About your dental program

When you choose to enroll in the **TRICARE** Select Retiree Dental Program, you are making an agreement directly with Delta Dental to have your premiums for dental insurance withdrawn from your retired pay. We receive many calls from retirees who want us to stop their payment to Delta Dental. It is not possible for your pay technician to stop this deduction. You do not start an allotment with us when you enroll in the plan. You authorize Delta Dental to deduct the money for your premiums. Therefore, in order to change the amount of payment or to cancel, you must contact Delta Dental directly. When you enroll in the plan you also authorize them to deduct any yearly increase in

their premium from your retired pay.

2000 Coast Guard Mutual Assistance fund raising campaign

The annual Coast Guard Mutual Assistance (CGMA) fund raising campaign will run from 1 March through 30 April 2000. This is the

only fund raising campaign that is truly: "Coast Guard people helping Coast Guard people".

CGMA has been providing financial assistance to our members since 1924, when the CGMA was originally established as the *League of*

Coast Guard Women. Since then CGMA has provided over \$93,000,000 in financial assistance to our members!! Everyone associated with the Coast Guard, including Active Duty and Retired military personnel, Civilian employees, Reservists, Auxiliarists and Public Health Service Officers serving with the Coast Guard, is a CGMA member and eligible to receive financial assistance from CGMA.

Through circumstances beyond their control, some of our members find themselves in financial need. In 1999, CGMA provided in excess of \$5,900,000 of assistance, in the form of loans and grants to 7,800 members of our Coast Guard family! Financial assistance was needed for a wide array of reasons, including financial and personal loss due to

> floods and hurricanes, funeral expenses, emergency travel, medical bills not covered by primary or supplemental insurance, pay problems, major car repairs, rental assistance, budget counseling and education expenses. During 1999,

CGMA increased dollar limits and expanded the scope and eligibility for most of our education programs, while adding two new education programs – the *Supplemental Student Loan Program* and the *Federal Direct Student Loan Reimbursement Program.* These changes were based on the recommendations received from our members.

Now CGMA can use your help! CGMA asks for your support in the form of charitable contributions during the campaign, particularly, by starting or increasing payroll allotments. Your tax-deductible contributions will allow CGMA to continue meeting the financial needs of our members, and create opportunity to expand current assistance programs and add new ones. Military Coalition asks U.S. Supreme Court to help veterans



Alexandria, VA – On 7 February 2000, The Retired Officers Association and 29 other member associations of The Military Coalition, filed a friend-of-the-court brief asking the U. S. Supreme Court to hear a case about military retiree's right to military health care.

The original suit was brought in 1997 by the Coalition of Retired Military Veterans, an independent group headquartered in South Carolina. The suit alleges that those serving a full career in the military were promised health care benefits that the government is not providing.

Currently, when military retirees reach Medicare-eligibility at age 65, they lose access to the military's health care program, called TRI-CARE. At that point, they must enroll in Medicare and may receive care in military hospitals only on a spaceavailable basis. Post-Cold War cutbacks, however, have reduced significantly the availability of such care. In addition, Medicare does not offer a pharmacy benefit.

On 9 August 1999, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit affirmed the district court's decision that, notwithstanding the plaintiffs' dissatisfaction with the cutbacks in medical treatment, any relief must come from Congress and not from the courts.

TROA and The Military Coalition disagree, stating that the "very integrity of the Government is at stake when an express promise, relied upon by millions in choosing to serve their country throughout their careers in the uniformed services, suddenly is abrogated during retirement, long after such benefits have been earned".

According to Colonel Paul Arcari, Director of Government Relations for

TROA and Co-chair of The Military Coalition, "We have numerous horror stories of brave decorated people who served their country for a career. They were told they would have health care in military facilities for life. They're not getting it, and that's not right. The country has broken its promise to these dedicated men and women, and regrettably this broken promise is having an adverse impact on the services' recruiting. Retirees have always been among the services' best recruiters, but today many of them decline to recommend to young people that they consider a career in uniform".


