

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What Was the Coast Guard Doing in Iraq?

On 29 January 2003, General Richard Myers, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs, was asked, "The Coast Guard announced today [it is] sending eight cutters, 600 people, to the Persian Gulf, which I understand is the first time they have been dispatched to a combat zone since the Vietnam War. What's the thinking behind that, and what's their mission going to be?" General Myers answered, "For the Coast Guard, primarily for port and harbor and waterway security. That's what they do best."

Immediately, questions followed about why the lead federal agency for maritime homeland security should remain a military expeditionary force, as part of a power projection strategy overseas. After all, the Coast Guard suffers from its own readiness issues and is embarked on a multiyear, multimillion

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dollar strategy to address deficiencies and modernize much of its fleet. Why, in the face of our current homeland security threats, should the nation's primary maritime security force deploy overseas?

Defending the Peace: Military Power

Defending the peace includes defeating global terrorism, preventing future attacks, and transforming our national security institutions to meet new challenges and opportunities. A 1995 memorandum of agreement between the Secretaries of Defense and Transportation identifies Coast Guard core capabilities applicable to the national defense role and provides the operational framework for interoperability. The components of the agreement include: port security and defense, maritime interception operations, coastal sea control operations, peacetime military engagement, and military environment response operations. The agreement, still valid today, states that the Coast Guard is "a branch of the Armed Forces at all times . . . required to maintain a state of readiness to function as a specialized service in the Navy in times of war."

The Coast Guard is the recognized leader in port security, at home and overseas. Overseas missions are performed primarily by port security units (PSUs), self-contained units staffed mostly by reserve members that operate in conjunction with harbor defense commands, mobile inshore undersea warfare units, and inshore boat units as part of the Naval Coastal Warfare Plan. PSUs have contributed significantly to operations in Umm Qasr and Bahrain, providing command and control for port and shoreside security and escort operations. In addition, the Coast Guard patrol boat Wrangell (WPB-1332) was assigned to protect British minesweepers clearing the entrance to Umm Qasr. In this 40-mile swath of water, comprised of a 200-yard channel, the Wrangell's 110-foot size was ideal. Trained at the Coast Guard's Special Mission Training Center at Marine Corps Base Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, the PSU fits well within the combatant commander's requirement for a proficient, expeditionary, self-contained port security contingent.

In recent years the Navy has been involved overseas in the visit, board, search, and seizure mission, particularly in the Persian Gulf since the end of Desert Storm. This effort recently was expanded to support detection and interception of al Qaeda and Taliban leaders attempting to flee Afghanistan and Pakistan. Coast Guard personnel provide the Navy with boarding expertise taken from extensive experience in combating drug and alien smugglers.

Law Enforcement Detachment 205, embarked in the USS Chinook (PC-9), located and secured a large Iraqi military equipment and weapons cache hidden in caves in southern Iraq. It is likely that members of the Republican Guard had prepositioned this equipment for future urban combat. Also in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, the high-endurance cutter Boutwell's (WHEC-719) boarding teams worked with HMS

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Chatham and the Danish frigate Olsen Fischer to intercept and board suspected smugglers close to the Iraq-Iran border.

The cutter Dallas (WHEC-716), positioned off the west coast of Syria, intercepted fugitives from Saddam Hussein's regime who were attempting to flee by sea. She also provided force protection to Navy battle groups in the eastern Mediterranean. In a 13 April 2003 article in the Philadelphia Inquirer, Rear Admiral John Stufflebeen said, "Whether they [Hussein regime] stay or whether they decide to go, we're going to work this part of the water hard to make sure that if they do go, we catch them." He referred to the Dallas as "the lead dog," sniffing around any ships moving through the eastern Mediterranean.

Military missions for the Coast Guard are an important part of the national strategy and an instrumental part of those forces that defend the peace. The National Fleet concept, signed in 1998 and revalidated in 2001, speaks directly to Coast Guard-Navy integration. It is a cornerstone document that reaffirms the service's expeditionary capability and the immediate need for a modernized fleet to replace ships such as the Dallas, commissioned in 1967.

