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RESTORATION AND REHABILITATION WORK ON COAST GUARD STATION AT EAST BEACH, ST. SIMONS ISLAND, GEORGIA COMPLETED

ST. SIMONS ISLAND, GA—Since 1936, the Coast Guard Station at East Beach, St. Simons Island has stood watch over the ever-changing waters of the island. Today, the Coastal Georgia Historical Society is standing watch over the Coast Guard Station. Adaptive rehabilitation and restoration work began on this unique station in April of 2004 thanks to an ISTEA grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation. The Historical Society worked closely with the Glynn County Board of Commissioners and EDS Services of Savannah to preserve this historic building on the island.

This unique historic resource has been an integral part of the changing landscape of the island. Construction crews of the Public Works Administration (PWA) began work in 1935 on what was originally a life-saving station. Commissioned in 1937, the 2.5 acre complex includes the station house, surf boat and jalopy garage, signal tower, and a series of concrete sidewalks. St. Simons Island Coast Guard Station was the only Coast Guard life-saving station established on the Georgia coast at that time. The former boathouse was 3 1/2 miles away at the Frederica River. At the time of construction, the water's edge reached the current parking lot, directly in front of the station.

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
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If the widow's walk could talk, stories of U-boats, observation blimps, lost shrimpers, weekend sailors gone awry, and changing coastlines would fall from the perch. Local residents remember watching "their boys" make practice runs in surf boats along the beach. Descendants of the original crews reminisce about the days of fish fries, Friday night dances at the King and Prince, and hours of standing watch over the ocean. The tripartite effort of the Coastal Georgia Historical Society, Glynn County Board of Commissioners, and EDS Services has saved another island icon and unique piece of coastal Georgia's heritage.

By the decommissioning of this station in 1995, accumulated sand had placed the waterline over 300 feet from the station house. Adding to the frustrations, modern traffic patterns along the island made it difficult to get to the boathouse during rush hour times. Referred to as a "Roosevelt-Era style" station, it is only one of 45 Coast Guard stations constructed during the administration of President Franklin Roosevelt that is still in existence. After decommissioning the Station, the Coast Guard moved to new quarters along the Turtle River in mainland Brunswick.

The adaptive rehabilitation work has included replacing out-of-code wiring and plumbing, repairing damaged wooden windows, upgrading the HVAC system, replacing vinyl windows with new, historically-correct wooden windows, recovering the floors with historically-appropriate linoleum, removing vinyl siding, and complete restoration of the exterior cypress shingles. As inappropriate repairs and remodeling efforts were removed during the demolition phase, architectural features unique to this era buildings were revealed. Built-in tool lockers, dress uniform-length closets, radiator niches in the bunk rooms, and original government-issued drawer pulls were restored and reused within their original contexts.

The beaches, marshes, forests of oak and pine have greatly influenced the history of Georgia's barrier islands. These natural assets are in danger of being lost and must be interpreted and understood if they are to be appreciated and preserved. The planned Maritime Center at the Historic Coast Guard Station offers an exciting opportunity not only to illuminate the region's natural assets, but also to preserve a significant historic structure.

"The Past meets the Present on the Black Sands of Iwo Jima"

In the hot and humid air on the small pork-chop shaped island, a grey-haired 79-year-old Coast Guard veteran takes slow but sure steps in the black volcanic sand on the beach. Marvin J. Perrett is back on Iwo Jima – 60 years after one of the fiercest and most memorable battles in American history. Perrett, with a boatswain whistle around his neck, is the only vet in uniform among the 600 or so people who flew to the island from Guam for a day trip to commemorate the Battle of Iwo Jima, 660 miles south of Tokyo. The Japanese defenders had been ordered to fight to the death and most did. All but 1,000 of the 21,000 Japanese died during the 36-day battle. More than 23,000 Marines were wounded or killed in a fight that the U.S. military had expected would last only a few days.

