HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF ACCOUNTING AND GENERAL SERVICES TO DEVELOP A PLAN TO HAVE ALL SIGNS AT THE STATE CAPITOL PRINTED IN ENGLISH AND HAWAIIAN.

WHEREAS, section 4 of article XV of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii designates English and Hawaiian as the official languages of Hawaii; and

WHEREAS, section 4 of article X of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii mandates that the State promote the study of Hawaiian culture, history, and language; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to section 5-6.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, Hawaiian may be used on all emblems and symbols representative of the State, its departments, agencies, and political subdivisions; and

WHEREAS, all signs at the State Capitol should be printed in English and Hawaiian to reflect the State's allegiance to preserving and promoting Hawaiian culture; and

WHEREAS, the presence of the Hawaiian language in signage throughout the State Capitol will also help to revitalize and encourage the use of the Hawaiian language; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2008, that the Department of Accounting and General Services is requested to develop a plan to have all signs at the State Capitol printed in English and Hawaiian; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED in developing the plan, the Department of Accounting and General Services is requested to:

(1) Project a full integration of Hawaiian into the signs at the State Capitol no later than January 1, 2013;

- Rank signs according to visibility with signs that are (2) 1 located in common areas that receive a lot of visitor traffic having the highest priority; 3 4
 - Recommend signs for possible exclusion, such as signs (3) that indicate maintenance or utility features of the building, or that are located in areas that are private or have low visibility;
 - (4)In determining the Hawaiian translation for each sign, consult with at least one representative of:
 - The Department of Hawaiian and Indo-Pacific (A) Languages and Literature, University of Hawaii at Manoa:
 - The Center for Hawaiian Studies, University of (B) Hawaii at Manoa;
 - Ka Haka `Ula O Ke`elikōlani, College of Hawaiian (C) Language, University of Hawaii at Hilo; and
 - (D) The Bishop Museum; and
 - Recommend an individual or agency to be used to (5)provide Hawaiian language for signs at the State Capitol; and
 - Provide a list of the highest priority signs to be (6) displayed in English and Hawaiian, including the sign wording in both languages; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Accounting and General Services is requested to submit a report of its findings, including projected costs and any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the 2009 Regular Session; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the Comptroller; Director of the Center for Hawaiian Studies at the University of Hawaii at Manoa; Chair of the Department of Hawaiian and Indo-Pacific Languages and Literature at the University of Hawaii at Manoa; Director of Ka Haka `Ula O Ke`elikōlani, College of Hawaiian
