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May 1st, 2006, **ISO/IEC DIS 26300** Ballot Passes

- ODF now an international standard
- 31/31 "yes" votes, including: Australia, Belgium, Canada, China, Czech Republic, Egypt, Finland, France, Germany, Hungary, India, Iran, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Kenya, Korea, Luxembourg, Malaysia, Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Poland, Romania, Singapore, Spain, Sri Lanka, Switzerland, United Kingdom, United States.
- Some nations expressed comments with their ballots, which ranged from statements of support, to indications of typographical errors. The OASIS ODF TC will take these comments and provide a "comment disposition report" to ISO within the next few weeks.

ISO Approval of OASIS OpenDocument Is a Blow to Microsoft

International standards bodies' unanimous approval of ISO/IEC 26300 moves OASIS OpenDocument Format to being the official XML document format. It is now unlikely that ISO will adopt Microsoft's Open XML document format.



Massachusetts moves forward to require ODF in 2007



Goliath software companies and executive resignations are no match for the state of Massachusetts.

The commonwealth said Monday it would stick to its guns and implement open document software standards in every state government agency.

Governor Mitt Romney stood by the policy as his Chief Information Officer Peter Quinn resigned over the issue last month, and as Microsoft put its foot down by saying it wouldn't natively support the OpenDocument standard in Office 12, due out mid-year.

But Romney found himself a new CIO to get the job done. Louis Gutierrez will start work on February 6. "Gutierrez will be responsible for overseeing the final stages of implementation of the state's new OpenDocument format proposal, to go into effect in January 2007," Romney announced.



Norwegian Minister: Proprietary Formats Not Acceptable

'The Norwegian government is taking large steps in their software policy: everybody in the public sector has to develop a plan for use of open source solutions within 2006. The Norwegian Minister of Modernization, Morton A. Meyer, presented new plan for information technology in Norway called "eNorge – the digital leap", where one of the points concerned open standards and open source. ...

- Within 2009 all new ICT- and information systems in the public sector shall use open standards.
- Within 2006 a set of management/administrative standards for data and document exchange should be established
- Within 2006 all operations in the public sector should have introduced plans for how they will use open standards, service oriented architecture and open source. ...

Meyer also said Proprietary formats will no longer be acceptable in communication between citizens and government. ...'

Push to Create Standards for Documents

With government records, reports and documents increasingly being created and stored in digital form, there is a software threat to electronic access to government information and archives. The problem is that public information can be locked in proprietary software whose document formats become obsolete or cannot be read by people using software from another company.

ODF 1.0 (second edition)

- In public comment period now.
- Specification will be reformatted to match ISO requirements
- Various typographical errors will be fixed
- Nonsubstantial Comments made by some National Bodies during the ISO ballot will be incorporated
- Goal is to be 100% backwards compatible with ODF 1.0. So, no schema changes/



ODF 1.1 (November 2006)

- Main focus will be accessibility, implementing recommendations made by the ODF Accessibility Subcommittee:
 - Alternative text for non-text objects (3 recommendations)
 - Proper association of captions to captioned content
 - Encoding of pagination information
 - Preservation of table semantic structure imported from other file formats
 - Proper encoding of authored table header content
 - Author-defined logical navigation of page objects in presentations
 - Provision of alternative text hints for hyperlinks



ODF 1.2 (2007)

- A variety of enhancements which may include:
 - metadata enhancements
 - better XForms integration
 - additional accessibility work
 - Specification of spreadsheet formulas
 - Interoperability with Chinese UOF format