Chief Petty Officers needed now to join CPO's world-wide



Purple Hearts honor lives lost aboard USS Tampa

The following story is re-printed with permission from The Tampa Tribune. Written by Jacqueline Soteropoulos, Washington Correspondent.

Friday November 12, 1999 Arlington, VA -

A somber ceremony on hallowed ground honors lives lost decades ago.

When the band began to play the Coast Guard Hymn on Thursday at Arlington National Cemetery, 82year-old Mildred Blair softly sang along, holding the Purple Heart presented to her moments before.

Her eyes filled with tears as Transportation Secretary Rodney Slater held her hand and gave her the award her father earned 81 years ago. The Coast Guard falls under Slater's department.

Blair was just 1 year old when 2nd Lt. John F. McGourty and 129 other men died when the USS Tampa was torpedoed off the coast of Wales in World War I.

"It's an enormous pleasure that finally the recognition is here," said Blair, of Harrington Park, N.J.

Her son, Chris Blair, told the crowd, "If my grandfather were looking down on us this cold November day, he'd be very proud that his country still remembers him and honors him."

The Veterans Day ceremony – a posthumous awarding of the honor – took place in front of the Coast Guard World War I Monument, often called the Tampa Memorial.

Slater paid tribute to "the gallant men of the United States Coast Guard Cutter Tampa....who made the ultimate sacrifice" and to their families.

No one survived the September 26, 1918, sinking of the Tampa, just a few weeks before the war's end.

Thirty-six of the 130 who perished were from Florida, and 28 were from the Tampa Bay area. Three pairs of brothers and a pair of cousins were killed when the German U-boat attacked.

Admiral James M. Loy, Coast Guard Commandant, praised the Tampa's service escorting ships carrying war materials and troops through European waters.

Providing protection from submarine attack, the Tampa escorted 18 convoys with more than 350 ships between Gibraltar and England.

"Tampa's service set a standard," Loy said.

Commander Jim Howe, the Commanding Officer of the present-day Coast Guard Cutter Tampa, was presented a plaque and framed Purple Heart to hang aboard the Virginiabased ship.

"Look at the dedication and bravery of these folks 81 years ago," Howe said. "All I ask of my men is, be as good as they were."

About one-third of the current Tampa's crew of 98 men took time off to attend Thursday's ceremony. Dressed in blue uniforms, the surrounded the pyramid-shaped memorial that bears the names of the men who lost their lives when the Tampa sank.

Of those lost, 111 were in the Coast Guard. Four Navy sailors, 10 Royal Navy men and five civilians also were aboard.

One of the names inscribed on the Tampa Memorial is "Jimmie Ross" - a testament to a Tampa immigrant's determination to serve his adopted homeland.

"Jimmie Ross" was the name adopted by young Vincenzo Guerriero when he joined the Tampa. And even after the mistake was discovered, a newpaper account at the time confused Guerriero with his older brother, Rocco, a mistake repeated in recent news accounts.

"He was a very young boy when he enlisted, and he didn't want his family to know, so he said he was Jimmie Ross," said 64-year-old Joann Gant, the granddaughter of Rocco Guerriero.

"He was so young – he was only 16 or 17 years old. He was the youngest of three brothers" who emigrated from Naples, Italy, Gant said. "They were so proud to be in America, the land of opportunity. He just wanted to help."

A story handed down by the family says Guerriero was not supposed to be aboard ship the night of its sinking. He would have been on leave, but a friend messed up his bunk as a joke and the shore break was revoked, Gant said.

When word spread through Tampa that Ross was actually Guerriero, Gant's grandfather had an unexpected visitor – a former shipmate who had borrowed money from Guerriero.

"When he found out (Guerriero) had gotten killed, he brought the money to my grandfather," Gant said. "Everyone thought that was a very honorable thing to do."

In addition to the Arlington monument, a memorial to the Tampa was placed at Gibraltar. The American Legion Post on Kennedy Boulevard is named after the lost cutter.

TRICARE Senior Supplement Demonstration Program "Let the enrollment begin"

The TRICARE Senior Supplement Demonstration (TSSD) program will soon be off and running for military Medicare eligible beneficiaries age 65 and older who reside within designated zip codes in specified areas near Santa Clara, California and Cherokee, Texas. The enrollment period begins 1 March 2000. The demonstration is scheduled to end 31 December 2002, with coverage beginning 1 April 2000.