The Commander of Coast Guard Far East Activities (FEACT), Captain Michael Blair, and myself, FEACT's XO, had flown in on an USAF C130. Wearing our ODUs and being the only Coast Guard representatives in a sea of Marine Corps green both the CO and I stand out in the crowd, prompting numerous vets to approach and tell us their stories. But it's our fellow Coastie, the former coxswain who we are most drawn to. Perrett, a New Orleans native, was the first Coastie to land on Iwo Jima, serving aboard the Coast Guard-manned attack transport USS *Bayfield* (APA-33) as a coxswain of one of the *Bayfield*'s landing craft. He overcame what he recalls was "border chronic seasickness" on his initial voyage from the States to Europe before he got his sea legs.

Standing on the Iwo beach in his light blue uniform and bell bottoms, he recounts his experience in front of a History Channel camera. It is a story of survival more than anything else; Perrett had also been part of the invasions at Normandy and Okinawa and had lived to tell about the tales. Perrett recalls that maneuvering the watercraft was like "driving a bulldozer in the water." The young coxswains would hit the beach full throttle – at eight to ten miles an hour. The stories of the men who transported the troops to the beaches have generally been overlooked by historians. But as Perrett points out that with people with him, the invasions would not have been possible.

Perrett skillfully navigated his Land Craft Vehicle/Personnel (LCVP) onto several beaches before Iwo Jima. The 36foot flat-bottomed craft, made primarily of wood and powered by a 671-Gray Marine Diesel could hold three dozen fully equipped assault troops. The men were packed in like sardines, standing up with 80 to 90 pounds of gear on their backs. Perrett admits he was scared as he maneuvered onto beaches under hostile fire, but says he was never about to show fear to those 36 troops in his craft. Now on the very same beach that he saw turn from black to red with American blood, Perrett takes a short break from the interviews and story-swapping to open a can of sardines to eat with some crackers – just as he did 60 years ago on the same beach. Perrett reflects on what he calls the unexpected "warm reception" received at Iwo Jima, a much more treacherous landing than what he experienced at Utah Beach. The same landing craft that he had maneuvered successfully and without incident at Normandy and southern France was lost the first day he hit the beach at Iwo Jima. It all happened in a split second, he recalls, as he hurriedly backed off to avoid crushing a young Marine. Because the craft's ramp was not yet up, water came over the stern. By the time Perrett was 50 feet or so off the beach, water had seeped in through the open bow and "the boat just went out from under us." After an unsuccessful towing attempt his boat was cut free and went under. Suddenly the Coasties found themselves evicted from their ride and put ashore. He and three of his mates held Springfield rifles at the ready but in the confusion they had left their ammunition in their now sunken boat.

Perretts' journey back in time on the beach is momentarily interrupted when a Marine with three stars on his uniform approaches us and expresses his appreciation to the Coast Guard for expertly planting so many grunts on the beach in 1945. After talking, shaking hands and slaps on the back, we jump into a Humvee to head to the ceremony honoring "Our Greatest Generation" vets. The Marine Corps Commandant, General Michael W. Hagee, more than 20 other stars and three Congressmen, as well as former Japanese Prime Minister Yoshiro Mori, join hundreds of spectators, paying respect to the casualties from both sides. The theme was one of transition from war and hatred to peace and friendship.


