This toolkit, *Initiating Change: Creating an Asthma-Friendly School*, will help you convince people in your school and community—teachers, school nurses, school

administrators, school health councils, school business leaders, school board members, community leaders, community asthma coalitions, and parents – of the importance of promoting asthma-friendly schools.

Asthma-friendly schools adopt policies and procedures and coordinate student services to better serve students with asthma.

Our hope is that this toolkit will help you initiate change in your school or community so that students with asthma will receive the support they need to fully participate in all school activities.