Dr. Sue Bailey, Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Affairs, said, The TRICARE Senior Supplement Demonstration is a test program designed to reach our Medicare-eligible beneficiaries who use Medicare and are established with their own physicians. The supplement demonstration offers them secondary coverage to Medicare plus some benefits that Medicare does not offer, all at a very reasonable costs.

To be eligible for the TSSD program, an enrollee must be a retired member of the Uniformed Services, a family member of a retired member of the Uniformed Services, or a survivor of a member of the Uniformed Services who died while on active duty for a period of more than 30 days. The enrollee must also be age 65 or older, eligible for Medicare Part A (Hospital Insurance), enrolled in Medicare Part B (Supplemental Medical Insurance), and reside in one of the demonstration sites.

The TSSD provides an affordable TRICARE supplement to Medicare, which includes a pharmacy benefit, for those who enroll. Enrollees in the TSSD may not receive health care in military hospitals or clinics, including pharmacy services, while they are in TSSD.

The program, which offers enrolled members benefits similar to TRI-CARE Extra and Standard, serves as a secondary payor for Medicare coverage, reducing or eliminating most out of pocket expenses, and providing reimbursement for some services not covered by the Medicare Program. Benefits of enrollment include: access to National Mail Order Pharmacy (NMOP), use of TRICARE civilian network pharmacies, coverage for certain diagnostic and preventive services, extended mental health coverage, and coverage for health care services delivered outside the Continental United States (OCONUS).

The enrollment fee is \$576.00 per enrollee and can be paid in full, annually, or by quarterly installments of \$144.00. To enroll in the TSSD program, the member must return an enrollment application form accompanied by a copy of his/her Medicare card indicating Part A and Part B coverage and the enrollment fee to the Iowa Foundation for Medical Care (IFMC), Customer Service Center (CSC). Enrollment may occur at any time during the demonstration period. Enrollees are eligible to disenroll at any time by contacting the CSC. Eligibility for space available care for members who are disenrolled from the TSSD will be reinstated on the date the member is officially disenrolled from the program.

Dr. Bailey stated that, "This demonstration is one of several that the Department is exploring to find the right combination to serve our senior beneficiaries." The other Defense demonstrations include TRICARE Senior Prime, Federal Employees Health Benefit Program, and a pharmacy benefit.

Chairman of the Joint Chiefs rallies for health care improvement

WASHINGTON, 8 February 2000 --Calling the military medical system "not user-friendly," the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff said TRI-CARE "must be fixed and the over-all health-care system must be improved."

Army Gen. Henry H. Shelton told the members of the Senate Armed Services Committee Feb. 8 that he thinks America has broken its commitment to military retirees to provide health care.

TRICARE is one of the quality of life initiatives DoD will stress in the fiscal 2001 Defense budget request. Defense Secretary William S. Cohen and Shelton will work together in the coming year to change TRICARE.

"While service members and their families are normally very pleased with the care that they receive once they enter into the system ... they are very frustrated with TRICARE as a system," Shelton said. "It is quite frankly immensely complex, administratively confusing and not very customer-friendly. Our service members and their families deserve better."

The fiscal 2001 DoD budget request

makes some changes. In

TRICARE Prime, the request eliminates co-pays for active duty service members who must get treatment in civilian facilities. The request also eliminates the co-pay for family members enrolled in TRI-CARE Prime Remote.

Shelton said in an earlier speech that DoD must fully fund and place more emphasis on the Defense Health Program. He also has said the medical plan deserves the attention of command at all levels.

Taking care of military retirees' health needs is also a priority for Cohen and Shelton. "I think that the first thing that we need to do is make sure that we acknowledge our commitment to the retirees for their years of service and for what we basically committed to at the time they were recruited into the armed forces," Shelton told the Senate committee.

He told the senators that DoD has recruiting posters that vividly state that not only would the services provide medical care upon retirement, "but that their families would be taken care of," Shelton said. "In their minds, we have broken that commitment. And I think we have."

