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10 Year Anniversary of CG in the Persian Gulf



CGC MIDGETT'S DEPLOYMENT W/USS CONSTELLATION (FOR RELEASE) Persian Gulf (July 15)--The CGC Midgett (WHEC 726) sails alongside the USS Constellation. The Cutter Midgett departed homeport of Seattle Washington on June 18, 1999, to deploy with the USS Constellation Battle Group to the Persian Gulf. The Midgett is the first Coast Guard cutter to deploy to the Gulf with a U.S. Navy Battle Group. Once in the Gulf, the Midgett's primary mission was to enforce the United Nation's sanctions that are in place.

After over 10 years since the CG was first called to duty in the Middle East, many people of the general public are unaware of the CG's accomplishments or presence during that time. As seen in the photo above, to this day, our operations continue in the Persian Gulf. The following chronicles the beginning of the CG's involvement.

- 2 August 1990: Iraqi military forces invaded Kuwait.
- 6 August 1990: President George Bush orders the deployment of U.S. armed forces to defend Saudi Arabia in an operation named "Operation Desert Shield."

10 August 1990: Marine Safety Offices [MSOs] around the U.S.

became immediately involved in Operation Desert Shield. MSO Hampton Roads was directly responsible for the activation *inspections* of 22 of 78 Ready Reserve Fleet [RRF] vessels activated nationwide. These and similar inspections by MSOs throughout the U.S. ensured that RRF vessels were fully capable of safely meeting their vital support

mission. The quality of the inspection work is reflected in the 95 percent operationally ready rate achieved by the RRF vessels once they were in service. Additionally, a flexible Merchant Marine manning and licensing program was established to facilitate movement of RRF vessels.

In addition to the supervision of all regularly assigned peacetime port safety and security missions, Coast Guard MSOs were responsible for the establishment and supervision of Port Security Detachments in the coastal ports of the U.S. This effort involved the activation and organization of Coast Guard reservists to oversee shoreside and waterside security at facilities plus the supervision of the loading of hazardous materials and explosives aboard Military Sealift Command vessels bound for the Kuwaiti theater of operations.

16 August 1990: Multi-national maritime intercept operation began intercepting ships going to or from Iraq and Kuwait, consistent with U.N. Security Council Resolution 661.

17 August 1990: At the request of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the Secretary of Transportation and the Commandant of the Coast Guard commit Coast Guard law enforcement boarding teams [LEDETs] to Operation Desert Shield. A total of 10 four-person teams served in theatre to support the enforcement of UN sanctions by the Maritime Interdiction Forces. Approximately 60 percent of the 600 boardings carried out by U.S. forces were either led by or supported with the USCG LEDETs. Additionally, a 7-man liaison staff was designated by the

Commandant as Operational Commander for the USCG forces deployed in theatre.

- 22 August 1990: President George Bush Sr. authorized the call up of members of the selected reserve to active duty in support of Operation Desert Shield. Three port security units (PSU's), consisting of 550 Coast Guard reservists are ordered to the Persian Gulf in support of Operation Desert Shield. (This was the first involuntary overseas mobilization of Coast Guard Reserve PSU's in the Coast Guard Reserve's 50-year history). A total of 950 Coast Guard reservists are called to active duty. Other reservist duties included supervising RRF vessel inspection and loading hazardous military cargoes.
- 4 September 1990: USS Goldsborough (DDG 20) stops and challenges the Iraqi cargo ship Zanoobia. She was loaded with tea, a cargo prohibited under UN Resolutions. The Coast Guard officer in charge of the boarding party ordered the master to sail his vessel to a non-Iraqi or Kuwaiti port-the master refused. Whereupon the Coast Guard officer ordered a member of the boarding team to seize the helm. The team sailed the vessel to Muscat, Oman. [Edward J. Marolda & Robert J. - 15 September 1990: The Secretary of Transportation and the Commandant of the Coast Guard authorized the first-ever deployment of a reserve port security unit overseas. PSU 303 is the first unit deployed. They were stationed in ad-Dammam.

