HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE JUDICIARY TO CONVENE A TASK FORCE TO REVIEW THE FAMILY COURT'S JUDICIAL WAIVER PROCESS INVOLVING JUVENILE FELONY DEFENDANTS.

WHEREAS, the Family Court has exclusive original 1 jurisdiction in proceedings involving a felony act allegedly 2 committed by a juvenile under the age of eighteen pursuant to 3 section 571-11, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and 4 5 WHEREAS, if the juvenile was between the age of fourteen 6 7 and eighteen at the time the act was allegedly committed, the Family Court can waive its jurisdiction and order the juvenile 8 held for criminal proceedings pursuant to section 571-22, Hawaii 9 10 Revised Statutes; and 11 WHEREAS, however, the Family Court must complete a full 12 13 investigation and hearing to determine whether certain criteria exist to warrant excluding the juvenile from the juvenile 14 justice system; and 15 16 WHEREAS, while there are thousands of juvenile criminal 17 18 cases annually, there have been only about one hundred judicial waiver requests over the past ten years; and 19 20 WHEREAS, questions and concerns have arisen regarding the 21 Family Court's judicial waiver process that require review; and 22 23 WHEREAS, it is important to periodically examine the Family 24 Court's judicial waiver process to determine whether it is 25 26 adequately protecting not only juveniles, but the community as well; now, therefore, 27 28 29 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 30 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2008, the Senate concurring, the Judiciary is 31



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requested to convene a task force to review the Family Court's 1 judicial waiver process involving juvenile felony defendants; 2 and 3 4 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in convening the task force, 5 the Judiciary is requested to include at least one 6 representative each of the: Judiciary, Department of the 7 Attorney General, Office of the Public Defender, Department of 8 Human Services, Office of Youth Services, Office or Department 9 10 of the Prosecuting Attorney of each county, and Hawaii State Bar Association in private practice with criminal defense 11 experience; and 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in reviewing the Family Court's 14 judicial waiver process involving juvenile felony defendants, 15 the task force, among other things, is requested to: 16 17 (1)Examine the application of evidence that a juvenile is 18 committable to an institution for the mentally 19 defective or retarded or the mentally ill used to bar 20 a judicial waiver; 21 22 Identify concerns that arise during the Family Court's (2)23 judicial waiver process that affect the rights and 24 likelihood of reasonable rehabilitation of a juvenile, 25 as well as affect the prospects for adequate 26 protection of the public; 27 28 29 (3) Examine relevant procedural issues such as findings of 30 adulthood, and the transfer of cases from the Family Court to District or Circuit Criminal Court; 31 32 (4)Identify any circumstances that may be suitable for an 33 "automatic judicial waiver"; 34 35 (5) Consider the need for speedy processing, disposition, 36 and ruling on the matter of judicial waiver; 37 38 Examine the judicial waiver process involving juvenile 39 (6) felony defendants in other states; 40 41 42 (7) Recommend possible statutory amendments to address issues and concerns; and 43 44



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1 (8) Meet at least twice monthly; and 2 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Judiciary is requested to 4 provide administrative, professional, technical, and clerical support to the task force; and 5 6 7 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Judiciary is requested to submit a report of the task force's findings and 8 recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the 9 Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 10 the 2009 Regular Session; and 11 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 13 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Chief Justice of the 14 Supreme Court, Senior Judge of the Family Court, Attorney 15 General, Public Defender, Executive Director of the Office of 16 Youth Services, the prosecuting attorney of each county, and the 17 President of the Hawaii State Bar Association. 18 19 20 21
