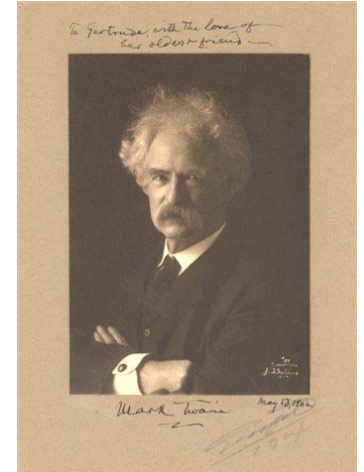
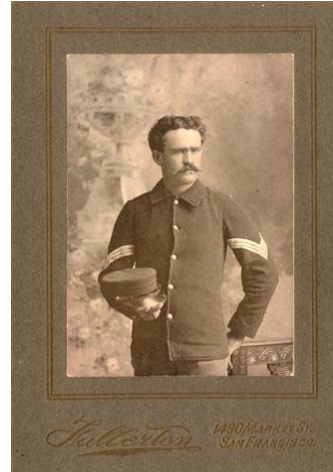


WAR & DISSENT: THE U.S. IN THE PHILIPPINES, 1898-1915

The Spanish-American War of 1898 and the Philippine War that immediately followed were turning points in United States history. The war in the Philippines triggered strong dissent within the U.S. from Mark Twain and others as the nation changed from a republic based on the consent of the governed to the possessor of a colonial empire. This exhibit of photographs, San Francisco monuments, diaries, letters, political cartoons, maps and flags looks at the Spanish-American and Philippine Wars from U.S. and Filipino points of view.
