





Computers for Learning Program

Education is a national priority. Every child should be educated to his or her full potential. GSA's Computers For Learning (CFL) Program helps accomplish this goal by increasing school access to technology needed to prepare children to contribute and compete in the 21st century.

The CFL program allows government agencies to transfer excess educationally useful computer equipment to schools and educational nonprofit organizations, giving special consideration to those with the greatest need. Federal agencies report computers and peripheral equipment they no longer need to a GSA managed data base. Eligible recipients then search the data base using a virtual shopping cart and process through "checkout" to request their selections.

Who is eligible to receive computer equipment through the CFL program?

 Schools and educational nonprofit organizations located in the United States, the U.S. Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, or the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, can receive computer equipment through the CFL program.

- A school is eligible to participate if it is a public, private, or parochial school serving some portion of the pre-kindergarten through grade 12 population. Home schools are not qualified to participate in the CFL program unless they are recognized by the U.S. Department of Education as a school with an NCES number. Day care centers must provide a state approved preschool curriculum in order to participate.
- An educational nonprofit organization must have a 501(c)(3) Tax ID and meet the educational institution criteria specified under Title 40 USC such as certification and license requirements.

Recipients of computers and other educationally useful federal equipment must make their own arrangements for transportation and pickup of the property and gain title to the property upon receipt.
