A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII OCEAN AND COASTAL COUNCIL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that almost any activity
- 2 in Hawaii could be described as having an impact on ocean and
- 3 coastal resources. Hawaii's historical, cultural,
- 4 environmental, social, recreational, and economic foundations
- 5 are centered on our State's near-shore waters and coastline.
- 6 There is a need to establish a permanent mechanism to coordinate
- 7 the concerns and interests of the multitude of public and
- 8 private organizations to maximize collaboration and cooperation
- 9 among groups and to eliminate duplication of efforts.
- In 2005, the governor, pursuant to section 26-41, Hawaii
- Revised Statutes, and by Executive Order No. 2005-01,
- 12 established the Hawaii ocean and coastal council to gather
- 13 information and provide advice and recommendations on direction
- 14 and planning for addressing Hawaii's ocean and coastal concerns.
- 15 The Hawaii ocean and coastal council has since initiated the
- 16 development of coordinated policies.
- 17 The purposes of this Act are to:

5		addressing Hawaii's ocean and coastal concerns; and
6	(2)	Affirm the objective of the State to protect Hawaii's
7		resources.
8	This	Act does not create any new function of government or

10	SECT	ION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by

8	(4)	Explore, pursue, and develop additional sources of
9		funding to address ocean and coastal measures, as
10		appropriate;
11	(5)	Implement the 2006 Hawaii ocean resources management

13	(6)	Perform any other function necessary to effectuate the
14		purposes of this chapter.
15	The	council shall consist of thirty members, including
16	nineteen	members who shall be appointed without regard to
17	section 2	6-34 by the governor not later than January 1, 2008.
18	The counc	il shall be composed of the following members or, when
19	necessary	, appropriate substitutions selected by the governor:
20	(1)	The chairperson of the board of land and natural
21		resources, ex officio, or designee;

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1	(2)	The director, ex officio or designee, of each of the
2		following departments:
3		(A) Business, economic development, and tourism;
4		(B) Health;

8		officio, or designee;
9	(4)	The director of the office of planning, ex officio, or

11	(5)	The tourism liaison of the office of the governor, ex

14		or designee;
15	(7)	The chairperson of the marine and coastal zone
16		advisory council, ex officio, or designee;
17	(8)	The chairperson of the university of Hawaii sea grant
18		program, ex officio, or designee;
19	(9)	A representative of the university of Hawaii - school
20		of ocean and earth science and technology;
21	(10)	A representative of the office of Hawaiian affairs;
22	(11)	A representative of the Polynesian Voyaging Society;

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1	(12)	A representative of the association of Hawaiian Civic
2		clubs;
3	(13)	A representative of the Hawaii Institute for Marine

7	(b)	The council shall meet no less than twice annually to
8	discuss a	nd assess progress and recommend changes to the ocean
9	and coast	al programs.
10	(c)	The council shall submit a report of its activities to
11	the govern	nor and legislature annually.
12	(d)	The chairperson of the board of land and natural
13	resources	shall serve as the chairperson of the council and the
14	departmen	t of land and natural resources shall be the lead
15	agency.	The lead agency shall:
16	(1)	Coordinate all efforts between other departments and
17		federal and private agencies to organize and identify
18		ocean and coastal issues;
19	(2)	Prepare and distribute an annual progress report forty
20		days prior to the convening of each regular session of

3	(3)	Engage in any other function of a lead agency
4		necessary to effectuate the purposes of this chapter.
5	(e)	All council members shall serve without compensation
6	but shall	be entitled to reimbursement for necessary expenses
7	while att	ending meetings and while in the discharge of their
8	duties and	d responsibilities as members of the council."
9	SECT	ION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval and
10	shall be	repealed on July 1, 2012.

PURPOSE:

To provide statutory authority to continue

the Hawaii Ocean and Coastal Council.

MEANS:

Add a new chapter to the Hawaii Revised


Statutes.

JUSTIFICATION:

Directed leadership and coordinated actions among all government agencies are critical to address Hawaii's ocean and coastal concerns, including, but not limited to user conflicts, protection of our natural, cultural, and historical resources, and health and safety. The multitude of public and private organizations with an interest in ocean and coastal matters need a mechanism for cooperation, collaboration and coordination.

In 2005, Governor Linda Lingle issued Executive Order (EO) No. 2005-01, establishing the Hawaii Ocean and Coastal Council (Council) in recognition of the need to protect Hawaii's near-shore waters and coastline, to gather information and provide advice and recommendations on direction and planning for addressing Hawaii's ocean and coastal matters throughout the State to foster coordinated approaches that support local initiatives on ocean and coastal concerns.

In spite of the Council having been terminated as a result of a condition of the EO, there is still a need to continue the leadership actions provided by the Council, not only to eliminate unnecessary duplication of effort and provide maximum leveraging and coordination of existing state funding from all concerned agencies,



but to also help promote increased and targeted participation and funding from cooperating entities.

Impact on the public: Directed leadership and coordination would eliminate duplicative actions and pool resources in addressing Hawaii's ocean and coastal concerns, including, but not limited to user conflicts, protection of our natural, cultural, and historical resources, and health and safety.

Impact on the department and other agencies: Would continue to foster and organize coordinated approaches among various executive departments, federal and county agencies, and international and local initiatives in addressing Hawaii's ocean and coastal concerns.