Preserving the Peace: Diplomatic Power

The Coast Guard has capabilities to preserve the peace. We work with our hemispheric neighbors in counterdrug operations and with international partners to provide safe vessel standards across the globe. With our eyes squarely on the homeland security ball, the Coast Guard also sends expeditionary forces to help preserve the peace overseas.

At the request of the regional combat commanders, eight Coast Guard 110-foot patrol boats are deployed in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Operating in various locations within the Central and European Command areas of responsibility, these vessels provide a layered harbor defense as well as serving as quick response maritime interceptors. Coast Guard patrol boats also escorted the British vessel Sir Galahad with the first shipment of humanitarian aid to Iraq. On 11 April 2003, the Wrangell, Adak (WPB-1333), Aquidneck (WPB-1309), and Firebolt (PC-10)—with a Coast Guard law enforcement detachment embarked—escorted the M/V Manar, with more than 700 tons of vital humanitarian supplies, into port.

During Operation Desert Storm, the Iraqi-generated oil spill in the Persian Gulf was an ecological disaster, but quick Coast Guard response saved precious natural resources and contained the damage to the environment. The service's capability in this area is unmatched. Through its extensive international interests, the Coast Guard has instant access to the largest worldwide database of oil spill response capabilities, which can be brought to bear as circumstances dictate.

The Walnut (WLB-205), a seagoing buoy tender with oil spill containment system capability, was sent to support Iraqi Freedom operations. In conjunction with the Coast Guard National Strike Force teams and the Vessel of Opportunity Skimming System, the Coast Guard provides formidable pollution response and an element of national security.

Worldwide, the Coast Guard receives more requests for engagement operations from combatant commanders than it could ever support. Like many navies of the world, we perform border security missions and fisheries and law enforcement duties, and there is a natural humanitarian link. Central Command, European Command, and Pacific Command all use a variety of Coast Guard platforms for

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worldwide engagement missions. Through these and other engagement opportunities, the Coast Guard builds on common interests to promote global security, all in the name of preserving peace.

Extending the Peace: Economic Power

Ensuring the unfettered flow of commerce, both import and export, is critical to most national economies. In Iraq, preserving oil resources for that nation's economic future was an important objective in extending the peace. Just 13 miles off the Iraqi coast, 39 Coast Guard reservists secured the Mina-al-Bakr offshore oil terminals in the opening phases of Operation Iraqi Freedom. More than a million barrels of oil a day flowed through this terminal before the war. The Coast Guard's action will help ensure continuation of the flow, a major source of income that will aid in the reconstitution of Iraq.

Placing navigation aids in approaches and harbors is important for the safe navigation of the ships that import and export goods. In a post conflict environment, the aids- to-navigation program is an essential military mission, which currently only the Coast Guard is able to perform. The Walnut demonstrated this expeditionary capability in support of Iraqi Freedom, maintaining the 41-mile navigable channel heading from Iraq's primary southern port, Umm Qasr, to the sea. Because of years of neglect, the buoys along this route were in a terrible state of repair or had been removed. The Walnut provided a well-marked channel for humanitarian aid arrivals, vital to coalition objectives. In all cases, establishing a well-maintained seaway provided greater safety and security for mariners transiting to these ports.

An Expeditionary Force Multiplier

The Coast Guard adds measurable value to the larger National Security Strategy goals, and its capabilities are an extraordinary force multiplier. From Operation Iraqi Freedom lessons learned, to historical data from ongoing maritime interdiction operations, to recent responses to large environmental defense operations, the Coast Guard's unique skill sets must be continually capitalized on and maintained.

We carefully assessed our expected demands when contemplating deploying 11 cutters and 4 port security units to the Gulf, and the Department of Homeland Security steadfastly supported the combatant commanders' request for Coast Guard expeditionary forces. The Coast Guard's participation had, and will continue to have, a significant impact on our nation's future.

Concurrent Receipt for Disabled Veterans Combat Related Special Compensation

Combat-Related Special Compensation (CRSC) was authorized by the FY 2003 National Defense Authorization Act (P.L. 107-314, sec. 636) for certain retirees with combat or operations-related disabilities. The details about how the program will be administered have only recently become available.

