H.B. NO. 1046

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HEALTH.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the chemical and 2 radiological toxicity of depleted uranium has been a reported cause of kidney dysfunction, lung damage, neurological 3 disorders, liver infection, and high miscarriage rates among 4 5 military personnel. These health problems have been reported from military personnel who have served in designated combat 6 zones where depleted uranium munitions and armor have been used, 7 8 including the 1991 Gulf War and during the three years since the 2003 invasion of Iraq. 9

10 The legislature further finds that the military use and 11 disposal of depleted uranium munitions are capable of having a 12 significant environmental impact, and depleted uranium has been 13 found in contaminated ground surfaces that lead to food and 14 ground water contamination.

15 The purpose of this Act is to provide access for all 16 returning veterans to a health screening test for exposure to 17 depleted uranium and to take steps to evaluate the scope and

3	SECTION 2. Chapter 121, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is	
4	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated	
5	and to read as follows:	
6	" <u>§12</u>	1- Screening for exposure to depleted uranium. The
7	adjutant	general shall ensure access to appropriate screening
8	involving	sensitive methods capable of detecting depleted
9	<u>uranium a</u>	t low levels for all members of the Hawaii national
10	guard who	return or have returned to this State after service:
11	(1)	In the Persian Gulf War, as defined in Title 38 United
12		States Code section 101; or
13	(2)	In an area designated as a combat zone or qualified
14		hazardous duty area by the President of the United
15		States during Operation Enduring Freedom or Operation
16		Iraqi Freedom; or recognized as such by the Internal
17		Revenue Service for purposes of exclusion from income
18		tax."
19	SECTION 3. (a) There is created a task force on depleted	
20	uranium exposure, to be placed within the office of veterans'	
21	services.	

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The task force shall consist of fourteen members as 1 (b) 2 follows: The director of veterans' services or a designee who 3 (1)shall serve as the chairperson of the task force; 4 The director of health or a designee; 5 (2)Four members of the legislature appointed by the 6 (3)7 governor as nominated, one each, by the majority and minority leaders of the senate, and the majority and 8 minority leaders of the house of representatives; 9 Two members who are physicians or scientists with 10 (4) 11 knowledge of or experience in the detection of health 12 effects from exposure to depleted uranium or other hazardous materials, to be appointed by the governor 13 as nominated, one each, by the president of the senate 14 and the speaker of the house of representatives; 15 (5) Four members who are veterans with knowledge of or 16 experience with exposure to depleted uranium or other 17 hazardous materials, to be appointed by the governor 18 19 as nominated, one each by the majority and minority 20 leaders of the senate, and the majority and minority 21 leaders of the house of representatives; and

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(6) Two members of the community at large with knowledge,
 experience, or interest in health effects resulting
 from exposure to depleted uranium, to be appointed by
 the governor as nominated by the director of veterans'
 services.

6 (c) The task force shall study the effects of depleted
7 uranium as it relates to veterans in the State and develop a
8 plan for outreach and follow up for veterans who have been
9 exposed to depleted uranium and who have developed adverse
10 health effects due to their exposure.

(d) The task force shall report its findings and
recommendations to the legislature no later than twenty days
prior to the convening of the regular session of 2008.

14 (e) The task force shall cease to operate on January 1,15 2008.

16 SECTION 4. (a) The department of health shall conduct an 17 environmental impact study of the scope and adequacy of depleted 18 uranium storage and disposal in Hawaii and compile a report on 19 training received by members of the armed forces on exposure to 20 depleted uranium. Based on the reports, the department of 21 health shall make recommendations for the removal and clean-up 22 of depleted uranium in Hawaii.

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1 The department shall report its findings and (b) 2 recommendations to the legislature no later than twenty days 3 prior to the convening of the regular session of 2008. SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general 4 5 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so much 6 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, for the purposes of conducting an environmental impact study of the 7 8 scope and adequacy of depleted uranium storage and disposal in 9 Hawaii and compiling a report on training received by members of 10 the armed forces on exposure to depleted uranium. 11 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of health for the purposes of this Act. 12


13 SECTION 6. New statutory material is underscored.
