these two modifications resulted in an increase of 360,000 poor families and 1.6 million poor persons in 1967.

In 1980, another interagency committee recommended three additional modifications that were implemented in the March 1982 CPS as well as the 1980 census: (1) elimination of separate thresholds for farm families, (2) averaging of thresholds for female-householder and "all other" families, and (3) extension of the poverty matrix to families with nine or more members. For further details, see the section, "Changes in the Definition of Poverty," in Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 133.

The poverty thresholds rise each year by the same percentage as the annual average Consumer Price

Index. Table A-2 shows the CPI and the corresponding thresholds for a family of four for the 1959-92 period. The poverty thresholds are currently adjusted using the annual average CPI-U (1982-84 = 100). This base year has been used since 1988. From 1980 through 1987 the thresholds were adjusted using the CPI (1967 = 100). The CPI (1963 = 100) was used to adjust thresholds prior to 1980. Table A-3 shows the full poverty threshold matrix in 1992.

Poverty guidelines. Average poverty thresholds are similar but not identical to the "poverty guidelines" which are issued by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). The HHS poverty guidelines are used for administrative purposes such as determining eligibility for certain assistance programs rather than for determining poverty status in surveys. The guidelines are often applied in combination with other eligibility criteria, such as asset limits, and may be used as multiples (e.g., children in families with income below 185 percent of the appropriate poverty guidelines may be eligible for the reduced-price school lunch program).

The HHS guidelines represent rounded versions of the average weighted poverty thresholds which have also been adjusted (for convenience in administrative use) to provide equal differences between each family size (rather than using the equivalence scale implicit in the poverty thresholds). For example, the 1993 poverty guidelines issued in the Federal Register (see Federal Register, Volume 58, No. 28, Feb. 12, 1993, pp. 8,287-8,289) were calculated by updating the 1991 poverty thresholds for inflation from 1991 to 1992 and then rounding; as a result, the 1993 guidelines are approximately equal to the 1992 poverty thresholds. The 1993 guidelines use the reference year 1993 since they are published and are used for eligibility purposes in that year. The 1992 poverty thresholds are called "1992" because in the March 1993 CPS persons are asked income information for the previous calendar year (1992).

For further information on the poverty guidelines, see Gordon M. Fisher, "Poverty Guidelines for 1992," *Social Security Bulletin*, Vol. 55, No. 1, Spring 1992, pp. 43-46, or contact the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation, Department of Health and Human Services, Washington, D.C. 20201.

Ratio of income to poverty level. Because the poverty definition does not meet all the needs of the analysts of the data, a few of the tables in the report present variations of the poverty level expressed as a ratio of income to the family's (or unrelated individual's) appropriate poverty threshold. Ratios below 1.00 are below the official definition while a ratio of 1.00 or greater indicates income above the poverty level. A ratio between 1.00 and 1.25 indicates for example that a family's income was above their poverty threshold but below 125 percent of their poverty threshold. If a

family's poverty threshold was \$10,000 a ratio of 1.00 to 1.25 thus would mean their income was between \$10,000 and \$12,500.

Weighted average thresholds at poverty level. As shown in table A-3, the poverty cutoffs used by the Bureau of the Census to determine the poverty status of families and unrelated individuals consist of a set of 48 thresholds arranged in a two-dimensional matrix consisting of family size (from one person, i.e., unrelated individuals, to nine or more persons) cross-classified by presence and number of family members under 18 years old (from no children present to eight or more children present). Unrelated individuals and two-person families are further differentiated by the age of the individual or family householder (under 65 years and 65 years and over). The total family income of each family in the sample is tested against the appropriate dollar threshold to determine the poverty status of the family. If the family's total income is less than its corresponding cutoff, the family is classified as below the poverty level. The average thresholds shown in these tables were weighted by the presence and number of children. For a given size of family, the weighted average threshold for that group is obtained by multiplying the threshold for each presence and number of children category within the given family size by the number of families in that category. These products are then aggregated across the entire range of presence and number of children categories, and the total aggregate is divided by the total number of families in the group to yield the weighted average threshold at the poverty level for that size family. Because family composition does not remain constant from year to year, the weighted average thresholds for 1992 will not reflect, identically, the change in the CPI between 1992 and earlier years.

Since the basic thresholds used to determine the poverty status of families and unrelated individuals are applied to all families and unrelated individuals, the

weighted poverty thresholds are derived using all families and unrelated individuals rather than just those families and unrelated individuals classified as below the poverty level. In a few instances these weighted thresholds are slightly different from those published in earlier reports due to corrections to the CPS files.

Income deficit. Income deficit is the difference between the total income of families and unrelated individuals below the poverty level, and their respective poverty thresholds. In computing the income deficit, families reporting a net income loss are assigned zero dollars and for such cases the deficit is equal to the poverty threshold. This measure provides an estimate of the amount which would be required to raise the incomes of all poor families and unrelated individuals to their respective poverty thresholds. The income deficit is thus a measure of the degree of impoverishment of a family or unrelated individual. However, caution must be exercised in comparing the average deficit of families classified by the race or sex of the householder. Since the poverty thresholds used in this report are based on family size and composition, apparent differences in the average income deficits may, to some extent, be a function of the differences in these characteristics.

Median income deficit. The median income deficit is the amount which divides the distribution into two equal groups, one having an income deficit above the median and the other having an income deficit below the median.

Mean income deficit. The mean income deficit is the amount obtained by dividing the total income deficit of a group below the poverty level by the number of families or unrelated individuals (as appropriate) in that group.

Deficit per family member. The deficit per family member is the average amount of money necessary to raise every man, woman and child in a family out of

poverty. The deficit per family member is derived by dividing the total family income deficit of a group by the number of family members in the same group.

Household. A household consists of all the persons who occupy a housing unit. A house, an apartment or other group of rooms, or a single room is regarded as a housing unit when it is occupied or intended for occupancy as separate living quarters; that is, when the occupants do not live and eat with any other persons in the structure and there is direct access from the outside or through a common hall.

A household includes the related family members and all the unrelated persons, if any, such as lodgers, foster children, wards, or employees who share the housing unit. A person living alone in a housing unit, or a group of unrelated persons sharing a housing unit as partners, is also counted as a household. The count of households excludes group quarters.

Group quarters. All persons who are not members of households are regarded as living in group quarters. Group quarters contain five or more persons unrelated to the person in charge, such as residents of lodging and boarding houses. Persons living in military barracks and inmates of institutions were excluded from the survey.

Householder. The instructions call for listing first the person (or one of the persons) in whose name the home is owned or rented. If the house is owned jointly by a married couple, either the husband or the wife may be listed first, thereby becoming the reference person, or householder, to whom the relationship of the other household members is recorded. One person in each household is designated as the "householder." The number of householders, therefore, is equal to the number of households. Beginning with the 1980 CPS, the Bureau of the Census began using the terms "householder" and "family householder" instead of "head of household" and "head of family."

Family. The term "family" refers to a group of two or more persons related by birth, marriage, or adoption who reside together; all such persons are considered as members of one family. For example, if the son of the person who maintains the household and the son's wife are members of the household, they are treated as members of the parent's family. Every family must include a householder; two or more people living in the same household who are related to one another, but are not related to the householder, form an "unrelated subfamily" and are not included in the count of families.

Subfamily. A subfamily is a married couple with or without children, or one parent with one or more own single children under 18 years old living in a household

but not including among its members the person or couple maintaining the household. Because a subfamily does not include a householder, it is by definition excluded from the count of families. There are two kinds of subfamilies, related and unrelated.

Related subfamily. A related subfamily is a subfamily whose members are related to the person or couple maintaining the household. Examples of related subfamilies include a young married couple sharing the home of the husband's or wife's parents or the daughter and grandchild of the householder. Members of a related subfamily are also members of the householder's family.

Unrelated subfamily. An unrelated subfamily is a subfamily whose members are not related to the person or couple maintaining the household. Members of unrelated subfamilies may include such persons as guests, lodgers, or resident employees and their relatives living in a household. Unrelated subfamily members are not part of the householder's family. Even though unrelated subfamilies are not counted as families, they are treated as families for the purpose of determining whether their members are above or below the poverty level. Beginning with the 1980 CPS, unrelated subfamilies (referred to in the past as secondary families) are no longer included in the count of families, nor are the members of unrelated subfamilies included in the count of family members.

Married couple. A married couple, as defined for census purposes, is a husband and wife enumerated as members of the same household. The married couple may or may not have children living with them. The expression "husband-wife" or "married-couple" before the term "household," or "family," indicates that the household, or family, is maintained by a husband and wife.

Unrelated individuals. The term "unrelated individuals" refers to persons 15 years and over (other than inmates of institutions) who are not living with any relatives. An unrelated individual may (1) constitute a one-person household, (2) be part of a household including one or more other families or unrelated individuals, or (3) reside in group quarters such as a rooming house. Thus, a widow living by herself or with one or more other persons not related to her, a lodger not related to the householder or to anyone else in the household, and a servant living in an employer's household with no relatives are examples of unrelated individuals. The poverty status of unrelated individuals is determined independently of other household members' incomes.