He said the Joint Chiefs are proposing a plan that would provide some type of national pharmacy benefit with no enrollment fees for Medicare-eligible retirees. He said the chiefs are also examining a MediGap type of insurance for retirees 65 and older. "Both these are rather expensive programs, but we've got to somehow find a way to start providing more than we have in the past," Shelton said.

Defense officials agree that the programs will be expensive. DoD Comptroller William Lynn said during a Pentagon news conference that the cost could be from \$2 billion to \$8 billion more per year depending on what program is adopted.

"At the end of the day fixing TRI-CARE is not only the right thing to do, it is the smart thing to do," Shelton said. "It sends a very strong signal, not only to those serving today, but all those that are considering a career in our armed forces as well.

"And it keeps faith and keeps the commitment to those that have served and retired. We need to get it right, and I know that together, we will."

Complaints spawn discussions on the military healthcare system

WASHINGTON -- Complaints about TRICARE have not fallen on deaf ears. Defense leaders say they have heard about service members' frustrations, and plans are under way to fix the system.

Defense Secretary William S.Cohen told reporters in early January he would soon make a major announcement on how DoD plans to improve military health care. He and Army Gen. Henry Shelton, C hairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, have both pledged that the improvement of health care is one of their top priorities in the year ahead.

Service members receive quality health care, but related business practices are causing headaches, Mary Gerwin recently told the American Forces Press Service. After she visited troop bases in Italy and the Balkans, Deputy Assistant Defense Secretary for Health Affairs said access to health care is a major concern to service members.

"Even though our surveys find that people are very happy and satisfied when see the doctor and get the care they need, there is a problem getting appointments," Gerwin said. People complain about having to hold for long periods when they call to make an appointment and that it takes too long to get to see a doctor, she said. People feel that "access standards" allowing patients to be seen within a few days or a few weeks are not being met, she said.

DoD officials are determined to fix these types of problems. Dr. Sue Bailey, Assistant Defense Secretary for Health Affairs, has directed that military treatment facilities adhere to established access standards and to have more of a standardized appointment system. Officials want to make it easier to get appointments and to ensure patients are directed to the right caregiver, Gerwin said.

"What we find sometimes is that patients will have a lot of their time wasted because they're sent to the wrong clinic," she said. A patient with a shoulder injury, for example, may be sent to a knee specialist. "They're sent to the wrong clinic because the person making the appointments from a centralized appointment system is not familiar with the actual clinic and what it does. So that's very frustrating from the patient's standpoint."

Service members also say they're having a difficult time getting claims paid, Gerwin said. Families are getting notices that the doctor bills have not been paid or, in cases where they paid the bill up front, service members are not getting reimbursed. Incorrectly completed claim forms are being returned to the provider, she noted, thereby delaying payment.

"We're working hard to fix the claims processing system so that a service member and his or her family will never get a notice that says the bill was not paid," Gerwin said. "That is our goal so that service members don't have the feeling that they're going to get bad credit because they had an unpaid bill."

DoD health affairs officials are addressing these problems in several ways. "We're reforming the claims process so that we're paying our claims in a shorter period of time," Gerwin said. "We're also trying to

simplify the process so that it's easier for providers to submit claims."

Service members' concerns about care after retirement affect recruitment and retention. When they hear claims about broken promises from retirees in their communities, service members naturally question whether health care will be there for them when they retire," Gerwin explained. DoD is now exploring ways to best extend coverage to people over age 65. "At age 65, you're no longer eligible for CHAMPUS," she said. "That's why we have to find other ways of doing it."

DoD officials are particularly concerned about caring for service members' families when units deploy. Service members should not have lingering concerns about their families' care, Gerwin said. "We have to try harder to get those bills paid on time, because health care is a high quality of life issue for our troops."

Many service members acknowledge that TRICARE is still fairly new and getting used to it is taking some time, Gerwin said. Commanders, in particular, say they need more education -- more help in being able to explain the program.

