## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CANCER SURVEILLANCE.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECT	ION 1. The legislature finds that surveillance of
2	cancer in	cidence and survival to assist individuals to make
3	informed	decisions is but one of eight goals of the Hawaii
4	comprehen	sive cancer control coalition to advance cancer control
5	in Hawaii	. The other seven goals revolve around the following
6	issues:	
7	(1)	Prevention, primarily through education and behavioral
8		change;
9	(2)	Early detection and assurance of coordination with
10		cancer management services;
11	(3)	Treatment with the most current and effective
12		treatments available;
13	(4)	Quality-of-life enhancement for all cancer survivors;
14	(5)	Research to advance the capabilities in Hawaii for
15		prevention, early detection, treatment, and quality of
16		life;
17	(6)	Uniform access to cancer services; and

1	(7) Adequate insurance.		
2	However, several obstacles impede the fulfillment of the		
3	goal of c	ancer incidence and survival surveillance. First, the	
4	Hawaii Tumor Registry is currently unable to contact cancer		
5	survivors in Hawaii directly to educate them on the work of the		
6	Hawaii Tumor Registry for cancer research. Second, it is		
7	unclear under existing law that the collection of data on pre-		
8	cancerous conditions is permissible. Third, the collection of		
9	biological specimens that may assist in cancer prognosis and		
10	outcome is also uncertain under existing law.		
11	The p	ourpose of this Act is to remove the obstacles impeding	
12	the fulfil	llment of the goals of cancer incidence and survival	
13	surveillance by:		
14	(1)	Allowing a cancer patient to be contacted directly,	
15		without initial physician contact, to inform the	
16		patient that the patient is registered in the state	
17		cancer surveillance and registration program;	
18	(2)	Adding "pre-cancerous" to the conditions about which	
19		data collection is authorized to monitor cancer	
20		screening activities and the efficacy of cancer	
21		vaccines; and	

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         (3) Adding "biological specimens" to the materials that
              may be collected to assist in research efforts to
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 3
              reduce, mitigate, and ameliorate the morbidity and
              mortality of cancer in Hawaii.

         SECTION 2. Section 321-43, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
    amended to read as follows:

         "$321-43 Statistical activities. The department of health
    shall engage in the collection and analysis of statistical
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9
    information on the morbidity and mortality of cancer in the
    [State.] state. The morbidity data may be collected in
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11
    cooperation with the [Hawaii state modical association]
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    University of Hawaii, Hawaii Medical Association, and the Hawaii
    cancer society. All data collected by a cooperating agency may
13
    be shared with the department of health in the form specified by
14
    the department of health. The mortality data as collected from
15
    death certificates shall be analyzed by the staff of the
16

    department in order to determine the significance of cancer in
18
    the [State] state by race, sex, age, occupation, site in the
19
    body, and in any other way found desirable for the purpose of
    determining the areas where greatest emphasis should be laid in
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21
    the statewide cancer control program. The morbidity data shall
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    be used [in]:
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1	(1)	<u>In</u> determining the prognosis and chance of cure, as	
2		well as the number of persons cured of cancer in the	
3		[ <del>State; for</del> ] <u>state;</u>	
4	(2)	For assisting in the direction of tumor research;	
5		[ <del>for</del> ]	
6	<u>(3)</u>	For determining, if possible, the tendencies of benign	
7		tumors to become malignant; [and for]	
8	(4)	For assisting in the follow-up of diagnosed or treated	
9		tumor cases as requested by attending physicians [-]:

11	<u>(5)</u>	For improving the reporting of the cause of death on	
12		death certificates.	
13	All statis	stical material collected under this section shall be	
14	considered confidential as to the names of persons or physicians		
15	concerned, except that researchers may use the names of [such]		
16	those persons when requesting additional information for		
17	research studies when [such] the studies have been approved by		
18	the cancer commission of the [Hawaii medical association.]		
19	Hawaii Medical Association and the appropriate federally		
20	authorized	d human subjects protection board."	
21	SECT	ION 3. Section 324-21, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
22	amended by	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:	

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         "(a) Any person, public or private medical facility, or
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    social or educational agency, may provide information,
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    interviews, reports, statements, memoranda, biological
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    specimens, or other data or relevant material relating to
    individuals with cancer or pre-cancerous conditions to the
 5
    Hawaii Tumor Registry. This information may be used in the
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 7
    course of any cancer research study approved by the cancer
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    commission of the Hawaii Medical Association[+] and the
 9
    appropriate federally authorized human subjects protection
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    board."
         SECTION 4. Section 324-22, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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12
    amended by amending subsections (b) and (c) to read as follows:
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         "(b) The identity[7] or any group of facts [which] that
    tends to lead to the identity[7] of any person whose condition

    or treatment has been studied shall be confidential and shall
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    not be revealed in any report or any other matter prepared,
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    released, or published. Researchers [may], however, may use the
    names of persons when requesting additional information for
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19
    research studies after being approved by the cancer commission[+
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    provided that when a request for additional information is to be
21
    made directly from a patient, the researcher shall first obtain
22
    approval for such request from the patient's attending
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- 1 physician. of the Hawaii Medical Association and the
- 2 appropriate federally authorized human subjects protection
- 3 board.
- 4 (c) The use of [such] additional information obtained by
- 5 researchers shall also be governed by subsection (a) and, in
- 6 addition, where the patient is still living and the information
- 7 is to be obtained directly from the patient, the researcher
- 8 shall first obtain the approval of the patient  $[\tau]$  or the
- 9 patient's immediate family, including a reciprocal beneficiary
- 10 [, or attending physician], in that order of priority."
- 11 SECTION 5. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 13 SECTION 6. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