Nonfamily householder. A nonfamily householder (formerly called a primary individual) is a person maintaining a household while living alone or with nonrelatives only.

Secondary individual. A secondary individual is a person in a household or group quarters such as a guest, roomer, boarder, or resident employee (excluding nonfamily householders and inmates of institutions) who is not related to any other person in the household or group quarters.

Family Status (SIPP). As in the Current Population Survey, the term "family" refers to a group of two or more persons related by birth, marriage, or adoption who reside together; all such persons are considered as members of one family. Two or more people living in the same household who are related to one another, but are not related to the householder, form an "unrelated subfamily". Persons in unrelated subfamilies are not included in the count of family members in the Current Population Survey, but they are included as family members for the SIPP section of this report and are classified by family type as if they were families.

Persons were classified as members of a married-couple family, other family type, or as an unrelated individual based on their most common status during the calendar year. For example, a person who in 1987 was in a married-couple family in January through March but was an unrelated individual in April through December would be characterized here as an unrelated individual in 1987. Ties were broken by using the family status that occurred first. Family size was also based on the most common size during the calendar year.

Size of household, family, or subfamily. The term "size of household" includes all persons occupying a housing unit. "Size of family" includes the family householder and all other persons in the living quarters who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption.

Own children and related children under 18 years of age. "Own" children in a family are sons and daughters, including stepchildren and adopted children of the householder. "Related" children in a family include own children and all other children in the household who are related to the householder by blood, marriage, or adoption.

Marital status. The marital status classification identifies four major categories: single, married, widowed, and divorced. These terms refer to the marital status at the time of the enumeration.

The category "married" is further divided into "married, wife present," "separated," and "other married, wife absent" for male householders and "married, husband absent" by reason for absence of husband for female householders. A male householder was classified as "married, wife present" if his wife was reported as a member of the household, even though she may

have been temporarily absent on business or on vacation, visiting, in a hospital, etc., at the time of the enumeration. Persons reported as separated included those with legal separations, those living apart with intentions of obtaining a divorce, and other persons permanently or temporarily separated because of marital discord. The groups "other married, wife absent" and "other married, husband absent" included married persons living apart because either the wife or the husband was employed and living at a considerable distance from home, was residing in an institution, had moved to another area, or had a different place of residence for any other reason except separation as defined above.

Age. The age classification is based on the age of the person at his or her last birthday.

Race. The population is divided into three groups on the basis of race: White, Black, and "other races." The last category includes American Indians, Japanese, Chinese, Filipinos, Pacific Islanders, and any other race except White and Black.

Persons of Hispanic origin. Persons of Hispanic origin were identified by a question that asked for self-identification of the person's origin or descent. Respondents were asked to select their origin (and the origin of other household members) from a "flash card" listing ethnic origins. Persons of Hispanic origin, in particular, were those who indicated that their origin was Mexican, Puerto Rican, Central or South American, or some other Hispanic origin. It should be noted that persons of Hispanic origin may be of any race.

Educational Attainment. This classification refers to the highest level of school completed or the highest degree received. The category, "Associate degree" includes persons whose highest degree is an associate degree either in (1) an occupational program that prepares them for a specific occupation, and the course work may or may not be creditable toward a bachelor's degree or (2) an academic program primarily in the arts and sciences, and the course work is transferrable to a bachelor's degree. Some examples of professional degrees include medicine, dentistry, chiropractic, optometry, osteopathic medicine, pharmacy, podiatry, veterinary medicine, law, and theology, but specifically exclude barber school, cosmetology, or other training for a specific trade.

Data on educational attainment are derived from a question that asks, "What is the highest level of school ... has completed or the highest degree ... has received?" The question on educational attainment applies only to progress in "regular" schools. Such schools include public, private, and parochial elementary and high schools (both junior and senior), colleges, universities, and

professional schools (whether day schools or night schools). Thus, regular schooling is that which may advance a person toward an elementary school certificate, a high school diploma, or a college, university, or professional school degree. Schooling in other than regular schools is counted only if the credits obtained are regarded as transferable to schools in the regular school system.

Beginning in January 1992, the CPS began using an educational attainment question similar to that used in the 1990 Decennial Census of Population and Housing. Consequently, data on educational attainment from the 1992 CPS are not directly comparable to CPS data for prior years. Prior to 1992, the CPS educational attainment data were derived from the combination of answers to questions concerning the highest grade of school attended by the person and whether or not that grade was finished. For a discussion of the change in the form of the question, and some of the motivating factors behind the change, see the introductory text of this report.

Work Disability. Persons were classified as having a work disability if they met any of the following criteria:

1. With a health problem or disability which prevents them from working or which limits the kind or amount of work they can do. (See 62A and 62B on the facsimile of Form CPS-665-Income Supplement.)
2. Ever retired or left a job for health reasons. (See items 63A and 63B on the facsimile of Form CPS-665-Income Supplement.)
3. Did not work in survey week because of long-term physical or mental illness or disability which prevents the performance of any kind of work.
4. Did not work at all in previous year because ill or disabled.
5. Under 65 years of age and covered by Medicare.
6. Under 65 years of age and a recipient of SSI (Supplemental Security Income).
7. Received veteran's disability compensation.

Severe work disability. A person who meets any of the criteria in 3 through 6 above, is considered to have a severe work disability.

Labor force and employment status. Unless otherwise specified, the definitions of labor force and employment status relate to the population 15 years old and over.

Employed. Employed persons comprise (1) all civilians who, during the survey week did any work at all as paid employees or in their own business or profession, or on

their own farm, or who worked 15 hours or more as unpaid workers on a farm or in a business operated by a member of the family and (2) all those who were not working but who had jobs or businesses from which they were temporarily absent because of illness, bad weather, vacation, or labor-management dispute, or because they were taking time off for personal reasons, whether or not they were paid by their employers for time off, and whether or not they were seeking other jobs. Excluded from the employed group are persons whose only activity consisted of work around the house (such as own home housework, and painting or repairing own home) or volunteer work for religious, charitable, and similar organizations.

Unemployed. Unemployed persons are those civilians who, during the survey week had no employment but were available for work and (1) had engaged in any specific jobseeking activity within the past 4 weeks, such as registering at a public or private employment office, meeting with prospective employers, checking with friends or relatives, placing or answering advertisements, writing letters of application, or being on a union or professional register; (2) were waiting to be called back to a job from which they had been laid off, or (3) were waiting to report to a new wage or salary job within 30 days.

Labor force. Persons are classified as in the labor force if they were employed as civilians, unemployed, or in the Armed Forces during the survey week. The "civilian labor force" is comprised of all civilians classified as employed or unemployed.

Not in labor force. All civilians 15 years old and over who are not classified as employed or unemployed are defined as "not in the labor force." This group of persons who are neither employed nor seeking work includes persons engaged only in own home housework, attending school, or unable to work because of long-term physical or mental illness; persons who are retired or too old to work, seasonal workers for whom the survey week fell in an off season, and the voluntarily idle. Persons doing only unpaid family work (less than 15 hours during the survey week) are also classified as not in the labor force.

Occupation and class of worker. Occupation describes the kind of work the person does on the job. If the person changed jobs, the data refer to the occupation of the job held longest during the income year. The occupational groupings were derived from the classification system used in the 1990 Census of Population. Note that data on occupations for 1991 are not fully comparable with data for prior years because of the change from the 1980 classification to that used in 1990.

Class of worker refers to the subdivision of workers into three groups: wage and salary workers, self-employed workers, and unpaid family workers. The first group refers to persons working for wages, salaries, commissions, tips, pay "in kind," or at piece-rate for private employer or for any government unit. The second group refers to persons working in their own business, profession, or trade, for profit or fees. The third group refers to persons working without pay in a business operated by a member of the household to whom they are related by birth or marriage.

Work experience. A person with work experience is one who, during the preceding calendar year, did any civilian work for pay or profit or worked without pay on a family-operated farm or business at any time during the year, on a part-time or full-time basis.

Weeks worked in income year. Persons are classified according to the number of different weeks, during the preceding calendar year, in which they did any civilian work for pay or profit (including paid vacations and sick leave) or worked without pay on a family-operated farm or business.

Part-time or full-time jobs. A person is classified as having worked at part-time jobs during the preceding calendar year if he or she worked at civilian jobs which provided less than 35 hours of work per week in a majority of the weeks in which work was performed during the year. A person is classified as having worked at full-time jobs if he or she worked 35 hours or more per week during a majority of the weeks in which work was performed.

Year-round, full-time worker. A year-round, full-time worker is one who worked primarily at full-time civilian jobs for 50 weeks or more during the preceding calendar year.

Number of workers. The number includes all persons in the family who worked at anytime during the year.

