Greening Government Program Replaces Inefficient Refrigerators



Howard Paul, a Colorado State Parks employee, submitted a request for this refrigerator to be replaced. Howard estimated that this pale yellow Crosely Model 1112 refrigerator, located in the maintenance shop at Bonny Lake State Park, was manufactured around 1965, but could easily be older. Howard states, "This refrigerator is so old that it has a rounded top and a similar model might have been used

as a prop in the Jackie Gleason's sixties sitcom *The Honeymooners*."

The Governor's Energy Office will replace approximately 40 refrigerators which individually consume electricity in the range of 1,100 to 2,700 kilowatt hours per year (kWh) with a new appliance that uses less than 450 kWh per year, a reduction of 75% on average than the replaced appliances. The old appliances will be decommissioned, meaning the refrigerants will be removed and the parts recycled.

Refrigerators will be replaced in the following state agencies and colleges:

- Health Care Policy and Financing
- Labor and Employment
- Natural Resources, Division of Wildlife
- Natural Resources, State Parks
- Law (Attorney General's Office)
- University of Northern Colorado
- University of Colorado, Colorado Springs
- Public Safety
- University of Colorado, Health Sciences
- Agriculture
- Corrections

Due to the high level of interest in the program (180 applications received), we hope to offer the program again in

the future.

City of Greely Recognizes University of Northern Colorado for Environmental Efforts

The University of Northern Colorado (UNC) has been named one of four recipients of the City of Greeley's first Environmental Stewardship Awards. The awards recognize individuals and businesses for outstanding efforts and strategies for protecting the environment. Other winners were RR Donnelley, Island Grove Village Apartments, and State Farm Insurance and Financial Services. The recipients were recognized at the Northern Colorado Green Summit in Fort Collins on April 24, 2008. Among the accomplishments leading to UNC's selection:

- Since 2001, UNC has increased its recycling of paper, cardboard and other items from 103,000 pounds annually to more than 521,000 pounds.
- The campus cut its natural gas and electricity consumption by more than 15 percent since 2002 through the use of energy efficient equipment and conservation practices.
- More than 2,000 faucets and shower heads on campus have been replaced with low-flow fixtures, saving nearly \$70,000 annually.

Bike to Work Day is Wednesday, June 25th. The Governor's Energy Office challenges other organizations to form a team and compete with us as we work toward 100% participation

from our staff.

Conservation is *the* fundamental component of the Greening Government plan to reduce petroleum consumption by 25 percent by 2012. By state fiscal year 2011-12, the state needs to reduce consumption in "baseline" vehicles by at least 625,000 gallons per year.

If each baseline vehicle was driven a mere ten fewer miles per week, we would eliminate almost two million vehicle miles traveled per year, and save 115,000 gallons of fuel annually.

The following suggestions will help reduce vehicle miles traveled:

- Think twice drive once or not at all.
- Use a teleconference, webinar, or video conference in place of in-person meetings. A list of state government video conferencing facilities is available on the <u>State Fleet</u> <u>Management website</u>.
- When traveling to meetings, carpool with others from your office. A carpool option is available when renting a car from the State's downtown motor pool.
- Plan your trips ahead of time. Combine trips when possible and use the most efficient route.
- Do not intentionally "run up" the mileage on a state vehicle in order to meet the minimum number of vehicle miles as per the utilization criteria. The utilization code criteria will be considered for retention of the vehicle, but can be adjusted by Fleet Management with the proper justification. Contact Fleet for more details.
