Sport Fishing Regulations

Sport fishing is permitted only in Duck, Westcut Lakes, Possum Bayou, Lake Long and in the immediate vicinity of the Lake Agnes drainage culverts on the Red River.

Use of gear or equipment other than hook and line to catch fish or bait fish is prohibited.

Fishing is permitted from March 1 through October 15 during daylight hours only.

Yo-yo's are permitted during daylight hours only and must be attended (within sight) at all times.

Largemouth bass must be a minimum of 14 inches long. Possession of largemouth bass less than 14 inches long is prohibited on the refuge.

Black and white crappie (white perch) must be a minimum of 10 inches long. Possession of crappie less than 10 inches long is prohibited on the refuge.

Possession of cleaned or processed fish on the refuge is prohibited.

Creel limits, boating safety, and license requirements are in accordance with state regulations unless otherwise specified in this brochure.

Signs and Boundaries

Signs are useful tools in regulating the use of a public area. The wording of the sign applies to the area behind the sign. Please respect the following signs.



This sign delineates the refuge boundary. Always know the regulations before entering.



All hunting and possession of any weapon is prohibited beyond this sign.



This area is closed to all public entry. Exceptions stated on sign.



Speed limit on refuge roads, unless otherwise posted.



Only ATVs are allowed on these trails.

Deer-Youth Hunt (Lottery)	Nov. 25, 2008 Dec. 13, 2008 Dec. 30, 2008	Rifles allowed. One parent and one staff/volunteer with each youth. Two deer, (one buck, one doe) per hunt. Hunter orange required.
Waterfowl	Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday until noon during State Season	Closed during muzzleloader hunts. Boats, blinds and decoys must be removed daily by 1 pm. Non-toxic shot required. Possession of lead shot prohibited. Dogs only permitted to retrieve game.
Youth Waterfowl Weekend	State Zone Date	All refuge waterfowl hunting regulations apply.
Dove, Snipe and Rail	State Season	Allowed ONLY during waterfowl hunt days during the State dove season. May be taken incidental to waterfowl hunting. Closed during muzzleloader deer hunts. Only non-toxic shot allowed.
Woodcock	State Woodcock Season	Closed during muzzleloader deer hunts. Non-toxic shot required.
Turkey	First 16 days of State Season until noon	Harvested turkeys must be checked at Dupuy's Grocery (located 7 miles south of the refuge on Hwy 452). Incidental hunting of hogs and use of turkey gobbler decoys is prohibited during Turkey season.

Note: Archers, you must collect biological data on the deer you harvest by weighing, taking antler measurements, pulling a jawbone, and recording data at the unmanned check station on the west end of Lake Long Road. Equipment, data forms, and instructions will be provided. Failure to comply will result in the issuance of a citation.