- 15 September 1990: A multinational boarding team, including four Coast Guardsmen, boarded the Iraqi tanker *Al Fao* after the tanker was stopped by the USS *Brewton* (FF 1086) and the HMAS *Darwin*. The tanker was permitted to proceed after the boarding team determined that it had no cargo on board.
- 22 September 1990: The second port security unit, PSU 301, was deployed to Saudi Arabia. They were stationed in al-Jubayl.
- 28 September 1990: "A Coast Guard LEDET from the USS *Brewton* (FF 1086) boarded HMAS *Success* and presented relevant briefings and lectures to the visit and search parties of HMAS *Success*, HMAS *Darwin*, and HMAS *Adelaide*." [Marolda & Schneller, p. 91.]
- 22 October 1990: The Iraqi merchant vessel *Al Bahar Al Arabi* was cleared to proceed by a multinational boarding team including Navy and Coast Guard personnel from the USS *Reasoner* (FF 1063) in the North Arabian Sea. The merchantman had apparently "disposed of" its prohibited cargo.

November 1990: PSU 302, staffed by reservists from Cleveland, Ohio, arrive in the Gulf. They were stationed in Bahrain.

16 January 1991: The White House announced the commencement of Operation Desert Storm: offensive action against the forces of Iraq under the provisions of U.N Security Council/U.S. Congressional resolutions. With the commencement of Operation Desert Storm, Coast Guard MSOs increased both the level and tempo of port safety and security activities in the port to protect critical commercial and military waterfront facilities from the threat of terrorism. The Coast Guard increased both shoreside and waterside

security patrols in ports using regular and reserve augmentation forces, established and enforced waterside security zones around key facilities and in one case, in Norfolk, responded to a potential terrorist bombing incident at a bulk liquid facility.

17 January 1991: The air offensive against Iraqi forces began.

18 January 1991: Coast Guard LEDET personnel on board the USS *Nicholas* (FFG-11) assisted when the frigate cleared eleven Iraqi oil platforms and took 23 prisoners.

13 February 1991: In response to

the Iraqi action of firing oil wells and pumping stations, some off shore, in Kuwait that caused oil spills in the Gulf, two HU-25A Falcon jets from Air Station Cape Cod, equipped with Aireve technology [which precisely locates and records oil as it floats on water], depart for Saudi Arabia as part of the Inter-agency oil spill assessment team [USIAT] They were accompanied by two HC-130 aircraft from Air Station Clearwater which transported spare parts and deployment packages. The Falcons mapped over 40,000 square miles in theatre and located "every drop of oil on the water. . . The USIAT used the mapping product to produce a daily updated surface analysis of the location, condition and drift projections of the oil." The AVDET was deployed for 84 days, flew 427 flight hours and maintained an aircraft readiness rate of over 96 percent. [Christopher J. 24 February 1991: Coalition forces began a ground offensive to liberate Kuwait.

28 February 1991: By presidential order all Coalition offensive operations ceased at 0800 local time.

11 April 1991: The UN Security Council declared a formal cease-fire, ending the Gulf War.

21 April 1991: A tactical port security boat [TPSB] of PSU 301, stationed in Al Jubayl, Saudi Arabia, was the first boat in the newly reopened harbor, Mina Ash Shuwaikh in Kuwait City, Kuwait. The USCG TPSB led a procession of multinational vessels into the harbor. [Ronald L. *****FLAG VOICE 126**** TRICARE ENHANCEMENTS FOR FY01

The FY01 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) *significantly* improves the health care benefit to active duty members, their eligible family members, retirees and their eligible family members. In particular, Congress has made good on the promise "health care for life" by providing TRICARE for retirees 65+ years of age. These improvements now make the health care benefit offered to service members and their families among the **most comprehensive offered by any employer!** In addition, TRICARE Business Practice Improvements scheduled for implementation by 1 OCT 2001 will also improve TRICARE. Paperwork and waiting times should be reduced making TRICARE more responsive to customer needs.

It is important to note that most of these benefits will take some time to implement, and that they will not take effect immediately. We are working with DOD in developing the implementing policies and procedures. These will be provided when available via future Flag Voices and ALCOASTS. Although many details still need to be worked out, I would like to discuss the major changes coming soon and provide some recommended actions that will help ensure a smooth transition to your new TRICARE entitlements.

The following steps are recommended *now* to ensure your eligibility for the new benefits once they become effective:

Consider MEDICARE part B for retirees over 65. Many benefits to the retirees over 65 will require participation in part B of MEDICARE.

Verify TRICARE enrollment of Active Duty members to protect benefits of family members (details discussed later).