Eligible Retirees: Must have 20 or more years of active duty service in the Uniformed Services (retired reservists are not eligible unless they have accumulated 7,200 points, equivalent of 20 years for pay, or more). Retirees with less than 20 years active service are not eligible for CRSC. Retirees are not eligible if they have waived military retired pay to credit military service toward their civil service retirement, or for any other reason, other than to receive Department of Veterans Affairs (DVA) disability compensation. DoD expects approximately 35,000 retirees to qualify for the new compensation. (The Coast Guard expects only a minute fraction of this number – perhaps greater than 100 – to qualify under either Purple Heart or Combat-Related criteria.)

Qualifying Disabilities: A combat-related disability associated with the award of a Purple Heart decoration, regardless of the DVA disability rating (10-100 percent). Or, any disability (or combination of disabilities*) with an assigned medical diagnosis code from the DVA Schedule for Rating Disabilities (VASRD) that results in a DVA rating of 60-100% that was incurred either:

- As a direct result of armed conflict (e.g., in a combat setting but not qualifying for a Purple Heart like breaking a leg by jumping for cover when hearing the warning "Incoming!")
- While engaged in exceptionally hazardous service (e.g., in the performance of flight, diving, or parachute duties; or other extraordinary operational settings);
- In the performance of duty under conditions simulating war (exercises, field training, combat training);
- Through an instrumentality of war (combat vehicles, weapons, Agent Orange, etc.)

(*Note – only disabilities from the preceding four classifications can be used to meet the 60% or higher combat-related threshold. Disabilities that are not combat-related cannot be combined with combat-related disabilities to meet the 60% criteria.)

For Coast Guard CRSC applicants, the Coast Guard Personnel Command (CGPC-adm-1) will determine which disabilities qualify under the above criteria and notify applicants of their decision. CRSC will not be paid for disabilities that are not combat or hazardous duty operations related. Applicants who qualify for CRSC will have their applications forwarded to the Retiree & Annuitant Services Division of the Personnel Service Center (PSC (RAS)) for computation of the actual CRSC payment, which will be included in their monthly Retired Pay, along with any back payments that may be applicable.

Certain disabilities will be presumed to be combat-related when the DVA disability rating form indicates that the DVA rating for the disability is based on one of these presumptions: disabilities rated by the DVA on the basis of exposure to radiation, mustard gas or lewisite, Agent Orange, and those associated with Persian Gulf service. Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) must be evaluated by the member's Service to determine if it is combat-related. Other chronic disabilities that are incurred over time (arthritis; heart, respiratory, or circulatory disabilities; and the like) will typically not be eligible for CRSC.

Application Processing: Eligible retirees must apply for CRSC using the approved application form DD-2860 in accordance with the instructions published on the form. Processing times have not been established, but it is anticipated that there will be a large number of initial applications submitted and the process may take months due to the backlog of records requests at DVA and other records archives. However, payments will be retroactive to June 1, 2003, for those determined to have qualifying disabilities that existed as of that date. Disabled retirees who have qualified for and are in receipt of Special Compensation for Severely Disabled Retirees (SCFSDR) may not receive CRSC unless they waive SCFSDR. (If an applicant is qualified for both SCFSDR and CRSC, PSC (RAS) will pay them the higher of the two entitlements once the retiree has executed a waiver of the lesser.)

DEERS Verification Changes for Unremarried Former Spouses

August 19, 2003

The Social Security number (SSN) used to verify TRICARE eligibility in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) for unremarried former spouses is changing. Starting Oct. 1, 2003, DEERS will reflect TRICARE eligibility for these beneficiaries using the unremarried former spouse's own SSN and not the former sponsor's. Health care information will be filed under the unremarried former spouse's own SSN and name. These beneficiaries will now use their own name and SSN to schedule medical appointments and to file TRICARE claims.

The current Uniformed Services Identification and Privilege Card, DD Form 1173, held by the unremarried former spouse is still valid until it expires. Upon renewal, the unremarried former spouse will be issued a replacement Department of Defense/Uniformed Services Identification and Privilege Card, DD Form 2765.

