National Security Cutter Final Assembly Unit Installed



Rosslyn, VA – Jan. 26, 2006 – The final unit of the first Deepwater National Security Cutter (NSC), USCGC BERTHOLF (WMSL 750), was lifted onto the keel yesterday marking a significant construction milestone for the flag ship of the newest class of Coast Guard cutters. The first of eight NSCs being built by Northrop Grumman Ship Systems under contract to Integrated Coast Guard Systems (ICGS) has all assemblies on keel and is one step closer to reality.

"We've battled a few storms, but the diligent work ethic and production efficiencies implemented by our shipbuilding team have enabled us to maintain a great momentum," said Jamie Anton, ICGS executive vice president.

Installation of unit 1120 completes the bow section of BERTHOLF, which is now 49 percent complete overall. Production is proceeding on schedule to be delivered to the Coast Guard in the summer of 2007 and is demonstrating quality comparable to that of a fifth-in-class ship.

"Completing this milestone so quickly in the wake of the most significant natural disaster in our nation's history is a direct reflection on the dedication and professionalism of the workforce and management," said U.S. Coast Guard Capt. William S. Krewsky, on-site program representative at the Pascagoula, Miss., shipyard.

BERTHOLF will be the first Coast Guard cutter featuring the full Deepwater command & control, communications, computers, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (C4ISR) capability providing commonality and interoperability among all Deepwater assets. The C4ISR equipment and systems, designed and produced by Lockheed Martin, recently completed a full testing program at the Maritime Domain Awareness Center in Moorestown, N.J., and is due to be installed onboard the BERTHOLF this summer.

The NSC is a 418-foot ship with a 4,300-ton displacement at full load. Powered by a twin-screw combined dieseland-gas turbine-power propulsion plant, the NSC is designed to travel at 28 knots max speed. The cutter will include an aft launch and recovery area for two rigid-hull inflatable boats, a flight deck to accommodate a range of rotarywing manned and unmanned aircraft and state-of-the-art command & control electronics.

About Integrated Deepwater System

IDS is a critical multiyear, multibillion dollar program to modernize and replace the Coast Guard's aging ships and aircraft and improve systems for logistics and command and control. It is the largest recapitalization effort in the history of the Coast Guard. When complete, the interoperable IDS system will include three classes of new cutters and their associated small boats, a new fixed-wing manned aircraft fleet, upgraded helicopters, and both cutter-based and land-based unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs). All of these highly capable assets are linked by C4ISR systems and are supported by an efficient and progressive integrated logistics system.

About Integrated Coast Guard Systems

ICGS is a joint venture of Lockheed Martin (NYSE: LMT) and Northrop Grumman (NYSE: NOC). ICGS was awarded the Deepwater contract in June 2002. Headquartered in Rosslyn, Va., core leadership teams are located in Virginia, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Jersey, and Washington, D.C.





STATEMENT BY VICE ADM. TERRY CROSS, VICE COMMANDANT OF THE U.S. COAST GUARD, ON THE COAST GUARD'S DUE DILIGENCE IN SUPPORT OF THE CFIUS PROCESS

WASHINGTON - "Early in the Committee on Foreign Investments in the United States (CFIUS) process, the Coast Guard's initial review identified potential intelligence gaps. Since completing its initial intelligence assessment, the Coast Guard has continued its due diligence by auditing all Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company (P&O) operations in the United States, examining Dubai Ports World (DPW) operations outside the United States, obtaining formal assurances from DPW regarding ongoing access to information on personnel and operations, and further evaluating the proposed transaction in conjunction with other elements of the intelligence community. These additional efforts have reinforced the conclusion of the Coast Guard's initial assessment, and the Coast Guard continues to believe that, 'DP World's acquisition of P&O, in and of itself, does not pose a significant threat to U.S. assets in [continental United States] ports.' In fact, the Coast Guard will have more information about the affected terminals under DPW ownership than it currently does under P&O's ownership. During the 45-day review period, the Coast Guard will continue to work diligently within the Department of Homeland Security and the intelligence community to ensure that port security concerns are fully raised and objectively analyzed."

Dogwatch-

A dogwatch at sea is the period between 4 and 6 p.m., the first dogwatch, or the period between 6 and 8 p.m., the second dogwatch. The watches aboard ships are:

Noon to 4:00 p.m. Afternoon watch 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. First dogwatch 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Second dogwatch 8:00 p.m. to midnight 1st night watch Midnight to 4:00 a.m. Middle watch or mid watch 4:00 to 8:00 a.m. Morning watch 8:00 a.m. to noon Forenoon watch

The dogwatches are only two hours each so the same Sailors aren't always on duty at the same time each afternoon. Some experts say dogwatch is a corruption of dodge watch and others associate dogwatch with the fitful sleep of Sailors called dog sleep, because it is a stressful watch. But no one really knows the origin of this term, which was in use at least back to 1700.

Coast Guard Commissions New Cutter

U.S. Coast Guard January 23, 2006

Yerba Buena Island, Calif. - The U.S. <u>Coast Guard</u> commissioned an 87-foot patrol boat into its fleet this morning during a commissioning ceremony at Sector San Francisco on Yerba Buena Island.

The Coast Guard Cutter Pike is the latest vessel of the newest class of Coast Guard patrol boats, and is equipped for search and rescue, environmental protection, and maritime law enforcement. It will conduct these primary missions in the San Francisco Bay, as well as between Point Arena and Point Piedras Blancas in distances up to 50 miles from shore. The Pike has a crew of ten men and women, and is commanded by Lt. j.g. Robert A. Bixler of Warren, Ohio.

Rear Adm. Kevin J. Eldridge, Commander of the Eleventh Coast Guard District, officially commissioned the ship into service. This was followed by the raising of colors, reading of orders and assumption of command, setting the watch, and manning the ship, all proud traditions dating back to the early days of the Revenue Cutter Service and the U.S. Lifesaving Service.

The Honorable Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi, Democratic Leader of the House of Representatives, christened the cutter during the ceremonies. Pelosi served as the keynote speaker and was the cutter's official sponsor.


The Pike was built by Bollinger Shipyard, Inc. of Lockport, La, in September 2005. This vessel employs the latest advances in navigation and <u>Marine</u> technology. A fully integrated electronics suite coordinates radar, satellite navigation, gyrocompass, autopilot and computer generated charts to form a compact and user-friendly command and control system for the ship's personnel.

After weathering Hurricanes Katrina, Rita and Wilma, and Tropical Storm Gamma, Lt.j.g. Bixler and his crew safely navigated more than 4,700 nautical miles from Louisiana to California. During their trip, the Pike crew delivered 1,500 pounds of disaster relief supplies to Guatemala, received a visit from the U.S. Ambassador to Nicaragua, performed two port security assessments, and conducted a professional exchange and nation building exercise with the Colombian Navy.

The Pike is one of the most advanced coastal patrol boats in the world and will help the U.S. Coast Guard to respond to America's maritime needs well into the 21st Century.

The Commissioning Ceremony is the most important event in a Coast Guard cutter's history. The heart of the ceremony is the acceptance of the ship by the Coast Guard, entitling the ship to thereafter fly the Coast Guard ensign and hold the designation of U.S. Coast Guard Cutter (USCGC).

Annual Premium Update

TRDP premiums were established for each year of the contract at the time of contract award to allow for projected changes in the cost of dental care. The modest premium increases are scheduled to take effect May 1 of each year. This annual premium adjustment is automatic and will be reflected in your retired pay allotment, or if you are billed directly, in your payment coupons or electronic funds transfer (EFT). The new monthly premium rates are effective May 1, 2005 through April 30, 2006.

I'm New to TRICARE

TRICARE is the Military Health System's health care program for active duty military, active duty service families, retirees and their families, survivors, and other beneficiaries. Reservists and National Guardsmen (collectively known as the Reserve Component) are also eligible for TRICARE coverage when they are on active duty. It is a fully integrated system that brings together the health care resources of the Army, Navy, Air Force, and Coast Guard, and then supplements them with civilian health care professionals to provide better access and high-quality service, while maintaining the ability to support military operations.

The three most common programs are TRICARE Prime, TRI-CARE Extra and TRICARE Standard (formerly called CHAMPUS). TRICARE also provides a dental benefit, a comprehensive pharmacy program, and TRICARE For Life for most Medicare-eligible uniformed service retirees. Each TRICARE program has its own eligibility and enrollment requirements. You must be registered in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS) to be eligible for any TRICARE benefits. Enrollment for TRICARE coverage is subject to your location, your eligibility category, and the specific program requirements. Costs and enrollment fees also differ by program. Health benefits advisors are available at your local TRICARE Service Center (TSC) or military treatment facility (MTF) to help you decide which option is best for you. You may still be eligible for TRICARE coverage even if you have other health insurance. However, you should inform your regional contractor and healthcare provider if you have other insurance so that your benefits can be coordinated and there is no delay in the payment of claims.

New Retiree Enrollment Opportunity

Newly retired members of the uniformed services who enroll in the enhanced TRDP within 120 days after their retirement have a special opportunity to begin coverage with additional benefits, normally subject to a 12-month waiting period. Additional benefits normally subject to the 12-month waiting period are:

- Cast crowns, cast restorations and bridges covered at 50%
- Coverage for full and partial dentures at 50%
- Orthodontic coverage for both adolescents and adults at 50%

Those who wait to enroll after this 120-day period will not receive these benefits until after 12 months of continuous enrollment in the enhanced TRDP. These benefits are in addition to the immediate benefits of:

- ♦ Two cleanings in a 12-month period
- An allowance toward payment for tooth-colored fillings on back teeth
- Dental accident coverage
- Additional diagnostic and preventive services

Note: Your enrollment will be confirmed pending verification of your date of retirement. If you are mailing your application to Delta, be sure to include a copy of your retirement orders as proof of your retirement from active duty within the last 120 days. This will help expedite processing of your enrollment in the enhanced TRDP and verify your eligibility for this special offer.





I am seeking recollections and/or photos from individuals that participated in the rescue; whether in the air, on land or at sea. I'm requesting your first person account of the rescue events. This information will be given to the artist to assist in developing a mural that is historically correct. Regretfully, I will not be able to return submittals to you.

Some describe the *PRINSENDAM* rescue as the "greatest sea rescue ever". Please help us "tell" the story accurately with your first person recollections.

I enlisted in the Coast Guard in 1948 at the age of fourteen and served for 29 plus years. In 1950-1951 I was assigned to the "real" Lightship, L.V. #92. Roland Miller Sr., was the commanding officer and I was assigned as a seaman.

Lightship #92 was built as a coal burner about 1908. It had two large boilers for making steam, 90 ton coal bunkers and coal ports on both sides and a million cockroaches. The stoking was done by hand, approximately 1 ton a day on station and approximately 1 ton an hour underway at 6-8 knots.

The washing machine was a 10 gallon milk can, salt water, salt water soap and a toilet plunger as the agitator. The Lightship #92 was built as a coal burner and remained so until 1951 when she was decommissioned. She was never converted to diesel.

The Lightship #92 was relieved by Lightship #604, the Columbia River. The #604 has been decommissioned and moored in Astoria, Oregon.

In 1966 as a boot W-0/W-1, I was assigned to Lightship #605, Blunts Reef, as officer in charge. I made W-2 fourteen months later. I was relieved by Roland Miller Jr., son of my CO on L.V. #92 sixteen years later.

I believe the Lightship #92 was the last coal burner in the Coast Guard. There can't be a lot of "real" Lightship sailors still around.

KEEPING RETIREE AND ANNUITANT SERVICES INFORMED

There have been a few recent instances on retiree accounts where retirees failed to report the unfortunate passing of his/her spouse. It is critical when the spouse predeceases the retiree and Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) costs are being deducted for spouse coverage. In one of these cases, the spouse had predeceased the retiree 20 years prior to the retiree himself passing, and PSC (RAS) only became aware of the spouse's death during final pay processing. Title 31, U.S. Code 3702 states "A claim against the Government presented under this section must contain the signature and address of the claimant or an authorized representative. The claim must be received by the official responsible under subsection (a) for settling the claim or by the agency that conducts the activity from which the claim arises within 6 years after the claim accrues..." Following enactment of Public Law 107-314 (Bob Stump National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2003), for claims presented on or after December 2, 2002, waivers of the 6-year time limit can be made by the Secretary of Defense upon application by the secretary (Department of Homeland Security for U.S. Coast Guard) for amounts less than \$25,000. Any waivers submitted to Secretary of Department of Homeland Security would require clear documentation as to why the necessary information had not been reported in a timely fashion.

All retirees are reminded to inform PSC (RAS) as soon as possible following changes of marital status (divorce, death, annulment, marriage, just to mention some), death of a designated SBP beneficiary, or any other changes which could impact retired pay.

Are you eligible to make an election to participate in the SBP during the open enrollment but don't know what your lump sum buy in would be? Now there is an easy way for you to find out. Simply log on to www.dod.mil/actuary/. Under the SBP Open Season tab, you will be able to calculate your monthly SBP Premium and the open enrollment buy in cost by following the easy to understand form. This tab also offers the cost, benefit, and future value of your 2005-2006 open season enrollment election.

Place your personal correspondence to that individual in a sealed envelope, making sure to include how they can get in touch with you. TAX TIME QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Income tax deadline is right around the corner! April 15th falls on a Saturday so the IRS extended the deadline to the 17th of April. The following checklist will help you file your 2005 taxes.

Correcting a previous tax return? If you have any corrections to prior years returns, you only have 3 years to file an amended tax return. Use Form 1040X for this.

Do you need additional time to file your return? If you do, you need to file Form 4848, which provides a 6 month extension. This is only an extension to file, you still need to pay 90 percent of taxes owed by April 17th.

Have you reviewed your tax return? Be sure to check your tax return, even if you have a tax preparer complete the form for you. Your refund could be delayed or you could cause unwanted IRS scrutiny if something is amiss on your return.

VA and HHS to Target Diabetes, Obesity among American Veterans February 27, 2006

Veterans Are More Likely to Have Diabetes

WASHINGTON – With obesity and deadly diabetes at significantly higher levels among America's veterans, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) have announced a coordinated campaign to educate veterans and their families about ways to combat these health issues.

"Inactive lifestyles and unhealthy eating habits can cause needless suffering for America's veterans," said the Honorable R. James Nicholson, Secretary of Veterans Affairs. "Obesity and diabetes are major threats to the health and lifestyles of our veterans, deserving a robust campaign to better educate them on healthy habits."

Veterans are more likely than the general population to have diabetes, one of the major complications associated with being overweight. According to the American Diabetes Association, 7 percent of the U.S. population has diabetes, and the rate increases with age. Among veterans receiving VA health care, who are on average older than the general population, the rate is 20 percent.

"Central to our goal of controlling the cost of heath care is the promotion of wellness, fitness and the prevention of chronic disease. We are working to encourage Americans to adopt a healthy lifestyle and to take responsibility for making wise choices to improve their fitness and health," said HHS Secretary Mike Leavitt.

In a news conference here today, Secretary Nicholson, HHS Secretary Leavitt, Surgeon General Dr. Richard H. Carmona and VA Under Secretary for Health Dr. Jonathan B. Perlin announced the start of a campaign called "HealthierUS Veterans" – a multi-pronged educational effort to spawn healthy eating and physical activity among veterans, their families and members of their communities.

VA medical centers will promote nutrition and exercise with local groups in 40 communities that receive grants from HHS in a program called "Steps to a HealthierUS."

"Our service men and women are known for their extraordinarily high levels of fitness," said Perlin. "We want our veterans to be identified the same way."

Overweight patients receiving VA health care may participate in weight loss programs tailored to their needs. They may also receive pedometers, diet advisories and "prescriptions" suggesting how much to walk -- or, in the case of wheelchair users, how much to roll.

The two secretaries also plan to kick off regional educational campaigns this spring in four cities where VA and HHS Steps programs collaborate. Local celebrities and members of veterans service organizations will be invited to participate.

In May, the "HealthierUS Veterans" program will participate with the President's Council on Physical Fitness during the council's annual rally in Washington.





Piping

Boatswains have been in charge of the deck force since the days of sail. Setting sails, heaving lines, and hosting anchors required coordinated team effort and boatswains used whistle signals to order the coordinated actions. When visitors were hoisted aboard or over the side, the pipe was used to order "Hoist Away" or "Avast heaving." In time, piping became a naval honor on shore as well as at sea.