Keep all receipts and explanation of benefits (EOB) statements, especially for family members in remote areas on TRICARE Standard.

Remain enrolled in any supplemental insurance plan.

The following summary represents the most significant aspects of the new law:

Retirees:

Reduces retiree catastrophic cap under TRICARE Extra and TRICARE Standard Programs from \$7,500 to \$3,000.

A pharmacy benefit will be provided to our dual-eligible military retiree/Medicare-eligible personnel effective 1 April 2001. All retirees who became Medicare-eligible prior to 1 April 2001 will receive this benefit. All retirees who become Medicare-eligible on or after 1 April 2001 must be enrolled in Medicare Part B to receive this benefit. This benefit includes national mail order and retail pharmacy services.

Medicare-eligible beneficiaries become eligible for TRICARE effective 1 October 2001. Medicare will be first payer and TRICARE will be the second payer. All beneficiaries must be enrolled in Medicare Part B for TRICARE to serve as second payer.

The health care entitlement for Medicare-eligible beneficiaries will be funded, beginning in fiscal year 2003, through the Department of Defense Medicare-eligible Retiree Health Care Fund established by the Department of Treasury.

The TRICARE Senior Prime demonstration program is extended through 31 December 2001.







The chiropractic health care demonstration became a permanent benefit for active duty personnel at designated military treatment facilities (MTF) worldwide. A five-year phased-in implementation will begin in 2001.

Other:

An Individual Case Management Program for Persons with Extraordinary Conditions (ICMP-PEC) was funded. In selected cases, the program allows waiver of TRICARE limitations on health care coverage, including coverage of custodial care services for persons with exceptional conditions. Applicability/scope still pending at this time.

While not immediate, over the next 5 years as TRICARE contracts are renewed, MTF non-availability statement/preauthorization for TRICARE Standard will be eliminated.

UNTIL THE FINAL IMPLEMENTING RULES ARE PUBLISHED, MEMBERS SHOULD KEEP A COPY OF ALL HEALTH CARE RECEIPTS AND TRICARE STANDARD EXPLANATIONS OF BENEFITS FOR CARE RECEIVED IN A TPR AREA FROM 30 OCT 00 UNTIL 1 OCT 01. *MEMBERS SHOULD NOT CANCEL EXISTING SUPPLEMENTAL INSURANCE POLICIES*.

NOTE: At this time, one of the key factors which will be used in determining eligibility for the TRICARE Remote for Family Members benefit will be the formal enrollment of the active duty member in TRICARE. This requires the active duty member to fill out an enrollment form. Although we had a recent service-wide drive to enroll all of our active duty members in TRICARE, the biggest step a service member can take to ensure earliest TPR eligibility for their family member is to verify the active duty member's actual enrollment in TRICARE. The easiest way to verify your enrollment is to contact the TRICARE contractor at the toll-free number for your region listed below. This may be especially important to individual service members who have executed a recent PCS transfer: TRICARE ENROLLMENT verification:

Another key factor regarding eligibility will be that the active duty family member and the active duty service member have the same address in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS). Eligible beneficiaries may update their addresses in DEERS in a number of ways; Visiting local personnel offices that have an ID card facility.

Note: Internet users should use all lowercase letters because some email systems are case sensitive.

To <u>change</u> information <u>other than address data</u>, beneficiaries may visit an ID card facility, mail or fax changes with appropriate documentation to the address/numbers provided above. To learn what documentation is required, call an ID card facility or the DSO toll-free number, 1-800-538-9552. The hours of operation for DSO are Monday-Friday (excluding Federal Holidays), 0600-1530 (Pacific Time).

As you can see, this legislation should significantly enhance your military medical benefit. However, the details are far from complete, and it will take several years for the changes to be fully implemented. The Coast Guard is working with DOD to develop detailed implementation guidance on these improvements. Again, additional information will be provided as soon as available. TRICARE FOR LIFE

President Clinton signed the FY2001 National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2001, Public Law 106-398 (the Act) on 30 October, 2000. The legislation included a number of health care provisions that collectively represent the most significant change to military health care benefits since the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS) was established by Congress in 1966.

