#### Seminar Participation and Grading:

This is a seminar course in which active student participation is expected. The other major expectation is a c. 20-page research paper. To help prepare for this long paper, students will be required to submit a short, 5-page paper by October 10. This paper will be used primarily to assess students' writing skills but may also be used to explore possible topics for the longer research paper. The research paper could be devoted to an intensive study of a health care organization or institution, the politics of a specific piece of legislation, or the administrative reality of a health policy initiative. Topics are to be negotiated between student and instructor, and **all** term papers should be discussed in detail with the instructor well before final drafting.

The finished draft of the term paper should be handed in no later than <u>Monday,December 15</u>. There will be no examinations.

Final course grades will not be released until the anonymous course evaluations have been turned in at the end of the semester.
