What is NAICS?


- New industry classification system
- Developed in cooperation with NAFTA partners



Why Develop NAICS?

The U.S. SIC

- Developed in 1930's
- Emphasis on manufacturing
- Updated every 10-15 years
- Little change to the original structure



How Does NAICS Differ from the SIC?



- Based on a concept
- Focuses on new and emerging industries, industries using new technologies, and service industries
- Provides for comparability with Canada and Mexico
- Adds U.S. industries to provide more detail











North American Industry Classification System (NAICS)

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) is replacing the U.S. Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) system. NAICS will reshape the way we view our changing economy.

NAICS was developed jointly by the U.S., Canada, and Mexico to provide new comparability in statistics about business activity across North America.



NAICS on the move. A Federal Register notice (NAICS documents industry revisions being proposed for NAICS 2002. Construction and wholesale trade are substantially affected, but the proposal also modifies a number of retail classifications and the organization of the information sector.

A new <u>North American Product Classification System</u> (NAPCS) is also being proposed for 2002, starting in <u>four services sectors</u>. (No major changes are planned for <u>manufacturing products</u>.)

Measuring electronic business is a major challenge for future statistical programs. Review Census Bureau plans and make your own comments.

The first-ever NAICS-based statistics are included in the 1997 Economic Census Advance Report. Preliminary national totals are shown for sectors and subsectors. More details will be published through 1999.

The official 1997 US NAICS Manual North American Industry Classification System--United States, 1997 includes definitions for each industry, tables showing correspondence between 1997 NAICS and 1987 SICs, and a comprehensive index.