The Defense Manpower Data Center Support Office is sending a letter to all beneficiaries affected by this change. The letter explains the new DEERS eligibility verification procedures and serves as official notification from DoD regarding this change. The letter does not, however, provide proof of continued eligibility for TRICARE health care benefits.

After Oct. 1, 2003, unremarried former spouses may contact or visit the nearest identification card issuing facility (locations may be found online at http://www.dmdc.osd.mil/rsl) for questions or assistance.

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Unremarried former spouses should always keep their DEERS information current and up-to-date. For questions regarding their medical records, they should contact the Military Treatment Facility and medical records department where their DoD medical records are stored.

TRICARE Awards Dual Eligible Claims Contract

Dr. William Winkenwerder Jr., assistant secretary of defense for health affairs, announced today the TRICARE Dual-Eligible Fiscal Intermediary Contract (TDEFIC) award. The contract is a single, separate vehicle for claims processing, customer service and administrative services for individuals who are eligible for both TRICARE and Medicare. The contract was awarded to Wisconsin Physicians Service Insurance Corporation (WPS), of Madison, Wisconsin. The TRICARE Dual Eligible Fiscal Intermediary Contract (TDEFIC) will replace the current practice of the managed care support contractors providing these services. The TDEFIC claims processing, customer service and administrative services will be phased in by region with the managed care support contracts beginning on April 1, 2004.

"The DoD is committed to providing the best health care possible for our beneficiaries," said Dr. William Winkenwerder, assistant secretary of defense for health affairs. "From lessons we have learned during previous contracts, we chose to simplify contract administration, increase accountability and improve customer service by centering these responsibilities in one contract. We are confident this will enhance the services we provide to beneficiaries while ensuring fiscal responsibility."

The contract is for a base period, four 12-month option periods and one 3-month option period for a total of 5 years. The base period for transition is July 25, 2003, through March 31, 2004. The total value of the award is estimated to be \$487 million for the base period and all option periods combined. The TDEFIC services will be phased in by region with the managed care support contracts beginning on April 1, 2004.

TDEFIC will affect the approximately 1.7 million beneficiaries who are eligible for both TRICARE and Medicare. Beneficiaries should not be affected by this change unless they need to submit a paper claim. WPS will notify beneficiaries of the change in mailing address for paper claims submission. WPS will provide this information when services begin for the contract.

Tricare Standard Over Age 65

Tricare standard eligibility expires upon reaching the social security Medicare eligibility age which is at 12:01 a.m. on the first day of the month in which the beneficiary becomes entitled to hospital insurance benefits (Part A) under Medicare. There are no plans to raise this age even though social security full retirement age is rising to 67. Anyone who is a military dependent and is not eligible for Medicare benefits can retain Tricare Standard benefits provided they can provide to the ID card issuing activity or DEERS a

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notice of disallowance of Medicare Part A benefits. This applies to many alien dependent widows because they do not meet the U.S. five-year residency requirement to draw on their sponsor's social security account and have elected to continue to reside overseas.

DEERS requires all dependents upon turning age 65 to obtain a new ID card which allows them to update their records on each individual's Tricare eligibility. Eligibility is removed for those who are eligible for Medicare and do not elect to pay for Medicare Part B. Unless otherwise advised all widows are assumed eligible. To obtain a notice of disallowance they must write to Social Security Administration, Office of Central Operations, PO Box 17769, Baltimore MD 21235 Attn: W. Burnell Hurt, Associate Commissionerfor Central Operations. The letter should include:

- From. A current mailing address.
- Reference. Sponsor's SSN & Widows SSN (if any).
- Enclosure. DFAS-DE Form 2203
- Purpose. To have your records at Department of Defense, DEERS indicate you are not eligible to receive social security benefits.
- Authorization for SSA to release directly to DEERs Support Office, Attn: Research & Analysis, 400 Gigling Rd., Seaside CA 93955-6771 and DFAS, PO Box 7130, London KY 40742-7130 any information relating to eligibility to receive Medicare benefits.
- Country of citizenship, country of residence, and that you do not meet the five-year U.S. residency test or any exceptions to that test.
- Request for SSA to notify DEERS & DFAS that you are not receiving Medicare benefits from your deceased spouse's social security account and the reason why you are not. Also, that you have not earned any Social Security credits.
- Reason for Request. Required to continue your eligibility for Tricare benefits which were lost at age 65 because DEERS was not aware of your ineligibility for Medicare.
- Comment on Enclosure purpose. For forwarding to DEERS & DFAS Retired Pay

