A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that agriculture plays a vital role in Hawaii's efforts to become more self-sustainable. Agriculture not only contributes to the State's economy by providing employment opportunities, products for export, and a stage for tourism, but also performs a public service by helping to perpetuate a rural lifestyle for Hawaii's residents who in turn provide stewardship for Hawaii's lands and water.

8 With the demise of the plantations that once controlled 9 vast acres of pineapple and sugar cane fields, there is a need 10 to promote the diversification of Hawaii's agriculture industry. 11 Hawaii must also diversify its economic base beyond a reliance 12 on tourism. A revived and revitalized agriculture industry 13 promises not only to achieve this objective but also to sustain 14 and stabilize Hawaii's food supply and protect the open space 15 and lifestyle that both residents and visitors value.

16 Currently, Hawaii's agriculture and value-added product 17 industry contributes \$2,400,000,000 to the State's economy and 18 employs more than thirty-eight thousand people. During the past 2007-2332 HB404 SD1 SMA.doc

1 twenty years, the value of diversified agriculture in Hawaii has
2 more than doubled, reaching a record \$370,900,000 in farm-level
3 revenues in 2002.

The agriculture industry should continue to explore new 4 5 opportunities as prime agricultural land becomes available. At 6 present, about one hundred thousand acres of former sugar cane and pineapple land--prime agricultural land--lie fallow. Recent 7 8 estimates suggest that if all this land could be put to 9 productive use through successful agricultural ventures, an 10 additional \$1,700,000,000 to \$4,400,000,000 could be infused 11 into the State's economy.

12 To take advantage of these opportunities and to provide the 13 necessary support for the overall transition of Hawaii's 14 agriculture industry from plantation agriculture to diversified 15 agriculture, more resources must be directed toward agricultural 16 research and development. Agricultural research is key to 17 maintaining Hawaii's competitiveness in an agricultural market 18 that is becoming increasingly global.

19 The legislature believes that the Hawaii Agriculture
20 Research Center, the University of Hawaii college of tropical

Agricultural Research Center should work collaboratively to
 expand their agricultural research efforts. These research
 organizations are critical to the State's efforts to strengthen
 and improve the agriculture industry, expand employment
 opportunities for residents, and revitalize the economy.

The legislature further finds that the Hawaii Farm Bureau 6 Federation is a nonprofit agricultural organization representing 7 the interests of, and exemplifying a strong commitment to, the 8 agriculture industry in Hawaii and can ensure that agricultural 9 research and marketing meet the needs of local farmers and 10 11 The Hawaii Farm Bureau Federation has frequently ranchers. partnered with institutions like the Hawaii Agriculture Research 12 13 Center, the University of Hawaii college of tropical agriculture and human resources, and the department of agriculture on many 14 research and market development projects. The Hawaii Farm 15 Bureau Federation has also worked with many other kinds of 16 17 commodity organizations, including sugar, pineapple, papaya, macadamia, coffee, flower, fruit, vegetable, aquaculture, seed 18 corn, forestry, and livestock organizations to formulate 19 20 research needs for the entire agriculture industry.

21 Therefore, the legislature finds that the most logical22 organization to oversee and expend funding for agricultural

research and market development in the State is the Hawaii Farm
 Bureau Federation.

3 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds for a grant
4 to the Hawaii Farm Bureau Federation to conduct agricultural
5 research and development.

6 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general 7 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much 8 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 for a 9 grant, pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, for the 10 Hawaii Farm Bureau Federation to conduct agricultural research 11 and development.

12 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of13 agriculture for the purposes of this Act.

14 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
