

2003 State Small Business Profile: NEBRASKA

In 2002-2003, gross domestic product continued to rise nationwide, while growth in employment remained slow to recover. Small businesses continued to be a source of economic strength nationally and in Nebraska. Research from the Office of Advocacy shows that half of U.S. private non-farm output and employment stem from small firms with 500 or fewer employees. Women and minority entrepreneurs are also significant participants in the state's economy. Advocacy uses a variety of data bases to document the contributions of small, minority-, and women-owned businesses in Nebraska.

Number of Businesses. The number of employer businesses in 2002 increased by 0.7 percent and numbered 45,342. The number of self-employed individuals decreased an estimated 6.4 percent in 2002. In the state, 96.8 percent of the businesses were small (with fewer than 500 employees based on 2000 firm size data) (Source: U.S. Dept. of Labor, Employment and Training Administration; U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Census Bureau; U.S. Dept. of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics).

Women-Owned Businesses. In 2002, self-employed women totaled 36,575, or 39.1 percent of self-employed workers in the state (Source: U.S. Dept. of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics). Women-owned businesses totaled 33,500, of which 14.3 percent had employees. They generated \$4.5 billion in revenues in 1997 (Source: U.S. Dept. of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics; U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Census Bureau).

Minority-Owned Businesses. Minority-owned businesses represented 3.3 percent of the state's businesses and generated \$0.6 billion in revenues in 1997. Of these minority-owned businesses, 23.9 percent had employees (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Census Bureau).

Business Turnover. Between 2001 and 2002, new employer firms decreased 1.1 percent to 4,372. Business bankruptcies increased by 5.6 percent, and totaled 152 in 2002. Business terminations decreased by 3.0 percent, and totaled 5,234 in 2002 (Source: U.S. Dept. of Labor, Employment and Training Administration; Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts; U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Census Bureau). **Employment.** In 2000, businesses with fewer than 500 workers employed 51.2 percent of the state's 751,076 non-farm sector employees (see Table 1). The industry with the most small business employees was retail trade. Between 1999 and 2000, small businesses added a net total of 12,913 employees; they represented 69 percent of net non-farm employment change in the state (see Table 2) (U.S. Dept. of Commerce, Census Bureau, Statistics of U.S. Businesses).

Small Business Income. Non-farm proprietors' income—a partial measure of small business income—increased by 0.8 percent in 2002 and amounted to \$4.7 billion (Source: U.S. Dept. of Commerce).

Finance. Small businesses traditionally depend on local bank services and use commercial bank lenders. The number of banks in the state has decreased. The largest concentration of banks by asset size was in the less than \$100 million category.