Complete and sign the annuitant section of the Social Security Administration Statement (Annual Rectification) DFAS-DE Form 2203 and include it as an enclosure to your letter. A blank form can be obtained from your RAO Office or from DFAS. A sample letter is available upon request to raoemo@mozcom.com . When action has been taken you should receive a notice from DEERS stating that based on the document sent they have been able to confirm that you are not entitled to social security benefits. Therefore, your DEERS record will reflect your continued Tricare eligibility. You can present this notice to the ID card issuing activity with your application for a new ID card. The card's expiration date and Medical Civilian (yes) EXP DATE should be the same, four years after issue date. If you do not have a SSN or ITIN number they should assign a FIN number [i.e a number that has an "F" in front and starts with a "9"] in the SS box on the card.

Nautical Terms, Phrases & Trivia

The term "Nautical" is rooted in the Greek word "NAUT", meaning sailor.

Breech

Middle English - from 'broc' or leg-covering. The plural form was 'breeches' or pants, usually referring to the critical area of the body where the pants covered. It was soon used when referring to the bottom half of any object, such as a cask, beam, gun, or man.

Broach

Middle English - 'brocus', or 'projecting'. Originally used to describe the piercing of a cask to open it. The term was eventually used to describe the opening of a new subject in conversation. It was also used to describe when a ship is turned sideways to a wave, allowing it to break over for the length of the hull. This usually means the ship is in extremis and is probably sinking or about to break up. The possible origins of this particular term is from the action of the masts thrusting through the on-coming waves while the ship is full over on its side.

Dead Horse

When a Sailor pays off a debt to the command (advance pay, overpayments, etc...) they say they've paid off a Dead Horse. The saying comes from a tradition of British sailors. British seamen, apt to be ashore and unemployed for considerable periods of time between voyages, generally preferred to live in boarding houses near the piers while waiting for sailing ships to take on crews.

During these periods of unrestricted liberty, many ran out of money, so innkeepers carried them on credit until hired out for another voyage. When a seaman was booked on a ship, he was customarily advanced a month's wages, if needed, to pay off his boarding house debt. Then, while paying back the ship's master, he worked for nothing but "salt horse" the first several weeks aboard.

Salt horse was the staple diet of early sailors and it wasn't exactly tasty cuisine. Consisting of a low quality beef that had been heavily salted, the salt horse was tough to chew and even harder to digest. When the debt had been repaid, the salt horse was said to be dead and it was a time for great celebration among the crew. Usually, an effigy of a horse was constructed from odds and ends, set afire and then cast afloat to the cheers and hilarity of the ex-debtors. *Source: Net Research*

Tax Time is Coming! Avoid the Estimated Tax Penalty in Retirement

Have you or someone you know been charged the estimated tax penalty? Approximately ten percent of all retirees reporting taxable pension and/or Social Security income in a recent year were assessed this penalty by the Internal Revenue Service.

Being retired or 65 plus does not end our obligation to file and pay taxes. If you do not pay enough tax either through withholding or by making estimated tax payments, you may be assessed an estimated tax penalty when you file your federal income tax return.

Many individuals end up owing at tax time because they are not aware that taxes can be withheld from Social Security payments and pensions. New retirees may not be aware that a part, or most, of their income can be taxable. Contributing to the problem are sources of income from which no tax is withheld. These can include interest, dividends and capital gain income. Many retirees or their spouses continue to work and their withholding from those jobs may not be sufficient to cover the tax on their income from all sources.

When is the estimated tax penalty assessed?

Generally, it is when you owe at least \$1,000 when you file your return and you did not have at least 90 percent of your current year's tax, or 100 percent of your prior year's tax, paid throughout the year through withholding and/or estimated tax payments.

The best way to estimate how much tax you may owe is to complete IRS <u>Form 1040 ES</u>, *Estimated Tax for Individuals*. This form has a worksheet similar to a mini tax return that will help you estimate your tax for the year.

