SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO SURVEY OTHER STATES TO DETERMINE HOW NURSING FACILITIES IN RURAL AREAS ADDRESS THEIR TRANSPORTATION AND PARKING ISSUES RELATED TO THE TRANSPORT OF NURSING FACILITY RESIDENTS.

WHEREAS, in Hawaii, forty-nine nursing facilities house 1 2 4,257 of the most frail and vulnerable elderly and disabled residents in the State: and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, eighteen of those facilities are on neighbor 6 islands, housing 1,527 elderly and disabled; and 7 8 WHEREAS, based on federal and state guidelines, the elderly 9 are required to receive mandatory follow-up visits for their various medical needs, including visits related to skin, 10 gastroenterology, cancer, foot, dental, eye, and ear ailments, 11 and visits for chemotherapy, radiation, x-rays, and other 12 13 treatment; and 14 15 WHEREAS, while nursing facilities on Oahu enjoy the luxury of various options to transport their elderly patients, neighbor 16 island nursing facilities need to equip their own vehicles, 17 including vans, to accommodate wheelchairs and gurneys to 18 transport elders to all their appointments; and 19 20 WHEREAS, to park in handicapped stalls, current law 21 requires nursing facilities in Hawaii to apply for a removable 22 windshield placard for disabled persons for each facility 23 resident transported in a van--a practice that burdens county 24 staff, physicians' offices, and nursing facility offices; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, furthermore, current law limits the issuance of 28 special license plates or removable windshield placards only to persons with disabilities; and 29 30



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WHEREAS, this system poses a hardship on nursing facilities with limited staff and resources and places the elderly or 2 disabled resident at risk of missing appointments that are vital 3 to their health and well-being; now, therefore, 4 5 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth 6 7 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2008, the House of Representatives concurring, that the Legislative 8 Reference Bureau is requested to survey nursing facilities in 9 other states to determine how nursing facilities in rural areas 10 address their transportation and parking issues related to the 11 transport of nursing facility residents; and 12 13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference 14 Bureau is requested to consult with the Disability and 15 Communication Access Board; Long-Term Care Social Workers of 16 Hawaii; National Association of Social Workers, Hawaii Chapter; 17 Nursing Facility Administrators; and the Hawaii State Long-Term 18 19 Care Ombudsman, as necessary; and 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference 21 Bureau is requested to submit a report on the results of the 22 23 survey, including any necessary proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 24 the Regular Session of 2009; and 25 26 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Disability and 27 Communication Access Board; Long-Term Care Social Workers of 28 Hawaii; National Association of Social Workers, Hawaii Chapter; 29 Nursing Facility Administrators; and the Hawaii State Long-Term 30 Care Ombudsman are requested to meet to discuss an alternative 31 solution to the transportation and parking problems of nursing 32 facilities and make recommendations, including proposed 33 legislation, at the state and county levels, as appropriate, to 34 the Legislature and the appropriate county council no later than 35 36 twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2009 and twenty days prior to the convening of the appropriate 37 county council 2009 legislative session; and 38 39 40 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 41 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau; the Hawaii State Long-Term Care 42 Ombudsman; the Chairperson of the Disability and Communication 43 44 Access Board, who in turn, is requested to transmit copies to 3



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the head of the Long-Term Care Social Workers of Hawaii; the
head of the Nursing Facilities Administrators; and the Executive
Director of the National Association of Social Workers, Hawaii
Chapter.