Nonworker. A nonworker is one who did not do any civilian work in the calendar year preceding the survey.

Main reason for working part year. For persons who worked 1 to 49 weeks during the year, the main reason for working part year is based on the response to the question "What were you doing most of the remaining weeks?"

Main reason for not working. For persons who reported they did not work at a civilian job for pay or profit or on a family-operated farm or business during the year, the main reason for not working is derived from the response to the question, "What were you doing most of last year?"

Symbols. A dash (-) represents zero or rounds to zero, the symbol "B" means base less than 75,000 or not applicable. The symbol "NA" means not available, and the symbol "r" means revised.

Rounding. Percentages are rounded to the nearest tenth of a percent; therefore, the percentages in a distribution do not always add to exactly 100.0 percent. The totals, however, are always shown as 100.0. Moreover, individual figures are rounded to the nearest thousand without being adjusted to group totals, which are independently rounded; percentages are based on the unrounded numbers.

Base figures. The base figures shown for 1980 and later years were prepared by inflating weighted sample results to agree with independent estimates of the population based on statistics updated from the 1980 census. The base figures shown for 1969 to 1979 were based on statistics updated from the 1970 census, whereas the figures for the years 1961 to 1968 were inflated to estimates derived from the 1960 census. The data for the years prior to 1961 were based on the 1950 census. A more detailed description of this change can be found in an article entitled "Revisions in Current Population Survey," *Employment and Earnings*, Vol. 18, No. 8, February 1972, published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The introduction of population controls and estimation procedures based on the 1980 census raised the number of persons from 217.8 million to 222.9 million in the March 1980 CPS and the number of families from 58.4 to 59.6 million. The number of persons and families below the poverty level rose proportionately, from 25.3 to 26.1 million, and from 5.3 to 5.5 million, respectively.

COMPARABILITY OF ESTIMATES FROM MARCH 1993 CPS WITH ESTIMATES FOR PREVIOUS YEARS

Estimates from the March 1993 CPS are in some instances not strictly comparable with estimates for previous years due to several factors. Among these factors are changes in (1) population controls and metropolitan residence definitions; (2) collection of income and work experience data; (3) noninterviews, nonresponses, and allocations; (4) questionnaire wording and procedures; (5) sample size and interpolation procedures; (6) definition of the income universe and (7) revisions to the processing system. Each of these factors is discussed in the following sections, and readers should consider these differences when comparing current with previous years' estimates.

Population Controls

Beginning with 1979, the data shown in this report are based on population controls derived from the 1980

census. The data for 1969 to 1978 reflect 1970 census-based population controls, while figures for previous years are tied in with 1960 census-based controls. Basically, these changes should have no substantial impact on summary measures, such as medians and means, and on proportional measures, such as percent distributions and poverty rates. However, the changes may have more impact on the population levels in different sub-groupings such as the total number of persons or families either overall, within some particular income interval, or below the poverty level. A detailed description of these changes appears in the Bureau of Labor Statistics report, *Employment and Earnings*, Vol. 18, No. 8, February 1972.

Undocumented Immigrants

The 1980 census counted about two million undocumented immigrants according to Census Bureau estimates. Beginning in January 1986, the independent population controls included an allowance for growth in the undocumented population for every year since 1980. This methodological change was partially offset by another change that increased the allowance for emigration of legal residents. Data shown for Current Population Surveys with controls based on pre-1986 methods have not been revised to take into account these methodological changes. Consequently, direct comparisons of CPS figures for months before January 1986 with later months will not be consistent. Series P-25, No. 985 reviews the postcensal population estimates methodology currently in use.

Comparability of Metropolitan and Nonmetropolitan Data From March 1993 CPS With Data for Previous Years

Estimates by type of residence categories (metropolitan, nonmetropolitan, central cities, outside central cities) were omitted from the 1984 reports because of the mixed 1970 and 1980 census sampling frame used for the 1985 CPS. Estimates by type of residence were resumed in the 1985 poverty report (*Current Population Reports*, Series P-60, No 158) since the March 1986 CPS was totally based on the 1980 census sampling frame as are subsequent years. The type of residence categories reflect metropolitan statistical areas (MSA's) defined as of June 1984. (For the definition of MSA's, see the definition's section under the heading "metropolitan areas".)

In July 1985, the CPS began carrying the metropolitan statistical area definitions announced by the Office of Management and Budget on June 30, 1984. Figures published from the CPS in the early 1980's and throughout most of the 1970's referred to metropolitan areas as

defined on the basis of the 1970 census. There are important differences in the population classified as metropolitan using the 1970 and 1984 definitions.

The new CPS metropolitan estimates have consistently been higher than independent estimates of the metropolitan population prepared by the Census Bureau; the new CPS nonmetropolitan estimates have been lower than the independent estimates. For example, between July 1985 and August 1986 the magnitude of the monthly differences varied from 900,000 to 2.5 million persons, so that the proportion of the population living in metropolitan areas according to the CPS has ranged from 0.4 to 1.0 percentage points higher than the independent estimate. The difference in level between the two sets of estimates is partially attributable to the basic CPS sample design, which, because of sampling variability, includes an oversample of metropolitan households and an undersample of nonmetropolitan households. The monthly variations result from the exit and entrance of rotation groups, each with slightly different metropolitan-nonmetropolitan proportions, into the sample. The apparent overestimation of metropolitan and underestimation of nonmetropolitan population in the CPS relative to the Bureau's independent estimates should be taken into account when using the data.

Noninterviews, Nonresponses, and Allocations

In the March 1993 CPS, no interview was obtained for approximately 4.5 percent of the 60,000 households in the sample. No interview was obtained at these households during the enumeration week for reasons such as "no one home," "temporarily absent," or "refusals." In order to account for these households, the weights assigned to households in which interviews were obtained have been increased slightly. This "non-interview" adjustment procedure adjusts the weights of sample households by race of householder and within a specified set of geographical restrictions.

The nonresponse problem, which is sometimes referred to as "item nonresponse," is a serious problem in most household surveys and is especially troublesome for income. In many cases, even though an interview is obtained, complete information for all of the income questions is not available, unknown or refused. In March 1993, the income data were incomplete for about 27 percent of the persons 15 years old and over. About 32 percent of the families had one or more members with incomplete income information. In order that the maximum amount of information can be utilized, missing income items are imputed or allocated by values which are obtained from active respondents with similar economic and demographic characteristics.

Although nonresponse rates for families by poverty status are not available, it is known that families in the lower income intervals tend to have lower nonresponse

rates than those in the middle and upper income intervals. This is due in part to the fact that lower income families have less complicated financial arrangements than those in other income groups. For a more detailed discussion of this topic see "Income Nonresponses in the Current Population Survey" by Mitsuo Ono and Herman P. Miller published in Proceedings of the Social Statistics Section, American Statistical Association, 1969.

Modifications In Collecting Income Data in the March 1980 Current Population Survey

A modified version of the experimental questionnaire which was tested on three-eighths of the March 1979 sample was used for the full sample in March 1980. The experimental questionnaire contained a number of modifications designed to improve income reporting. For further discussion, see the section, "Modifications to the March 1980 CPS" in Current Population Reports, Series P-60, No. 130.

Definition of the Income Universe

Starting in the March 1980 CPS, a decision was made to restrict the universe for presenting income data to persons 15 years old and over instead of 14 years old and over. This change was made to establish consistency between the results from the March 1980 CPS and the 1980 Census of Population. Although income data were collected for persons 14 years old and over, the income of the 14-year-olds was not used for processing and tabulation purposes.

The March 1980 CPS also incorporated the use of the "householder" concept rather than the traditional "head" concept. Under the new procedure, the householder is the first adult household member listed on the questionnaire. The instructions call for listing first the person (or one of the persons) in whose name the home is owned or rented.

Another change made in the March 1980 CPS was the exclusion of secondary families (now called unrelated subfamilies) from the count of all families. This modification was required because of the introduction of the householder concept, since unrelated subfamilies do not have a householder. For more discussion on all of these changes, see the section, "Modifications to the March 1980 CPS," Current Population Reports, Series, P-60, No. 130.

REVISIONS TO EARNINGS QUESTION

The Census Bureau made a revision to the March CPS income supplement questionnaire in 1986 in an effort to adapt to continually rising levels of annual income. Beginning with the March 1986 CPS, question

number 48, which covers the amount of earnings received from the employer or own business for which the respondent worked the longest during the previous calendar year, was modified to permit coding of earnings amounts to a maximum of \$299,999. Prior to March 1986, procedures allowed for coding of amounts to a maximum of \$99,999. In March 1977, about 127,000 weighted sample persons reported receiving earnings in the previous calendar year in excess of the \$99,999 maximum. In March 1986, when the revision was made, about 627,000 weighted sample persons reported receiving earnings in excess of this maximum. About 16,000 weighted sample persons reported earnings amounts that exceeded the revised maximum of \$299,999.

