A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII CHILDREN'S HEALTH CARE PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Although estimates of the number of uninsured
- 2 children in the State vary, one thing that can be agreed upon is
- 3 that there is a gap group that is ineligible for any state or
- 4 federal health care coverage. Children who remain uninsured
- 5 typically do not receive an appropriate level of medical care.
- 6 Children who lack a source of care or must turn regularly to a
- 7 hospital emergency department are unlikely to receive preventive
- 8 care or early and regular management of acute or chronic health
- 9 conditions.
- 10 A study performed by the Urban Institute, a nonpartisan
- 11 economic and social policy research organization, showed that
- 12 regardless of age, race, ethnicity, income, or health status,
- 13 uninsured children were much less likely to have received a
- 14 well-child checkup within the past year and were more likely
- 15 than insured children to report an unmet need for medical care
- 16 that was associated with concerns about cost.

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- 1 Health insurance helps children and youth receive regular
- 2 health care so they can participate in school and other
- 3 activities. Often, parents experience hardship when an
- 4 uninsured child is sick because of the added stress of the
- 5 child's medical bills.
- 6 Local health care coverage providers offer children's plans
- 7 that cover certain preventive services, immunizations, doctor
- 8 visits, diagnostic tests, emergency care, mental health
- 9 benefits, and some prescription drugs.
- 10 The State has the opportunity to help provide health care
- 11 coverage for children in the gap group through partnerships with
- 12 mutual benefit societies such as the Hawaii Medical Service
- 13 Association. Such partnerships will allow the State to offer
- 14 coverage to uninsured children under the existing children's
- 15 plans offered by these mutual benefit societies. The cost of
- 16 the premium will be split equally between the partner mutual
- 17 benefit society and the State.
- 18 The purpose of this Act is to establish the Hawaii
- 19 children's health care program as a temporary three-year pilot
- 20 program to provide health care coverage to uninsured children.
- 21 SECTION 2. Hawaii children's health care program; three-
- 22 year pilot program; establishment. (a) There is established

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- 2 year pilot program to provide health care coverage to uninsured
- 3 children. The pilot program shall provide health care coverage
- 4 through a public-private partnership, established as a contract
- 5 to provide health and human services pursuant to chapter 103F,
- 6 Hawaii Revised Statutes, between the department of human
- 7 services and a mutual benefit society operating in the State
- 8 under chapter 432, Hawaii Revised Statutes, that offers accident
- 9 and health or sickness insurance plans.
- 10 (b) To qualify for this pilot program, a child shall:
- 11 (1) Be between thirty-one days to eighteen years old;
- 12 (2) Have been uninsured continually for at least six
- months; provided that infants between thirty-one days
- 14 and six months of age shall have been uninsured
- 15 continually since birth; and
- 16 (3) Be ineligible to qualify for any other state or
- 17 federal health care coverage; provided that
- 18 individuals between two hundred fifty and three
- 19 hundred per cent of the federal poverty level who
- would otherwise be qualified for QUEST-net coverage
- 21 may choose to receive coverage through QUEST-net and
- 22 pay a prorated premium rate or to receive coverage

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- (c) The department of human services and the mutual
 benefit society shall share equally in the cost of the premium
 for each child enrolled in the pilot program.
- (d) The department of human services shall pay the State's
 share of the premiums under the pilot program on a quarterly
 basis.
- 9 (e) The mutual benefit society participating in the pilot
 10 program shall be responsible for determining the eligibility of
 11 the Hawaii children's health care program applicants and of
 12 enrolling applicants in the program.
- (f) The mutual benefit society participating in the pilot program shall provide a quarterly report to the department of human services and the legislature on the number of children enrolled in the Hawaii children's health care program.
- (g) Other private organizations may partner with the State to offer coverage to uninsured children under the Hawaii children's health care program; provided that plan benefits to be provided shall be equal to or better than those offered through the pilot program established by the State and a mutual benefit society under subsection (a).

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- 1 All children currently enrolled in a mutual benefit
- society's children's plan shall be eligible for enrollment into 2
- 3 the Hawaii children's health care program.
- 4 The Hawaii children's health care program shall
- 5 terminate on June 30, 2010.
- SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general 6
- 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$600,000, or so much
- 8 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and the
- 9 same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 10 2008-2009, for the Hawaii children's health care program
- 11 established by this Act.
- 12 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 13 of human services for the purposes of this Act.
- 14 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007, and
- 15 shall be repealed on June 30, 2010.

Appropriates funds. Sunsets June 30, 2010.
