Welcome to Cross Creeks National Wildlife Refuge, one of over 545 national wildlife refuges administered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The 8,862 acre refuge stretches 11 miles on either side of Lake Barkley on the Cumberland River in Stewart County, Tennessee. The combination of deciduous woodlands, open water, marsh and croplands provide excellent habitat for various species of birds. Manipulation of water levels in refuge pools resulting in moist soil areas rich in natural plant and animal life create unlimited food resources for wading birds, marsh and shorebirds, raptors, songbirds and waterfowl.

The refuge is approximately four miles east of Dover, Tennessee off of Highway 49. Travel east from Dover three miles, turn left at the refuge sign and proceed one mile. Signs will direct you to the refuge office/visitor center and main entrance to the refuge.

*How to use your
checklist*

The bird checklist was designed to be informative and simple to use. The list is arranged in the order established by the American Ornithological Union. Symbols which appear in this checklist represent the following:

*Seasonal
appearance*

Sp-Spring, March-May
S-Summer, June-August
F-Fall, September-November
W-Winter, December-February

Seasonal abundance

a - abundant (a common species which is very numerous)

c - common (certain to be seen in suitable habitat)

u - uncommon (present but not certain to be seen)

o - occasional (seen only a few times during a season)

r - rare (seen only once or twice a year; some years not at all)

x - accidental - (out of normal species range)

* - nests on the refuge.

+ - Irruptive species seen most frequently during invasion years (2-10 year intervals)

This checklist includes 251 species of birds and is based on observations by refuge personnel and visiting ornithologists. Another 26 species which have been observed very infrequently are presently listed under "Accidental" birds. If you should find an unlisted species, please let us know at Refuge Headquarters. We appreciate your help in updating our records.