This change in the questionnaire causes a break in the time series for some income measures. Overall the revision added about \$22.9 billion in 1985 to the total aggregate income that would have gone undetected had the \$99,999 limit continued. Mean income, per capita income, shares of aggregate income by quintile and the index of income concentration (GINI Index) were all affected by the revision and caution should be used when comparing the 1985 and later data to earlier years.

REVISIONS TO MARCH CPS PROCESSING SYSTEM

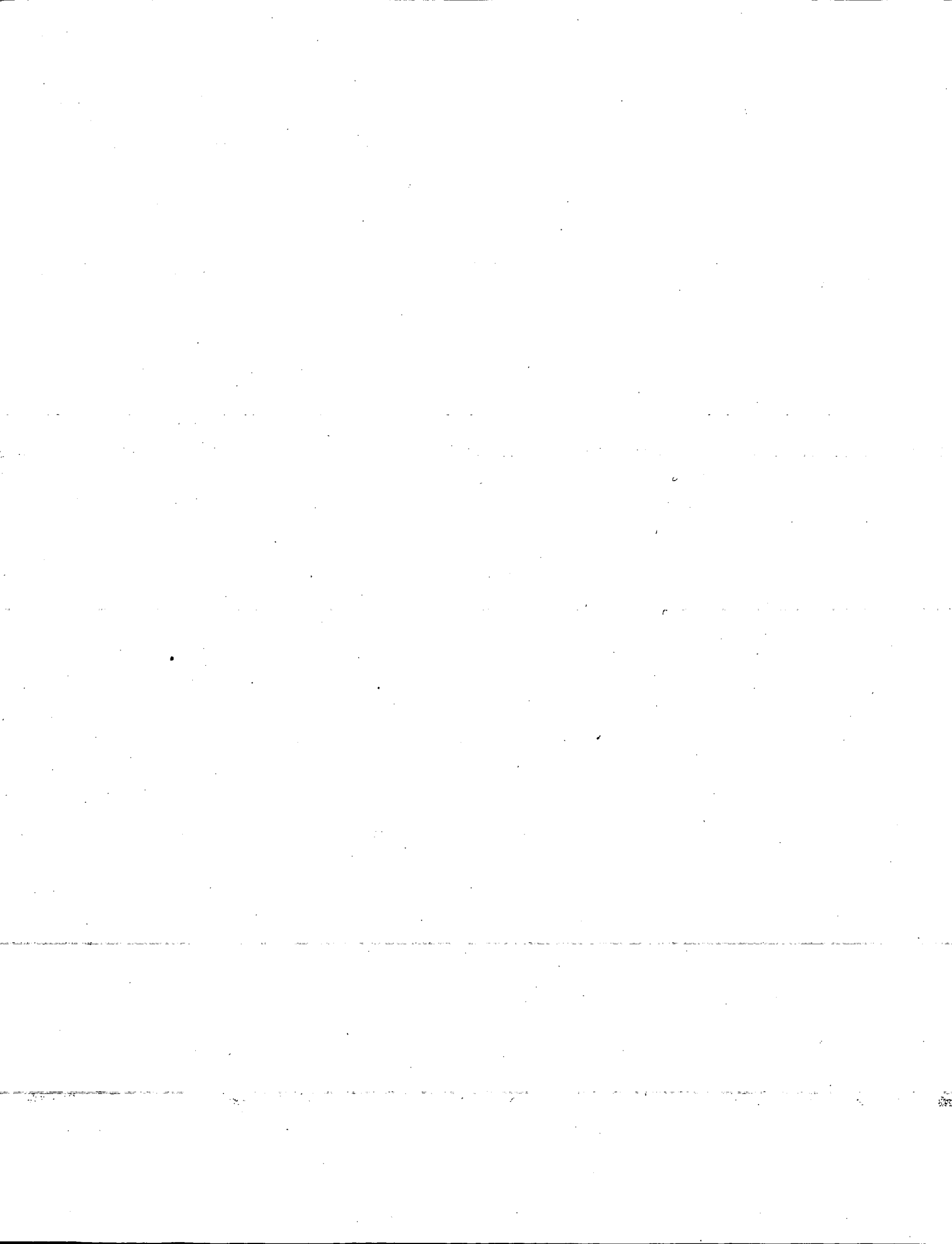
Between 1988 and 1989 a new computer processing system was introduced for the March Current Population Survey. This processing system rewrite was long overdue; the system in use before this year was first introduced in March 1976 and was never fully updated to reflect the numerous questionnaire changes that have taken place since that time. In addition, the programs used to process the CPS file were written in a computer language that is being phased out of use at the Census Bureau. While the March 1989 file is the first to reflect this new processing system, the March 1988 file has been reprocessed based on these new procedures in order to: 1) better evaluate the new processing procedures, and 2) allow year-to-year comparisons to be made between income years 1987 and 1988 using a consistent processing system. All 1987-88 comparisons in this report are based on the new processing procedures for both years.

While the following section deals mainly with modifications to the March imputation procedures and their subsequent effect on income and poverty estimates, it should be pointed out that all of the processing programs were rewritten this year, so that not only is the new file based on a somewhat different imputation system, it also reflects a rewritten weighting system, data acceptance program, family relationship edits, and new procedures to match income supplement records to the monthly CPS file. As a result, it is difficult to

ascertain whether differences (especially those based on relatively small bases) are the result of imputation or other processing differences between the original and revised files.

Since the Census Bureau began imputing for missing income data on the CPS in 1962, there have been three major revisions to the processing system (in 1967, 1976, and 1989). Through all of these revisions, the basic strategy used to make imputations has remained the same. This approach, commonly referred to as "hot deck" imputation, assigns missing responses to sample persons with information from matched sample persons with similar demographic and economic information who answered these questions. For a detailed description of the CPS imputation procedures, see Technical Paper No. 54, *Income Nonresponse: March 1983 CPS*. Under the new March processing system, there were three main modifications to the income imputation programs:

1. The edits and imputations were expanded to reflect the full detail of the March income questionnaire. The original processing system was still based on a less detailed CPS income questionnaire that has not been in use since 1980.
2. Under the revised processing procedures, entire sets of March income and noncash benefits data were imputed to supplement noninterviews from the same interviewed person. Under the original processing procedures, earnings, unearned income, and noncash benefits were imputed in separate stages during the processing system. Thus, the new processing system imputes noninterviews more efficiently and is better able to preserve the correlation between earnings, unearned income, and noncash benefits.
3. Both the old and new processing systems employ what are called "statistical matches" to link sample cases with reported data to those requiring imputation for missing responses. In the original processing system, under certain circumstances, reported data was removed and replaced with imputed data during the statistical matching process. Under the new system, reported data are never removed. This was accomplished by expanding the number of statistical matches in the income imputation system.



Appendix B. Source and Accuracy of Estimates

SOURCE OF DATA

Most estimates in this report come from data obtained in March of years 1960 through 1993 in the Current Population Survey (CPS). The Bureau of the Census conducts the survey every month, although this report uses only March data for its estimates. The March survey uses two sets of questions, the basic CPS and the supplement.

Some estimates in this report come from data obtained from the 1990 Panel of the Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP). The Bureau of the Census conducts the SIPP every four months, and collects data on a monthly basis.

Basic CPS. The basic CPS collects primarily labor force data about the civilian noninstitutional population as well as basic demographic characteristics of population such as age, sex, race, marital status and household relationship. Field representatives ask questions concerning labor force participation about each member 15 years old and over in every sample household.

The present CPS sample was selected from the 1980 Decennial Census files with coverage in all 50 States and the District of Columbia. The sample is continually updated to account for new residential construction. It is located in 729 areas comprising 1,973 counties, independent cities, and minor civil divisions. About 60,000 occupied households are eligible for interview every month. Field representatives are unable to obtain interviews at about 2,600 of these units because the occupants are not home after repeated calls or are unavailable for some other reason.

Since the introduction of the CPS, the Bureau of the Census has redesigned the CPS sample several times to improve the quality and reliability of the data and to satisfy changing data needs. The most recent changes were completely implemented in July 1985.

Table B-1 summarizes changes in the CPS designs for the years for which data appear in this report.

CPS March Supplement. In addition to the basic CPS questions, interviewers asked supplementary questions in March about money income received the previous calendar year.

To obtain more reliable data for the Hispanic origin population, the March CPS sample was increased by about 2,500 eligible housing units, interviewed the previous November, that contained at least one sample person of Hispanic origin. In addition, the sample included persons in the Armed Forces living off post or with their families on post.

CPS Estimation Procedure. This survey's estimation procedure inflates weighted sample results to independent estimates of the civilian noninstitutional population of the United States by age, sex, race and Hispanic/non-Hispanic categories. The independent estimates were based on statistics from decennial censuses of population; statistics on births, deaths, immigration and emigration; and statistics on the size of the Armed Forces.