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Perrett continues his stories after the ceremony, with several former Coasties and a Congressman from Indiana listening. Captain Blair and I break from the party and proceed on a short climb up Mt. Surabachi, the 550-foot inactive volcano, where the classic photograph of Marines raising the American flag was snapped by the AP's Joe Rosenthal. That large flag and the 21-foot long galvanized steel steamfitter's pipe on which it was raised, incidentally, was courtesy of the Coast Guard, requested by one of the young Marines immortalized in the photograph who had come calling to LST-758 and Coast Guard quartermaster Robert Resnick. At the top of Surabachi, Captain Blair and I imagined that flag being hoisted and tens of thousands of Americans below cheering. It was hard not to wonder what it must have been like fighting in the harshest of environments. It made me realize that the freedom we enjoy today comes from the sweat, toil and blood of vets, such as Marvin Perrett and men and women like him who fought across Europe, Asia, Africa and the Pacific.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT CENTER, New London, Conn.— A retirement ceremony yesterday highlighted Chief Warrant Officer Dan S. McIntyre's 42 years of service to the Coast Guard. He publicly thanked his wife, Mary, whom he's been married to for 29 years, and of the opportunities the Coast Guard gave to him.

CWO McIntyre, a New London resident and an instructor at Leadership Development Center, enlisted in the Coast Guard Reserves on Dec. 23, 1960. He advanced to Chief Petty Officer nine years later and made Chief Warrant Officer in 1982.

TRICARE Retiree Dental Program sweetens benefit for members of the National Guard/ Reserve

TMA grants waiver of 12-month waiting period for full scope of services

Sacramento – National Guard and Reserve personnel who elect to enroll in the TRICARE Retiree Dental Program (TRDP) within 120 days after retirement are now eligible to skip the 12-month waiting period normally required for certain TRDP benefits, according to Delta Dental, the program's administrator.

Effective February 1, 2005, TMA authorized a waiver from requiring retired National Guard/Reserve men and women who meet the criteria to be enrolled in the TRDP for 12 months prior to gaining the maximum allowed benefits for cast crowns, cast restorations, bridges, dentures and orthodontics for both adults and children.

Additionally, this new waiver will be applied retroactively to February 1, 2004 for any Guard and Reserve enrollees who can document their enrollment in the TRDP within 120 days after their retirement effective date. Delta will process any claim adjustments resulting from this retroactive waiver, upon notification from the enrollee and submission of the appropriate documentation.

All new enrollees seeking to obtain the waiver should submit a copy of their retirement orders together with their application.

The nation's largest voluntary, all-enrollee-paid dental program continues to offer coverage for diagnostic and preventive services, basic restorative services, periodontics, endodontics, oral surgery, dental emergencies and a separate dental accident benefit with no waiting period. The program currently covers over 800,000 retired members of the uniformed services, including National Guard and Reserve personnel, and their families.

"We are working in partnership with TMA to offer a comprehensive dental program with the fewest possible restrictions in the first year of enrollment," said Lowell Daun, DDS, senior vice president for Delta's Federal Services division. "We are also working to keep premiums affordable for members of the National Guard/Reserve."

Eligibility for the TRICARE Retiree Dental Program extends to all retirees of the Reserve and Guard and their family members, including "gray area" retired Reservists who are entitled to retired pay but will not begin receiving it until age 60. Although eligibility for this group has been in effect since the TRDP first began in 1998, many retired Reserve and Guard members, and even more "gray area" retirees, still do not realize they are eligible. It is important to note that as with all new retirees, the 120-day period during which a "gray area" retired Reservist can enroll in the TRDP to qualify for the 12-month waiting period waiver begins with his/her retirement effective date, not the date he/she reaches age 60.

The TRDP, first authorized by Congress in 1997, continues today to offer one of the few affordable, comprehensive dental benefit programs available to the nation's Uniformed Services retirees, as well as to retirees of the Reserve and Guard. The TRDP is a nationwide, combined fee-for-service/ preferred provider program that offers enrollees access to any licensed dentist in all 50 states, plus the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, the U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands and Canada.

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Enrollees may seek care from any licensed dentist, with optimal benefits available when choosing a participating "Delta Dental PPO" dentist in over 80,000 locations nationwide.

The TRDP carries a \$50 per person annual deductible. The program also includes a family deductible cap of \$150 and an annual maximum amount of \$1,200, against which preventive and diagnostic services are not counted. In addition to the annual maximum, the TRDP also has a separate dental accident annual maximum of \$1,000 and a lifetime orthodontic maximum of \$1,200.