To avoid the Underpayment Penalty you can:

- Have sufficient income tax withheld from your wages, pension and Social Security payments. Ask for withholding on your pension by filing a Form W-4P (W-4 for military retirees) with your servicing pay center. You can request withholding on your Social Security by filing Form W-4V with your Social Security Office.
- Pay your estimated tax in quarterly installments, which are due the 15th of April, June, September and January. You can do this through Form 1040 ES, *Estimated Tax for Individuals*.

You can pay your tax using either one or both of these options. Remember the target is to pay in advance an amount that equals or exceeds 90 percent of the tax for the year or an amount that is at least equal to last year's tax.



MONUMENT TO A CENTURY OF FLIGHT

The Foundation for Coast Guard History (FCGH) Project to Commemorate a Century of Flight was officially launched in a brief ceremony June 9, 2003, close to the site where Orville Wright piloted the Wright Flyer on its historic First Flight, December 17, 1903. With a Rescue Helicopter (HH-60J) from Coast Guard Air Station Elizabeth City providing the backdrop, VADM (Ret.) Howie Thorsen and RADM (Ret.) Bob Johanson accepted from the Icarus International Foundation a replica of the 16 foot stainless steel pylon, one of fourteen wing-shaped pylons comprising the Icarus Monument to a Century of Flight that is being sponsored by the FCGH to honor the Coast Guard's rich aviation history, as well as the tremendous contributions to numerous U.S. coastal communities by the crews of the U.S. Life-Saving Service Stations and Coast Guard Boat Stations. Joining in the ceremony were CAPT (Ret.) Terry Beacham, CWO (Ret.) Hope Beacham, and Jesse Ward...all descendants of the U.S. Life-Saving Service surfmen who ably assisted the Wright brothers before, during, and after their historic flight. Also in attendance, representing the Coast Guard lifesavers of today, were CAPT Bruce Drahos, Commanding Officer AR≻, CAPT Rod Ansley, Commanding Officer CGAS Elizabeth City, and LCDR John Homan, Commander CG Group Cape Hatteras. The Monument to a Century of Flight, described in detail at www.icarusinternational.com, will be located adjacent to the Aycock Brown Welcome Center in Kitty Hawk, NC. Dedication of the monument took place September 27, 2003. All work associated with this fund-raising effort is being done by volunteers, and nearly all administrative costs are being borne by FCGH and The Ancient Order of the Pterodactyls (AOP), a non-profit organization whose members are former or present pilots and crewmembers of Coast Guard aircraft, plus other

individuals interested in and supportive of CG aviation. Donations to defray the cost of the \$60,000 pylon are fully tax deductible and may be made by check (mark "for MCOF project") to FCGH, c/o Coast Guard Museum Northwest, 1519 Alaska Way South, Seattle, WA 98134, or on-line (VISA or Mastercard) via www.fcgh.org web site. PTERODACTYLS PRESERVE AVIATION HISTORY

A pterodactyl is a dinosaur that once was able to fly. The Coast Guard has many still in existence. An organization of Coast Guard aviators and aircrewmen with some 1200 members, based at the Air Training Center in Mobile, Alabama, the Ancient Order of the Pterodactyl preserves the his-tory of Coast Guard aviation. They also cooperate fully with our efforts on a Servicewide basis. Their current project, among many, is to preserve and display CG aviation history materials, including documents, photographs and other scannable items which can be saved and/or displayed in a digital format. CDR Gib Brown, USCG (Ret) designed a website linked to the Pterodactyl site, an impressive work in progress. Many photos and writings obtained from various sources have been screened, scanned and posted, but only the first few steps have been taken in what will be a long journey. The initiators recognize that the Coast Guard does not have and never has had adequate resources to collect, store, organize and make accessible much of its history, notwithstanding the diligence and expertise of the people in the CG Historian's

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Office at CG Headquarters. Much of the history of CG aviation is in files at air stations, museums and with the personal memorabilia of aviators and aircrews, and much is scattered and disorganized. Not much is accessible. As a result, current and past participants in Coast Guard aviation, as well as the public, are denied the rich history of this vibrant organization. The Pterodactyls are supporting new efforts with encouragement, member participation and initial funding for equipment and website maintenance.