"We've got a big education effort under way," she said. "Our job is to simplify the system as much as possible and then educate commanders and people within the community so they're able to answer service members' and their families' questions." Families can sign up for one of three health care options, Gerwin said. The first is TRICARE Prime, DoD's managed care plan that resembles civilian HMOs, she noted. Enrollees get a primary care manager, and there are set access standards.

The second option is TRICARE Standard, which is basically the old CHAMPUS program. Service members and families use any participating provider they wish, but pay higher out-of-pocket expenses for the privilege. They have to submit claims forms and are responsible for providers' charges that exceed TRI-CARE's payment schedule.

The third option is TRICARE Extra, which limits families' expenses whenever they use "preferred providers" -- a limited list of caregivers who meet certain standards and accept the TRICARE schedule as payment in full. Co-payments are 5 percent lower than TRICARE Standard's.

Health care is complicated, Gerwin said. "We're trying to simplify the message as much as possible. We really encourage people to get good briefings when they sign so they know who to call for care and how that care is going to be delivered," she said.

Military and civilian consumers are dealing with many of the same health care issues, Gerwin noted. These include high prescription drug costs, claims processing snafus, a more complicated health care system, and patients having to do more to manage their own care.

"We can only go as fast as the overall health care industry does," she remarked. "What we can do is make sure we've adequately budgeted for our program, so we have enough to give that very good level care.

"A good example of that is our prescription drug costs. Much like the rest of the overall health care system, we have prescription drug costs that are skyrocketing. We have to make sure we put enough dollars in the system so the drugs are available for individuals."

DoD's goals, she said, are to "get the onus off the beneficiary" and make the system as easy to use as possible. "The major initiatives are to make sure those phones are answered, that people are able to get their appointments on time, that they get their claims paid, and that they feel they have the access to the care they deserve."

Across my career, I have had the opportunity to drive small boats and participate in rescues. I've worked at a Marine Safety Office and boarded commercial ships to check stowage plans and toiled at cleaning up oil spills. I've taught children water safety and boarded hundreds of fishing vessels to check for safety equipment. I've conducted regatta patrols and checked aids to navigation to ensure they worked. These things were done in that time I like to refer to as "the good old days." You remember those days too, don't you? Then came chief petty officer, and then a commission. Gone were the good old days of driving a small boat and boarding of ships. Now I drove a desk and my boardings were to countless meeting rooms. On a personal scale, I missed the adventure and dealing directly with the public.

Then came my introduction to the Coast Guard Auxiliary. I found the majority of the members joined for the same reasons I had joined the active duty and Reserve sides. The more interaction that takes place between the elements of Team Coast Guard, the more effective the team will be in the future.

Revisions to 38 CFR cause confusion concerning dental for VA and veterans alike

In the January 2000 issue of the Retiree Newsletter on page 12, we printed a story received from The Retired Sergeants Major & Chiefs Association (TRSMCA). Apparently this story has generated a tremendous number of inquiries for the VA pertaining to veterans eligibility for treatment. At the request of the VA's Deputy Director for Dentistry, the following clarification information is provided to help resolve any questions you may have.

Ms. Klein:

Per numerous calls we have received concerning the recent confusion over dental eligibility, I am attaching the following explanation from our office in Headquarters. It was presented on a February conference call to our Dental Service Chiefs in the field.

Whatever you could do to help clarify this issue to your readers would be very helpful. This has become a rather confusing situation to not only our veterans but to some in VHA (Veterans Health Administration) as well.

"VBA's Compensation and Pension Office in VA Headquarters recently updated information for their regional offices concerning performing dental ratings. The guidance was recently incorporated into 38 CFR (Code of Federal Regulations), Chapter 3. The recent guidance has created confusion in the field. Numerous regional offices and veterans think VA dental eligibility has been expanded. Many individuals have the misconception that if veterans ever had dental treatment performed while they

served in the military, they are eligible for VA dental care. Unfortunately, that is not correct.

Chapter 3 pertains to veterans' benefits issues and does not provide/cover VA medical and dental eligibility guidelines.

38 CFR, Chapter 17, provides guidance concerning medical and dental eligibility issues. There have been no recent changes to 38 CFR, Chapter 17 concerning dental eligibility guidelines.




