Breastfeeding Support

WHO IS ELIGIBLE: Any health care professional working in Philadelphia with pregnant or nursing mothers, and any nursing mother who is interested in any aspect of breastfeeding protection, promotion or support.

SUMMARY: MCFH promotes breastfeeding as the accepted and preferred method of infant and toddler feeding. Services include individual support for nursing mothers and education and training programs for health care professionals. MCFH also maintains and provides a comprehensive breastfeeding resource guide as well as other educational materials.

The Healthy People 2010 Goals for the United States state that 75 percent of babies should leave the hospital being breastfed, with 50 percent still to be breastfed at six months (25 percent exclusively) and 25 percent at one year. Citywide breastfeeding protection, promotion and support are essential to reach these goals.

Prenatal Care Services

■ WHO IS ELIGIBLE: Philadelphia residents of childbearing age.

SUMMARY: Philadelphia hospitals provide prenatal care at eight City health care centers. Nurse practitioner, physician and midwifery models are available. All clinical teams integrate clinical care with care coordination and social work services, nutritional counseling, dental screening, health education and referrals to WIC, EPSDT and family planning.

Patients are seen even if they do not have insurance. Insured patients are encouraged to bring their health insurance cards.

Low-income women who cannot qualify for insurance because of residency status or other reasons may receive prenatal care at no cost to them under the Maternity Services Program (MSP).

Family Planning Services

• WHO IS ELIGIBLE: Residents of Philadelphia and surrounding counties (Bucks, Chester, Delaware, and Montgomery) of childbearing age.

SUMMARY: Confidential family planning services are provided at all City health care centers. The family planning team includes a nurse practitioner, a social worker and a gynecologist if needed.

Services include pelvic and breast exams, Pap smears, STD treatment, HIV counseling and testing, genetic screening and options counseling. Available methods of contraception include: birth control pills, Depo-Provera, contraceptive patch, IUDs (intra-uterine devices), male and female condoms, spermicides (foam, jelly and film) and ECP (emergency contraception pills).

Patients are seen even if they do not have insurance. Insured patients are encouraged to bring their health insurance cards. Evening and Saturday hours are offered at some sites.

Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention

• WHO IS ELIGIBLE: Philadelphia families with young children; see program descriptions below for geographic and immigrant/refugee target groups.

LEAD SAFE BABIES

SUMMARY: Lead Safe Babies (LSB) is a health education and home visiting program that seeks to prevent children from becoming lead poisoned. LSB provides a home visit with environmental education and support, a bucket of cleaning supplies, a visual assessment of the home for potential lead hazards, and possible referral for lead hazard reduction services.

LSB services are available to pregnant women and new mothers living in West Philadelphia, Southwest Philadelphia, South Philadelphia and North Central and Northwest Philadelphia.

LEAD SAFE COMMUNITIES

SUMMARY: Lead Safe Communities (LSC) seeks to prevent children from becoming lead poisoned, with a special focus on the needs of immigrant and refugee populations in Philadelphia. Home visitors, often from the client's home country, provide environmental education and support, help women access program resources, and provide connections to and referrals for other problems depending on individual needs, all in a linguistically and culturally appropriate manner.

LSC services are available for women who are pregnant or have recently delivered a baby, or who have a child who has been resident in this country for less than a year, living in West Philadelphia, Southwest Philadelphia, South Philadelphia and North Central and Northwest Philadelphia.

Children with Special Health Care Needs

• WHO IS ELIGIBLE: Children who have or are at increased risk for chronic physical, emotional, behavioral and developmental health conditions.

SUMMARY: The medical and social needs of children with special health care needs (CSHCN) often require a high degree of support. This program addresses issues that affect the lives of CSHCN and their families at both a "systems" level and an individual level.

The Program Coordinator works with public and private service providers to facilitate and enhance "system" collaboration among those serving CSHCN.

Nurse Family Partnership Program

WHO IS ELIGIBLE: First-time, low-income mothers (see zip codes below).

SUMMARY: The Nurse Family Partnership Program is a research-based home visiting program. A team of public health nurses provides home visits to mothers every one to two weeks during their pregnancy. Home visits continue until the child is two years of age.

The program addresses the mother's personal health and life course development, environmental health issues, and the quality of care giving for the infant or toddler. The nurses involve family members and friends in the program and help families access other community resources.