Delta Dental of California belongs to a larger holding company system, formed jointly with Delta Dental of Pennsylvania and several affiliate companies, covering nearly 21 million enrollees in 16 states and the District of Columbia. Both the California and Pennsylvania Delta Plans are members of the national Delta Dental Plans Association, which collectively covers 43 million Americans.

NOAA TRANSFERS MAPPING SHIP TO MEXICAN NAVY



May 3, 2005 — <u>NOAA</u> transferred ownership of Whiting, a decommissioned hydrographic survey ship, to the Mexican Navy upon authority of Congress and by order of the Secretary of Commerce. The transfer took place during a special ceremony at Town Point Park, Otter Berth, in Norfolk, Va. At the ceremony held last Thursday, the vessel was accepted by Vice Admiral Edgar F. Narro y Quesda, director general de investigacion y dessarollo, who was the senior representative of the Mexican Navy. The ship was then recommissioned Rio Tuxpan.

"For years, Whiting supported NOAA's mission to promote safe navigation," said Rear Admiral Samuel P. De Bow Jr., director of the <u>NOAA Commissioned Officers Corps</u> and <u>NOAA Marine and Aviation Operations</u>, which operates, manages and maintains the NOAA fleet. "We replaced her with a former Navy hydrographic survey ship two years ago as part of our fleet modernization program. We're delighted Whiting now will be of service to the Mexican Navy."

Whiting was decommissioned in 2003. Until then, the ship conducted hydrographic surveys of U.S. coastal waters to determine least water depths and locate obstructions on the sea floor and other dangers to navigation.

"Whiting will be Mexico's first dedicated hydrographic survey vessel, and will significantly contribute to that country's mapping and charting capabilities," said Captain Roger L. Parsons, director of the <u>NOAA Office of Coast Survey</u>. Parsons is also the National Hydrographer of the United States. "We are looking forward to collaboration in hydrographic activities between our two nations. The transfer is part of our cooperative efforts to share data and resources," he added.

The legislative authority for the Secretary of Commerce to transfer Whiting to Mexico stipulates that the ship support hydrographic activities of the U.S.-Mexico Charting Advisors Committee and enhance the two countries' cooperation regarding surveying and charting activities in the border waters of both countries in the Gulf of Mexico and in the Pacific Ocean.

The United States and Mexico plan hydrographic efforts together via the United States-Mexico Cooperative Charting Advisory Committee. In an effort to make surveying and nautical charting operations more compatible, the International Hydrographic Organization's MesoAmerican-Caribbean Sea Regional Hydrographic Commission established the committee in 2002 to promote coordination of respective requirements. The NOAA Office of Coast Survey represents the United States on this committee. Specific areas of collaboration include hydrographic survey data acquisition and exchange, tidal and current data harmonization, and hydrographic and cartographic personnel exchanges.

NOAA, an agency of the <u>U.S. Department of Commerce</u>, is dedicated to enhancing economic security and national safety through the prediction and research of weather and climate-related events and providing environmental stewardship of the nation's coastal and marine resources.

Concurrent Retirement and Disability Payments (CRDP)

Due to the number of inquiries we have received on CRDP, we are providing the following information to help clarify our current policy guidance.

CRDP and retroactive Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) disability compensation awards:

According to the Coast Guard program guidance of Section 1414 of Title 10, United States Code, **CRDP is not retro**active. CRDP is only payable starting the month the Coast Guard actually starts offsetting your VA award from your retired pay. If you are in receipt of VA compensation and for some reason the Coast Guard did not offset your VA award, then there is nothing to restore, no concurrent payment was made. Even if the VA withheld the difference of the award and retired pay for the prior months, CRDP is still not retroactive, if the Coast Guard did not start the offset. If the VA did not withhold the difference, then an overpayment to the member would have resulted.

