Dear Madam President and Members of the Senate:

Re: Senate Bill No. 2816 SD1 HD2

On May 1, 2008, Senate Bill No. 2816, entitled "A Bill for an Act Relating to Intra-County Ferry Service," became law without my signature, pursuant to Section 16 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Hawaii.

The purpose of this bill is to provide priority assignment of mooring space from Maalaea Harbor to Lahaina for intra-county ferry service regulated by the Public Utilities Commission. This bill further exempts these ferries which serve counties under 500,000 in population from paying the State fuel tax on fuels used in their operations.

This bill raises a number of concerns. This bill would grant preferential mooring rights to ferry operators ahead of non-ferry vessels seeking the same limited space in Maalaea Harbor. According to the State Department of Land and Natural Resources, there is a waiting list of 134 persons requesting space at this small boat harbor. Some of the individuals on this list have been waiting upwards of 10 years to obtain a mooring. Thus, I am concerned at the fact that this measure gives the ferry vessels a legal right to be placed at the top of the list.

I am proud that my Administration has taken much needed steps to upgrade and improve small boat harbors in our state, including Maalaea Harbor. Construction is already underway to rebuild the harbor and is expected to continue through 2011. As a result, vessels will need to be shuttled to different locations and mooring space will be further constrained during this period of time. This initiative will make it harder to accommodate ferry operations covered by this bill. The Small Harbors Division has already indicated they will work with the ferry operators to try to accommodate them to the extent possible.

Despite these concerns, the State and my Administration recognize the importance of providing safe, efficient intra-state ferry service to our island populations. Thus, we provide

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certain benefits to intra-state commerce vessels that are regulated by the Public Utilities Commission. Further, the Legislature has recognized the public purposes of these types of operations by enacting Act 9 of 2001 that granted fee waivers to intra-state ferry operators.

As part of our ongoing efforts to improve the transport of passengers and cargo within our island community, I have, for the foregoing reasons, allowed Senate Bill No. 2816 to become law as Act 57, effective May 1, 2008, without my signature.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO INTRA-COUNTY FERRY SERVICE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. The legislature finds that the residents of
2	West Maui	are served by only one highway and one small airport.
3	Residents	on the island of Lanai have only one feasible means of
4	water tra	nsport to Mauiby intra-county ferry from Lanai to
5	Lahaina.	However, the Lahaina small boat harbor is already
6	overused	and is shared by commercial fishing activities and
7	cruise sh	ips that add to already congested surface traffic.
8	The	legislature finds that an alternate ferry route from
9	Lanai to Maalaea harbor will:	
10	(1)	Provide more convenient travel for the residents of
11		Lanai and West Maui;
12	(2)	Ease the congestion in and around Lahaina and its boat
13		harbor; and
14	(3)	Make emergency ferry operations out of Lahaina a
15		feasible reality as a component of an emergency
16		transportation system should the only highway in West
17		Maui be closed.



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However, any ferry route to and from Maalaea harbor and Lahaina
 requires priority assigning of mooring space. In addition, the
 added fuel costs of this route would require an exemption from
 the fuel tax for fuel purchases for the ferry service.

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5 The purpose of this Act is to provide priority assignment 6 of mooring space for a new ferry route from Maalaea harbor to 7 Lahaina and to provide an exemption from the fuel tax for fuel 8 purchases for the ferry service.

9 SECTION 2. Any other law to the contrary notwithstanding,
10 the department of land and natural resources shall assign
11 priority mooring space to any intra-county ferry service
12 regulated by the public utilities commission that serves a
13 county:

14 (1) With a population of less than five hundred thousand15 residents; and

16 (2) That includes at least three islands inhabited by17 permanent residents.

18 SECTION 3. Section 243-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is19 amended to read as follows:

20 "§243-7 Tax not applicable, when. (a) This chapter
21 requiring the payment of license fees shall not be held or
22 construed to apply to fuel imported into the [State] state in

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interstate or foreign commerce while and so long as such fuel is 1 beyond the taxing power of the State, nor to any such fuel 2 exported or sold to the government of the United States or any 3 department thereof for official use of the government, nor to 4 any fuel exported or sold to another licensed distributor; but 5 every distributor shall be required to report such imports, 6 exports, and sales as provided by this chapter and in such 7 8 detail as the department of taxation shall require.

9 (b) This chapter shall not apply to the sale of liquid 10 fuel sold or used in the state for ultimate use by an intracounty ferry service that serves a county with a population of 11 less than five hundred thousand residents and that includes at 12 least three islands inhabited by permanent residents." 13 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 15 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon approval and 16 shall apply to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2007. 17
