Year 'round, there are nature programs offered by state and federal agencies, as well as nonprofits.








'Masked bandit' holds own place in history

Raccoons were one of the many marvels encountered by English colonists when they arrived in the New World. Algonquins called the raccoon 'aroughcun' which loosely translates to 'he who scratches with his hands.' Captain John Smith described the animal in his Generall Historie of Virginia (1624): 'There is a beast they call aroughcun [raccoon], much like a badger, but useth to live [in] trees as squirrels do.' The species is found primarily in North America and has no European cousins. It is distantly related to the bear. Raccoons generally are nocturnal animals and seeing them in the daytime sometimes can indicate that they are diseased and disoriented so should be avoided.

Lost and Found

Red Wolves making comeback

One of the world's most endangered wild canids, it was once common throughout the southeastern US, but its populations were decimated by the 1960s due to intensive predator control programs and loss of habitat. A remnant population was found along the Culf coast of Texas and Louisiana. After being declared an endangered species in 1973, efforts began to locate and capture as many wild Red Wolves as possible. Of the 17 wolves captured, 14 became the founders of a successful captive breeding program. Consequently, the US Fish and Wildlife Service declared Red Wolves extinct in the wild in 1980.

By 1987, enough of the animals were bred in captivity to begin a restoration program on Alligator River National Wildlife Refuge. Since then, the population area has expanded to include three national wildlife refuges, a Department of Defense bombing range,

state-owned lands, and private property, spanning a total of 1.7 million acres.

An estimated 100 Red Wolves roam the wilds of northeastern North Carolina and another 180 comprise the captive breeding program, still an essential element of Red Wolf recovery.

The average adult red wolf weighs 50-80 pounds, stands about 26 inches at the shoulder and measures about four feet from the tip of the nose to the end of the tail.

They are social animals, living in packs consisting of a breeding adult pair and their offspring of different years, typically five to eight animals. They prey on a variety of wild mammals such as raccoon, rabbit, white-tailed deer, nutria, and other rodents. Most active at dusk and dawn, they are elusive and generally avoid humans and human activity.



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

Pit vipers, the only types of poisonous snakes found in the region, have elliptical pupils. All other local snakes have round pupils, signaling that they aren't poisonous.





Seabirds of the Gulf Stream have own magic

Did you know that just by traveling 20 to 30 miles out to sea off the Outer Banks that you can see several species of birds in one day that you would be hard-pressed to see in years of shore-based birding?

This is the world of pelagic birding, and the Gulf Stream off Cape Hatteras is a world-class destination for what has become known as "seabirding." People travel thousands of miles to come to see the local specialty, the Black-capped Petrel and a variety of other deep-water species. The waters of the Cape are a destination for birds from all over the Atlantic.

Tiny Wilson's Storm-Petrels from Antarctica, Greater Shearwaters from far away Tristan de Cunha, Cory's Shearwaters from the Azores and the Mediterranean, Sooty Shearwaters from South America, Manx Shearwaters from Britain, Great Skuas from Iceland, White-tailed Tropicbirds from Bermuda, Leach's Storm-Petrels from Newfoundland, and Pomarine Jaegers from the arctic tundra are all species that might seen on a seabirding trip, and with a little luck, most might be seen in one day.

Though birders and ornithologists have surveyed the local Gulf Stream waters for more than 30 years, much remains to be learned. Though diversity tends to peak between May and September, as many as 12 species have been spotted in a day in early November. For those who like to watch birds in action, these trips are a great experience. The closest parallels in land-based birding are sea-watching from shore and hawk-watching. But what is different about pelagic birding is the ability to move closer to the action, and by using fish oil and other tasty offerings, birds can be enticed into coming closer for viewing. The grace and agility of the ocean wanderers is truly a sight to behold but one that you might never see if you don't go to sea.

Captain Brian Patteson has organized and led hundreds of pelagic trips from the Outer Banks since the early 1990's. He now runs most of his trips from Hatteras on his own boat, the Stormy Petrel II. Call 252-986-1363 or visit www.seabirding.com.



Outer Banks' history is wild!

The Outer Banks is known for its maritime and colonial history, but its abundance of wildlife also holds historical importance. The region's wildlife was among the earliest aspects of the New World to be reported in England. After Arthur

Barlowe landed on Roanake Island in 1584, he reported "such a flocke of Cranes (the most part white) [which] arose under us, with such a crye redoubled by many Ecchoes, as if an armie

of men had showed all

together."

The woods, Barlowe wrote, were full of deer, rabbits and birds "even in the middest of Summer, in incredible aboundance."

Squirrels and bears were added to the list of animals found within 100 miles of Roanoke Island, while Native Americans were said to sometimes kill a "Lyon" — probably a panther -- and wolves were noted.

