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HIGHLIGHTS OF CHARLESTON-NORTH CHARLESTON, SC NATIONAL COMPENSATION SURVEY MAY 2007

Workers in the Charleston-North Charleston metropolitan area averaged \$17.05 per hour during May 2007, according to new survey results from the National Compensation Survey (NCS) released by the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). Regional Commissioner Janet S. Rankin reported average hourly earnings of \$26.62 for management, professional, and related workers and \$15.33 for natural resources, construction, and maintenance workers. Production, transportation, and material moving workers averaged \$14.39 an hour; sales and office workers, \$14.26; and service workers, \$8.95. [See table 1. Note: Occupational aggregations are now based on the 2000 Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) system.]

In the Charleston area, management, professional, and related workers represented the largest occupational group in the survey at 28 percent. Sales and office workers accounted for 26 percent; service workers, 20 percent; and production, transportation, and material moving workers, 15 percent. Natural resources, construction, and maintenance workers accounted for the remainder.

The NCS provides straight-time earnings for occupations in establishments with one or more workers in private industry and State and local governments. This NCS survey covered 258 establishments representing 259,600 workers in the Charleston-North Charleston Metropolitan Statistical Area which is comprised of Berkeley, Charleston, and Dorchester Counties in South Carolina. Agricultural establishments, private households, the self-employed, and the Federal Government were excluded from the survey.

In the Charleston area, average hourly wages were published for a number of detailed occupations. Within the management, professional, and related occupations, elementary and middle school teachers averaged \$27.20 per hour. In the sales and office occupations, executive secretaries and administrative assistants earned \$15.41 per hour and cashiers earned \$8.49. Industrial machinery mechanics part of the natural resources, construction, and maintenance occupational group, earned \$21.69. (See table 2.)

The NCS also provides broad coverage of selected occupational characteristics. Establishments in the Charleston area with 1-99 workers averaged \$14.96 per hour and those in establishments with 100-499 workers earned \$17.66; workers in establishments with 500 or more employees earned \$20.18. Full-time workers averaged \$17.98 per hour while their part-time counterparts earned \$9.38. (See table 1.)

The NCS is a comprehensive survey that measures occupational earnings, occupational levels based on duties and responsibilities, compensation cost trends, and benefit incidences. The Employment Cost Index (ECI) component measures changes in labor costs. Average employer costs for employee compensation are available from the Employer Cost for Employee Compensation (ECEC) series. Details on benefits incidences and provisions are available from the Employee Benefits Survey (EBS). The occupational wage data may be used by businesses for establishing pay plans, making decisions concerning plant relocation, and in collective bargaining negotiations.
