> This map depicts the size and location of hospitals and nursing homes relative to the State's urban population. The analysis in this Atlas for Pennsylvania is based on 172 general medical and surgical hospitals and 717 nursing homes distributed over 67 counties.
> Pennsylvania is dominated by two urban centers: Philadelphia, in the southeastern corner of the State, and Pittsburgh, in southwestern Pennsylvania. The State has several other significantly large cities, such as Allentown and Erie, but the urban population and hospitals and nursing homes are clustered around Philadelphia and Pittsburgh and their environs.
> Hospitals and nursing homes across the State appear to follow major transportation routes, although some isolated facilities exist in the more rural areas. The central and northern parts of Pennsylvania are the least urban, reflected by the scarcity of major transportation routes and health care facilities. From this map, it appears that hospitals tend to have nursing homes in their general vicinities, which may increase health care capacity in the event of an emergency.

These maps show greater detail for the two major urban areas in Pennsylvania, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia. Pittsburgh is in southwestern Pennsylvania, while Philadelphia is located in the southeast of the State. As with the State-level map, the percentage of the population in urban and rural areas is shown by census tract, along with the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals. These smaller city maps are useful for looking at the distribution of resources in areas with a high density of nursing homes and hospitals.

Both metropolitan regions are heavily bedded in terms of hospitals and nursing homes. However, Philadelphia's facilities outnumber those of Pittsburgh due to its larger size and population. Generally, nursing homes appear to be located near hospitals in these urban areas.

## HAZMAT Response

There is no regionalization of Hazardous Materials (HAZMAT) in Pennsylvania.

## Trauma Coordination

The Trauma Coordination Regions in Pennsylvania are the same as the Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Regions. Most trauma care is provided by 26 Level I or II facilities accredited by the Pennsylvania Trauma Systems Foundation (PTSF).

Emergency medical services (EMS) in Pennsylvania are organized around 16 EMS regions. These regions are made up of contiguous counties with the exception of the region containing Philadelphia, which consists of a single county. The EMS regions bear little resemblance to Health Resources and Services Administration Bioterrorism (HRSA BT) Planning Regions or the Metropolitan Medical Response System (MMRS), now called the Regional Counter-Terrorism Task Force Regions in Pennsylvania, except in the west of the State where there are some similarities. In the south of the State, the Emergency Health Services (EHS) Federation has the same geography as the South Central Pennsylvania Counter-Terrorism Task Force

Pennsylvania has three emergency management (EM) regions, made up of contiguous counties, which follow HRSA BT Planning Region boundaries. Each of the three Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) regions encompasses three HRSA BT Planning Regions, suggesting an increased likelihood of effective coordination among the agencies.

This map highlights counties that contain nursing homes strategically located in rural areas with no hospital. In addition, the map identifies counties with high levels of hospital care (i.e., a tertiary care hospital) and counties with no hospitals at all. All counties in Pennsylvania have at least one hospital or one nursing home. Seven counties have one or more nursing homes and no hospitals. Three of these counties are clustered in central Pennsylvania, while the other four are in the northern part of the State. These areas are all predominantly rural. Eight counties in Pennsylvania have tertiary care hospital facilities; five of these counties are in either in the Pittsburgh or Philadelphia metropolitan area. The other hospitals are located in central Pennsylvania and serve the State's more rural residents. It seems that the northern part of the State is underserved by tertiary care hospitals as they are mostly located in the southern half of Pennsylvania.

## Relative Facility Location and Red Cross Chapters



This map looks at areas with nursing homes and no hospitals relative to the Red Cross chapters operating in Pennsylvania. The Red Cross could support strategically located nursing homes in the event of an emergency.

There are 32 Red Cross chapters in Pennsylvania, many of which cover multiple counties especially in the north and central areas of the State. Thirteen of the State's counties are served jointly by two Red Cross chapters.

Of the counties that have a nursing home but no hospital, only one (Snyder County) has its own Red Cross chapter. Pike County, in the northeast of the State, is served by two Red Cross chapters. All of the remaining counties are served by Red Cross chapters that provide services to multiple counties. ## Chester County EMS Region



This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older in the Chester County EMS Region, a single county with 5 hospitals and 18 nursing homes. The region is heavily rural but is linked by major transportation routes to the outer suburbs of Philadelphia to the east. The region's highest proportion of elderly residents is in the north of the county, where the population density is relatively low. All hospitals in the region are close to nursing home facilities, and nearly all are near major roads. The only hospital not on a significant highway is Phoenixville Hospital in the northeast section of the county.