The independent population estimates used for 1981 (1980 for income estimates) to present were based on updates to controls established by the 1980 Decennial Census. Data previous to 1981 were based on independent population estimates from the most recent decennial census. For more details on the change in independent estimates, see the section entitled "Introduction of 1980 Census Population Controls" in an earlier report (Series P-60, No. 133). The estimation procedure for the March supplement included a further adjustment so husband and wife of a household received the same weight.

The estimates in this report for 1983 (from the March 1984 CPS) and later also employ a revised survey weighting procedure for persons of Hispanic origin. In previous years, weighted sample results were inflated to independent estimates of the noninstitutional population by age, sex, and race. There was no specific control of the survey estimates for the Hispanic population. Since then, the Bureau of the Census developed independent population controls for the Hispanic population by sex and detailed age groups. Revised weighting procedures incorporate these new controls. The independent population estimates include some, but not all, undocumented immigrants.

Basic SIPP. The 1990 panel SIPP sample is located in 230 Primary Sampling Units (PSU's) each consisting of a county or a group of contiguous counties. Within these PSU's, expected clusters of four housing units (HU's) were systematically selected from lists of addresses prepared for the 1980 decennial census to form the bulk of the sample. Similar to CPS, the SIPP sample is continually updated to account for HU's built after the 1980 census.

The period covered by the 1990 longitudinal panel consists of 32 interview months (eight interviews) conducted from February 1990 to September 1992. The first interview was conducted during February, March, April, and May of 1990. Each sample person was visited every 4 months thereafter. At each interview the reference period was the 4 months preceding the interview month. In general, one cycle of four interviews covering the entire sample using the same questionnaire is called a wave. For subsequent interviews, only original sample persons (those in Wave 1 sample households and interviewed in Wave 1) and persons living with them were eligible to be interviewed. Original sample persons were followed if they moved to a new address, unless the new address was more than 100 miles from a SIPP sample area. Then, telephone interviews were attempted. All first wave noninterviewed households were automatically designated as noninterviews for all subsequent interviews. When original sample persons moved to remote parts of the country and couldn't be reached by telephoning, moved without leaving a forwarding address, or refused to be interviewed, additional noninterviews resulted.

Approximately 61,200 persons were initially eligible to be interviewed; however, 45,400 were classified as interviewed for the life of the panel. The person nonresponse rate was 25 percent.

SIPP Estimation Procedure. Several stages of weight adjustments were involved in the estimation procedure used to derive the SIPP longitudinal person weights. Each person received a base weight equal to the inverse of the probability of selection. Two noninterview adjustment factors were applied. One adjusted the weights of interviewed persons in interviewed households to account for households which were eligible for the sample but could not be interviewed at the first interview. The second was applied to compensate for person noninterviews occurring in subsequent interviews. The Bureau has used complex techniques to adjust the weights for nonresponse, but the success of these techniques in avoiding bias is unknown.

Another factor was applied to each interviewed person's weight to account for the SIPP sample areas not having the same population distribution as the strata from which they were selected.

An additional stage of adjustment to longitudinal person weights was performed to reduce the mean square error of the survey estimates. This was accomplished by ratio adjusting the sample estimates to agree with Current Population Survey (CPS) type estimates of the civilian (and some military) noninstitutional population of the United States by demographic characteristics including age, sex, and race, as of the specified control date. For the Panel, the control date is March 1, 1990. The CPS estimates by age, race, and sex were themselves brought into agreement with estimates from the 1980 decennial census which have been adjusted to reflect births, deaths, immigration, emigration, and changes in the Armed Forces since 1980. Also, SIPP estimates were controlled to independent Hispanic controls.

ACCURACY OF ESTIMATES

Since the CPS and SIPP estimates come from a sample, they may differ from figures from a complete census using the same questionnaires, instructions, and enumerators. A sample survey estimate has two possible types of error: nonsampling and sampling. The accuracy of an estimate depends on both types of error, but the full extent of the nonsampling error is unknown. Consequently, one should be particularly careful when interpreting results based on a relatively small number of cases or on small differences between estimates. The standard errors for CPS and SIPP estimates primarily indicate the magnitude of sampling error. They also partially measure the effect of some nonsampling errors in responses and enumeration, but do not measure systematic biases in the data. (Bias is the average over all possible samples of the differences between the sample estimates and the desired value.)

Nonsampling Variability. Nonsampling errors can be attributed to several sources including the following:

- Inability to obtain information about all cases in the sample.
- Definitional difficulties.
- Differences in the interpretation of questions.
- Respondents' inability or unwillingness to provide correct information.
- Respondents' inability to recall information.
- Errors made in data collection such as in recording or coding the data.
- Errors made in processing the data.
- Errors made in estimating values for missing data.
- Failure to represent all units with the sample (undercoverage).

CPS and SIPP undercoverage results from missed housing units and missed persons within sample households. Compared to the level of the 1980 Decennial Census, overall CPS and SIPP undercoverage is about 7 percent. Undercoverage varies with age, sex, and race. Generally, undercoverage is larger for males than for females and larger for Blacks and other races combined than for Whites. As described previously, ratio estimation to independent age-sex-race-Hispanic

population controls partially corrects for the bias due to undercoverage. However, biases exist in the estimates to the extent that missed persons in missed households or missed persons in interviewed households have different characteristics from those of interviewed persons in the same age-sex-race Hispanic group. Furthermore, the independent population controls have not been adjusted for undercoverage in the 1980 census.

A common measure of survey coverage is the coverage ratio, the estimated population before ratio adjustment divided by the independent population control. Table B-2 shows CPS coverage ratios for age-sex-race groups for a recent month. The CPS coverage ratios can exhibit some variability from month to month, but these are a typical set of coverage ratios. Other Census Bureau household surveys like the SIPP experience similar coverage.

Answers to questions about money income often depend on the memory or knowledge of one person in a household. Recall problems can cause underestimates of income in survey data, because it is easy to forget minor or irregular sources of income. Respondents may also misunderstand what the Census Bureau considers money income, or may simply be unwilling to answer these questions correctly because the questions are considered too personal. See Appendix C, "Underreporting of Income," for more discussion.

For additional information on nonsampling error including the possible impact on CPS data when known, refer

Comparability of Data. Data obtained from the CPS, SIPP, and other sources are not entirely comparable. This results from differences in field representative training and experience and in differing survey processes. This is an example of nonsampling variability not reflected in the standard errors. Use caution when comparing results from different sources.

Caution should also be used when comparing CPS estimates in this report, which reflect 1980 census-based population controls, with estimates for 1979 (from March 1980 CPS) and earlier years, which reflect 1970 census-based population controls. This change in population controls had relatively little impact on summary measures such as means, medians, and percentage distributions, but did have a significant impact on levels. For example, use of 1980 based population controls results in about a 2-percent increase in the civilian noninstitutional population and in the number of families and households. Thus, estimates of levels for data collected in 1981 and later years will differ from those for earlier years by more than what could be attributed to actual changes in the population. These differences could be disproportionately greater for certain subpopulation groups than for the total population.

Since no independent population control totals for persons of Hispanic origin were used before 1983, compare Hispanic estimates over time cautiously.

A number of changes were made in data collection and estimation procedures beginning with the March 1980 CPS. The major changes were the use of a more detailed income questionnaire, the use of the "householder" concept, the introduction of the new farm definition, and use of more detailed income intervals in the upper range of the income distribution. Due to these and other changes, one should use caution when comparing estimates for 1979 through 1991 with estimates for earlier years. A description of these changes and the effect they had on the data is given in the section "Modifications to the March 1980 CPS" of an earlier report (Series P-60, No. 130).

Another major change is that CPS income estimates for 1985 are the first based entirely on households selected from the 1980 census-based sample design. Estimates by type of residence category such as metropolitan, nonmetropolitan, farm and nonfarm, which

were omitted from the 1984 report because of the mixed 1970 and 1980 census sampling frame used for the March 1985 CPS, have been resumed. The residence categories reflect metropolitan areas defined as of June 1984. In addition, the March 1986 CPS supplement questionnaire was revised to enable the coding of higher amounts of earnings from longest job.

Note When Using Small Estimates. Summary measures (such as medians and percentage distributions) are shown only when the base is 75,000 or greater for CPS; 200,000 or greater for SIPP. Because of the large standard errors involved, summary measures would probably not reveal useful information when computed on a smaller base. However, estimated numbers are shown even though the relative standard errors of these numbers are larger than those for corresponding percentages. These smaller estimates permit combinations of the categories to suit data users' needs. Take care in the interpretation of small differences. For instance, even a small amount of nonsampling error can cause a borderline difference to appear significant or not, thus distorting a seemingly valid hypothesis test.