Computing and scanning equipment has been purchased for the use of volunteers in the Washington, D.C. area who will be working with the Office of CG Historian to digitize aviation history records now at Headquarters. Volunteers in the D.C. area are urgently needed to help with this project and are asked to contact Ptero Bob Johanson at robtjohanson@aol.com or 616 Lakeland Rd. A Fallen Hero Recovered ~In Memoriam~



The remains of the USCG's only Vietnam MIA, Lt Jack Rittichier, USCG, Have been recovered and returned to the US. He will be buried at Arlington at 1300 on 6 Oct 2003.

The following is a reflection of a true Coast Guard Hero:

Jack Columbus Rittichier was born on 17 August 1933 in Akron, Ohio. He graduated from Coventry High School in 1951. He attended Kent State University, where he played college football and was the team's captain. He graduated with a BFA degree in March of 1957.

After graduating, he joined the Air Force in August of 1957 and went through flight training at Bainbridge Air Force Base [AFB], Georgia and Loredo AFB, Texas, earning his wings in December of 1958.

Trained to fly the Boeing B 47 Second Lieutenant Rittichier was assigned to the Strategic Air Command's 340th Bomb Wing based at Whiteman AFB, Missouri. During his Air Force career he was promoted to the rank of Captain.

After being discharged from the Air Force in November of 1962, he accepted a commission in the Coast Guard Reserve as a Lieutenant, Junior Grade, his commission dating from 26 September 1963.

While assigned to his first tour of duty at Coast Guard Air Station Elizabeth City, North Carolina, he served as a search and rescue pilot and had collateral duties as the unit's legal affairs officer and Public information officer. He was promoted to Lieutenant in the regular Coast Guard on 28 March 1966. The Coast Guard awarded Rittichier and his unit the Coast Guard Unit Commendation for their rescue work during Hurricane Betsy.

In May of 1966 he was assigned to Air Station Detroit, based out of Selfridge AFB, where he again flew search and rescue missions and also served as the assistant head operations officer and as the unit's public information officer. While there, he laid the ground work for a public information campaign on the activities of Coast Guard aviators flying as exchange officers with the U.S. Air Force Rescue Service in Vietnam. This exchange program allowed Coast Guard officers the opportunity to serve a tour of duty with an Air Force unit and vice versa, and was designed to give these officers experience in the rescue operations and procedures used by the other service.

The Coast Guard awarded Lieutenant Rittichier the Air Medal in June 1967 for his role as the copilot of a helicopter that completed a dangerous rescue during the winter of 1966. On 29 November 1966 Rittichier and his crew responded to a distress call from the West German motor vessel *Nordmeer* that had grounded on Thunder Bay Island Shoal in Lake Huron. The cutter *Mackinaw* also responded to the distress call but prevailing weather conditions and the location of the stranded vessel prohibited her crew from effecting a rescue and they awaited the assistance of a Coast Guard helicopter. Rittichier navigated the helicopter for 150 miles from Detroit with the "final 80 miles flown through snow showers at 200 feet over the lake utilizing the shoreline for navigation." After locating the vessel, Rittichier established contact with her crew by radio. They indicated that they were stranded on the forward deck, exposed to the elements, had no power, and were in imminent danger. Rittichier then assisted the pilot in "maneuvering the helicopter and accomplishing the hoist of the eight crewmen from the NORDMEER to the decks of the Mackinaw" safely. The rescue was completed in a mere 22 minutes. Soon after the crew had been rescued, the *Nordmeer* broke apart and sank.

Soon thereafter Rittichier volunteered for the exchange program with the Air Force. The Air Force assigned him to the 37th Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Squadron [ARRS], based at Da Nang, in the Republic of Vietnam. Once with the 37th ARRS, Rittichier began flying the large Sikorsky HH-3E "Jolly Green Giant" combat rescue helicopters.

Within three weeks of his arrival in Vietnam he demonstrated his courage above and beyond the call of duty. The Air Force awarded Rittichier a Distinguished Flying Cross for a mission where, flying as copilot through heavy enemy fire, he and his crew saved four Army fliers. Two weeks later, under the light of illumination flares, he rescued nine men from the side of a mountain, five of whom were badly wounded.