The population pyramid has a noticeable bubble between the ages of 30 and 55 , indicating that the elderly population will grow in the next 10 years. The shape of the pyramid indicates slow population growth as the number of people younger than 15 is consistently decreasing.

## Delaware County EHS Region








This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older in the Delaware County Emergency Health Services (EHS) Region, a single county with 4 hospitals and 30 nursing homes. The county is bordered by New Jersey to the south and Philadelphia to the east. Its proximity to Philadelphia makes this a very urban region with suburbs of the city taking up most of the county. There appears to be a relatively high percentage of elderly residents in the county, particularly in areas with nursing homes. The region's hospitals have nursing homes relatively close by. Although the nursing homes are not always adjacent to the hospitals, the small size and urban nature of the region aids accessibility.

The population pyramid shows a large bubble between the ages of 30 and 59, indicating that the number of elderly persons in the region is due to increase significantly in the next 10 years. With the number of elderly persons in the county already high, this increase may stress the area's health care facilities. Decreasing numbers of children suggest a slowing natural population growth.

## Eastern PA EMS Region



This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older in the six-county Eastern Pennsylvania EMS Region, which has 14 hospitals and 64 nursing homes. These counties include some significant urban centers, such as Allentown and Bethlehem, situated on the Lehigh River. These cities are served by several hospitals and numerous nursing homes. Areas to the west and north of the region have the highest percentage of elderly persons in the population, with several large nursing homes. The region is served by numerous transportation routes along which all of the region's hospitals can be found. Each of the hospitals has at least one nursing home close by except for Palmerton Hospital in Carbon County, with only 70 beds.

The region's population pyramid shows a prominent elderly population. A significant bubble between the ages of 30 and 60 will further increase the senior sector of the population in the next 10 years. There also appears to be a declining number of children in the area, implying slow or no natural population growth.

## EHS Federation EMS Region



This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older in the Emergency Health Services (EHS) Federation EMS Region, which has 15 hospitals and 101 nursing homes. All of the hospitals have nursing homes relatively close by or are on major transportation routes, making health care accessible during an emergency. Harrisburg is close to the geographic center of the region, and most of the transportation routes flow through this city. Many of the region's nursing home facilities are on routes leading to and from Harrisburg, although clusters of facilities are also seen in Lancaster to the southeast and York to the south. Despite the large number of nursing homes in the area, the density of the elderly populace does not appear to be extremely high.

The population pyramid for this region shows a large bubble between the ages of 25 and 60, which will lead to an increased number of elderly persons in the region in the next 10 years. The base of the population pyramid indicates fewer children being added to the population, leading to slow natural population increase.

## EMMCO East EMS Region



This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older in the Emergency Medical Management Cooperative (EMMCO) East EMS Region, which has 8 hospitals and 19 nursing homes. Cameron County is the only county in the region that does not have a hospital. It does, however, have a nursing home facility with 40 beds. This apparent lack of facilities is not particularly surprising as Elk State Forest takes up the vast majority of the county. The hospitals in this region all have nursing homes close by that could be used as overflow in an emergency. The rural, forested nature of this region, along with the high proportion of elderly residents, suggests that transportation and accessibility may be a problem during an urgent event.

The population pyramid shows a large bubble between the ages of 25 and 55 . This suggests that the number of elderly persons in this region will increase over the next 10 years. The lower end of the population pyramid shows a significant decline in the number of children in the region, indicating a slow natural population growth.

This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older in the Emergency Medical Management Cooperative (EMMCO) West EMS Region, which has 12 hospitals and 55 nursing homes. Forest County in the east of the region is the only county without a hospital, although it does have a nursing home facility with 100 beds. Erie County has by far the greatest number of hospital $(1,032)$ and nursing home $(2,112)$ beds. This county is home to the city of Erie, and its population appears to have a lower proportion of elderly persons than those of other counties in the region. All of the hospitals in the region have nursing homes close by and are near to major transportation routes, except for a small ( 56 -bed), relatively isolated hospital in Titusville.