VA Unemployability Codes and CRDP:

Those members who are rated 100 percent with the VA and meet the CRDP criteria, will have their full retired pay restored effective January 1, 2005. Those members who have been rated less than 100 percent, but are receiving 100 percent from the VA due to an unemployability code, will not receive their full retired pay up front. They still fall under the 10-year phase in plan, in which they will see full restoration by the year 2014. The CRDP is paid on the actual VA rating not the unemployability code.

Chapter 61 retirees and CRDP:

Certain individuals who retired from the Coast Guard with a disability under Chapter 61 of Title 10, United States Code; will not see restoration of their full retired pay. CRDP is based on the longevity percentage, not the disability. So if your disability percentage is greater than your longevity percentage, under current policy, your CRDP will be based on the longevity percentage and will be less than your full retired pay.

TRICARE Retiree Dental Program Enrollment

Uniformed service retirees and their family members are offered dental benefits through **voluntary** enrollment in the TRDP. They are not eligible for dental benefits under the TRICARE Dental Program (TDP)

There are three ways to enroll in the TRDP:

2. Enroll online with acceptable credit cards at <u>www.trdp.org</u>.

3. Call toll-free at 1-(888) 838-8737 between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. Pacific Time, Monday through Friday and enroll over the phone using acceptable credit cards.

DoD Announces Criteria for Two New Campaign Medals

The Department of Defense announced today the creation of two campaign medals for Afghanistan and Iraq.

Presidential Executive Order 13363 established the Afghanistan and Iraq campaign medals to recognize members, who made specific sacrifices and significant contributions in these areas of operation.

Service members authorized the Afghanistan Campaign Medal must have served in direct support of Operation Enduring Freedom on or after Oct. 24, 2001, to a future date to be determined by the Secretary of Defense or the cessation of the operation. The area of eligibility encompasses all land areas of the country of Afghanistan and all air spaces above the land.

Those authorized the Iraq Campaign Medal must have served in direct support of Operation Iraqi Freedom on or after March 19, 2003, to a future date to be determined by the Secretary of Defense or the cessation of the operation. The area of eligibility encompasses all land area of the country of Iraq, and the contiguous water area out to 12 nautical miles, and all air spaces above the land area of Iraq and above the contiguous water area out to 12 nautical miles.

Service members must have been assigned, attached or mobilized to units operating in these areas of eligibility for 30 consecutive days or for 60 non-consecutive days or meet one of the following criteria:

- Be engaged in combat during an armed engagement, regardless of the time in the area of eligibility; or
- While participating in an operation or on official duties, is wounded or injured and requires medical evacuation from the area of eligibility; or
- While participating as a regularly assigned air crewmember flying sorties into, out of, within or over the area of eligibility in direct support of the military operations; each day of operations counts as one day of eligibility.

Service members qualified for the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal by reasons of service between Oct. 24, 2001, and April 30, 2005, in an area for which the Afghanistan Campaign Medal was subsequently authorized and between March 19, 2003, and Feb. 28, 2005, in an area for which the Iraq Campaign Medal was subsequently authorized, shall remain qualified for that medal.

Upon application, any such service member may be awarded the Afghanistan or Iraq Campaign Medal in lieu of the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal for such service. No service member shall be entitled to all three medals for the same act, achievement or period of service.

The awarding authority for the Afghanistan and Iraq campaign medals shall be the prescribed by the member's respective military service regulations. Both medals may be awarded posthumously.

Only one award of the Afghanistan Campaign Medal and Iraq Campaign Medal may be authorized for any individual. Service stars are not prescribed.

Individuals may receive both the medals if they meet the requirement of both awards; however, the qualifying period of service used to establish eligibility for one award cannot be used to justify eligibility for the other.

The Afghanistan Campaign Medal shall be positioned below the Kosovo Campaign Medal and above the Iraq Campaign Medal. The Iraq Campaign Medal shall be positioned below the Afghanistan Campaign Medal and above the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal.