Estimation of Median Incomes. The methodology for computing median income has been changed over the past few years. The computations have been done using either Pareto interpolation or linear interpolation. Currently, linear interpolation is used to estimate all medians. Pareto interpolation assumes a decreasing density of population within an income interval, whereas linear interpolation assumes a constant density of population within an income interval. Estimates of median income for 1979 through 1987 and associated standard errors have been calculated using Pareto interpolation if the estimate is larger than \$20,000 for persons or \$40,000 for families and households. This is because the width of the income interval containing the estimate is greater than \$2,500. Estimates of median income for 1976, 1977, and 1978 and associated standard errors were calculated using Pareto interpolation if the estimate was larger than \$12,000 for persons or \$18,000 for families and households. This is because the width of the income interval containing the estimate is greater than \$1,000. All other estimates of median income and associated standard errors for 1976 through 1992 and almost all of the estimates of median income and associated standard errors for 1975 and earlier were calculated using linear interpolation. Thus, use caution when comparing median incomes above \$12,000 for persons or \$18,000 for families and households for different years. Median incomes below those levels are more comparable from year to year since they have always been calculated using linear interpolation. For an indication of the comparability of medians calculated

using Pareto interpolation with medians calculated using linear interpolation, see Series P-60, No. 114, *Money Income in 1976 of Families and Persons in the United States*.

Sampling Variability. Sampling variability is variation that occurred by chance because a sample was surveyed rather than the entire population. Standard errors, as calculated by methods described next in "Standard Errors and Their Use," are primarily measures of sampling variability, although they may include some non-sampling error.

Standard Errors and Their Use. A number of approximations are required to derive, at a moderate cost, standard errors applicable to all the estimates in this report. Instead of providing an individual standard error for each estimate, generalized sets of standard errors are provided for various types of characteristics.

Tables B-3 and B-4 provide CPS standard errors of estimated numbers and estimated percentages, respectively. The standard errors in both tables are of persons, households, families, and unrelated individuals for Total or White, Black, and Hispanic. For Asians and Pacific

Islanders, use the standard errors for Total or White from these two tables. Table B-5 has CPS standard error parameters for various characteristics. Table B-6 provides factors to apply to the CPS standard error parameters for estimates prior to 1992. Table B-7 provides CPS Hispanic parameters for estimates prior to 1984. Table B-8 provides CPS Asian and Pacific Islander parameters for poverty, income, and nonincome characteristics. Table B-9 has the year-to-year CPS correlation coefficients for poverty and income characteristics.

Table B-10 and B-11 provide SIPP standard errors of estimated numbers and percentages, respectively. Table B-12 has SIPP standard error parameters by race and sex.

The sample estimate and its standard error enable one to construct a confidence interval, a range that would include the average result of all possible samples with a known probability. For example, if all possible samples were surveyed under essentially the same general conditions and using the same sample design, and if an estimate and its standard error were calculated from each sample, then approximately 90 percent of the intervals from 1.645 standard errors below the estimate to 1.645 standard errors above the estimate would include the average result of all possible samples.

A particular confidence interval may or may not contain the average estimate derived from all possible samples. However, one can say with specified confidence that the interval includes the average estimate calculated from all possible samples.

Some statements in the report may contain estimates followed by a number in parentheses. This number can be added to and subtracted from the estimate to calculate upper and lower bounds of the 90-percent confidence interval. For example, if a statement contains the phrase "grew by 1.7 percent (± 1.0)," the 90-percent confidence interval for the estimate, 1.7 percent, is 0.7 percent to 2.7 percent.

Standard errors may also be used to perform hypothesis testing, a procedure for distinguishing between population parameters using sample estimates. The most common type of hypothesis appearing in this report is that the population parameters are different. An

example of this would be comparing the poverty rate of Black families to the poverty rate of White families.

Tests may be performed at various levels of significance, where a significance level is the probability of concluding that the characteristics are different when, in fact, they are the same. All statements of comparison in the text have passed a hypothesis test at the 0.10 level of significance or better. This means that the absolute value of the estimated difference between characteristics is greater than or equal to 1.645 times the standard error of the difference.

Standard Errors of Estimated Numbers. There are two ways to compute the approximate standard error, s_x , of an estimated number shown in this report. The first uses the formula

$$s_x = fs \quad (1)$$

where f is a factor from table B-5, B-8, or B-12 and s is the standard error of the estimate obtained by interpolation from table B-3 or B-10. The second method uses formula (2), from which the standard errors in table B-3 and B-10 were calculated. This formula will provide more accurate results than formula (1).

$$s_x = \sqrt{ax^2 + bx} \quad (2)$$

Here x is the size of the estimate and a and b are the parameters in table B-5, B-8, or B-12 associated with the particular type of characteristic. When calculating standard errors for numbers from cross-tabulations involving different characteristics, use the factor or set of parameters for the characteristic which will give the largest standard error.

Illustration

Table 1 shows that there were 36,880,000 persons below the poverty level in 1992. Use the appropriate parameters from table B-5 and formula (2) to get

Estimate, x	36,880,000
a parameter	-0.000040
b parameter	9,502
Standard error	544,000
90% conf. int.	35,985,000 to 37,775,000

The standard error is calculated as

$$s_x = \sqrt{-0.000040 \times 36,880,000^2 + 9,502 \times 36,880,000} = 544,000$$

The 90-percent confidence interval for the estimated number of persons below the poverty level in 1992 is calculated as 36,880,000 \pm 1.645x544,000.

The alternate calculation of the standard error, using formula (1) with $f=1.0$ from table B-5 and $s = 533,000$ by interpolation from table B-3, is

$$s_x = 1.0 \times 533,000 = 533,000$$

Standard Errors of Estimated Percentages. The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends on the size of the percentage and its base. Estimated percentages are relatively more reliable than the corresponding estimates of the numerators of the percentages, particularly if the percentages are 50 percent or more. When the numerator and denominator of the percentage are in different categories, use the factor or parameter from table B-5, B-8, or B-12 indicated by the numerator.

The approximate standard error, $s_{x,p}$, of an estimated percentage can be obtained by use of the formula

$$s_{x,p} = fs \quad (3)$$

In this formula, f is the appropriate factor from table B-5, B-8, or B-12 and s is the standard error of the estimate obtained by interpolation from table B-4 or B-11.

Alternatively, formula (4) will provide more accurate results:

$$s_{x,p} = \sqrt{\frac{b}{x} p(100 - p)} \quad (4)$$

Here x is the total number of persons, families, households, or unrelated individuals which is the base of the percentage, p is the percentage ($0 \leq p \leq 100$), and b is the parameter in table B-5, B-8, or B-12 associated with the characteristic in the numerator of the percentage.

Illustration

Table 1 shows that of the 36,880,000 persons below the poverty level in 1992, 24,523,000, or 66.5 percent were White. Use the appropriate parameter from table B-5 and formula (4) to get

Percentage, p	66.5
Base, x	36,880,000
b parameter	9,502
Standard error	0.8
90% conf. int.	65.2 to 67.8

The standard error is calculated as

$$s_{x,p} = \sqrt{\frac{9,502}{36,880,000} \times 66.5 \times (100.0 - 66.5)} = 0.8$$

The 90-percent confidence interval for the estimated percentage of persons below the poverty level in 1992 that were White is calculated as 66.5 \pm 1.645x0.8.

The alternate calculation of the standard error, using formula (3) with $f=1.0$ from table B-5 and $s=0.8$ by interpolation from table B-4, is

$$s_{x,p} = 1.0 \times 0.8 = 0.8$$

Standard Error of a Difference. The standard error of the difference between two sample estimates is approximately equal to

$$s_{x-y} = \sqrt{s_x^2 + s_y^2 - 2rs_x s_y} \quad (5)$$

where s_x and s_y are the standard errors of the estimates, x and y . The estimates can be numbers, percentages, ratios, etc. The correlation coefficient, r , can be determined from table B-9 for year-to-year comparisons for CPS poverty or income estimates of numbers and proportions; for other CPS comparisons and for SIPP assume that r equals zero. This will represent the actual standard error quite accurately for the difference between

estimates of the same characteristic in two different areas, or for the difference between separate and uncorrelated characteristics in the same area. However, if there is a high positive (negative) correlation between the two characteristics, the formula will overestimate (underestimate) the true standard error.

Illustration

Table 1 shows that the number of persons below the poverty level in 1992 was 36,880,000 and in 1991 was 35,708,000. The apparent difference is 1,172,000. Use the appropriate parameters from tables B-5, B-6, and B-9 and formulas (2) and (5) to get

The standard error of the difference is calculated as

$$s_{x-y} = \sqrt{544,000^2 + 537,000^2 - 2 \times 0.45 \times 544,000 \times 537,000} = 567,000$$

The 90-percent confidence interval for the estimated difference is calculated as 1,172,000 ± 1.645x567,000. Since this interval does not contain zero, we can conclude with 90-percent confidence that the number of persons below the poverty level in 1992 is greater than the number in 1991.

Standard Error of a Median. The sampling variability of an estimated median depends on the form of the

distribution and the size of the base. One can approximate the reliability of an estimated median by determining a confidence interval about it. (See the section "Standard Errors and Their Use" for a general discussion of confidence intervals.)

