A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE STATE MAMMAL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The Hawaiian monk seal (*Monachus schauinslandi*)
2 is the only marine mammal whose entire species range lies within
3 the United States. It is one of only two endemic mammals found
4 in Hawaii.

5 On November 23, 1976, it was listed as an endangered
6 species pursuant to the Endangered Species Act and it remains
7 listed as endangered today. The population of the Hawaiian monk
8 seal has been in a 20-year constant decline and today there are
9 only approximately 1,200 remaining. The majority of this
10 population is in the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands, while there
11 are an estimated 80 monk seals living in the main Hawaiian
12 Islands.

13 In 1979, the legislature designated the humpback whale as
14 the official marine mammal of the State. Part of the purpose
15 for doing so was to increase awareness about the humpback whale,
16 which was on the brink of extinction in the 60s. As a result of
17 an increase in awareness regarding the humpback whale, its



1 numbers have markedly increased. A purpose in designating the
2 Hawaiian monk seal as the official state mammal is to raise
3 awareness of it as an endangered species with the hope that this
4 awareness will, like the humpback whale, result in increased
5 protection and its repopulation.

6 The purpose of this Act is to recognize the importance and

9 official state mammal.


