A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AN AUDIT OF THE HAWAII DISABILITY RIGHTS CENTER.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Congress created a
- 2 nationwide protection and advocacy system for individuals with
- 3 developmental disabilities under the Developmental Disabilities
- 4 Assistance and Bill of Rights Act, as amended, to aid
- 5 individuals with developmental disabilities or mental illness
- 6 and their families in gaining access to appropriate support and
- 7 services. States are required to designate an agency or entity
- 8 to provide advocacy services to persons with developmental
- 9 disabilities and mental illness in order to receive federal
- 10 funds for programs for these persons.
- 11 The legislature notes that the Hawaii Disability Rights
- 12 Center (Center) is the agency designated under section 333F-8.5,
- 13 Hawaii Revised Statutes, to provide advocacy services to persons
- 14 with developmental disabilities or mental illness. Section
- 15 333F-8.5(c), Hawaii Revised Statutes, grants the Center access
- 16 to all records of any person with developmental disabilities or
- 17 mental illness, to the extent required by federal law. However,

- 1 there are also federal and state statutes, such as the Health
- 2 Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, which were enacted
- 3 to protect the privacy of patient records.
- 4 The legislature also finds that there is an ongoing dispute
- 5 as to whether the law that provides the Center access to records
- 6 overrides the privacy rights of persons receiving services and
- 7 their families, with or without the appropriate waivers of these
- 8 privacy rights, and, if so, what justification is necessary for
- 9 the Center to demand access to records of persons with
- 10 disabilities. Providers of services to individuals with
- 11 disabilities are uncertain as to their obligation to disclose
- 12 patient records to an entity such as the Center. Concerns have
- 13 been raised about the Center, its approach to resolving the
- 14 conflict between a patient's right to privacy, and its need for
- 15 access to the patient and the patient's records.
- 16 The legislature also notes that the department of health
- 17 has jurisdiction over state funding for the Hawaii Disability
- 18 Rights Center and has responsibility for the performance of the
- 19 Center. The legislature finds for purposes of this Act that the
- 20 Center is a "quasi-public institution" within the scope of
- 21 section 23-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, because it is supported
- 22 in whole or in part by and handles state or public funds.

- 1 Although the Center is therefore subject to regular audits by
- 2 the auditor, it has never been audited by the auditor.
- 3 The purpose of this Act is to direct the auditor to perform
- 4 a financial and management audit of the Center to protect its
- 5 vulnerable clientele and to ensure that state funds are being
- 6 spent in accordance with applicable laws.
- 7 SECTION 2. (a) The auditor shall conduct a financial and
- 8 management audit of the Hawaii Disability Rights Center.
- 9 (b) The auditor shall submit a report to the legislature
- 10 no later than twenty days prior to convening of the regular
- 11 session 2009, containing findings and recommendations, including
- 12 any proposed legislation, concerning the Hawaii Disability
- 13 Rights Center's handling of state funds and its approach to
- 14 resolving the conflict between a patient's right to privacy and
- 15 its need for access to the patient and the patient's records.
- 16 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