Estimate the 68-percent confidence limits of a median based on sample data using the following procedure.

1. Determine, using formula (4), the standard error of the estimate of 50 percent from the distribution.
2. Add to and subtract from 50 percent the standard error determined in step 1.
3. Using the distribution of the characteristic, determine upper and lower limits of the 68-percent confidence interval by calculating values corresponding to the two points established in step 2.

Use Pareto interpolation for any point in an income interval greater than \$2,500 in width, and linear interpolation otherwise. The formulas for interpolation are:

$$\text{Pareto: } X_{pN} = \exp \left[\frac{\ln(pN/N_1)}{\ln(N_2/N_1)} \ln(A_2/A_1) \right] A_1 \quad (6)$$

$$\text{Linear: } X_{pN} = \frac{pN - N_1}{N_2 - N_1} (A_2 - A_1) + A_1 \quad (7)$$

where

X_{pN} = estimated upper and lower bounds for the confidence interval ($0 \leq p \leq 1$). For purposes of calculating the confidence interval, p takes on the values determined in step 2. Note that X_{pN} estimates the median when $p = 0.50$.

N = for distribution of numbers: the total number of units (persons, households, etc.) for the characteristic in the distribution.

= for distribution of percentages: the value 1.0.

p = the values obtained in step 2.

A_1, A_2 = the lower and upper bounds, respectively, of the interval containing X_{pN} .

N_1, N_2 = for distribution of numbers: the estimated number of units (persons, households, etc.) with values of the characteristic greater than or equal to A_1 and A_2 , respectively.

= for distribution of percentages: the estimated percentage of units (persons, households, etc.) having values of the characteristic greater than or equal to A_1 and A_2 , respectively.

exp is the exponential function.

Ln is the natural logarithm function.

A mathematically equivalent result is obtained by using common logarithms (base 10) and antilogarithms.

4. Divide the difference between the two points determined in step 3 by two to obtain the standard error of the median.

Use of the above procedure could result in standard errors which differ from those given in the detailed tables. The reasons for this discrepancy are the use of a more detailed distribution than that given in the tables in determining the published standard errors, and the rounding of the numbers to thousands in the published tables. Linear interpolation was almost always used to compute the published medians and standard errors. Occasionally, a median may lie in an open-ended interval. To calculate its standard error the user must call Housing and Household Economic Statistics Division of the Census Bureau to obtain the methodology.

Illustration

Table 22 shows that the median income deficit for families below the poverty level was \$5,073 in 1992. Table 22 also shows that the size, or base, of the distribution from which this median was determined was 7,960,000 families.

1. Using formula (4) with $b = 2,243$ from table B-5, the standard error of 50 percent on a base of 7,960,000 is about 0.8 percent.
2. To obtain a 68-percent confidence interval on the estimated median, add to and subtract from 50 percent the standard error found in step 1. This yields percentage limits of 49.2 and 50.8.
3. The lower and upper limits for the interval in which the median falls are \$5,000 and \$6,000, respectively (from table 22). Then, by addition, the estimated numbers of families below the poverty level with an income deficit greater than or equal to \$5,000 and \$6,000 are 4,024,000 and 3,415,000, respectively. Using formula (7), the lower limit for the confidence interval of the median is

$$\frac{0.508 \times 7,960,000 - 4,024,000}{3,415,000 - 4,024,000} (6,000 - 5,000) + 5,000 = 4,968$$

Similarly, the upper limit is approximately

$$\frac{0.492 \times 7,960,000 - 4,024,000}{3,415,000 - 4,024,000} (6,000 - 5,000) + 5,000 = 5,177$$

Thus, a 68-percent confidence interval for the median income deficit for families below the poverty level is from \$4,968 to \$5,177.

4. Therefore, the standard error of the median is

$$\frac{(5,177 - 4,968)}{2} = 105$$

Standard Error of a Mean for Grouped Data. The formula used to estimate the standard error of a mean for grouped data is

$$s_{\bar{x}} = \sqrt{(b/y)S^2} \tag{8}$$

In this formula, y is the size of the base of the distribution and b is a parameter from table B-5, B-8, or B-12. The variance, S², is given by the following formula:

$$S^2 = \sum_{i=1}^c p_i \bar{x}_i^2 - \bar{x}^2 \tag{9}$$

where \bar{x} , the mean of the distribution, is estimated by

$$\bar{x} = \sum_{i=1}^c p_i \bar{x}_i \tag{10}$$

c is the number of groups; i indicates a specific group, thus taking on values 1 through c.

p_i is the estimated proportion of households, families or persons whose values, for the characteristic (x-values) being considered, fall in group i.

\bar{x}_i is (Z_{i-1} + Z_i)/2 where Z_{i-1} and Z_i are the lower and upper interval boundaries, respectively, for group i. \bar{x}_i is assumed to be the most representative value for

the characteristic for households, families, and unrelated individuals or persons in group i.

Group c is open-ended, i.e., no upper interval boundary exists. For income of families below the poverty level, use -\$2,500 as the midpoint for "Loss" and \$20,600 as the midpoint for "\$20,000 and over." For income of unrelated individuals below the poverty level, use -\$9,100 as the midpoint for "Loss" and \$5,200 as the midpoint for "\$5,000 and over." For income tables for all families, use -\$5,000 for "Loss" and \$150,000 for "\$100,000 and over." For the income deficit table, use \$7,400 as the midpoint of "\$5,000 or more" interval and \$4,900 for the "\$1,500 or more" interval. Otherwise, the approximate average value for an open-ended interval is

$$\bar{x}_c = \frac{3}{2} Z_{c-1} \tag{11}$$

Standard Error of a Ratio. Certain estimates may be calculated as the ratio of two numbers. The standard error of a ratio, x/y, may be computed using

$$s_{x/y} = \frac{x}{y} \sqrt{\left[\frac{s_x}{x}\right]^2 + \left[\frac{s_y}{y}\right]^2 - 2r \frac{s_x s_y}{xy}} \tag{12}$$

The standard error of the numerator, s_x , and that of the denominator, s_y , may be calculated using formulas described earlier. In formula (12), r represents the correlation between the numerator and the denominator of the estimate.

For one type of ratio, the denominator is a count of families or households and the numerator is a count of persons in those families or households with a certain characteristic. If there is at least one person with the characteristic in every family or household, use 0.7 as an estimate of r. An example of this type is the mean number of children per family with children.

For all other types of ratios, r is assumed to be zero. If r is actually positive (negative), then this procedure will provide an overestimate (underestimate) of the standard error of the ratio. Examples of this type are the mean number of children per family and the poverty rate for families.

NOTE: For estimates expressed as the ratio of x per 100 y or x per 1,000 y, multiply formula (12) by 100 or 1,000, respectively, to obtain the standard error.

Illustration

Table 1 shows the number of families below the poverty level, x, was 7,960,000 and the total number of families, y, was 68,144,000. The ratio of families below the poverty level to the total number of families was 0.117 or 11.7 percent. Use the appropriate parameters from table B-5 and formulas (2) and (12) with r=0 to get

The 90-percent confidence interval for the ratio of families below the poverty level to all families is calculated as 0.117 ± 1.645x0.002.