Key Features

- o Effective 1 April, 2001, the pharmacy benefit provides Medicare-eligible retirees of the uniformed services, their family members and survivors the same pharmacy benefit as retirees who are under age 65. It includes access to prescription drugs not only at military treatment facilities, but also at retail pharmacies and through our national mail order service program. (Section 711 of the Act.)
 - All beneficiaries who turn 65 prior to 1 April, 2001, will automatically qualify for the benefit whether or not they have purchased Medicare Part B
 - All beneficiaries, who attain the age of 65 on or after 1 April, 2001, must be enrolled in Medicare Part B to receive this benefit.
- o Medicare-eligible military beneficiaries become eligible for all other TRICARE benefits effective 1 October, 2001. The law requires that all Medicare-eligible beneficiaries, regardless of age, must be enrolled in Medicare Part B to receive the rest of the TRICARE benefits. (Section 712 of the Act.) With enrollment in Part B, these benefits will provide the following coverage:
 - If the medical care received is a benefit of both Medicare and TRICARE,

Medicare will pay the allowable amount for the care. TRI-CARE will pay the amount that is the Medicare cost share, as well as any Medicare deductible. Most, but not all medical services are a benefit under both Medicare and TRICARE.

- If the medical care received is a benefit of Medicare, but NOT a benefit of TRICARE, Medicare will pay its normal amount and the beneficiary will be responsible only for the Medicare deductible and cost-share. An example of this type of care is certain types of chiropractic care that is covered by Medicare.
- If the medical care received is a benefit of TRI-CARE, but NOT a benefit of Medicare, Medicare pays nothing. TRICARE will pay the amount it pays for the same service received by a retiree under the

age of 65. In this case, the beneficiary must pay the applicable TRICARE cost-share and deductibles. An example of this type of coverage is the prescription drug benefit.

- o The health care entitlement for Medicare-eligible beneficiaries will be funded, beginning in fiscal year 2003, through the Department of Defense Medicare-eligible Retiree Health Care Fund established by the Department of Treasury. (Section 713 of the Act.)
- o The TRICARE Senior Prime demonstration program is extended through 31 December, 2001. (Section 712 of the Act.)
- o Active duty family members enrolled in TRICARE Prime will no longer have copayments for civilian health care services under TRICARE Prime (except prescription drugs), effective 1 April, 2001. (Section 752 of the Act.)
- o The TRICARE Prime Remote (TPR) program will be expanded to active duty family members throughout the continental United States by 1 October, 2001. In the interim, the Department will implement a program to waive copayments and deductibles of TPR active duty family members. (Section 722 of the Act.)
- o An Individual Case Management Program for Persons with Extraordinary Conditions (ICMP-PEC) was funded with a cap of \$100 million. In appropriate cases, the program allows waiver of TRICARE limitations on health care coverage, including coverage of custodial care services for persons with exceptional conditions. (Section 701 of the Act.)
- o The chiropractic health care demonstration became a permanent benefit for active duty personnel at designated MTFs worldwide. A five-year phased-in implementation will begin in 2001. (Section 702 of the Act.)

What Do YOU Need to Do Now?

o ENROLL IN MEDICARE PART

B: Beneficiaries who have already turned 65 and do not have Medicare Part B should purchase it if they would like additional health benefits through TRICARE. Medicare allows enrollment each year from January 1 through March 31. Coverage under Part B will beeffective July 1 of the same year. Beneficiaries who have not enrolled may be required to pay a surcharge (adjusted for age) to join Part B. Beneficiaries with questions

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regarding Medicare and Part B can visit any Social Security Administration (SSA) office, call the Social Security Administration (SSA) toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, or call the toll-free Medicare number, 1-800-633-4227. They also can find information on the Medicare Web site at http://www.medicare.gov

Please remember that if beneficiaries age 65 and over do not have Medicare Part B, they will NOT have the TRI-CARE benefit to help pay the cost of their doctor and hospital bills when the new benefit begins October 1, 2001.

- o DON'T DROP SUPPLEMENTAL (MEDIGAP) POLICIES YET: Because of the delayed effective dates, any decision to drop a Medicare supplemental insurance policy (known as Medigap) based on the new law is premature. We are working with the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), and The Military Coalition (TMC) and the National Military & Veterans Alliance (NMVA) to provide the most accurate information on what should be considered before any supplemental policy is dropped.
- o UPDATE INFORMATION IN DEERS: Beneficiaries should have up-to-date information in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS). In the coming months, we will mail information to beneficiaries who have received this new entitlement. To ensure that they are not overlooked, eligible beneficiaries must have the most accurate family and beneficiary data in DEERS. Eligible beneficiaries may update their addresses in DEERS in a number of ways, listed below.



