SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO ESTABLISH A GLOBAL
WARMING TASK FORCE TO ASSESS THE IMPACTS OF GLOBAL WARMING
ON THE STATE.

1 WHEREAS, there is consensus in the scientific community
2 that global warming and climate change are occurring at an
3 accelerated pace and pose a threat to human society; and
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5 WHEREAS, the effects of global warming have the potential
6 to impact the citizens, natural resources, and economy of
7 Hawaii; and
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9 WHEREAS, Hawaii, as an island state, is particularly
10 vulnerable to rising ocean levels as a consequence of global
11 warming; and
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13 WHEREAS, rising sea levels would have specific impacts on
14 Hawaii, including shoreline erosion, difficulties in air and sea
15 shipping, encroachment on existing buildings and infrastructure,
16 and population health effects; and
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18 WHEREAS, the State must take action to address the near-
19 term and long-term effects of global warming and rising ocean
20 levels; and
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22 WHEREAS, before action may be taken, efforts must be made
23 to fully predict and evaluate the effects that rising ocean
24 levels and other consequences of climate change will have upon
25 Hawaii; now, therefore,
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27 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth
28 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2008, the
29 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of
30 Health is requested to establish a Global Warming Task Force to
31 assess the effects of global warming in the State; and

2 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Global Warming Task Force
3 is requested to:

5 (1) Assess the current and potential impacts of climate
6 warming trends on the citizens, natural resources, and
7 the economy of the State, including impacts on:

9 (A) The visitor industry;

11 (B) Intrastate and interstate air and sea
12 transportation of cargo and persons;

14 (C) Existing buildings and public utilities
15 infrastructure;

17 (D) Population health; and

19 (E) Native plants, animals, and ecosystems; and

21 (2) Assess the potential impacts of rising ocean levels as
22 a result of climate change on the citizens, natural
23 resources, and the economy of the State, including
24 impacts on:

26 (A) The visitor industry;

28 (B) Shoreline erosion;

29
30 (C) Intrastate and interstate air and sea
31 transportation of cargo and persons;

33 (D) Existing buildings and public utilities
34 infrastructure;

36 (E) Population health; and

38 (F) Native plants, animals, and ecosystems; and

40 (3) Estimate the costs to the State and its citizens of
41 adverse effects associated with climate warming and
42 rising sea levels; and

- 1 (4) Make recommendations to the Legislature and the
- 2 Governor on measures that would address or mitigate
- 3 the near- and long-term effects of climate change,
- 4 including:

- 6 (A) Preventing shoreline erosion;

- 8 (B) Preserving the visitor industry;

- 10 (C) Improving or relocating transportation
- 11 infrastructure such as airports and shipping
- 12 terminals;

- 14 (D) Implementing restrictions on construction in
- 15 affected areas;

- 17 (E) Improving or hardening utilities infrastructure;

- 19 (F) Preparing for health emergencies; and

- 21 (G) Maintaining the health and resilience of native
- 22 species and ecosystems; and

24 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that membership of the Global

25 Warming Task Force shall consist of knowledgeable

26 representatives from state and county government, emergency

27 first responders, community stakeholders, affected industries,

28 the military, the United States Army Corps of Engineers, and the

29 scientific community; and

31 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Global Warming Task Force

32 is requested to submit a report of its findings and

33 recommendations, including proposed legislation, to the

34 Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of

35 the Regular Session of 2010; and

3 Director of Health, the Adjutant General, the Mayor and the
4 Chairperson of the Council for each county, President of the