Each military department will prescribe appropriate regulations for processing, awarding and wearing the medals and ribbons for their service members, to include application procedures for veterans, retirees and next-of-kin.

OBVERSE:

Description: On a bronze metal 1 3/8 inches (3.49 cm) in diameter above a range of mountains is a map of Afghanistan. Around the top is the inscription "AFGHANISTAN CAMPAIGN."

Symbolism: Mountains dominate the landscape of Afghanistan. The map of the country highlights the theater of operation and our commitment to Operation Enduring Freedom.

REVERSE:

Description: A radiating demi-sun superimposed by an eagle's head couped. Inscribed across the bottom half of the reverse side are the three lines "FOR SERVICE IN AFGHANISTAN" all enclosed by a laurel wreath. **Symbolism:** The eagle, a symbol of the United States and the American spirit, is constantly vigilant, ready to defend freedom. The rising sun embodies a new start for Afghanistan and its road to a free and prosperous future. The laurel wreath is for honor and high achievement.

RIBBON: The ribbon reflects the colors of the new Afghanistan flag and the red, white and blue represent the United States and its allies.





OBVERSE:

Description: On a bronze disc 1 3/8 inches (3.49cm) in diameter, a wreath of two palm fronds surmounted by a representation of the land mass of Iraq with the two primary rivers delineated, represents the area of operation. Above is the inscription "IRAQ CAMPAIGN."

Symbolism: The lines symbolize the Tigris and Euphrates River, recalling Iraq's title as "the land of two rivers." The palm wreath denotes peace and honor.

REVERSE:

Description: A representation of the Statue of Freedom on the Capitol Building surmounting a sunburst, encircled by two scimitars points down crossed at tip of blades, all above the inscription "FOR SERVICE IN IRAQ."

Symbolism: The Statue of Freedom represents the ideals and goals of the campaign to bring stability and to improve the way of life for Iraq. The sunburst behind the figure symbolizes hope and success. The two scimitars in base recall an arch of swords erected by Saddam Hussein during his reign, and with the tip of the swords pointing down represent his fall from power and symbolize the goal for freedom of the Iraqi people.

RIBBON: The right and left sides are the colors: Scarlet 67111, White 67101 with a narrow Green stripe 67129 in the middle, Black 67138 and Khaki 67142 in the middle. Black and green represent Iraq and its quest for freedom, white denotes idealism, and scarlet signifies courage and sacrifice. Khaki represents the desert.

Editor's notes

KEEPING RETIREE AND ANNUITANT SERVICES INFORMED

There have been a few recent instances on retiree accounts where retirees failed to report the unfortunate passing of his/her spouse. It is critical when the spouse predeceases the retiree and Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) costs are being deducted for spouse coverage. In one of these cases, the spouse had predeceased the retiree 20 years prior to the retiree himself passing, and PSC (RAS) only became aware of the spouse's death during final pay processing. Title 31, U.S. Code 3702 states "A claim against the Government presented under this section must contain the signature and address of the claimant or an authorized representative. The claim must be received by the official responsible under subsection (a) for settling the claim or by the agency that conducts the activity from which the claim arises within 6 years after the claim accrues..." Following enactment of Public Law 107-314 (Bob Stump National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2003), for claims presented on or after December 2, 2002, waivers of the 6-year time limit can be made by the Secretary of Defense upon application by the secretary (Department of Homeland Security for U.S. Coast Guard) for amounts less than \$25,000. Any waivers submitted to Secretary of Department of Homeland Security would require clear documentation as to why the necessary information had not been reported in a timely fashion.

All retirees are reminded to inform PSC (RAS) as soon as possible following changes of marital status (divorce, death, annulment, marriage just to mention some), death of a designated SBP beneficiary, or any other changes which could impact retired pay.