DoD Plans Data Match with Medicare to Verify Medicare Part B Enrollment

Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting Service (DEERS) Member Service Center representatives have been advising callers to update their records to confirm participation in Medicare Part B.

To clarify what the TRICARE Management Activity (TMA) - the group which oversees the TRICARE program - is contemplating, Steve Lillie, Director of the TFL Working Group has requested that the following information be given the widest possible dissemination.

QUOTE: We understand that there is a lot of uncertainty about whether beneficiaries need to provide evidence of their Medicare Part B enrollment in order to assure that they can get TRICARE for Life benefits.

Beneficiaries do not need to provide Medicare Part B information to DoD. DoD will work with the Health Care Financing Administration to obtain evidence of Part B coverage for all beneficiaries.

We will be working to get the story straight on all our information sources, and would appreciate your help in getting the word out. UNQUOTE.

TMA is optimistic that a data match with the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) will enable them to electronically code the DEERS record to reflect enrollment in Medicare Part B.

Diabetes Eye Exam Program

The Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) in collaboration with the American Academy of Ophthalmology (AAO) and the American Optometric Association (AOA) have initiated a National program for Medicare beneficiaries with diabetes to encourage them to get their eyes examined. Under the initiative, beneficiaries age 65 and older who have diabetes and haven't had a medical eye exam in the past three years, will be matched with a volunteer ophthalmologist in their area. They'll receive a free comprehensive eye exam and up to one year of follow-up care for any condition diagnosed at the initial exam. In 1998, the 105th Congress heard and understood what had been done by an earlier Congress and in the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (H.R. 2400-PL 105-178) included a provision (section 8207) making DIC **reinstatable** effective 1 October 1998. 



Abbie Burgess Grant 1839-1892 Born in Maine in 1839 and with a limited education, Abbie tended lighthouses for most of her life. One week after her father received his appointment as lighthouse keeper at Matinicus Rock, Abbie inherited the lamps. Her career as a lighthouse keeper spanned 38 years and saw her work at Matinicus and White Head Light Stations. Abbie was a heroine upon several occasions, risking her safety and well being for the sake of her family and "those that go down to the sea ships." It was not until she married Isaac Grant, bore four children and moved to White Head Light that Abbie received proper recognition and a salary for her lighthouse duties. She died in Maine in 1892.

AFTER 50 YEARS, "MAC" GOES RED

When the USCGC Mackinaw completed a maintenance period in mid-June, the "Queen of the Great Lakes" sported a whole new look -- a bright "icebreaker red" hull. Mackinaw's crew started painting at the end of May.

The primary reason for the color change is to address longstanding safety concerns. The white hull easily blended with ice and gray skies found during winter operations, effectively acting as camoflauge. "Changing the Mackinaw's hull color to red is long overdue," said Cmdr. Keith Colwell, Commanding Officer of USCGC Mackinaw. "Safety must be paramount in the harsh conditions that Mackinaw faces

each winter. A white hull in ice and snow does not meet this need."

The desire to change the hull color was not a new idea. "I discussed the change with several former commanding officer and they wholeheartedly agreed," Colwell said. "Safety must be paramount in the harsh conditions that Mackinaw faces each winter. A white hull in ice and snow does not meet this need."

Over the years, a number of Great Lakes Shipping Fleet captains noted that Mackinaw's hull is "invisible" in ice and they usually looked for the ship's stack as a point of reference. The red hull color will contrast sharply against the predominately white winter environment Mackinaw operates in. "The Lake Carriers Association supports the Coast Guard's objective to provide the safest icebreaking assistance possible. Every sailor knows that a white hull does not stand out in ice or in fog, a red hull makes safety sense," said George Ryan, president Lake Carriers Association.



The change also brings economic benefits. White hulls require frequent maintenance, resulting in a major effort on the part of the crew to preserve Mackinaw's hull and appearance. Flaws in the paint scheme caused by the rigorous winter season show up quicker and are not easily fixed. The red hull will be easier and cheaper for the ship's crew to repaint and touch up as necessary.

