Chaute Watson (Raleigh, NC)

Chaute Watson of Raleigh didn't let her disability or other people's perception about her ability stop her from volunteering. In 2005, she contacted Interact Volunteer Services about becoming a Crisis Line Counselor. Interact is a 24-hour agency offering safety and support to victims and survivors of domestic violence/rape/sexual assault. Because Chaute is totally visually impaired, she had to overcome some apprehension on the part of Interact staff given that the provision of many client resources is paper-based. Chaute successfully completed the training class and since then Chaute works the Interact's crisis lines weekly helping men, women and children deal with domestic violence as well rape/sexual assault.

Jim Eddins (High Point, NC)

Jim Eddins of High Point is probably the most popular man in the High Point Regional Health System. He arrives at the hospital Monday through Friday to volunteer by 6:30 am. Jim has been a volunteer since 1991 and has donated 5,500 hours of service to date. Prior to becoming a hospital volunteer, Jim spent years volunteering with Open Door Ministries. He has far exceeded President Bush's challenge to all Americans to donate two years or 4,000 hours of service during our lifetime. Jim routinely seeks ways to make a meaningful difference at the hospital. In addition to his regular assignments, he assists with blood drives, has been recognized for registering a record number of employees, and volunteers to give blood. Jim is one of our most active volunteers performing some of the most laborious jobs, pushing carts, delivering mail, escorting patients, and transporting supplies. His positive attitude, dedication, and high level of activity, make him a volunteer role model as others around him experience the challenges of aging. He is excited about turning 91 years young April 2006 and does not plan on slowing down.