Personnel Locator: If you are searching for an individual, we can help. Place your personal correspondence to that individual in a sealed envelope, making sure to include how they can get in touch with you. On the outside of that envelope, address it to them with their full name and rank/rate (for military). Please write your return address and attach a stamp on the envelope. Then, place that envelope in a larger envelope and address it to:

National Security Cutter Keel Laying

Pascagoula, Miss. - On Tuesday, Mar. 29, senior Coast Guard and industry officials laid the keel of the newest weapon in the war on terror, the first National Security Cutter (WMSL 750), during a ceremony at Northrop Grumman Ships Systems Ingalls shipyard in Pascagoula, Miss. The multi-mission cutter is being built by Integrated Coast Guard Systems, a joint venture between Northrop Grumman and Lockheed Martin Corporation, as part of the Coast Guard's Integrated Deepwater System modernization and recapitalization program

Honored guest speakers included Secretary of Homeland Security Michael Chertoff and his wife, Meryl; Mississippi Gov. Haley Barbour; Sen. Thad Cochran, R-Miss.; Sen. Trent Lott, R-Miss.; Commandant of the Coast Guard Adm. Thomas H. Collins; Rear Adm. Patrick M. Stillman, Integrated Deepwater System program executive officer; Dr. Philip Dur, president of Northrop Grumman Ship Systems; and Fred P. Moosally, president, Lockheed Martin Maritime Systems & Sensors.

"Today's ceremony marks a significant milestone in the history of the Deepwater program and the transformation of the Coast Guard for its 21st-century missions," said Collins, as he addressed more than 300 invited guests, distinguished visitors and members of the media.

The construction of the National Security Cutter, at 418-feet long and displacing 4,300 tons, is the centerpiece of the Integrated Deepwater System's System of Systems. The cutter will be the largest and most technically advanced class of cutter in the Coast Guard.

"The National Security Cutter is designed to be the flagship of the Coast Guard fleet," said Sen. Cochran, chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee. "It features helicopters, inflatable boats, and secure communications."

"We've got to make sure we have what we need to protect [and defend] our shores, our ports, and our harbors," said Sen. Lott.

"This National Security Cutter, the keel of which we lay today, is a visible symbol of the new generation of equipment that we are going to provide to the men and women of the Coast Guard," said Secretary Chertoff, principal speaker at the keel-laying ceremony. "Importantly, this cutter is not just a ship, but it is an integrated system - a system that is designed to perform in the defense of this country. In a way, that's emblematic of the Deepwater program itself, which is not simply a collection of individual assets, cutters, ships and aircraft, but is part of a capability...part of a perform-ance-based effort designed to deliver a result, a successful mission of protecting these United States.

"As you build this cutter you are demonstrating that your goals and those of the Department of Homeland Security are the same: operational efficiency, first in class excellence, and extraordinary service," said Chertoff. "You have chosen a sponsor for this ship that embodies all of those qualities."

Mrs. Meryl J. Chertoff, the sponsor of the U.S. Coast Guard's first in class NSC cutter, authenticated the laying of the keel. "As sponsor, I have to be the mother of this ship. Let's hope that will be easier than being the mother of two teenagers."

"As I stand here today, seeing how the Deepwater fleet is getting built by such a talented team, I look forward to the day when American families can rest a little easier knowing that the men and women of the Coast Guard are running missions up and down the coasts of the nation in this fine ship," she said.

The keel-laying ceremony is the long-recognized maritime tradition of laying down the backbone of a ship, and in modern times has come to represent the traditional start-of-construction milestone. During the authentication, Adm. Collins and Mrs. Chertoff traced their initials on the keel plate, signifying the keel of the first new Deepwater cutter has been "truly and fairly laid." Minutes later, Northrop Grumman Ship Systems welder L.W. "Billy" Ross permanently inscribed the initials into the keel.

