Karoline McMullen (Chesterland, OH)

Certified by: Save Our Stream

Karoline was inspired by a clip in the movie "Pay It Forward" to start her volunteer work. At fifteen, she launched "S.O.S." ("Save Our Stream") to educate the public about the importance of reviving the endangered population of Ohio brook trout in her area and restoring its coldwater habitat. Visiting a local land conservancy, Karoline learned that brook trout used to thrive in most streams in Ohio, but are now disappearing due to runoff pollution and urban sprawl. "I grew up splashing and catching insects in a stream where brookies live," she said. "They are my community's local treasure." With

help from friends and other volunteers, Karoline conducted a survey to gauge public awareness, prepared presentations and informational flyers, spoke to numerous school and community groups and recently wrote a book regarding the Chagrin River Watershed and efforts to save brook trout habitat for grade school students. In addition, Karoline testified on behalf of new legislation in her town to protect the watershed, and is helping other environmental groups get started.

Jerry Markley (Cincinnati, OH)

Certified by: Cincinnati Police Department

Cincinnati is a little safer thanks to the efforts of Jerry Markley who founded the Cincinnati Police Departments Citizens on Patrol Program (COPP). During the 1990's, he was a member of the Police Department's Volunteer Surveillance Team. In 1996, using his own funds, Jerry paid for Cincinnati police officers, a council member and himself to travel to Fort Worth, Texas and later to San Diego, California to learn more about their volunteer citizen patrol programs. He then acquired and passed on to the Police Department the operational procedures of additional citizen patrol programs around the country. In 1997, with Jerry's input and "push," the Cincinnati COPP was introduced. Through his efforts and personal donations, two police substations also were established in Madisonville. Currently, Mr. Markley volunteers 40 - 50 hours to the program and has volunteered just as many hours in a single week.
