A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ELECTIONS BY MAIL.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to enable the office 2 of elections to establish voting by mail for federal, state, and county primary, general, and special elections, and to require 3 that all elections be conducted by mail from the date of the 4 5 20 primary election. SECTION 2. Chapter 11, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended 6 by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and to read 7 as follows: 8 "PART . VOTING BY MAIL 9 10 §11-Elections eligible to be conducted by mail. 11 All federal, state, and county primary, special primary, 12 general, special general, and special elections shall be conducted by mail as follows: 13 14 (1) All special primary, special general, and special 15 elections shall be conducted by mail for elections 16 occurring after 20 ; and

1	(2) The 20 primary and general elections and all
2	primary and general elections thereafter shall be
3	conducted by mail.
4	(b) Notwithstanding subsection (a), voting at places of
5	deposit shall be allowed using ballots and ballot boxes that may
6	be necessary and convenient to voters to increase voter
7	participation in the election as provided in this part.
8	§11- Procedures for conducting elections by mail. (a)
9	Ballot packages shall include the ballot, a return
10	identification envelope, a secrecy envelope, and instructions
11	and shall be mailed to each voter at the voter's address not
12	sooner than days and no later than days before the
13	date of the election.
14	(b) Notwithstanding the dates of mailing in subsection
15	(a), ballot packages shall be mailed:
16	(1) To voters who live in places that do not receive daily
17	mail service from the United States Postal Service,
18	the mailings shall be made to enable the voter to vote
19	by mail or in person on or before the date of the
20	election; and

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1	(2)	To voters who request an absentee ballot, the mailing
2		shall be made in accordance with chapter 15 and the
3		rules adopted thereunder; and

- (3) To new voters who register after the last date of the mailing provided in subsection (a), the mailing shall be made to enable the voter to vote on or before the date of the election.
- (c) Notwithstanding subsections (a) and (b), ballot packages may be delivered or made available to voters who are unable to receive ballot packages by mail and who request a ballot package be delivered or made available for pick-up by the voter. The delivery and availability shall be made in a manner and using a method as will ensure confidentiality as provided in section 11-14.5. The receipt of the ballot package shall be made to the voter to enable the voter to vote on or before the date of the election.

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Undeliverable ballot packages. Ballot packages 1 **§11-**2 that are mailed or delivered shall not be forwardable or 3 deliverable beyond the address of the voter as shown in the register established and maintained by the clerk of the 4 respective county pursuant to part II. A ballot package that is 5 determined to be undeliverable by mail or other means to the 6 7 voter at the address shown in the register because of the death 8 of the voter, refusal of any person living at that address, or 9 because the voter moved and is no longer residing at that 10 address shall be returned to the clerk who initiated the mailing, and as to a voter that has moved, the clerk shall mail, 11 12 deliver, or make available the ballot package to the voter after 13 the clerk has determined or has been provided the new address of 14 the voter. 15 Requirements for voting by mail; returning the envelope. (a) Upon receipt of the ballot package, the voter 16 shall comply with the instructions included in the ballot 17 18 package. The instructions shall include directions on marking the ballot, inserting the marked ballot in the secrecy envelope, 19 inserting the secrecy envelope with the ballot in the return 20 21 identification envelope, and signing of the return 22 identification envelope before mailing or delivering the return

- 1 identification envelope containing the secrecy envelope with the
- 2 marked ballot.
- 3 (b) The instructions shall include information on election
- 4 fraud and voter fraud as provided in sections 19-3(5) and
- 5 19-3.5, and that violation of either section may subject the
- 6 voter, upon conviction, to imprisonment, fine, or both.
- 7 (c) Voters shall return the identification envelope
- 8 containing the secrecy envelope with the marked ballot by mail
- 9 or by delivery to a place of deposit that is designated by the
- 10 clerk so that the return identification envelope is received at
- 11 the office of the clerk or the place of deposit not later than
- 12 the time stated in section 11-131 on the date of the election.
- 14 replacement ballot if the ballot is destroyed, spoiled, lost, or
- 15 not received by the clerk. Replacement ballots shall be
- 16 provided to a voter who completes and signs a replacement ballot
- 17 request form. The form of the replacement ballot request shall
- 18 include information that allows the clerk to verify the
- 19 registration of the voter and ensure that another ballot has not
- 20 been returned by the voter.
- 21 (b) Upon receipt of the replacement ballot request form,
- 22 the clerk shall verify the registration of the voter and that



