SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING TUBERCULOSIS SCREENING AND TREATMENT FOR RESIDENTS OF PUBLIC HOUSING AND EMERGENCY TRANSITIONAL SHELTER HOUSING.

WHEREAS, under the terms of the Compacts of Free 1 Association (COFA or Compact) with the Federated States of 2 Micronesia, the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the 3 Republic of Palau, citizens from the Freely Associated States 4 have the right to freely travel to, and work and reside in, the 5 6 United States without durational limit; and 7 8 WHEREAS, a significant number COFA migrants in the State of 9 Hawai'i arrive with serious medical care needs, one of the most significant of which is screening for and treatment of 10 tuberculosis (TB); and 11 12 WHEREAS, a significant number of COFA migrants in the State 13 are also in need of housing assistance, and may reside in public 14 housing and emergency transitional shelter housing; and 15 16 17 WHEREAS, TB is a highly infectious communicable disease that can be transmitted from person to person by physical 18 contact or through airborne particles, especially in situations 19 20 in which an infected person is in close proximity or physical contact with other individuals; and 21 22 WHEREAS, TB is a health risk to all persons, and not 23 exclusive to COFA migrants; and 24 25 WHEREAS, emergency transitional shelter housing is often 26 provided in a congregate setting in which the residents are in 27 close proximity and physical contact with each other, with 28 limited privacy and with little separation between personal 29 spaces; and 30 31 WHEREAS, public housing, as distinct from emergency 32 transitional shelter housing, is often provided in dwellings in 33



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which large numbers of people reside together in close proximity 1 2 and physical contact with each other; and 3 WHEREAS, public housing and emergency transitional shelter 4 5 housing provided by private agencies often includes a requirement that a person provide a TB clearance before entering 6 7 the facility as a resident; and 8 WHEREAS, the State of Hawai'i, through the Hawai'i Public 9 Housing Authority (HPHA), currently provides public housing and 10 emergency transitional shelter housing to qualified needy 11 families, many of whom are COFA migrants; and 12 13 WHEREAS, the HPHA does not currently require a person to 14 provide a TB clearance prior to entering a facility as a 15 16 resident; and 17 WHEREAS, the State Department of Health provides TB 18 19 screening and treatment services to needy individuals, Hawai'i residents and visitors alike, including COFA migrants, in 20 various locations throughout the islands; and 21 22 WHEREAS, one of the tasks set out for the COFA Task Force, 23 convened by the Department of the Attorney General pursuant to 24 Senate Resolution No. 142, S.D. 1, 2007, was to investigate the 25 medical, educational, housing, and social services needs of 26 27 migrants from Freely Associated States including the impact these services needs have on schools, and to make 28 recommendations regarding how to plan for and coordinate the 29 30 provision of services to this population; and 31 32 WHEREAS, the COFA Task Force has identified health care and housing as two issues that are of concern to the COFA migrant 33 community, and has recommended coordinating the provision of 34 35 services by state agencies whenever possible; now, therefore, 36 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth 37 Legislature of the State of Hawai'i, Regular Session of 2008, the 38 House of Representatives concurring, that the Department of 39 Health and the HPHA are requested to collaborate in: 40 41 Determining whether and to what extent the imposition 42 (1) of TB screening and treatment should be considered as 43



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an appropriate and effective public health practice and as a condition before any person enters public housing and emergency transitional shelter housing, as a resident;

(2) Determining whether and to what extent screening and treatment for TB could be provided within public housing projects and emergency transitional shelter housing, and in conjunction with other services provided to residents of public housing, regardless of whether it is made a requirement for residents; and

Implementing TB screening and treatment services to (3) the extent the agencies determine it is possible; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 16 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the 17 Director of Health, the Executive Director of the Hawai'i Public 18 Housing Authority, the Attorney General, and the members of the 19 COFA Task Force, as convened by the Department of the Attorney 20 General. 21
