Subject: Re-release of NWCG Interagency Wildland Fire Key Messages

In April 2004, the NWCG approved Wildland Fire Key Messages to facilitate clear and consistent communications across all agencies and all disciplines with the goal of developing comprehensive national messages to help communicate the role of wildland fire management. The full scope of the messaging document is available at <u>http://www.nwcg.gov/teams/wfewt/message/key_message.pdf</u> with the five key thematic points stated below:

- 1) Wildland fire is an essential, natural process.
- 2) Society's influence has altered historic fire cycles, leading to a dangerous and difficult build-up of vegetation in our wildlands.
- 3) Land management agencies are committed to a balanced fire program that will reduce risks and realize benefits of fire.
- 4) Improving the health of the land and reducing risks to communities requires partnerships among federal and state agencies, tribal governments, fire departments, communities, and landowners.
- 5) Public education is necessary to the success of fire management programs.

In today's "information overload" culture, communicating the interagency fire management message is critical. In re-issuing these messages, we encourage you to continue their use in your communication products.