The population pyramid for the region indicates a slow natural population growth as the number of children is declining. A significant bubble in population can be seen between the ages of 30 and 60, indicating an increase in the number of elderly persons in the region in the next 10 years.

This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older in the EMS Institute Region, which has 37 hospitals and 149 nursing homes. Allegheny County (Pittsburgh) dominates this region with over 5,155 hospital beds and 8,120 nursing home beds. This is a very highly populated region, with the proportion of elderly residents increasing as one moves away from Pittsburgh toward the more rural edges of the region. Most of the hospitals in the region have nursing homes close by or are on major transportation routes. All counties in the region have hospitals, and a large number of major roads makes this region more accessible than most.

The population pyramid for this region shows a bubble between the ages of 30 and 55 , implying that the number of elderly persons will increase over the next decade. The base of the pyramid shows slow natural growth with the population as a whole looking fairly stable.

## EMS of Northeastern Pennsylvania


This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older in the EMS of Northeastern Pennsylvania, which has 12 hospitals and 50 nursing homes. Most facilities in this region are in Lackawanna and Luzerne Counties, where there are 10 hospitals and 44 nursing homes. All of the hospitals in the region have nursing homes close by, and these services are all close to major transportation routes. Pike County is the only county in the region without a hospital, although it does have two nursing homes with a total of 110 beds. Apart from Lackawanna and Luzerne Counties, the nature of this region is mostly rural, and the age structure reflects this, with a high proportion of elderly residents throughout.
The population pyramid as a whole for the region suggests an extremely slow natural growth rate with births declining and the number of elderly residents appearing to be high. A bubble between the ages of 30 and 55 indicates an increasingly aging population that will impact the region in the next 10 years.

This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older for the Lycoming-Tioga-Sullivan (LTS) EMS region, which has 3 hospitals and 13 nursing homes. The LTS EMS region is located in predominantly forested land with several State game lands located throughout the area. Sullivan County is extremely rural with a large proportion of elderly residents and a lack of hospital facilities because of its small size. Lycoming County dominates the two other counties in the region, with the city of Williamsburg including a cluster of nursing homes and the region's largest hospital (Susquehanna Health System). All three hospitals in the region are close to nursing homes and are on major transportation routes. The bubble in the population pyramid between the ages of 30 and 55 indicates that the elderly population will grow in the region in the next 10 years. The base of the population pyramid shows slow growth as the birthrate in the region appears to be declining. It also appears that young adults are leaving the area, as shown by the relatively low numbers of people between the ages of 20 and 30 .

This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older in the Philadelphia EMS Region. Although this region consists of a single county and is geographically very small, the population density of this major urban center makes for a very high number of elderly residents. The large number of hospitals and nursing homes provides many options for hospitals to acquire overflow aid from surrounding nursing homes.

The population pyramid for this region does not show the expected "Baby Boom" bubble and indicates relatively stable population numbers from the ages of 0 to 50 . Above age 50 , numbers start to decline through natural processes of mortality. The large and steady number of people through the groups aged 55 years or younger indicates a significant increase in the number of elderly residents in the region in the next decade.

## Seven Mountains EMS Region



This map examines the size and location of nursing homes and hospitals relative to the distribution of the population aged 65 or older in the Seven Mountains EMS Region, which consists of four rural counties in the Allegheny Mountains of central Pennsylvania. Juniata County is the only county in the region that does not have a hospital. There are, however, three nursing homes in this county along U.S. 22. All of the hospitals in the region have nursing homes close by; the nursing home facilities also tend to be near highways. Bucktail Medical Center in Renovo is the only hospital in the region that appears to be isolated from a major road. The population pyramid for the region has one overwhelming characteristic that sets it apart from the others in the State: a disproportionate jump in the population between the ages of 20 and 24. This is due to the location of Pennsylvania State University in State College, located in Centre County. Other than the jump in college-age population, the population pyramid for the area has few outstanding characteristics. A slight bulge for those aged 30 to 54 indicates that the number of elderly persons in the area is likely to climb in the next 10 years.