- 1 another ballot has not been returned by the voter, note on the
- 2 registry of voters that the voter has requested a replacement
- 3 ballot, mark the return identification envelope as a replacement
- 4 ballot, and issue the ballot package containing the replacement
- 5 ballot by mail, by delivery, or by making the ballot package
- 6 available for pick up by the voter requesting the replacement
- 7 ballot.
- **8** (c) Voters requesting a replacement ballot shall return
- 9 the identification envelope containing the secrecy envelope with
- 10 the marked replacement ballot by mail or by delivery to a place
- 11 of deposit that is designated by the clerk so that the return
- 12 identification envelope is received at the office of clerk or
- 13 the place of deposit not later than the time stated in section
- 14 11-131 on the date of the election.
- 15 §11- Counting of mail-in ballots. A mail-in ballot
- 16 shall be counted only if it is returned in the return
- 17 identification envelope, the return identification envelope is
- 18 signed by the voter to whom the ballot is mailed or delivered,
- 19 the signature on the return identification envelope is verified
- 20 by the clerk with the signature of the voter shown on the
- 21 registry of voters, and the return identification envelope is
- 22 received at the office of the clerk or at the place of deposit



- 1 not later than the time stated in section 11-131 on the date of
- 2 the election.
- 3 Not sooner than the day before the date of the election,
- 4 the secrecy envelope shall be opened in the preparation of the
- 5 counting of the ballots on the date of the election, provided
- 6 that counting of the mail-in ballots shall not commence sooner
- 7 than o'clock on the date of the election."
- 8 SECTION 3. Section 11-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended as follows:
- 10 1. By adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
- 11 and to read:
- ""Place of deposit" means a polling place located within a
- 13 representative district designated by the clerk for the purpose
- 14 of voting and receiving return identification envelopes as
- 15 provided in part ."
- 2. By amending the definition of "voting system" to read:
- ""Voting system", the use of paper ballots, electronic
- 18 ballot cards, voting machines, mail-in ballots, or any system by
- 19 which votes are cast and counted."
- 20 SECTION 4. Section 11-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended to read as follows:

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"§11-4 Rules [and regulations]. The chief election
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    officer may make, amend, and repeal [such] rules [and
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    regulations] governing elections held under this title, election
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    procedures, and the selection, establishment, use, and operation
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    of all voting systems now in use or to be adopted in the State,
    and all other similar matters relating thereto as in the chief
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    election officer's judgment shall be necessary to carry out this

    title.
         In making, amending, and repealing rules [and regulations]
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    for voters who cannot vote at the polls in person or receive or
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    return ballots by mail, and all other voters, the chief election
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    officer shall provide for voting by [such] these persons in
    [such] a manner as to insure secrecy of the ballot and to

    preclude tampering with the ballots of these voters and other
    election frauds. [Such] These rules [and regulations], when
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    adopted in conformity with chapter 91 and upon approval by the
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    governor, shall have the force and effect of law."
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         SECTION 5. Section 11-92.1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
    amended as follows:
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              By amending the title to read:
         "$11-92.1 Election proclamation; [establishment of a new
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precincts."

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- 1 2. By amending subsection (a) to read: The chief election officer shall issue a proclamation 2 [whenever a new precinct is established in any representative 3 4 district.] listing all polling places as places of deposit 5 within representative districts for voters of that representative district to vote or deposit return identification 6 envelopes containing secrecy envelopes with marked ballots. 7 The chief election officer, or the county clerk in a county 8 9 election, shall provide a suitable polling place for each precinct[-] or for one or more precincts within a representative 10 11 district as the chief election officer or county clerk determines to be necessary and convenient for voters of that 12 13 representative district to vote or deposit return identification 14 envelopes containing the secrecy envelope with the marked ballot. Schools, recreational halls, park facilities, and other 15 publicly owned or controlled buildings, whenever possible and 16 17 convenient, shall be used as polling places. The chief election 18 officer shall make arrangements for the rental or erection of 19 suitable shelter for this purpose whenever public buildings are 20 not available and shall cause these polling places to be 21 equipped with the necessary facilities for lighting, 22 ventilation, and equipment needed for elections on any island.
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- 1 This proclamation may be issued jointly with the proclamation
- 2 required in section 11-91."
- 3 SECTION 6. Section 11-136, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended to read as follows:
- 5 "§11-136 Poll book, identification, voting. [Every
- 6 person] A voter upon applying to vote at a place of deposit
- 7 shall sign the person's name in the poll book prepared for that
- 8 purpose. This requirement may be waived by the chairperson of
- 9 the precinct officials if for reasons of illiteracy or blindness
- 10 or other physical disability the voter is unable to write.
- 11 Every person shall provide identification if so requested by a
- 12 precinct official. A poll book shall not contain the social
- 13 security number of any person.
- 14 After signing the poll book and receiving the voter's
- 15 ballot, the voter shall proceed to the voting booth to vote
- 16 according to the voting system in use in the [voter's precinct.]
- 17 place of deposit of that representative district. The precinct
- 18 official may, and upon request shall, explain to the voter the
- 19 mode of voting."
- 20 SECTION 7. Section 11-91.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 repealed.