Early explorers also reported seeing a wide variety of marine life including sturgeons, herrings, crabs and shellfish.

"There are many Tortoyses both of lande and sea kinde," explorer and scientist Thomas Hariot concluded. "[T]heir backs & bellies are shelled very thicke; their head, feete, and taile, which are in appearance, seems

ougly as though they were members of a serpent or venemous: but notwithstanding they are very good meate, as also their egges. Some have bene founde of a yard in bredth and better."

The alligator received attention and, although once almost wiped out of the area. now are common sights.

John Lawson made passing reference to the bullfrog, "so call'd," he said, "because he lows exactly like that Beast,

which makes Strangers wonder (when by the side of a Marsh) what's the matter, for they hear the Frogs low, and can see no Cattle."

The wide array of wildlife is still appreciated and celebrated in the Outer Banks region. Area nonprofits and agencies offer an assortment of programs and activities for nature-lovers all year long and the Wings Over Water Wildlife Festival to be held Nov. 6-11, 2007 offers dozens of programs for paddlers, birders and others who enjoy the great outdoors.

During William Powell's tenure as curator of the N.C. Collection at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, he recounted the history of documenting the region's wildlife. A portion of the above is excerpted from Powell's work.

Weidensaul to present keynote address

eynote speaker for this year's Wings Over Water Wildlife Festival will be Scott Weidensaul, author of more than two dozen books on natural history including the Pulitzer Prize-nominated "Living on the Wind."

In 1955, naturalists Roger Tory Peterson and James Fisher published their best selling book "Wild America," chronicling a now-legendary 30,000-mile trip across North America. Fifty years later, Weidensaul retraced their epic journey, to see what has been gained and lost, and to catch a glimpse of what the future holds for wildlife and wild lands.

"I'd read 'Wild America' as a kid, and was — like most of its readers — on fire with the idea of doing a similar trip, bumming around wild country finding exotic birds," said Weidensaul. "But as I got older and periodically re-read the book, I came to realize that Peterson and Fisher were seeing America at a crossroads in the early 1950s, both culturally and at a critical time for conservation.

"And I realized that with the fiftieth anniversary of the publication of the original book coming up in 2005, there was a marvelous opportunity to go back



and retrace the original trip, and use it as a framework to look at what we'd gained and what we'd lost for conservation in the past half-century."

As he retraced the steps of
Peterson and Fisher, Weidensaul traveled from the great seabird cliffs of
Newfoundland to the cypress swamps
of Florida, from the cloud forests of the
Sierra Madre in Mexico to lonely islands
far out in the Bering Sea. He searched
out the wild heart of the continent
- and found it strong. His journey and
subsequent findings are the basis of
his book "Return to Wild America: A

Yearlong Search for the Continent's Natural Soul."

Weidensaul lives in the mountains of eastern Pennsylvania, where he studies the migration of hawks, owls and hummingbirds.

He writes for such publications as Smithsonian, Audubon, Nature Conservancy and National Wildlife and his newest book is "Of a Feather: A Brief History of American Birding."

The Wings Over Water Wildlife Festival keynote dinner will be at 6 p.m., Friday, Nov. 9, at Roanoke Island Festival Park. Cost is \$30 and advanced registration is required. See registration form on pages 41-42.

Large sharks swim inches away from visitors as they peer through a 5.5-inch acrylic window that's 35-foot long and 14 feet tall. The window wraps up and overhead in a candy-cane shape offering an overhead view of the tank's inhabitants. Civil war buffs will marvel at the one-third-scale replica of the USS Monitor, which lies just off Cape Hatteras

In addition to being a premier birding area, black bears, alligators, red wolves and other wildlife also inhabit the region. From Nov. 6 to Nov. 11, 2007, Wings Over Water Wildlife Festival will give birders many opportunities to add to their life lists; paddlers can discover the wonderful inland waterways; and natural history enthusiasts can learn about the history of the area, take a photography class or try their hand at carving. Come join us for a walk on the wild side.

Coastal Wildlife Refuge Society

The Coastal Wildlife Refuge Society is a non-profit

organization established and incorporated in 1989 by a group of local residents with the mission to generate funds to support refuge programs and activities and to assist in the recruitment of Refuge volunteers. The Society designed, constructed,



and staffs the Visitor Center and Gift Shop for Pea Island National Wildlife Refuge. It also provides support for the refuges' large and diverse volunteer program and for educational and outreach activities. In recent years, due to declining budgets for US Fish and Wildlife Service which manages the refuges, the Society has expanded its support to help fund other needed projects.

Outer Banks Chamber of Commerce