The Coast Guard's two Polar Class icebreakers have been painted since their commissionings. (The USCGCs Polar Star and Polar Sea, both hoeported in Seattle, operate in the Artic and Antartic annually.) USCGC Healy, the Coast Guard's newest icebreaker, also to be homeported in Seattle later this year, is also painted red.

MONTGOMERY GI BILL BENEFITS AVAILABLE TO CERTAIN RECENT RETIREES

Public Law 106-419 authorizes certain military members who had participated in the Veterans' Educational Assistance Program (VEAP) to enroll in the more generous Montgomery GI Bill (MGIB) program. Eligible members are those who:

- Participated in the VEAP educational program on or before 9 October 1996, and made contributions into the VEAP program (even if the contributions were later withdrawn)
- Served continuously on active duty between 9 October 1996 and 1 April 2000.

The open enrollment opportunity for eligible members expires on 31 October 2001.

If you retired <u>after 1 April 2000</u>, and at one time had participated in the VEAP educational program, you should have recently received a letter from HRSIC (MAS) notifying you of your eligibility to enroll in MGIB.

The cost to enroll in MGIB under Public Law 106-419 is \$2,700.00. The enrollment fee can be paid in the following ways:

- By check or money order payable to "U.S. Coast Guard".
- Via establishment of an allotment from retired pay.
- A combination of lump sum payment and allotment. For example, a retiree could remit a check for \$1,000.00 and have the remaining \$1,700.00 deducted as an allotment from retired pay.

In deciding what method to pay the enrollment fee, the following factors must be considered:

- The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) will not authorize a veteran to utilize any MGIB benefits until <u>all</u> \$2,700.00 of the enrollment fee has been paid.
- The \$2,700.00 enrollment fee <u>must</u> be paid within 18 months of the date of enrollment. Failure to contribute a total of \$2,700.00 within the 18 month period will result in loss of all MGIB contributions as well as ineligibility for MGIB benefits.

Coast Guard Donates Computers to Elementary School

The Seventh Coast Guard District in Miami has donated 20 computers, complete with keyboards and monitors, to Sunset Elementary School, a south Miami public school

The Coast Guard donated 65 computers to Our Lady of the Holy Rosary Elementary School in December. Overall, the Coast Guard plans to donate about 150 computers, with an original purchase cost of \$180,000, to various schools in Miami-Dade and Broward counties.

About 1,100 students ranging from pre-kindergarten to fifth grade will benefit from the Coast Guard's donation to Sunset Elementary. The Coast Guard recently upgraded its computers, rendering the slower yet perfectly usable machines excess. Under government rules, the agency can donate them to local schools.

VA and TFL BENEFIT SCAM WARNING

VA is warning veterans about a financial scam that offers lump-sum payments in exchange for monthly VA disability checks or pensions. VA pensions go to wartime veterans incapable of self-support for reasons unrelated to their military service. VA disability compensation is paid to veterans with lingering health problems related to their time in uniform.

These schemes target veterans who are in financial difficulty and tempt them to forfeit a large percentage of their future monetary benefits for temporary debt relief today. Federal law outlaws the direct sale of VA benefits. VA is also prohibited from paying pensions and disability compensation to anyone other than a veteran, a family member or a lawful guardian. The latest schemes, however, attempt to avoid the long-standing federal prohibition by representing these transactions as loans. Companies persuade veterans to give up their disability and pension checks for a specific period — up to eight years — in exchange for a lump-sum cash payment typically worth 30 - 40 percent over that same period. In some cases, the veteran must also take out a life insurance policy naming the company as beneficiary.

In the case of a veteran with a disability rated at 50 percent, it could mean receiving a one-time payment of about \$20,000, then forfeiting a \$609 monthly payment that in the course of eight years would bring in nearly \$60,000. VA lawyers are studying the fine print in these schemes to determine whether or not they are legal. Even if they are found to be legal, forfeiture of future benefits is not a good way to get out of debt.

There's NO FEE involved in signing up for TFL. IT'S FREE!!! All you have to do to be eligible for this new program is (1) be enrolled in Medicare Part B and (2) ensure that your personal information in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) is current. Chances are that if nothing has changed since you received your military identification card, you're in good shape.

Anyone who promises to enroll you in TFL for a fee is attempting to take your money in exchange for a worthless service. If you are approached by one of these "TFL enrollment facilitators call 1-800-245-8762 and give the details of any such "offer."

