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RETIRING LODO

After 27 Years of service with NOAA, and 8 Years as the Line Office Diving Officer (LODO) for the NMFS, lan Workman is retiring. Ian has been a fixture in NOAA Diving since the mid-70's, has logged nearly 3,000 dives with NOAA, and is retiring as one of NOAA's few Master Divers. Frank Parrish of the NMFS Honolulu lab will be taking his place as LODO starting in January 2003.

lan started his diving in 1960 with the British Sub Aqua Club in England. He stayed active diving as he later moved to New Jersey, spent four years in the Navy, attended college, and finally ended up with NOAA in the mid-70's. Ian performed light commercial diving work for the Halter Marine shipyard, performing vessel surveys, replacing transducers, and repairing props. He also performed four saturation missions in the Hydrolab habitat in the 1970's and 80's. His diving adventures included dives in the Pacific and Atlantic oceans, Gulf of Mexico, Caribbean Sea, Mediterranean Sea, Red Sea, and several lakes, rivers, and quarries in the northeastern U.S. to name a few.

Ian is active both diving for NOAA and in the recreational diving community. Since 1975 he has been active as a diving instructor, holding instructor certifications from NAUI, PADI, CMAS, and IANTD and teaching all levels of scuba diving including technical diving. From 1987 to 1998 he owned and operated a local dive shop.

More recently as a Research Fishery Biologist for NOAA in Pascagoula, Mississippi, Ian's diving has

included work on the development and testing of trawl Turtle Excluder Devices (TEDs), certification and testing of new TED designs, bycatch reduction in shrimp trawls, and juvenile red snapper recruitment. Ian has also been a fixture as an instructor at the NOAA Working Diver/Divemaster course held in Florida each year.

Along with lan's plans to retire in January to the Florida Keys, he also plans to stay active as a recreational diving instructor.

Thank you for your many years of leadership, dedication, and hard work in the NOAA diving community, Ian. Your contributions and diving expertise will be missed. Best of luck in the Keys.

ANNUAL MEDICAL HISTORY

Annual Medical History Report forms (NOAA Form 56-59) are <u>due from all NOAA divers age 59 and</u> younger by March 01 of each new calendar year. Forms may be faxed or mailed directly to the NOAA Diving Center, and are available online from the NDC web site or by request from NDC. Divers should note any health <u>changes</u> from their last medical history form submitted to NDC. These forms do not require the signature of a physician nor anyone else besides the diver. Failure to submit this form by March 01 will results in the suspension of the diver's NOAA certification.

ANNUAL TRAINING, Cont

In last month's issue you were reminded that: "NOAA-certified divers shall undergo <u>yearly</u> refresher training in oxygen administration, recognition and treatment of diving accidents and injuries, dive rescue, decompression tables, and inwater diving emergency skills. CPR and First Aid refresher training shall be completed in accordance with agency guidelines for certification". Two methods are available to assist you in meeting these requirements:
