
# City embracing online services

rom paying utility bills online to reviewing City Council meetings, it's getting easier for residents to do their business with the City of Lodi through the Internet.

Online bill payment is one of the newest features available to residents at www.lodi.gov. Signing up for the service is easy and secure, with residents able to pay their monthly bills with either a bank debit or credit card charge.

Nearly 100 residents had signed up for the service in the first several days following the Aug. 4 rollout.

Also this month, residents are now able to review their recent utility account infor-

mation through the city's Web site. The latest payment, amount due, billing date and due date are available through the site. The city previously began offering residents a Web portal

## City crafting first redevelopment program

odi's Community Development Department is crafting a program that would provide grants to homeowners who need financial help to fix up their houses.

Through the Lodi Community Improvement Project, approved by the Lodi City Council on July 2, the City will receive a higher percentage of property taxes paid on parcels in the project area, which is most of Lodi east of downtown.

A portion of those funds



would be awarded to incomeeligible homeowners who can't otherwise afford to make repairs that improve their property's appearance. Repairs could include paint, new windows, new door, garage door, roof, and others. The program is still pending, requiring approval of the City Council, which acts as Lodi's Redevelopment Agency.

The program has the support of the Lodi Improvement Committee. Details about the program will be decided by the City Council later this fall.

their vehicle collision reports online rather than coming to the Department, and the city provided an opportunity for anyone with Web access to comment on alternatives for the General Plan update.

Providing more information and services online is the goal for all city departments. Resi-

dents can now use Twitter (www.twitter.com) to receive news updates via computer or text-enabled cell phone by "following" CityofLodi. In just its first week, CityofLodi followers learned of a power outage and the police arrest of suspected auto burglars.

Later this year, residents should be able to register for Parks and Recreation activities and Community Center classes and programs through a single online registration portal, rather than in person or through the mail.

### Energy purchase will help stabilize Lodi Electric rates through 2012

odi Electric Utility on Tuesday agreed to buy roughly \$29 million in electricity between July 2010 and March 2012, a purchase that will help the utility keep rates stable through 2012, according to Utility Director George Morrow.

The purchase of 25 megawatts of around-the-clock

power locks up all but 25 percent of the City's electricity needs during that period. The average purchase price was \$75.62 per megawatt-hour, which compares favorably to the average price of about \$95 per megawatt-hour in the

year ending June 30, 2009.

The new purchase would cover most of the Lodi Electric Utility's needs

until the proposed Lodi Energy Center opens. The Lodi Energy Center, a 255-

megawatt power plant that would be owned by the Northern California Power Agency and built on city property adjacent to the White Slough wastewater treatment plant, could begin generating electricity as soon as April 2012 if it receives the necessary regulatory approvals.