In the summer of 1967 the United States Coast Guard sent an E-5 Damage Controlman to Instructor Training School in Yorktown, Virginia. I was still in night college at John Carroll University, majoring in diverse subjects, foundering for a possible career in Broadcasting. I became a broadcaster and spent several years as a disc jockey radio and TV newsmen, and finally graduated. The Coast Guard was kind enough to give me a direct commission and I found myself at Yorktown again, this time teaching courses for a few years. I was bored with broadcasting and decided to be a teacher. In Cleveland Public Schools I was first hired as an elementary librarian (media specialist). Then, I taught in various subjects and would up being a speech pathologist – audiologist in one of the state of Ohio's retardation centers. By this time I was well on my way to completing my doctorate in Education. My career took a shift to Audiology and I was called back to duty as the Coast Guard's first and only active duty audiologist to write the hearing conservation plan and assist noise quelling for the entire service. After my active duty stint, I served out my time in the reserve and retired. Now I have used that experience and the volunteer teaching I've done for the Air Force, to compile a new book with a different approach to teaching. The title is Teaching By Lesson Planning. The publisher is First Publish ISBN 1-929925-27-1-900. In the book you will find the familiar TOM IPASTA approach taught by the Coast Guard, with a few wrinkles of my own gleaned by my experience of 27 years as a teacher, facilitatorenabler, curriculum planner, educator/administrator and supervisor. Now that I am retired from the CG, Ohio Teachers, and sold my practice in audiology, I plan to devote my time to writing and lecturing. My next book will involve Life Planning, teaching people about goals and how to achieve them which seems a good payback for all I was able to do because of the good managers and planners that I encountered in my career.~

Former USCG Commandant Buried at Arlington National Cemetery

WASHINGTON – Admiral John B. (Jack) Hayes, 76, Commandant of the U.S. Coast Guard from 1978 to 1982, died on January 17 in Tavernier, Fla., and was interred at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia on January 31 at 2 p.m. He is best remembered as a sailor and a champion of the Coast Guard as well as a beloved husband, father and friend

"Admiral Hayes was one of our most dynamic Commandants, an icon in the legacy of the Coast Guard. He was a personal mentor and role model to literally thousands of Coast Guard Officers and crew, including myself. He is truly loved by this organization and will be greatly missed," said Admiral James M. Loy, Commandant of the U.S. Coast Guard.

Admiral Hayes was born in Jamestown, N.Y., August 30, 1924. He entered the Coast Guard Academy July 14, 1943, and graduated June 5, 1946, with a commission as Ensign. He spent most of his Coast Guard career in command positions. These included shore commands in Japan, Florida, Vietnam, and Alaska as well as sea commands of three Coast Guard cutters. Admiral Hayes returned to the Coast Guard Academy as Commandant of Cadets before his promotion to Rear Admiral in 1973.

As Commandant, Admiral Hayes ordered a comprehensive Roles and Missions study that helped to shape the present-day Coast Guard. He led Coast Guard responses to several significant events including the *Prinsendam* rescue off the Alaskan coast, the Florida Air Flight 90 crash in Washington D.C., and the Mariel Boatlift which, at the time, was the single largest search and rescue operation in Coast Guard history. He also saw the Coast Guard through difficult budget battles and fended off proposed reorganizations he felt would undermine the flexibility and effectiveness of the Service.

Admiral Hayes received numerous awards over the course of his distinguished career. Among those were the Coast Guard Distinguished Service Medal with one gold star, the Legion of Merit with one gold star, the Meritorious Service Medal and the Coast Guard Commendation Medal.

His profound impact on many individuals' lives was mirrored in his other interests and passions. An Eagle Scout, he continued his affiliation with the Boy Scouts as a troop leader and a member of the National Council. Both Bigelow Laboratory, a marine sciences laboratory in Boothbay Harbor, Maine, and the Armed Services YMCA benefited in many ways from his expertise and skills in long-range planning during his tenure as a member and Chairperson of their Boards of Trustees. His passions for scuba diving, fishing and hiking took him all over the world with family and friends.



Admiral Hayes was an active member of St. Columba's Episcopal Church in Boothbay, Maine. He served as Senior Warden for four years and was a driving force in guiding the mission's efforts in planning for a church building.

Jack Hayes was killed after being accidentally struck by a vehicle during a hike along the Florida Keys. 