On 9 June 1968, a Marine Corps A-4 *Skyhawk* went down 37 miles west of Hue in the A Shau Valley near a North Vietnamese Army staging area. The pilot, First Lieutenant Walter R. Schmidt, Jr., USMC, ejected safely but injured his leg and consequently, once on the ground, was unable to move. He established radio contact with control aircraft in the area and a rescue attempt was quickly coordinated. Rittichier, flying as the aircraft commander of an HH-3E (Serial Number 67-14710), code-named Jolly Green 23, and another HH-3E, code-named Jolly Green 22, were scrambled from Da Nang.

Since Schmidt was injured the helicopter crews would need to deploy their pararescue jumper [known as a "PJ"] to rescue him -- a dangerous procedure under any conditions as the helicopter would need to remain in a hover while the PJ deployed -- making a large, stationary target for enemy fire. Adding to the danger was the possibility that enemy forces had captured Schmidt and were using him as bait to bring in the Jolly Green Giants as close to their guns as possible. These rescue missions into hostile

territory were some of the most dangerous flights undertaken during the war and it took a special breed of serviceman to volunteer for this type of duty.

Helicopter gunships first fired their ordnance around the area where Schmidt lay to suppress enemy fire. Then Jolly Green 22 made the first attempts to rescue the injured pilot but heavy enemy fire repeatedly drove them off. After trying three times and running low on fuel, Jolly Green 22 flew off to refuel. The gunships and fighter-bombers then once again pummeled the surrounding area with ordnance but the enemy appeared to be well dug in and therefore resistant to suppression. The control officer, orbiting the area while he orchestrated the rescue and ground suppression missions, asked if Jolly Green 23 would make a rescue attempt. Rittichier, as the command pilot in Jolly Green 23, answered in the affirmative.

After heavy enemy fire forced him to pull away during his first attempt to hover over the injured Marine pilot, he

came around after the area had been swept by attack aircraft yet again. As he hovered over Schmidt and his PJ began to deploy, enemy bullets riddled the HH-3E Jolly Green Giant just above and aft of the cockpit, causing a fire. Rittichier pulled up and attempted to fly to a nearby

clearing to put his helicopter down. As he cleared a line of trees, witnesses saw his rotor slow and the Jolly Green Giant lost altitude. It exploded as it impacted the ground. An official report of the crash noted: "that at an altitude of approximately 50' JG 23's rotor very noticeably slowed down and it looked like he was attempting to set the helicopter down on a small knoll. Upon crashing the entire aircraft burst into a fire ball and within 30 seconds the entire structure was nothing but smoking ashes. The aircraft had melted out of sight."

There had been no chance to escape the inferno--all four men on board perished almost instantly. Lieutenant Rittichier and his Air Force crew had given their lives attempting to save the life of a fellow serviceman. The other men on board Jolly Green 23 with Rittichier were the copilot, Captain Richard C. Yeend, Jr., USAF, the flight engineer, Staff Sergeant Elmer L. Holden, USAF, and the pararescue jumper Sergeant James D. Locker, USAF. Subsequent attempts to rescue the Marine pilot proved unsuccessful and he had remained missing in action [MIA] until recovery this year.

During his distinguished career, Lieutenant Rittichier demonstrated a fearless determination to save lives at the risk of his own. He was awarded the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross with two oak leaf clusters, the Purple Heart, the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters, a Coast Guard Unit Commendation, the Vietnam Service Medal and the Vietnam Campaign Medal.

On 16 June 1969 the hangar at Coast Guard Air Station Detroit, based at Selfridge AFB--Lieutenant Rittichier's last Coast Guard duty station, was dedicated in his honor. On 10 November 1998 the Coast Guard Integrated Support Command at Portsmouth, Virginia, dedicated one of their buildings in his honor as well.

Rittichier and his crew on board Jolly Green 23 were listed as "Killed in Action / Bodies Not Recovered." Their names appear on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. In 2002 a Joint Task Force-Full Accounting investigation team located the crash site inside Laos and recovered the remains of the crew.