"This shipyard is 'America's shipyard' because it is the most productive in America with the greatest workforce in America that produces the best product in the shipbuilding industry," said Barbour. "This shipyard has been the crown jewel of our state's economy, because the people that work here do their jobs so well; and because Northrop Grumman and our state have insured that the capital investments have been here."

"Today's keel laying ceremony is the culmination of countless hours of research, planning and commitment to making the National Security Cutter program the pre-eminent national security asset in America's homeland security investment," said Dur. "We've planned for this ship to be the model for all first of class ships and it already is. The lead National Security Cutter the best first-time quality ship for a first in class that has ever been built here."

The ship represents the first major multi-mission cutter to be introduced to the Coast Guard in the past 25 years. The production contract for this first in class was awarded in June 2004, and the start of fabrication occurred in September last year.

"Integrated Coast Guard Systems is delivering to the men and women of the Coast Guard the tools they need to get their job done," said Moosally. "Our entire team is committed to the Coast Guard's success. This includes our colleagues in the shipyards...at test facilities...and at Coast Guard facilities around the nation."

Northrop Grumman Ship Systems is leading the production effort. Lockheed Martin also plays an important role, with its work focused primarily on the cutter's command, control, communications, computers, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (C4ISR) capabilities.

The first National Security Cutter is scheduled to be delivered to the Coast Guard in the spring of 2007. The contract for construction of the second National Security Cutter was signed in January and calls for a total of eight National Security Cutters to be constructed in this program.

- Check availability of specific medications through the TRICARE Mail Order or Retail Pharmacy programs.
- Discover which medications are on the Basic Core Formulary. These medications must be made available at all full service military pharmacies.
- Find co-payment information for prescription medications, including injectable medications.
- Learn about generic equivalents for brand-name medications, quantity limits prior authorization requirements.

• View and print prior authorization criteria and forms. Learn about FDA approved drug uses, side effects and potential interactions with other medications.

Beneficiaries should consult their provider, pharmacist, or other health care professional for specific questions regarding their medications.

A Little Reminder About US Coast Guard Reserve Retirement Point Statements.

By Lynn Couch, Reserve Processing Technician

It is important to remember to check your point statements in a timely manner while you are still drilling. Please verify each entry on the point statement carefully, including your mailing address, correspondence, ADT and IDT. If you feel it is incorrect, you must notify your Servicing Personnel Office (SPO) within 45 days. You should highlight the discrepancies, and provide supporting documentation (copies of paid orders, your LES, or course completion letters) with your letter to your SPO. Be sure and also include a written explanation outlining the discrepancy. It is so much easier to get this corrected while still drilling instead of waiting several years then realizing that this will affect your retired pay. At this time we may have to order your record from the National Personnel Records Center and if you had served in another branch of the service then you will need to sign a release before we can even get your record so again please take a few minutes when receiving your point statement and review it for accuracy.

IMPORTANT! IMPORTANT! IMPORTANT!

On pages 27 and 28 of this issue is the Form CG PSC-3600, Designation of Beneficiary for Payment of Unpaid Retired Pay. Why is this form important to you? This is the form that RAS uses to pay the person **you designated** to receive your final retired pay due upon your death. You probably filled one of these out upon your retirement from the Coast Guard, which could have been many years ago and your designated beneficiary may have changed due to marriage, divorce, birth of a child or death of a loved one.

As an example, if you filled out this form when you retired ten years ago, were married at that time and elected for your spouse to receive 100% of your final pay and subsequently divorced and remarried but didn't fill out a new 3600 form, then passed away, your former spouse would receive any final pay due versus your current spouse.

A current Form 3600 also makes it easier and quicker for RAS to pay to your designated beneficiary your final pay due, thus helping relieve some of the financial strain a death and loss of income can create and depending on rank and time of the month of your death, could be a considerable sum.

If there has been a change in your beneficiary and you've not filled out a new form, do yourself and your beneficiary a favor and take a few minutes to complete this form and mail to RAS.