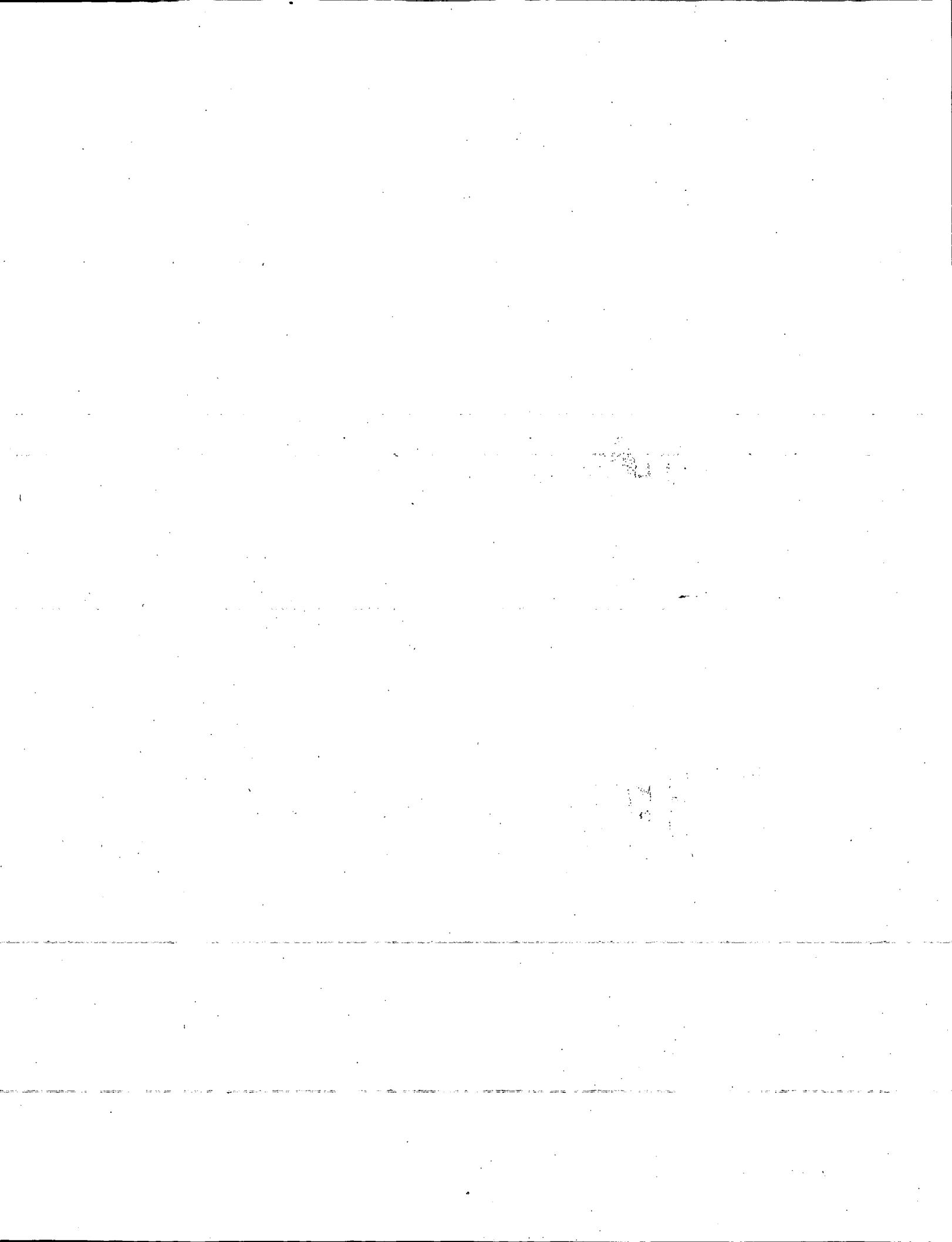

Appendix C. Underreporting of Income

QUALITY OF INCOME DATA

The quality of the income data derived from the March Current Population Survey (CPS) is affected by five main sources of error. The first, sampling errors, are errors attributable to the fact that a sample rather than a census was taken. The other four main sources of error, usually termed collectively as nonsampling errors, result from 1) use of a sampling frame that does not include all units for which the survey was intended to provide data, 2) failure to contact all sample units selected, i.e., noninterview and undercoverage problems, 3) poor quality of responses, and 4) missing data problems.

Over the years evaluations of the quality of the March CPS income estimates have revealed downward biases when the survey estimates are compared to independent estimates derived from sources such as the National Income and Product Accounts (NIPA), statistics based on Federal individual income tax returns, data from the Social Security Administration (SSA), etc.

Most analyses of the magnitude of nonsampling errors in the March CPS income estimates have been made at the "aggregate" level since the kind of data needed to make such comparisons are relatively easy to obtain. Some studies have also been conducted at the "micro" level by matching the data provided by individuals with data obtained from administrative records systems for those same individuals. These studies, such as the March 1973 CPS-IRS-SSA exact match, have shown that the nonsampling error problem is much more complex than that measured at the aggregate level. For example, a significant number of respondents provide responses to the amounts of income received that appear to exceed the actual amount received. These are offset by larger errors in the other direction by a somewhat higher proportion of other respondents.

Deriving independent estimates of aggregate income for purposes of evaluating the survey data is difficult. The survey and administrative sources use different definitions, cover different universes, and are based on concepts that are not exactly the same. Therefore, adjustments to the administrative sources must be made to help correct for these inconsistencies and arrive at a valid independent estimate that can be used to make fair and accurate estimates of the quality of the

survey estimates. These adjustments attempt to 1) remove income that is received by the institutional population, the deceased, and persons not residing in the United States at the time of the interview, 2) remove any components of income that are received as "in-kind" payments or benefits, and 3) remove any lump-sum or one-time payments, withdrawals, etc.

A degree of uncertainty must be attached to the independent estimates for several reasons. First, not all of the information needed to make some of these adjustments mentioned above are available. Second, administrative sources are also subject to estimation problems resulting from the lack of adequate data, and in the case of the NIPA, periodically undergo significant revision to correct for some of these errors when more recent or more accurate information become available. Third, even though attempts are made to include income received by those operating in the legal "informal" economy in the NIPA these estimates are subject to some unknown degree of error. Fourth, no attempt is made to include estimates of income received through illegal means.

In spite of this uncertainty regarding development of independent estimates it is important to attempt to monitor the quality of the income estimates using these sources. Table C-1 contains comparisons of survey and independent estimates of aggregate income by type of income for 1990. The estimates shown in this table are not directly comparable to those for 1987, which was the last year for which independent estimates were made. Major revisions to the NIPA and some revisions in the methods for arriving at the CPS concepts make most comparisons for these years inconsistent. Because of the difficulties in deriving adequate independent estimates, the table does not cover all types of income identified in the March CPS.

Overall, the survey estimate of \$3.518 trillion was about 88 percent of the independent estimate. This result is achieved mainly because the survey estimate of wage and salary income was 97 percent of the independent estimate and this income source accounts for 74 percent of the CPS income estimate from all sources. For the other sources of income the survey estimates range from 33 percent of the independent estimate for dividend income to 103 percent for private pensions and annuities.

As shown in table C-1, the CPS continues to have serious underreporting problems for interest and dividend income where the survey estimates are 51 and 33 percent of the independent estimates. Inclusion of interest or dividend income from IRA and Keogh accounts in the independent estimates contributed to the differences.

Although the CPS questions on interest and dividends attempt to capture income from IRA's and Keogh accounts, we feel only a small portion of this income is reported in the CPS. A more appropriate measure would be to omit these sources of interest and dividend income from the independent source estimates.

The apparent extreme underreporting problem for farm income helps to illustrate the difficulty in developing meaningful independent estimates. The estimate of \$45.9 billion shown in table C-1 for farm income was derived directly from the NIPA which bases its estimates on data from the United States Department of Agriculture. In contrast, farm income reported on Federal individual income tax returns for 1990 was only \$11.4 billion.

Benefits from the means-tested program, Aid to Families With Dependent Children (AFDC), also exhibits a significant survey underestimate at 72 percent of the independent estimate. A significant portion of this problem is associated with misclassification of the source of income. In the CPS, AFDC benefits are often reported by survey respondents as having come from other sources of welfare payments, mainly General Assistance.

Benefits from the Veterans' Administration and unemployment compensation, both of which have a past history of underestimation in the March CPS, continue to have such a problem. Veterans' payments have also been shown to be subject to errors of misclassification with a proportion of these benefits being reported incorrectly by respondents as military retirement.

Pension income estimates from the survey show different patterns of reporting. For State and local government retirement and Federal government and military retirement, the survey estimates represented 77 percent and 83 percent of the independent source estimate, respectively. For private pensions and annuities the survey estimate is 103 percent of that derived from independent sources. The proportion the Federal government and military retirement pension income represents of the independent source is somewhat low and may still be overstated because of the misreporting problem that exists between Veteran's benefits and military retirement. The high level of reporting for private pensions may be, in part, due to some persons incorrectly reporting lump sum amounts in the survey and also to inadequate accounting of pension income in the independent source.

Table C-2 has been included in this report to illustrate the wide variation between income estimates based on Federal individual income tax returns and the NIPA. The NIPA estimates adjusted to survey concepts (column 3 of table C-2) were used as the basis for the calculations in table C-1. In some cases these income amounts differ significantly from those shown in the other columns of table C-2. The first column labeled "IRS AGI as reported" represents the amounts as computed from unaudited Federal tax returns. The second column labeled "AGI after BEA reconciliation" are estimates of adjusted

gross income (AGI) for Federal individual tax returns derived by adjusting the NIPA amounts to AGI concepts. This reconciliation is performed annually by the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA).

The NIPA estimates used to evaluate the quality of the survey data differ from AGI income for five main reasons. First, the NIPA estimates include the income of persons who are not required to file tax returns. Second, the NIPA estimates reflect both taxable and nontaxable income amounts. Third, the accounting methods used in the NIPA, such as the treatment of depreciation, differ from those used by the IRS. Fourth, the NIPA does not use individual income tax return data extensively in its estimation methodology because of concerns regarding high levels of misreporting. Fifth, some attempts have been made to adjust the NIPA estimates to exclude lump-sum payment, withdrawals, etc. that are sometimes included as income for tax purposes. percent of the independent estimates. Inclusion of interest or dividend income from IRA and Keogh accounts in the independent estimates contributed to the differences. Although the CPS questions on interest and dividends attempt to capture income from IRA's and Keogh accounts, we feel only a small portion of this income is reported in the CPS. A more appropriate measure would be to omit these sources of interest and dividend income from the independent source estimates.
