### NOAA DIVING PROGRAM POLICY BULLETIN #06-01

NOAA has a number of contractors that serve as diversers in various locations around the world. These contractors fall within three basic categories: 1) those hired by employment agencies, 2) those employed by joint institutes (e.g., JIMAR in Honolulu), and 3) those employed by other government agencies (e.g., state of Florida).

A recent review of this practice by DOC and NOAA General Counsels, indicated a problem with contract employees having control over dives that include "supervisory oversight" of divers. In cases where any of the divers are government employees (i.e., FTE), this kind of supervision amounts to an inherently governmental function and is not permitted under the guidelines outlined in OMB A-76. A-76 is largely a FAIR Act implementation policy, and therefore is mainly concerned with Position Descriptions and how contracts are let. This is only a problem when divemasters are contractors and any of the divers are federal employees. If all divers are contractors, then there isn't any issue and contract divemasters can oversee all aspects of the dives.

The duties and responsibilities of divemasters are varied and not all of them are truly supervisory in nature. An analysis of divemasters tasks by the NDC and NOAA OGC indicated that only a few had supervisory components. The tasks identified as supervisory are:

- 1) Assess a person's readiness to dive
- 2) Ensure all divers are familiar with the tasks to be performed and capable of performing the task safely and successfully
- 3) Ensure all divers are current with NDP requirements (dive physical, proficiency, training, etc.)
- 4) Develop a dive roster and assign positions to personnel
- 5) Give order to dive
- 6) Counsel divers on violations of NDP dive regulations, safety rules, and policies and issue verbal warning on the consequences of a repeat occurrence
- 7) Discipline (limit, restrict or suspend diving privileges) divers committing flagrant violations of the NDP dive regulations, safety rules, and policies or repeat occurrence after verbal warnings.

Based on this, and effective immediately, contract employees are prohibited from performing any of the above tasks when the divers involved are federal (FTE) employees. In such cases, another federal employee will have to step-in to perform these tasks.

Certain contractors (e.g., state employees working with the federal government under the Intergovernmental Personnel Act (IPA)) may be able to perform these inherently governmental functions, depending on the relationship between the entities. To reiterate, contract employees can continue to serve as NOAA divemasters with the following caveats:

- 1) If the divers are federal employees, the divemaster cannot perform the 7 tasks identified above. He/she may perform all other normal divemaster duties and responsibilities.
- 2) If the divers are not federal employees, the divermaster can perform all duties and responsibilities, including the 7 tasks listed above.