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["[S11-91.5] Federal, state, and county elections by mail.
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    (a) Any federal, state, or county election held other than on
    the date of a regularly scheduled primary or general election
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    may be conducted by mail.

         (b) The chief election officer shall determine whether a
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    federal or state election, other than a regularly scheduled
 6
    primary or general election, may be conducted by mail or at
 7
8
    polling places.
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         (c) The county clerk shall determine whether a county
    election, held other than on the date of a regularly scheduled
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    primary or general election, may be conducted by mail or at
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    polling places. An election by mail in the county shall be
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    under the supervision of the county clerk.
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         (d) The chief election officer shall adopt rules pursuant
    to chapter 91 to provide for uniformity in the conduct of
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    federal, state, and county elections by mail."]
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         SECTION 8. Section 11-92.3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    repealed.
         ["$11-92.3 Consolidated precincts; natural disasters;
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    postponement; absentee voting required; special elections. (a)
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    In the event of a flood, tsunami, earthquake, volcanic cruption,
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    high wind, or other natural disaster, occurring prior to an
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    election, that makes a precinct inaccessible, the chief election
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    officer or county clerk in the case of county elections may
    consolidate precincts within a representative district. If the
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    extent of damage caused by any natural disaster is such that the
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    ability of voters, in any precinct, district, or county, to
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    exercise their right to vote is substantially impaired, the
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    chief election officer or county elerk in the case of county
    elections may require the registered voters of the affected
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    precinct to vote by absentee ballot pursuant to section 15-2.5
    and may postpone the conducting of an election in the affected
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    precinct for no more than twenty-one days; provided that any
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    such postponement shall not affect the conduct of the election,
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    tabulation, or distribution of results for those precincts,
    districts, or counties not designated for postponement. The
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    chief election officer or county clerk in the case of county
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    elections shall give notice of the consolidation, postponement,
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    or requirement to vote by absentee ballot, in the affected
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    county or precinct prior to the opening of the precinct polling
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    place by whatever possible news or broadcast media are
    available. Precinct officials and workers affected by any
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    consolidation shall not forfeit their pay.
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         (b) In the event the chief election officer or the county
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    clerk in a county election determines that the number of
    candidates or issues on the ballot in a special, special
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    primary, or special general election does not require the full
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    number of established precincts, the precincts may be
    consolidated for the purposes of the special, special primary,

    or special general election into a small number of special,
    special primary, or special general election precincts.
8
         A special, special primary, or special general election
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    precinct shall be considered the same as an established precinct
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    for all purposes, including precinct official requirements
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    provided in section 11-71. Not later than 4:30 p.m. on the
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    tenth day prior to the special, special primary, or special
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    general election, the chief election officer or the county clerk
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    shall give public notice, in the area in which the special,
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    special primary, or special general election is to be held, of
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    the special, special primary, or special general election
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    precincts and their polling places. Notices of the
    consolidation also shall be posted on election day at the
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    established precinct polling places, giving the location of the
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    special, special primary, or special general election precinct
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    polling place."]
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1	SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so
3	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and
4	the same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is
5	appropriated for fiscal year 2008-2009, for the purpose of
6	implementing and administering the election by mail voting
7	system by the office of elections.
8	SECTION 10. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the
9	department of accounting and general services for the purposes
10	of this Act.
11	SECTION 11. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
13	SECTION 12. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
